Defibrillator for Dunolly Reserve

The Andrews Labor Government is getting on with the job of equipping the Dunolly Recreation Reserve with a life-saving defibrillator.

Today, Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, announced the Dunolly Recreation Reserve Committee of Management is one of 100 groups across the state receiving the life-saving device.

When cardiac arrest strikes, there's not a second to spare.

Early intervention greatly increases the likelihood of survival during cardiac arrest. Having a defibrillator means players, parents and spectators can step in and take action until paramedics arrive.

Ms Pulford said Labor had promised to install lifesaving defibrillators at 1000 grassroots clubs across Victoria.

"More than a dozen Victorians suffer cardiac arrest

every day, so we know this investment will save lives," Ms Pulford said.

"Defibrillators at local sports clubs keep players safe and spectators protected, but they're also a vital tool for the community. Each device will be registered with Ambulance Victoria's database, giving triple zero operators a handy guide of where to find one when an emergency strikes nearby," she said.

Sports clubs in Western Victoria that already have defibrillators are encouraged to ensure their devices are registered with Ambulance Victoria.

"The Dunolly Recreation Reserve is a great local institution that sits at the heart of my electorate and I'm thrilled to be able to give them extra security in case an emergency strikes," Ms Pulford said.

The Goldengrain Café Closed

As some of you may be aware already, the café is now closed for business! I will tell you all the reason why to stop malicious gossip by a certain few, spreading from here to Tarnagulla and beyond! We do not own the building, and as such are forced to wait for any repairs, maintenance etc. after informing the owners/agents.

Our air conditioner ceased operation on 19 December and it currently is still non-operational, with no anticipated fixing date - as this goes to print. Count it - yep, six weeks and counting! Without an air conditioner in the café we cannot trade. It sits between 6-10° hotter inside than the outside temperature. We have been unable to trade since that date - so no income - however, bills and overheads continue to mount up. We had to dispose of lots of fresh food prior to Christmas as we have had to cancel very large bookings. January is the biggest and hottest trading month in the whole year. Our losses are immense; our anger and frustration is immeasurable, and the owners and the real estate agent are to blame. Not me, not Anthony, not the building itself, not Dunolly, but the onus sits fairly and squarely with the owners and real estate agent. No-one's in a hurry, no-one cares and it's our livelihood that they have destroyed. We have no option but to close because they have sent us broke! It is very sad to watch two years of blood, sweat and tears go out the door with no hope of resurrection, but close we must - we have no choice.

Letter from Louise Staley MP

Recently the YMCA wrote to me because Daniel Andrews has cut funding to small rural kindergartens and preschools including Dunolly Preschool. Because of Daniel Andrews' cuts, the Dunolly Preschool will run at a predicted deficit of \$22,000 in 2016. The YMCA is unable to cover these new deficits caused by the funding cuts as the total deficit across the region is in excess of \$160,000.

The only way for kindergartens and preschools like the one at Dunolly to stay open is for parents to fundraise up to \$30,000 each year. For communities suffering drought and isolation that is just too much to ask.


I agree with the YMCA letter when it says, "the care and education of children living in rural communities is no less important than for those living in regional and metropolitan centres." Unfortunately Daniel Andrews seems not to notice anything beyond Melbourne.

Just as bad, your local Labor MPs Jaala Pulford and Gayle Tierney support these cuts. It is an absolute disgrace woman have voted to hurt local kindergartens and preschools.



Road closures 2016 Central Goldfields Reverse Triathlon

The Central Goldfields Reverse Triathlon will be held on the morning of Sunday 14 February 2016, and will be utilising

the road carriageway which adjoins several local properties.

Please note: Access to Havilah Hostel will be via Holyrood St entrance (at the rear of Havilah Hostel). The event will commence at 6.15am with registrations. Tullaroop Rd, Burns St, Napier St, Lake Rd and Christian St will be closed from 7.15am through to 10.30am. All through traffic will be detoured for this period of time. Approval from Council and the Victorian Police has been granted to utilise these carriageways.

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Code Red Days

Make sure you know the facts

What is a Code Red Day?

