Dunolly moving to replace lost library

The Dunolly community will campaign for a permanent solution after losing access to a mobile library service.

Community group Dunolly and District Inc. has established a sub-committee aimed at working with the Central Goldfields Shire in order to find a solution to the town's lack of library services, after the Goldfields Library Corporation announced in May that its mobile library would no longer visit Dunolly.

Group member, Marion Da Costa, said while plans were very much in their infancy, the sub-committee will outline a desire for either a new purpose-built library, or for the service to share a space in another community building. "Ideally, we would like to see either a

"Ideally, we would like to see either a new permanent library built in town, or for it to share a home with another community service," Ms Da Costa said.

The Central Goldfields Shire is expected to undertake a community consultation process in Dunolly in order to plan a course of action in the coming months, with the outcome to



dictate what form the new library may take.

"The mobile library service was an important part of life in Dunolly," Ms Da Costa said.

"It wasn't just about access to books or internet, but it was a meeting place for people, and a social outing. There is a sense of disappointment among people, and even a feeling that there's nothing that can be done to solve the problem."

Ms Da Costa said the group was hopeful that the new library, whatever form it may take, would become a centre-point for the Dunolly community.

"Hopefully it becomes a meeting place for the town," she said.

"Somewhere where people can go and read the local newspapers, or where community groups can hold meetings, or even to establish clubs like the scrabble club which has formed in Maryborough."

CFA Agreement- letter from the Premier

Dear Editor,

There have been a lot of lies told about the new CFA agreement, and these lies are causing unnecessary concern for volunteers and the communities they protect every single day.

This nasty and spiteful dispute went on for over 1000 days. It simply couldn't go on for another 1000 days and that's why we've brought it to a close.

Under the agreement, CFA volunteer fire stations will continue operating as they always have – with their own independence, their own special connections to the community, and their own unique knowledge of their local area.

The role of volunteer firefighters in this state is sacrosanct. At no stage has our Government questioned it or jeopardised it.

It is time to debunk the lies of this nasty scare campaign:

- The need to dispatch seven firefighters to a fire ground is limited to 34 integrated stations in highly populated areas, like Frankston and Geelong. This won't apply to the other 1200 CFA stations around our state – that's 97% of them.
- There is no veto power in this agreement. Like most workplaces, there will be consultation on issues that affect the employment of career firefighters, such as the recognition of prior learning. But let's be very clear, there is no veto power.
- The agreement specifically states that the role of volunteers is not altered by the agreement, and to suggest it will destroy the CFA is the most irresponsible lie of all.

I promise your readers this: by the time the next fire season rolls around, this long running dispute will be behind us; the CFA will be stronger than ever before, and so will be the dedicated volunteers who have protected our state for so many years.

In the meantime, the Emergency Services Minister James Merlino and I will be visiting volunteer and career firefighters across Victoria to explain the agreement, to listen to local brigades and to honour the work done by volunteer and career firefighters to keep our state safe.

At the end of this year our mobile library service will discontinue and everyone in the community should think about what they would like to see the new library service provide. One of the biggest trends worldwide is the delivery of education through online courses. You can access online University courses at Maryborough Library. There are innovative online universities which have started up in two country towns in Australia; Geraldton and Cooma, where students can attend online University courses tailored to the needs of the local community. For example Cooma's Degree in Agriculture studies soil, climate and farming systems for that region. Imagine if Dunolly were to offer an online University, based in our library, offering degrees tailored to our region! In recent years some modern libraries have evolved from places where people weren't even allowed to make any noise and were expected to creep around quietly. In the 21st century libraries can support:

- Strong local economies, (if you have to travel to another town to borrow books, you are more likely to do your shopping at that town).
- Social inclusion
- · Warm and inviting space
- Internet access
- Storytime for toddlers and pre-schoolers
- Community Lounge Room
- Homework space after school activity space online university study courses
- Meeting rooms for community groups
- Access point to link and deliver services to very disadvantaged people
- Book Clubs, U3A meeting space, crossword group, scrabble club
- Daily newspapers
- Demonstration of functioning sustainable building with solar power
- Community hub with library and co-located services

The footpath in the main street still has to have work done on it, which will happen soon.

