SPRUNG!!

Take Note

A spate of counterfeit notes found circulating the Maryborough township has police urging the community to apply extra vigilance and to carefully check their money.

It's believed the notes are filtering through from Ballarat, where around twenty five counterfeit \$50 notes have been reported to authorities in recent weeks.

A Police representative said the notes appear to be made from paper, have a different texture from a regular \$50 note, and have a noticeable discrepancy in the clear window.

"The clear pocket is noticeably different, the pattern of the stars appears to be different and the note itself is a bit smaller," the representative said.

"They also feel a lot different because they're made of paper, so they're pretty easy to detect if you give them a proper check," he added.

Following the high volume of fake notes in the Ballarat area, police issued a statement asking for anyone who comes across a counterfeit note to hand it in to their local police station.

Police also encouraged the community to get descriptions of any people who hand a fake note over, as well as additional information such as vehicles they may have travelled in.

While the notes are predominantly used to purchase food, petrol and alcohol, the police representative said the offenders are likely to be more interested in the change.

"In small towns like this, they'll only pass off one or so and on most occasions they'll just buy something small so they can get change,' the representative said.

"If they use a \$50 note to purchase \$10 worth of goods, they receive \$40 of legitimate money back," he added.

Police advise anyone unsure of the legitimacy of a note to attempt to make a small tear in its corner and if it tears, then their suspicions should be raised.

Additionally, people can also do a scrunch test of the notes. If it's made of paper, it won't flatten back out, but rather remain scrunched.

Freemantle's up for sale after sixty years

After more than sixty years in the hands of one family, one of the region's biggest agricultural business, is set to change hands.

Eddington based stock-feed producer, Freemantle Stock Feeds is officially up for sale, sixty one years after it was first established. The business' current owner, Graeme Freemantle, who took the reins in 1992, has listed the business for sale, as he seeks to wind down his involvement according to the company's business manager, Mary Heddell.

"Graeme is just looking to make a change in his life, so he has decided to list the business for sale," she said.

The business was founded by Graeme's father, Reg, in 1955.

A World War 11 veteran, Reg used the farming land owned by the family of his wife, Joyce Douglas, to establish Freemantle Lucerne Mills in order to diversify the couple's income.

Operating alongside the farm's herds of cattle, sheep, pigs and chickens, the business grew rapidly under Reg's entrepreneurial vision, expanding to the point that it owned Australia's first private gas refuelling facility in the early 1960s.

After it was sold to Graeme – who had been working at the mill from an early age – in 1992, Freemantle Stock Feeds continued to grow, transforming from stock feed production into a one-stop agricultural supplier, distributing to rural retailers around the country.

Now, the company may change hands in the coming months, with Graeme set to focus on using the family's surrounding farmland to produce cereal crops.


The company has also given plenty back to the community which has supported it, making contributions to a range of groups, including race meetings, football clubs, the Dunolly hospital and many more.

"The company has also become a major employer in the area over the years," Ms Heddell said.

"We now employ around twenty three people and hopefully, those jobs will be retained when the company changes hands."

The mill has been listed with Bendigo-based Landmark agency, Harcourts, with the attached twelve acres of farmland also available to be leased as part of the deal.



Illegal puppy farms

Loddon Shire is taking a zero tolerance approach to illegal puppy farm breeding and it is paying dividends.

In the last 12 months our local laws team has successfully prosecuted three separate cases of illegal dog breeding within the Shire boundaries.

The most recent case brought before Bendigo Magistrate's Court last week, resulted in the defendant being ordered to pay a \$45,000 fine and being banned from owning, breeding or working with dogs for 10 years. An order was also made for the defendant to pay Council's legal costs, totalling \$11,016.

We believe it's the first time in the state's history a defendant has been ordered under the domestic animals act to comply with an order banning them for a period of 10 years from owning, breeding or working with dogs.