Each day, the Bureau of Meteorology determines a fire danger rating for each weather district in Australia. Central Goldfields Shire is in the North Central weather district.

A fire danger rating of 'Code Red' is the highest level of rating in Victoria. It signifies the worst conditions for grass or bushfires. A Code Red fire danger rating means that if a fire were to start:

- it could be uncontrollable, unpredictable and fast moving
- fire services will find it difficult to put out
- there is a high likelihood that people in the path of a fire will be killed or seriously injured
- many homes are likely to be destroyed -- even the best prepared homes will not be safe
- leaving the night before a Code Red Day or early in the morning of a Code Red Day is the safest option for your survival.

What should you do?

It is up to you to actively seek information, make decisions and act.

Every day during summer, check the fire danger rating for the weather district you are in and check to see if there are fires around you. Never rely on just one source of information.

Understand what the three different levels of warnings mean (Advice, Watch and Act, Emergency Warnings). Don't wait to receive an official warning. Bushfires can start quickly and threaten homes and lives within minutes. Be ready to leave the night before a Code Red Day or early in the morning of a Code Red Day. Don't wait and see if a fire will flare up – it's too late for you to travel once a fire has started nearby. If you know of someone who might need help, for example, a person who is frail, elderly, or without transport, talk to them about how you can help them leave early.

If you get caught out during fire, last resort options include neighbourhood safer places (NSP's) located at Princes Park Maryborough, Pascoe Reserve Maryborough, Pioneer Park Talbot, Gordon Garden Reserve Dunolly and Market Reserve Carisbrook. (There are no other NSP's in Central Goldfields Shire).

Remember -- neighbourhood safer places are places of last resort when all other bushfire plans have failed. They may protect you and your family from direct flame and radiant heat, but they do not guarantee safety. In addition, travelling during a fire can be dangerous due to smoke and fallen trees and you may not be able to reach a NSP.

How can you find out if there are fires nearby?

To find out if there are fires nearby:

- · visit www.emergency.vic.gov.au
- download the FireReady app

- tune in to ABC local radio, commercial radio, designated emergency
- broadcasters or Sky News
- call the Victorian Bushfire Information Line on 1800 240 667
- check out CFA's Twitter and Facebook Accounts.

Changes to Council services on Code Red Days

When a Code Red Day is determined for the North Central weather district, Council will implement a number of changes to its operations. Please visit our website and review the Emergency Management section for more information

Roads may be closed due to smoke and fire. Check road closure information before travelling on Code Red Days by visiting traffic.vicroads.vic.gov.au or call 13 11 70.

Parks and forests will close on Code Red Days. Visit parksweb.vic.gov.au or call 13 1963 for park closure information.

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Volunteer Wildlife Rescuers

It will be a long time before volunteer wildlife rescuers call a stop to the difficult searches currently being conducted on fire grounds

looking for burnt, injured and orphaned wildlife. Searches in the Scotsburn area have been in progress since the beginning of the year and will continue for some time on an on/off basis, allowing the frightened animals time to settle so searchers can more easily assess their problems and act appropriately. A huge number of animals have been dealt with so far, the work is exhausting and extremely stressful.

One of the essentials required to ensure the rescuers stay fit and able to cope is a supply of drinking water. Thanks to the generous donation of a good number of 10 litre containers of water from our local Maryborough Woolworths Supermarket, one of our essential requirements is currently off the 'wanted' list. A very grateful thank you goes to Woolworths for their rapid response in supplying the water.

It is likely that in the near future assistance for wildlife impacted on by the fires still out of control in The Otway Ranges will begin, preparations on many aspects is taking place, unfortunately because the fires are still out of control, rescuers are not as yet allowed to enter the fire ground.

Keeping Victoria's Title As The Least Littered State

The Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today welcomed the Andrews Government's announcement of a \$700,000 Litter Innovation Fund to help communities reduce the amount of litter and illegal dumping in Victoria.

Ms Pulford said grants of up to \$20,000 will be available for local government, industry, and community groups to submit innovative solutions that tackle local and regional litter problems.

"Victoria is Australia's least littered state, and we want to retain that lead by finding new and innovative ways to manage an issue that impacts communities throughout the state," Ms Pulford said.

