Congratulations Trent and everyone at The Railway Hotel. We wish you a long and happy life in Dunolly.

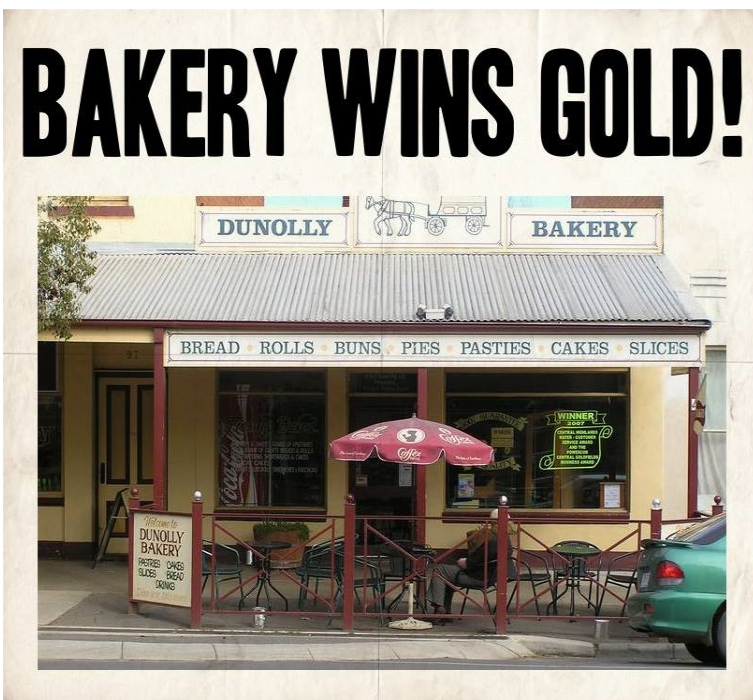

The 2016 incarnation of Maryborough's *Words in Winter* will focus on all things local, according to this year's organisers.

Beginning on Thursday, the festival's sixth year of operation will see eight events held across both Maryborough and Dunolly, all focused on the theme "live and local".

"This year's festival is all about getting out and celebrating all our local talent because we have so many brilliant writers, artists, musicians and poets," volunteer Words In Winter Maryborough area co-ordinator Monika Roleff said.

"We should be proud that they're our own and this is a chance to get out and about and show our pride while chasing off the last of the winter chill before spring comes."

With events ranging from crossword challenges, public readings, script writing and a soiree, Ms Roleff said the festival has a variety of events wide enough to cater for everyone.

"Local talent was one of our greatest supporters when we first started and there has been a lot of growth since then and the talent just gets higher and higher," she said. According to Ms Roleff, Dunolly hosting two gatherings is another highlight of the program of events, which will run from 4 Thursday to Sunday 28 August.

"The Dunolly community is very excited to be included in the program and they're going to be putting in a top effort," Ms Roleff said.

"With the events spread across the Shire it's a great chance for everyone to share in some winter cheer."

THE GREAT GARDEN MYSTERY

Children's picture book exhibition set to engage and delight people of all ages.



*Someone is stealing the beetroots.
Who could that somebody be?*

Join us in the garden, and we'll unravel this mystery.

Author and illustrator Renee Trembl brings the suspects and the clues to life in this exhibition focusing on children's book *The Great Garden Mystery* (published by Random House Australia 2014).

The Great Garden Mystery exhibition was developed with the assistance of the Central Goldfields Art Gallery. This show marks the first time Renee's children's picture books have been transformed into exhibition format. It features three dimensional elements, lifting the characters off the pages into life size scale.

Renee's writing and drawing is largely influenced by her years studying ecology and working in the natural sciences. She moved to Australia in 2007 from the United States and has since chosen to celebrate the amazing diversity of animals that inhabit this country through her words and pictures.

Using a digital technique that recreates traditional scratchboard, Renee is able to create detailed yet organic-looking black-and-white illustrations which she overlays on bright coloured backgrounds. Creating the artworks digitally enables Renee to lessen the environmental footprint while still maintaining the uniqueness and personality of her style.

The Great Garden Mystery was *short-listed for the 2015 Speech Pathology Book of the Year Award*.

During the exhibition around 600 school children will visit Central Goldfields Art Gallery and Maryborough Regional Library, participating in workshops and adding their own artistic creations to the exhibition.

