The Gordon and Rene Fox Gardens have both recently had a face lift. The playground in Gordon gardens has undergone a series of improvements and updates to increase its usability and safety. Library Services In Dunolly

Approximately 30 concerned Dunolly and district locals turned out to discuss the future of the town's library service.

With the local community set to lose its current mobile library service in December, Dunolly residents met on Tuesday last week in the town hall, to discuss and consider viable options to replace the service.

The Dunolly and District Inc Library Sub Committee hosted the meeting and found the concerned residents were largely in favour of a permanent library building, also known as a static library.

Sub committee member Lisa Mahon said the community will now urge Central Goldfields Shire Council to adopt the static library plan.

"A mobile service is fairly expensive to run," Ms Mahon said. Dunolly locals are passionate about keeping a library service. The community is very strongly in favour of having a library service. We consider the library to be really important," she said.

"We could have a static library that's open three-and-a-half days a week. We want the library service to include lots of books, good computers and for it to be like a community living room where people will come," Ms Mahon said.

"It would also be a place where people could go on a day

of Total Fire Ban as a Hot Day Out centre. There is nowhere in town at the moment where people can go on a Total Fire Ban day," she said.

As well as being a key meeting point for the community, there are also major economic benefits for Dunolly in having a static library, according to Ms Mahon. "It is very lucky that you can do all your shopping in Dunolly still. Everything's there," Ms Mahon said. "But the moment you have to go to another town to get your library books, you're shopping at the next town. It's important for the economic development of the town and its employment. The library is key. It's an integral part of the town. It's a service we need," she said.

The DDI library sub committee will now consult with the meeting facilitator who will prepare a report to be put forward to council as well as the community. "We've got a deadline. In December this year our library service will finish," Ms Mahon said.

Fellow committee member Marion Da Costa echoed Ms Mahon's words. "It's a really positive move for Dunolly. The community will really benefit," Ms Da Costa said. "It will provide more than just books, it will also include things like tourist information," she said.

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Dunolly Gardens

As residents will have noted, Gordon Gardens and Rene Fox Gardens are both receiving a facelift. The Dunolly Public Places and Tree Committee, which consists of Council, Shire and community representatives, is overseeing the process.

In the Gordon Gardens the playground works are largely completed with only street furniture to be added to the playground area. Further works will be carried out on the BBQ with an extension planned and the addition of a picnic setting and enclosure on the west side.

There is a large ironbark near the playground which has been inspected by an arborist. He has stated that the tree is unstable and dangerous and hence it will be removed. The area will be re-planted with deciduous trees to provide shade in summer and sun in winter.

In Rene Fox Garden works have been completed to construct a formal carpark. The garden beds are being re-designed and will include rose and perennial plantings. A sculpture of a gold panner will be included in a wall that will border the west garden. Crepe myrtles will replace the trees on the south side.

The Committee was also advised that footpaths would be constructed along the north side of Thompson Street to the caravan park, along the east side of Maude Street from Thompson Street to Bull Street and in Broadway along the east side between Bull and Tweedale Streets, including a small area on the west side.

Water and waste point for caravans

With the increasing number of visitors with caravans visiting the town, it has been of concern for some time that caravanners replenish their water and waste supplies by using the toilets in Rene Fox Gardens. Dunolly and District Inc (DDI) has worked with Joel Chadwick, the Shire's tourism manager, to investigate the installation of a water and waste dump similar to the one in Goldfields Reservoir in Maryborough. It is proposed to place the water and waste dump in Barkly Street near the tennis courts. This will enable easy parking for caravans and ready access to Broadway. Signs will be installed to direct caravans to the disposal point and the site will be listed with the Campervan and Motorhome Club of Australia.

Library Consultation

Over 30 people attended last Tuesday's consultation regarding the proposed library for Dunolly which was led by an independent facilitator, Maree Stephenson, Council's Library Manager and Cr Bob Henderson were also present.

The meeting was advised that the Council budget for this year's library will be available and will be ongoing. Various towns of the size of Dunolly have libraries, for example Clunes, Avoca and Ballan and that it was possible for a library to be established in Dunolly.

As the mobile library ceases at the end of December there is a need for a temporary library to be ready to commence in January 2017 with a permanent static library happening sometime after. The meeting was divided into groups to discuss the various issues for both the temporary and permanent libraries.

- Building. Renovate or build new, where located
- Services required. Lots of great ideas
- Operations. The minimum time open for the temporary library would be 12 hours per week.

A report will now be compiled which will be sent for comment to the people who attended the meeting and then it will go before Council.