The funding is part of a broader strategy, the draft Victorian Community and Business Waste Education Strategy, which will help keep more waste out of landfill by increasing recycling and reducing contamination.

"Different regions have different needs when it comes to litter prevention and clean-up. This fund aims to encourage and support communities to think differently about how they address these challenges," Ms Pulford said.

Parks Victoria western region community engagement and tourism officer Prue Daley said she was honoured to receive the medal and be recognised for her work.


"Over the years I have been extremely lucky to work with some amazing individuals within our community, emergency management teams and tourism," she said.

- Developed in collaboration with Tourism Victoria a community forum in Halls Gap in 2014 which used a fire scenario to highlight awareness and preparedness.

HEATWAVE HELP WEBSITE

A practical website has been developed to help Central Victorian residents prepare themselves and their homes to beat extreme heat during the summer months.

Several neighbouring councils including Loddon Shire Council, The City of Greater Bendigo, Mount Alexander Shire, Macedon Ranges Shire, Buloke Shire and Central Goldfields Shire partnered to develop the Heatwave Help Website.

This website is a joint response to our changing environment and was funded by the Adapting to Change — climate change adaption project, in partnership with the Victorian Government and the six local government areas. While all people can be affected by heatwaves, without a doubt the most vulnerable group is the elderly. It's important that the elderly, in particular, are aware of the dangers associated with extreme heat and are able to readily source information which will help keep themselves and their homes cool.

Encourage family, friends and neighbours to help those most at risk to access or action information contained on the new website, which contains a host of useful tips about keeping cool during the summer months.

Suggestions for keeping yourself cool include drinking water, dressing for the weather, going somewhere cool, staying in the shade, reducing physical activity, looking after your pets, going shopping before it gets too hot and calling 000 when you're not feeling well. Better management of the home environment also plays an important part in maintaining health during heatwaves.

Homes heat up for a number of reasons and these reasons may vary according to the direction your home faces. Simple things like keeping windows and blinds closed until it cools down outside, reducing drafts and zoning off areas, can all make a big difference to helping keep you cool.

Investing in small home improvements which would help keep the temperature down inside is also worth considering. Windows are one of the biggest sources of heat gain so making small improvements like putting external blinds on your sunniest windows, ensuring there are thick curtains on windows, taking the time to draught seal gaps and cracks and looking ahead to shade windows by planting trees will all make a difference.

The Heatwave Action website gives great advice on how to beat the heat through simple home improvements and managing our health and living spaces.

BALSAMIC-GLAZED CHICKEN AND GRAPE SALAD

Serves 4

Ingredients

1 tablespoon brown sugar

1 garlic clove, crushed

1/4 cup balsamic vinegar

4x150g chicken thigh fillets

3 small par-baked bread rolls, cut into 1cm thick slices

Olive oil cooking spray

120g baby spinach

1 Lebanese cucumber peeled into ribbons

200g red seedless grapes

½ pecans toasted, chopped

2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

Method

- 1. Combine sugar, garlic and 2 tablespoons vinegar in a shallow glass or ceramic bowl. Add chicken. Turn to coat. Refrigerate for 20 minutes to marinate.
- Preheat a barbeque chargrill or chargrill pan over medium heat. Lightly spray each side of bread slices with oil. Cook bread for 2 minutes each side or until lightly charred. Transfer to plate. Cover loosely with foil to keep warm.
- 3. Drain chicken, reserving marinade. Add chicken to chargrill. Cook, brushing occasionally with reserved marinade for 3-4 minutes each side or until cooked through. Transfer to a plate.
- 4. Meanwhile, place spinach, cucumber, grapes, pecans, oil and remaining vinegar in a large bowl. Toss to combine. Thickly slice chicken. Add chicken and croutons to salad. Toss to combine. Serve.

CUCUMBER CAKE WITH SUNFLOWER SEEDS

Ingredients

125g butter

1 cup white sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla essence

2 eggs

1 cup flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

½ cup sunflower seeds

1 cup peeled, grated cucumber drained

Method

Cream butter, sugar and vanilla essence and eggs (one at a time). Add flour, baking powder, cinnamon and sunflower seeds and fold through the grated cucumber. Spoon into a well greased or paper-lined loaf tin. Bake for 45 minutes at 150c degrees. Cool on a wire rack.