The prosecution follows our local laws team uncovering unregistered dogs housed in squalid conditions in a shed on a Bridgewater property. In this instance the shed had been decked out with breeding pens without any attempt to secure the relevant planning permits.

Three successful prosecutions in a 12 month period really demonstrates that illegal breeders will not be tolerated in this Shire and those who do so can expect to face the weight of the law.

Road maintenance a top priority

With school holidays just around the corner, chances are you'll be spending a bit of time on the road. While you go about your travels, near or far, take a moment to consciously note the state of the road you are travelling.

While there's always room for improvement, you may find we have one of the best gravel road networks around. This is the result of a decision to dedicate almost half Council's outdoor operations staff to the maintenance of unsealed roads and shoulders. At this point in time, this means we have 21 full time staff committed to our unsealed road network. In fact in the last 12 months our unsealed road network maintenance program has benefited from \$1.3 million labour, \$100,000 worth of materials and \$2.2 million in plant costs.

The merits of a gravel road network will always be debated, but the fact remains that in Loddon Shire we have more kilometres of unsealed roads, and per kilometre they remain more cost effective to maintain than their sealed counterparts.

That being said, Council continually strives to maintain an acute awareness of demand and change, which from time to time will result in individual stretches being sealed on a needs basis.

A creative data collection solution

Garbage collectors will gather invaluable mobile data blackspot information as they follow their usual routes throughout the Shire in August. At designated points throughout their run, drivers will take a moment to test the level of mobile service upload and download capability.

The move follows Loddon Shire's decision to borrow a device designed to collect and upload mobile signal strength, network performance and call drop out locations as part of a state government plan to accurately detect and eradicate mobile phone black spots.

While we already have information on mobile phone coverage, using the device, we'll develop a much more comprehensive connectivity map.

The garbage truck initiative is a great way to gather the information at multiple points using an existing resource

and is particularly prudent in a geographically diverse Shire like Loddon.

It is anticipated information collected through the project will be used to advocate for better funding of mobile towers and related infrastructure throughout the municipality.

Time to consider pre-school opportunities

Kindergarten enrolments for three and four year old sessions right across the Shire are set to open this Friday 1 July.

Council's Early Years team is encouraging families to lodge their applications online at www.loddon.vic.gov.au as soon as possible so they have a rough idea of numbers for planning purposes.

We're also happy to announce that while a start date is yet to be confirmed, occasional care sessions will soon be up and running in Pyramid Hill and Dingee.

As service demand increases, occasional care may also be able to run in other localities so feel free to register your interest with Council as the need arises.

We also have opportunities available for people interested in volunteering with the occasional care service. Inquiries regarding kindergarten enrolments and occasional care can be directed to Alycia by emailing earlyyears@loddon.vic.gov.au or phoning 5437 7999.

Finally if you're a new parent interested in meeting up with other parents you can join a parent group.





Support for young carers

The Labor Member for Wannon, Michael Barling, said young carers will be a priority under a Labor Government with a proposal to triple the number who will get access to the Young Carer Bursary Program.

Mr Barling said Labor recognised the enormous responsibility on the shoulders of young carers.

Helping Western Victoria's students honour our Vietnam Veterans

The Andrews Government is helping schools in Western Victoria send students to the Vietnam Veterans Day march and service at the Shrine of Remembrance.

The Vietnam Veterans Day March will begin at the Police Memorial on St Kilda Road, before a service at the Shrine.

"Our Government has recognised the large distances country kids will travel to the Shrine and subsidies of \$1,000 are available to country schools," she said.

"We want kids from Western Victoria to share in the memories of our brave servicemen. This initiative will help that happen," Ms Pulford said.