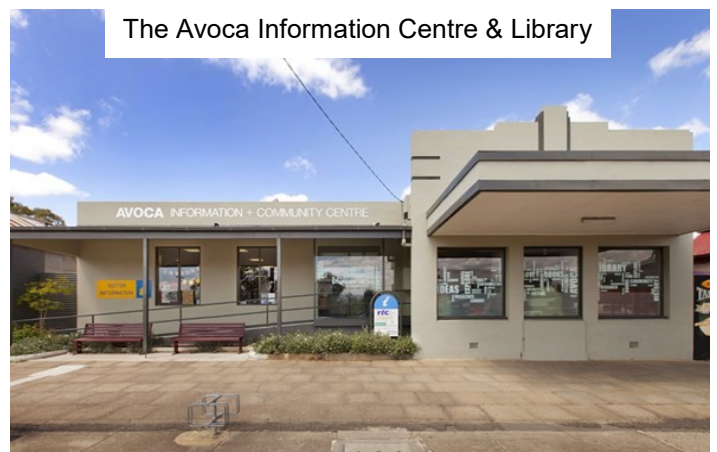

Gordon Gardens new playground



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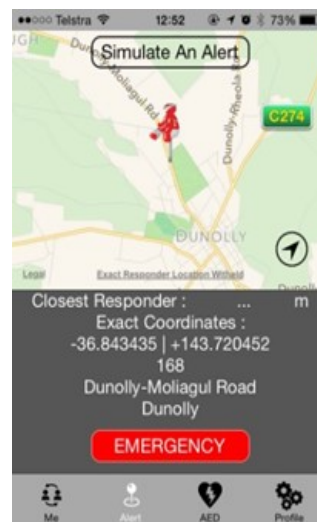
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Flying Was His Passion

We were delighted to be asked to find and fly a six-seater aircraft to help fellow pilot Ken out with a safari he had planned for two families, Maurice asked a fellow pilot friend if we could hire his new Beechcraft A36, and he kindly agreed. The two mothers are sisters and Ken flew the parents while we took the four delightful young teenagers; all were so keen and happy to be taking the holiday of their dreams. We each lodged our flight plans for the day and took off early from Moorabbin airport to Mildura, refuelling at Leigh Creek and seeking shade under the lovely trees at the old airport in the hot summer sun (not a time of year we would have chosen to fly to the centre and the west!) then on to Coober Pedy.

Ken is very interested in mining and organised a beautiful tour and after a fun and pleasant evening getting to know each other we lodged our flight plans for Alice Springs after breakfast. Alice was a favourite flight for us and although hotter than expected the two days spent there with swims in the motel pool. We all enjoyed tours to Anzac Hill, the Telegraph Station and the very interesting company at the motel of a camel owner who ran safaris and had wonderful tales to tell.

On the second day we visited Standley Chasm and Simpsons Gap and had more swims followed by a delicious dinner at the motel. After visiting Panorama Guth Gallery next morning we flew to Ayers Rock where a Cherokee Lance had just crashed. The two husbands climbed the rock but as we had previously climbed, we saved our energy in that heat and explored around the rock.

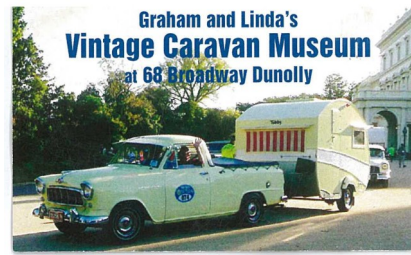
Each of the eighteen trips we have made to Ayers Rock was different; the first after an eight-year drought, once in a flood with waterfalls cascading from the monolith, grey, eerie and beautiful; the spring flowers were always the best and there again the visits varied. After observing the superb colour changes from Sunset Hill, our hired Mini-Moke broke down and we had to be towed back to the motel by a Landrover – always fun.

Our next stop was Forrest (thankfully day time!) to refuel, it was very hot. On to Madura and over the Great Victoria Desert and when we arrived, first we overflowed the motel near the old shoreline cliff to attract attention, as had been arranged for refuelling but there was no response. The six of us crouched under the low wings for shade in the 44°C heat. A whirly wind caught Ken just after he landed. We pushed on to Norseman, a mining town where we stayed in a delightful old pub and visited the Tourist Bureau where the kids bought tee shirts.

Next day was Kambalda, a new town, and in two taxis we toured towns and mines, watching sail boats skidding over the salt lake and visiting a mine. Next day we visited Kalgoorlie a very interesting town with wonderful history and lots of gold! We walked the main street, had a tour of Hainaults Gold Mine and joined in the New Year's Eve street carnival festivities. From Kalgoorlie we visited Hyden where a farmer and caravan park manager drove us to Wave Rock – just amazing.

Next day we flew on to Bunbury where we stayed in a beautiful motel opposite the surf; it was dull but that didn't

President's Report for 2015-2016

Welcome to the third annual meeting of Dunolly District Inc., the community organisation that works to foster local business development, especially through supporting events such as arts, cultural and tourism activities in the district. A special welcome to our new member, Ken, from the Golden Triangle Motel. An important objective is to bring new money into the town and surrounding district, especially through tourism. We aim to increase awareness and interest in our area and to attract visitors and new residents. DDI is the contact body for Council, the Regional Tourism Board and event planners.

While reading through our Minutes for the last twelve months to prepare for this report, I was surprised and impressed by how much our small organisation has contributed and achieved in this time. We began with the publication of the fourth edition of the Tiny Towns brochure in August, with a print run of 10,000. These are widely distributed and are generally regarded as the clearest and most helpful guide to our district. The Tiny Towns brochure beautifully partners the Dunolly town brochure that guides visitors around town.