When you drive through Bealiba, the main street looks great, but it would be great if we could get the protective fencing cleaned up. I will have to stir the Shire up and get them moving on it.

I have heard on the grapevine that the Railway Hotel is going to open in a couple of weeks; time will tell. There will be two cafes` opening in Broadway in the spring, which is also good news.

Local Crime Prevention

Police give advice on security and safety of your homes and cars. There is obviously a growing danger in the growing danger in the community opportunistic burglary and theft due to the

raging 'ice' epidemic. We need to be vigilant with our possessions and make sure we don't leave ourselves to be easy prey. These people are stealing small, easily portable items which will be easy to sell. They are also quite desperate to obtain money at any cost so must never be confronted. The best we can do as a community is to maintain our own safety and security and that of our neighbours. Like the slogan "Make like a Meerkat" and watch out for what is going around us. If in doubt call 000.

Lock up your car

Statistics have shown that theft from motor vehicles continues to be on the rise, despite police warnings. Hand held devices such as GPS systems, mobile phones, cameras and notebook computers are regularly being stolen. This kind of theft is the state's highest volume crime. It is also the easiest to prevent, from the victim's perspective, by simply removing valuables from the vehicle when parked. If you don't want it stolen don't leave it in the car! It's only common sense. Theft from a motor vehicle is a purely opportunistic offence. It happens in residential driveways and on nature strips as easily as it does in public spaces such as carparks. Another security measure is to fit security screws to your vehicle's number plates to prevent their unlawful removal.

It's up to you! This warning is repeated so often it is becoming boring. Lock up your car when you leave it unattended and don't be a soft target.

Livestock on public roads

Caution required

Livestock on country roads can represent significant danger to the public, stock and stock handlers. It is the responsibility of all road users to be vigilant when travelling on roads that are regularly used for grazing or moving stock.

Agriculture Victoria Dairy Extension Officer Mick O'Keefe said municipal councils and state road authorities administer guidelines for farmers, drovers and other people who may require a permit, or who are exempted by a local law to need a permit to have stock on roads or road reserves. "Designated stock routes, municipal roads or declared arterial roads and freeways have differing requirements for managing safe stock access," Mr O'Keefe said.

"There is a guide available on the VicRoads website called 'Manual for traffic control at stock crossings', which contains a

short checklist that can be used to determine if a permit is required, and includes graphics that show approved layouts for high-use and low-use stock crossings.

"It also details the appropriate type and/or size for flashing lights and signage to be used at the stock crossing sites."

All motorists travelling on country roads need to be on the look-out for 'STOP' and 'GIVE WAY TO STOCK' signs that are displayed by farmers when they have stock on roads.

For producers wanting to move stock on public roads, the relevant authority will assess requests and determine:

- if a permit is required; and/or
- specific instructions for selecting stock crossing sites, signage, lighting; and/or
- specific conditions that need to be applied where stock graze or traverse along roads.

Two well respected artists return to the Gallery
Prominent Australian artists Mandy Gunn and Heather Shimmen will be joining us at Central Goldfields Art Gallery commencing Saturday 18 June for their joint exhibition.

Exhibition dates are 16 June to 24 July 2016. The official launch was on Saturday 18 June at 2pm and was officially opened by Andrew Southall – painter, printmaker and sculptor. Mandy Gunn works mainly with sculpture, collage, assemblage and installation using recycled materials. Mono-prints and painting also form part of her work. She has shown widely in Australia and her work is held in many public and private collections.

Figurative and expressionistic printmaker Heather Shimmen's work is held in notable art galleries in Australia, plus private collections, and she has held numerous group and solo shows in Australia.

For Double Take the artists will show both collaborative and individual works. They both have a passion for environmental concerns and have produced together a series of layered prints using mono-printing, hand-cut stencilling and materials such as lino-cut, collage, stencils and cutting techniques.