Parks Victoria and the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation have released the draft management plan for Lake Boort Reserve for public comment. Reserve is Lake Boort а culturally significant landscape. It has more than 400 Aboriginal scar trees, and many other places including cooking mounds, camping sites and areas where stone tools were worked and is special to the Dja Dja Wurrung people. "Parks Victoria and the Traditional Owners, the Dja Dja Wurrung people, are looking to work together with the community to protect this significant place," said Parks Victoria Chief Executive Bradley Fauteux. "This is a great opportunity for anyone interested in future management of the reserve, including all Dja Dja Wurrung people, to shape the plan. We strongly encourage everyone to make written comments on the draft plan by Monday 19 September," said Rodney Carter, Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation Chief Executive.

"Developing this plan is an outcome of the Dja Dja Wurrung Recognition and Settlement Agreement," said Rodney.

Jida Gulpilil a Director of the Dja Dja Wurrung that has a family interest in the Boort area, would like to see the reserve managed and used as a key asset by his people and the wider community, and this plan will help give proper recognition to the significance of the lake. "The plan's vision, goals and strategies emphasise both cultural and natural significance, Dja Dja Wurrung culture and traditions, and developing nature and culture-based tourism at Lake Boort."

The plan was informed by review of available information, discussions with groups and individuals, an online community survey, and issues raised at community Open House engagement sessions held in Boort in November 2015. The draft plan is available online at

Ripon headed for clean energy future

Victoria has set ambitious renewable energy targets to create thousands of new jobs and cut the state's greenhouse gas emissions.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said by 2020, 25 per cent of electricity generated in the state will come from renewable energy and by 2025, that will rise to 40 per cent.

The renewable energy targets have been developed to put towns across Ripon on a strong path towards a clean energy future by building the state's clean energy increasing jobs and lowering emissions.

"Ripon is already the home of a number of successful renewable energy projects including the Waubra, Challicum Hills, Chepstowe and Coonooer Bridge Wind Farms," Ms Pulford said.

Renewable energy is vital to Ripon's future and the Andrews Labor Government is doing all we can to support it."

"The world is shifting to renewable energy and I know most people in Ripon are behind Victoria's push not to be left behind. Other jurisdictions have set ambitious targets, and Victorians have made it clear they want our state to pull its weight," Ms Pulford said.

Burkes Flat is a small farming community about half way between Moliagul and Logan. I have to confess to not knowing much about its history, though I did see a map of the place when it was a thriving little town of the later 1800s and early 1900s.

I believe there was a gold mine and a large timber mill to keep people employed, and the usual community hub consisting of shops, a school, churches and a hall. There were even three pubs to quench thirsts and cater to curious minds as to what was happening out and about. My only connection to Burkes Flat is that my Mother's grandparents came out from Ireland in the mid 1800s and settled there. They travelled from County Tyrone and then on to Australia on a ship called Red Jacket in

My knowledge of their lives is fairly sketchy at best, as I'm not even sure how many children they had. I do know of my grandfather and a sister called Isobel, who was said to be an artist, and another son named Albert.

It was Albert McCamish who was my connection to Burke's Flat. He was my Mother's Uncle and quite close to her and our family. I had a great admiration for him when I was young. Then, of course, he was an old man when I knew him.

He was born with a cleft palate and hair-lip and he was hard to understand until you got to know him. These days, when a child is born with this deformity, with a bit of micro and cosmetic surgery it's all fixed and unnoticeable. But back in the late 1800s when Albert was born, there were no magical fixes, so when he was young he must have gone through a very tough time. I don't know if he ever went to school but for most of his life he couldn't read or write.

When he was older he taught himself to read and write and kept the most beautifully hand-written diaries which I read when I was young. He never drove a car, but used to ride his bicycle to St Arnaud, Wedderburn, Inglewood, and to see us in Dunolly. He was an old man then. He lived in a small cabin near the bank of a creek, which is a tributary of the larger and quite beautiful Cochran's Creek.

He was within a few hundred metres of Martins' Farm at Mill End. The Martins were very good to Albert who had a few fruit trees, vegie garden, and a cow and chickens that he wrote about in his diaries.

He was a shy, gentle man with great tenacity which I always admired. Thank you to Richard Martin for his information about Albert McCamish and Burkes Flat.