Tracey Wilson, Director Primary and Preventative Health, Maryborough District Health Service will officially open the exhibition. She says, '*Goldfields Best Start supports the local community, parents, early childhood services, playgroups, kindergartens and schools to enhance children's development. It is again partnering with Maryborough Regional Library and Central Goldfields Shire to provide local children with a children's picture book illustration exhibition experience.*'

The exhibition opened on Friday 29 July 2016, and was attended by author and illustrator Renee Trembl, along with children from Talbot Primary School, and will run until Saturday 4 September 2016.

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Sheep electronic ID tags now much more affordable

Sheep producers can now electronically identify their livestock at even lower prices.

Two suppliers of electronic identification (EID) tags for sheep have recently dropped their prices. Allflex have reduced the price of their electronic RapIDTag to \$0.89.

Datamars have reduced the price of their electronic Sheep (FET) tag to \$0.80—they have also reduced the price of their Cattle (Round) tag to \$0.82 when purchased online.

The cheapest electronic tag available cost \$0.77 and is manufactured by Victorian based supplier Leader Products.

The use of electronic ID tags for sheep is voluntary, but because they can be machine-read in a fraction of a second, they have significant productivity benefits for farmers over visual tags.

Victoria's Chief Veterinary Officer Dr Charles Milne said that cheaper tags will help more Victorian producers harness the benefits of electronic identification.

"By delivering cheaper electronic tags and more choice, we are making the use of electronic identification even more attractive for sheep and goat producers," Dr Milne said.

The use of sheep EID tags is part of ensuring Victoria has a reliable and robust tracking and tracing system for livestock, should there be an emergency animal disease or food safety issue.

"Our livestock industries have exports of \$6.7 billion a year—it's vital that we have the best possible systems in place to help safeguard this vital trade," Dr Milne said.

Livestock producer and Chair of Victoria's Sheep and Goats Identification Advisory Committee, Stuart McLean pointed out the many opportunities available with the use of electronic identification technology.

"I would urge everyone across the sector to have a good look at what is available and to consider how they might utilise new systems to improve effectiveness and efficiencies across the supply chain," Mr McLean said.

Nuts and bolts of grazing course set for St Arnaud

Farmers across central and western Victoria have the chance to better understand the nuts and bolts of grazing management during a two-day workshop in St Arnaud next month. Organiser Neil James from Agriculture Victoria said the workshop would begin with the key principles of grazing management.

"Participants will be challenged to think about both livestock and pasture management objectives and the impact their decisions have on productivity, natural resource management and existing farm management," Mr James said.

Mr James said both workshop days included paddock walks for practical application of the topics discussed. Nuts and Bolts can also lead to other training opportunities such as Whole Farm Grazing Strategies and PROGRAZE®.

The course will be held at the St Arnaud Sporting Club over two days - Wednesdays 10 and 24 August from 9.30am to 3.30pm. Cost is between \$120 and \$180, depending on the eligibility of participants (this is a subsidised cost - costs may be higher if you are not eligible for subsidies).

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You don't need wings to fly in St Arnaud, Maryborough

Your life can change in a split second but it's how you tackle things from that point on that's important, according to beef cattle producer, motivational speaker and quadriplegic Sam Bailey.

Mr Bailey will speak at two special *Look Over the Farm Gate* evenings in St Arnaud and Maryborough later this month, when he will tell his powerful story of how he "just got on with things" after an accident left him a quadriplegic at 19. He originally planned to speak in central Victoria in July but had to reschedule due to illness.

Organised by Agriculture Victoria, the two sessions are supported by Northern Grampians and Central Goldfields Shire Councils and the Country Fire Authority, and funded through the Victorian Government's Drought Response Program. Mr Bailey will also speak at local schools in both districts.

"I just tell my story about having a dream and finding my life changed in a split second," Mr Bailey said.

"I certainly wasn't going to let a spinal cord injury get in the way of my life-long dream so I rolled up my sleeves and set about rebuilding. I converted all the farm machinery so I could use it, and I learnt to fly an ultralight plane. My next goal is to become the first quadriplegic to fly a helicopter."

You don't need wings to fly is the fitting title of Mr Bailey's talk, which he gives to adults and school children across Australia with his wife Jenny, with whom he wrote their best-selling book, *Head over Heels*.

"I had a plan and unfortunately life crash-tackled me. It's a fact that we are all going to get crash-tackled at some stage, but the sun goes down and comes up the next day and you've just got to get on with it," he said.

"After my accident I gradually pieced my life back together and now Jenny and I lead this incredible

life. We started telling our story 14 years ago and now we get a phone call and all of a sudden we're heading off in a direction we never thought we'd go."