Extracts from the newsletter of the Goldfields

Francis Fearn is best known in Dunolly as the one who changed the Criterion Hotel into the Railway Hotel and for his sketch of the Welcome Stranger nugget. However, there is much more to the man. Francis Fearn's wide range of talents included publican, storekeeper, draftsman, surveyor, bookkeeper, artistic painter, sign writer, singer, orator, stage manager, actor, writer, poet and historian.

Fearn first appears in the district in 1862 at Burnt Creek where he was a partner with Henry Payne in a store selling kerosene and whale oil. Here he was also doing coach painting and sign writing. Both of them helped establish the Burnt Creek Amateur Dramatic Club. In 1863 Fearn moved to Tarnagulla as publican of the Victoria Hotel. This hotel and its attached theatre are still in the main street in Tarnagulla. Fearn painted the set for this theatre, part of which included the Australian flag. At the time Australia was still separate colonies and there was no Australian flag so what he actually designed and painted is a mystery. Perhaps it is still there under many layers of paint?

Both Francis and Emmaline joined the Dunolly Dramatic Club. Their main venue was the theatre attached to Frayne's Commercial Hotel in Broadway. Here Francis painted a drop curtain depicting the Dido Building of Carthage. Other scenes he painted here included the shops along Broadway with the owners out the front, a mine, the Newbridge Brewery and, what was claimed his masterpiece, 'the home of the fairies'. In 1865 Francis and Emmaline were both founding members of the Dunolly Garrick Club then, in 1867, both helped form the Muff Dramatic Society. David Garrick was an English actor and muff is a term for an amateur actor. Both these groups were raising money for the Dunolly District Hospital.

In January 1868, Emmaline Fearn stayed up all night looking after two sick friends. This weakened her and she caught scarlet fever and was dead a few weeks later. Emmaline was 22 years old. Whilst working Francis Fearn broke his leg. This hampered his ability to do survey work. He left the Survey Office in December 1873, becoming licensee of the Criterion Hotel. He immediately changed the name to the Railway Hotel as the railway was to be extended to Dunolly the following year. He also became secretary of the Dunolly Public Library. In 1878 he was elected as councillor for the Borough of Dunolly, serving for one term. Francis changed from licensee of the Railway Hotel to licensee of the much smaller Camp Hotel in 1877. Two years later he left Dunolly and moved to St Arnaud to run a hotel. His final shift was to Bendigo. Here he wrote a history of Bendigo titled Chronicles of the Golden City. He died in Bendigo in 1896.

In Dunolly, Francis Fearn made a pyramid of mineral specimens for the Melbourne Intercolonial Exhibition of 1866. However, it fell apart while being transported to

Melbourne. He tried again for the 1875 exhibition, this time successfully displaying a pyramid of geological specimens on a revolving stand. For the 1866 exhibition, he also displayed a painting titled 'Flowers in Leatherwork Frame'. The illuminated addresses sent by both the Borough of Dunolly and the Shire of Bet Bet to the Duke of Edinburgh were hand painted by Francis Fearn. He is also credited with the introduction of fish into both the Dunolly and Tarnagulla Reservoirs.

What is not so well known about Francis Fearn is his writing under aliases. For many years he wrote poetry, comic verses and a history of Tarnagulla under the name of Josh Billings, Josh Billings being a well known American humourist. Later he wrote under the name of R T Mus Warde, which was a play on Artemus Ward, another American humourist. As part of Fearn's humour he wood miss spelle wherds inn his lettuce in thee knews paypurse.

There were also some letters in the Maryborough newspaper that were very much in the style of Francis Fearn's writing. They were critical of the Dunolly Dramatic Club and signed by Jack the Fossicker. There just happened to be a man living in the bush out from Dunolly known as Jack the Fossicker. He protested vehemently that the letters were not his.

None of Francis Fearn's paintings are known to have survived.