They state: "We both work in an intuitive way, handing work backwards and forwards without feeling precious about our own contributions and with a willingness to experiment".

Both artists were part of a travelling exhibition which featured at Central Goldfields Art Gallery in 2013. It was during this show that they expressed an interest in returning to our Gallery, and we are delighted to have their exhibition *Double Take* this year.

Black Saturday

From public reaction to a protest march by CFA volunteers in Maryborough and elsewhere, 2 July 2016 looks like being a black Saturday for Labor candidates in country Victoria.

Many people spoken to during the march and afterwards in supermarket car parks, resulted in similar reactions from Labor voters with the most common being: "Well I have been a Labor voter all my life but they have finally shown their true colours and I will not be voting for them again!"

Opposition leader Bill Shorten should be very worried because one theory abounds that actions of Premier Andrews is a ploy to have him replaced by someone more to the left. Kevin Rudd introduced a rule that no Labor leader could be replaced until after an election so a loss here would initiate a challenge.

The other theory is that Andrews owes a debt for assistance in getting elected and is caving in to the demands of Union rule over a Statutory Authority (namely CFA) appointed by an elected Government.

MFB has long wanted to take over control of CFA (now obviously) with a push from Union leadership so finally they may get their way. Should this be true then a very serious precedent is being set which should be of major concern to all volunteer organisations, not only in Victoria, but all other states.

The Emergency Services Minister has been sacked, then the CFA Board and CEO, followed by stacking a new board of five members (enough to make decisions) that will no doubt submit to Union and Premier Andrews demands before any of the other four members are elected by volunteer CFA members (a process which takes 30 days).

"Black Saturday"; the ABC YouTube documentary provides a very touching portrayal showing just what Victorians face; only next time most likely with a very diminished service because volunteers will not be as willing to join a task-force to go into areas under the control of inexperienced Union appointed officers.

Remember to make your vote count on 2 July and that promises from any party are only good until the next election; so anything promised beyond that period cannot be guaranteed.

While a vote for one major party in the House of Reps would provide stable government; voting for independents in the Senate, who hold the good of Australia paramount, would provide that independent house of review which our forebears created under our constitution.

Be aware that compulsory voting protects every other person's right to attend a polling booth without fear of any repercussions and any mark on the papers qualifies as a vote.

Silke Family Reunion

Descendants of one of Loddon Shire's foremost farming pioneers will gather in Tarnagulla later this year for a second major family reunion.

The Silke family has been traced back to 1607 in Somerset, England. John Gill Silke, who was born in 1805, wed Ann Date in 1832 and the couple began married life as tenant farmers. In 1850, the Silkes sailed to Australia with their 10 children and John opened a store in Collingwood, but after Anne died in 1854, the family moved to Bendigo. There, John took over as publican at the Union Hotel in Inglewood Road, Specimen Hill, but by 1863 he was farming at Bullock Creek. Two years later, John and his sons, Edward, William and Henry, and son-in-law Samuel Rae, selected land at Murphy's Creek/Flat and descendants of those families still farm the same ground today.

Dorothy Silke, one of the event's organisers, said the first such reunion was held in 1975, attracting about 200 people.

"The day will be based at the Tarnagulla Hall and is not just for family members – people from the district are also invited," Mrs Silke said. "We plan to have displays of photographs and sketches, the old school register, minutes from the original Wesleyan Church, John's cash book from his Collingwood days and copies of a book of poetry written by Edward. We also expect to be offering copies of a book currently being compiled by John Howe and myself which details the stories of the Silke family from 1607 to 1950 and includes accounts of the life and times of other early settlers of this area. Great assistance has been received from local people in this project, not to mention the invaluable research carried out by the late Ian Silke into his family's history." The reunion is planned for the Victoria Theatre in Tarnagulla on 25 September 2016.

Protect your water supplies with sediment fences

Quick, simple and inexpensive sediment fences can help protect your water supplies from blue green algae and other issues after a long, dry summer and subsequent heavy rain.