The Baileys were in Central Victoria 10 years ago and Mr Bailey said they were thrilled to be invited back to speak to people on the land who might be doing it tough due to seasonal conditions.

"I just try to inject some of that resilience, toughness, and "have a go" attitude, and hope people gain a sense of appreciation for what they have. My simple message is, you can do anything if you want to."

Agriculture Victoria session organiser Belinda Pritchard said it was fantastic to have the Baileys come to Central Victoria for the two sessions.

"All the organisations involved are really excited to host the Baileys, and we are inviting anyone interested to come along and hear their story," she said.

The two sessions will be relaxed evenings with family and friends and a two-course meal included in the \$15 ticket price.

Cost - \$15 a head, including a banquet meal.
- Maryborough – Wednesday 24 August, 6-9pm at the Maryborough Highland Society.

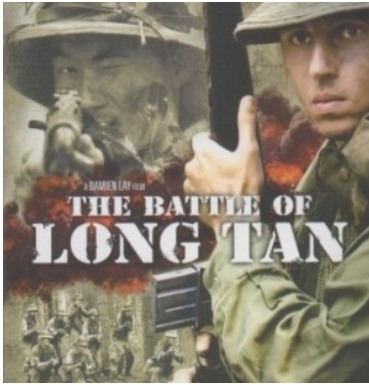

Helping local veterans honour the anniversary of Long Tan



The Andrews Labor Government will provide free public transport to help veterans in Western Victoria mark the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said veterans and war widows will travel for free on V/Line trains and buses between 17 to 19 August.

The free travel arrangements will help members of the veteran community and their families make the trek to Melbourne to attend the Vietnam Veterans' Day March and Service at the Shrine of Remembrance, which will mark the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan.

To be eligible for free travel, veterans and war widows must carry their Department of Veterans Affairs Gold or White Card, or Category V Victorian Public Transport Concession Card.

"Veterans and war widows can also wear their uniforms including service medals or ex-service or war widows' badges to demonstrate their eligibility for free travel," Ms Pulford said.

On Vietnam Veterans Day, free travel will be extended to members of the Australian Defence Force, as well as school students between 9.30am and 2.30pm.

"The Labor Government is also helping schools in Western Victoria send students to the special commemorations activities by helping with the costs of travel," Ms Pulford said.

"Local schools can apply for subsidies of up to \$1,000," she said.

"Vietnam Veterans Day is a special occasion for so many locals in Western Victoria. Free public transport is a small gesture of our thanks to those who gave us a great gift," Ms Pulford said.

Cookery Corner

Melting Moments

Ingredients

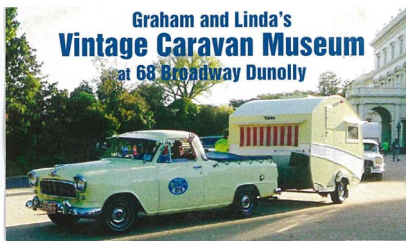
125g butter, softened
 ¼ cup plain flour
 ¼ cup icing sugar mixture
 2 tbs cornflour
 2 tbs custard powder
 1 tsp finely grated lemon rind
 ¼ cup frozen raspberries
 60g butter, softened extra
 ⅔ cup icing sugar mixture, extra
 ½ tsp finely grated lemon rind, extra
 2 tbs raspberry jam



Method

1. Preheat oven to 160°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper. Use an electric mixer to beat the butter in a medium bowl until very pale. Add the flour, icing sugar, cornflour, custard powder and lemon rind. Stir until just combined.
2. Roll 2 teaspoons of the mixture into balls and place on a prepared tray, 3cms apart. Use a fork, lightly dusted in cornflour, to gently flatten each ball. Bake for 10 mins or until lightly golden and just cooked through. Set aside on the tray for 30 mins to cool.
3. Place the raspberries in a small saucepan over low heat. Cook for 2 mins or until raspberries break down. Strain through a fine sieve into a bowl.
4. Use an electric mixer to beat the extra butter in a medium bowl until very pale. Gradually add the icing sugar, beating well after each addition. Add the raspberry puree and the extra lemon rind. Beat until well combined.
5. Spread the icing over the flat side of half the biscuits. Spread jam over remaining biscuits and sandwich the biscuits together.

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People have spoken on Victoria's infrastructure options

Infrastructure Victoria has today published the reports of its two citizen juries, along with a report of the consultation program for its *All things considered* options paper.

Infrastructure Victoria CEO Michel Masson said consultation was a crucial element of the development of Victoria's first ever 30-year infrastructure strategy.

"Consultation is critical to our strategy, because we think that the people who will be impacted by our recommendations should have a voice," Mr Masson said. "Today we are publishing the inputs to our consultation program to ensure we are absolutely transparent about the feedback we have heard, and will be considering as we develop our strategy.

"We have undertaken an extensive consultation program because we want our strategy to reflect a broad community view and be something people can support and feel ownership of.

"During our four-week consultation period, we had more than 24,000 people visit our website, we received 260 formal submissions and we met with stakeholders from all levels of government, the private sector and non-government organisations across Victoria."

Mr Masson said the citizen juries were an innovative component of the consultation program.

The juries, one regional and one metropolitan, were each made up of about 40 people, randomly selected to consider how best to address Victoria's infrastructure needs.

These juries met six times over a three month period to consider evidence, hear from experts and deliberate on over 200 options, including projects and policy initiatives. Both juries met for the final time on Saturday 30 July and delivered a report of recommendations to Infrastructure Victoria.

Infrastructure Victoria will now consider the recommendations of the juries, along with all other

feedback provided through the consultation program, in the development of the draft strategy.

Mr Masson said Infrastructure Victoria appreciated the work of the jurors, and the feedback of everyone who participated in the broader consultation program.

"We offer our sincere thanks to everyone who has contributed to this important conversation, including those who attended our roundtables and briefings and everyone who made a formal submission or completed our online survey.

"The citizen juries invested an incredible amount of time and effort in the process and we are extremely grateful for their input."

Mr Masson said Infrastructure Victoria would provide a response to the juries' recommendations alongside the draft strategy at the start of October.

"We will be absolutely clear about which citizen jury recommendations we have accepted and those we haven't," Mr Masson said.

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MAYORAL COLUMN

A 12.4 kilometre stretch of Yorkshire Road, situated between Newbridge and Bridgewater, has been earmarked for sealing. Tarnagulla and Inglewood residents are expected to warmly welcome Council's decision to invest \$4 million in the major capital works project.

At the end of the two year target period we will have continuous sealed road from the City of Greater Bendigo Shire boundary through to the Bridgewater-Maldon Road.

The project is to be undertaken in three stages, with stages one and three expected to be completed this financial year, and stage two being completed the following year. Existing road conditions and traffic and development growth on the three stretches have determined the order in which the road sections are to be sealed.

Stage one of the Yorkshire Road project will begin before Christmas. It comprises a 3.8 kilometre stretch of road to be sealed at an estimated cost of \$1.3 million.

Stage three, which covers a three kilometre stretch of road is expected to begin by Easter next year at a total cost of \$1 million.

Stage two, the last section of road to be sealed, covers a six kilometre stretch of Yorkshire Road and is expected to be upgraded at a cost of \$1.8 million.

This means Council has effectively decided to invest \$2.3 million of this financial year's \$7.5 million capital works budget on Yorkshire Road. The decision was determined by commercial vehicle traffic count data which demonstrated a need to upgrade the road.

Hazeldene's Chicken Farm and Scatoplus mushroom composting businesses, which are located in the immediate vicinity, undoubtedly account for a large proportion of traffic volume.

These agribusiness industries support countless families within the Shire through direct employment and supporting a range of small business service providers. Dedicating between 25 and 35 per cent of our 12 month capital works budget on the one sealing project makes sense when you consider the potential growth and economic development opportunities.

Standpipe charges modification

To help residents, businesses and farmers manage through drought conditions, in March this year Coliban Water agreed to temporarily suspend fixed charges on standpipes and reduce the volumetric charges from \$2.18 per kilolitre to 55 cents per kilolitre.

As a result Council was able to pass this subsidy to its customers by reducing the price from \$5 per kilolitre to \$2.20 per kilolitre.

The temporary suspension agreement between Loddon Shire Council and Coliban Water expires 1 August.

As a result, from Sunday 14 August the pre-agreement water usage charge of \$5 per kilolitre will apply to all customers using Council owned standpipes.

This is not an increase in water charges by Council to its customers, but is simply reverting back to pre-agreement phase charges.

With recent rains filling dams and bringing a sense of optimism to all, the charges modification has come at a good time.