Land Management Extension Officer, Heather Field, said it was important to protect dams and other water storages from runoff containing debris, manure and soil that can lead to serious problems like algal blooms.

"If your dam or waterway is at risk of debris from runoff, a quick and simple way to help keep water clean is to build strategically placed sediment fences at the inflow points," Ms Field said. "There have already been reports of dam sediment this season, but it's not too late to do something about it. Sediment fences made out of fabric, shade cloth or straw can be put in place before the next rain event."

Ms Field said the aim of a sediment fence is to slow runoff so that any material drops out before it reaches the water. She said large amounts of soil and manure with high nutrient content can cause algal growth such as blue-green algae, which can be toxic to stock.

"It's worth looking closely at each dam and making an assessment of what's likely to wash into it when the first heavy rain comes.

"Decide where your sediment fences will go and how many you will need by assessing the catchment size, steepness of the slope and contours of the surrounding area. Leave the fences in place until ground cover is established again, when they should be removed so as not to become a hazard in long grass."

Part of Reservoir to Be Drained

A small section of the Laanecoorie reservoir will start to be drained to allow maintenance works to begin.

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) will undertake an inspection and works at Laanecoorie reservoir this month that will see the plunge pool at the dam dried off for around four weeks.

These works are critical to ensure the long term integrity of the reservoir, according to GMW.

A plunge pool is an area of a dam that water enters before being released into the river or stream, preventing damage to the river bank.

The plunge pool began being dried off yesterday to allow for dam safety inspections to take place. These inspections will identify any maintenance work that need to take place during the four week shut down.

GMW customer services manager for Diversions West, Dale McGraw said diversions customers who extract water from the Loddon River, downstream of Laanecoorie Reservoir are requested to schedule any irrigation orders outside this period.

'While we don't anticipate that stock and domestic customers will be impacted, we are advising all customers to monitor their pumping infrastructure to avoid damage in the event the river levels drop below the level at which water can be extracted,' he said.

'We have informed Coliban Water of the works and they have made alternative arrangements for urban water supplies to their customers.'

Works will not impact recreational use of the lake or access to public areas.

Mr McGraw said GMW appreciated customers' cooperation during the maintenance works.

'It is important that the infrastructure at all our water storages is regularly inspected and maintained to ensure we continue to deliver a reliable and efficient water service for our customers,' he said.

'We have scheduled these works during a period that will cause minimal disruption to our customers.'



Labor will ensure small businesses in the commercial construction industry get paid for work they have completed, the Labor Candidate for Wannon, Michael Barling said.

Mr Barling said it was concerning that around \$3 billion in unpaid debt in the commercial construction industry occurs each and every year.

"This debt is mostly owed to small and medium sized businesses in the construction subcontracting chain," Mr Barling said.

"There are small companies around Wannon which know only too well the dramatic and occasionally tragic consequences these debts have. If a small family business is forced into insolvency or bankruptcy, it has a horrible impact on individuals and families," he said.

"The construction industry suffers more than most from phoenix operators – those who won't pay their debts, strip valuable assets from their companies and then send them into liquidation, only to rise from the ashes debt-free and at liberty to inflict further financial damage on the industry, Mr Barling said.

"In our local construction industry, far too many subcontractors have outstanding invoices that are often months overdue or simply never paid. This situation creates spiralling debt problems, cash flow problems and in the worst cases, insolvency," he said.

Mr Barling said in recent years, over one in five companies entering external administration were construction-related.

"Labor has consulted with subcontractors, sole traders and other small businesses in the construction industry and the message is clear that a new approach is required," Mr Barling said.

"If Labor is elected, we will introduce a federal Security of Payments framework as recommended by numerous inquiries, including the Cole Royal Commission and a recent Senate Economics References Committee report. Rapid dispute resolution for payment adjudication will ensure small construction businesses receive income that is rightfully theirs," he said.

"Reducing insolvency and improving cash flow is good for small businesses, good for workers and good for the economy," Mr Barling said.