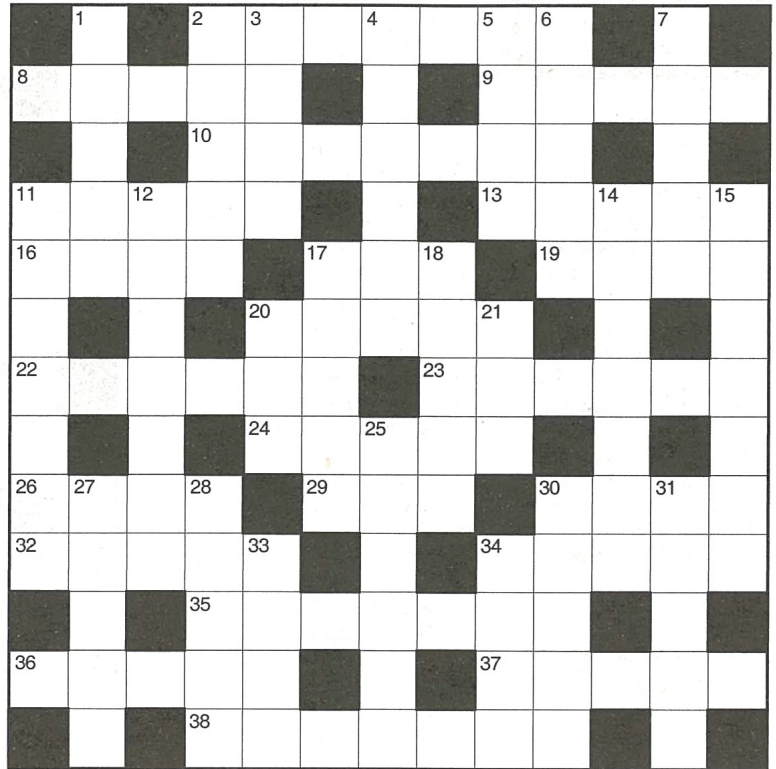

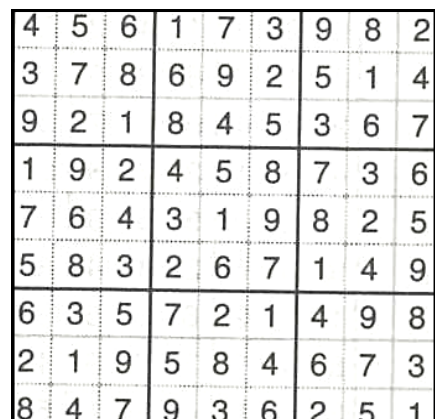
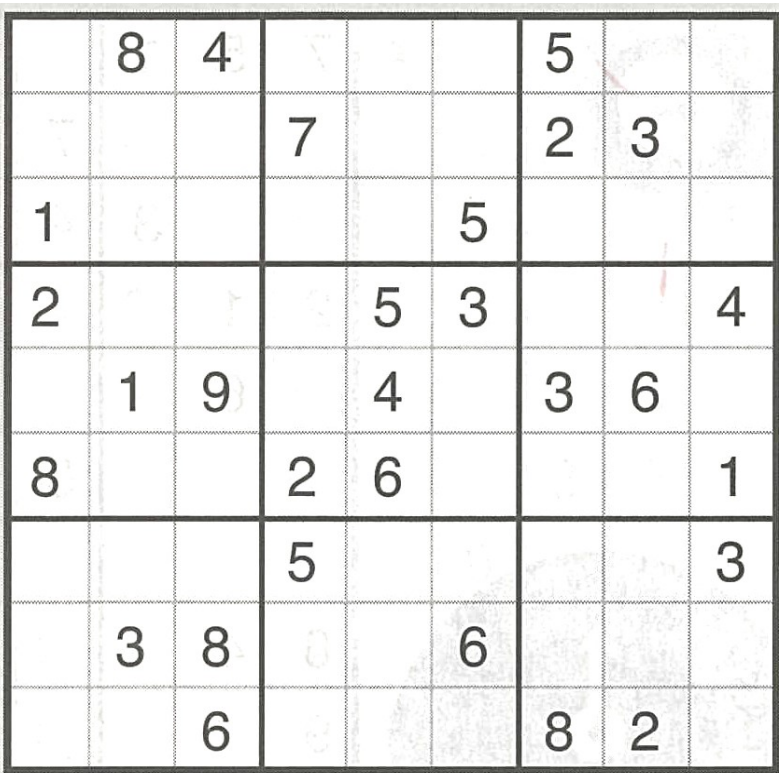