Our largest event for the year was the Great Victorian Bike Ride in November. Businesses and community groups worked well together to provide a very positive experience for the 3,000 cyclists and tour organisers. It took a lot of behind-the-scenes work for the executive and Joel, but was certainly worth the effort. Such events contribute to raising awareness of our district to a diverse audience. Similarly, the Organs on the Goldfields concerts scheduled in Dunolly for 16 January will bring hundreds of new people to town at a quiet time of the year. DDI is working with the program planners for this event.

This year has also seen several DDI members take the lead role in planning events and working on community issues. It's really encouraging when responsibilities are shared among members. John Moir co-ordinated the successful inaugural Arts Trail over the ANZAC weekend, along with active involvement by Philip and Anna Ashton and Judy Meldrum. Judy also instigated the submission to Regional Arts Victoria for a community arts and installation project in Bealiba. The submission was not successful, but constructive feedback and the development of new contacts means this project is likely to succeed in the near future. DDI has also initiated a library sub-committee that co-ordinated the community consultations to establish a new, permanent library in town when the mobile library ceases operation at the end of the year. Rowena Wells has generously taken over the maintenance and development of the Dunolly website, in addition to her blog, and this is a significant, voluntary contribution to the community. DDI thanks Hamish Strachan for his five years of work on the Dunolly website.

DDI is well placed to pick up and run with community issues and projects as they arise. Over the last year, we have supported Bromley Organics in their concerns about changes to working visa arrangements for overseas young people and "woofas" and we worked closely with the Supported Playgroup in all their endeavours to keep this important community service going for families with young children. Progress is being made to install a waste dump in town. This is an important service for caravanners and is an effective strategy to encourage

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Bendigo Writers Festival

The fifth Bendigo Writers Festival begins this weekend. With a comprehensive program of guest speakers, workshops and events, there really is something for everyone. The focus venue is the Ulumbarra Theatre in Bendigo although there are events taking place in a variety of venues.

The four day festival opens on Friday 12 at 7.30pm, at the Ulumbarra, with a discussion entitled 'Brave Enough' featuring Cheryl Strayed, Benjamin Law and David Astle, each discussing being brave enough to take creative risks.

Headline events include an evening with Julian Assange who calls himself publisher, author, muckraker and radical, an entrepreneur, programmer and cryptographer.

As we all know Julian is detained elsewhere at this time but he will be appearing at the Ulumbarra Theatre on Saturday 13 at 8pm via Videolink from London.

He will be on the big screen of the theatre, talking to Robert Manne, Assange will tell his own story about why he took on the world's superpowers and what he believes will be the future of Wikileaks.

The focus and mood changes completely on Saturday night. At 9.30pm, Assange will be followed by Mick Thomas and The Roving Commission. Described as an 'intimate cabaret concert' Mick is a writer and singer of 'really good stories and songs with his own brilliant, passionate brand of Australian rock.'

Aside from the headline events there are workshops for aspiring writers such as 'Getting Started' with Cate Kennedy on Friday 12 at 10am. 'Techniques For Success' with Mark Dapin on Friday 12 at 1pm or 'Writing Your Life Story' with Benjamin Law on Sunday 14 at 10am.

One of Bendigo's historic trams has been converted to a 'cubby on rails' with conductor-storyteller Narelle Stone providing books, stories and imagination for kids.

The line up of high profile guest speakers includes Peter Singer and his wife Renata, Helen Garner, Di Morrissey, Kerry O'Brien, Anne Summers, Anna Goldworthy, Stephanie Dowrick, Victor Del Arbol, Sarah Ferguson, Hugh Mackay and Stephanie Alexander.

There really is something for everyone!

The festival runs from this Friday 12 August until

Sunday 14 August. A full program with venues, times and specific events can be downloaded at bendigowritersfestival.com.au.

There are passes which give you access to 67 events on all four days at five different venues. There are one day passes available and also single tickets available for all events.

If you are interested in writing or reading, the Bendigo Writers Festival is definitely the place to be this weekend.

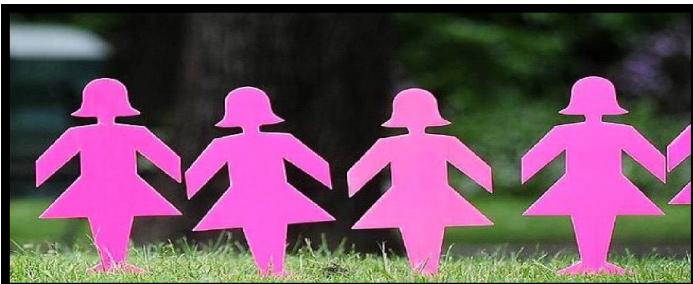

visitors to spend time in town. Joel Chadwick has collated all the relevant information and Cr Bob Henderson has gained the support of Council for this project. A site in Raglan Street adjoining the Gordon Gardens is supported by DDI. A suggestion from the Market Committee led to the preparation of the first Calendar of Events for the year which was published in the Welcome Record in March. We are due to prepare an update for the rest of the year and over summer. Marion certainly worked hard to encourage businesses and community groups to submit their planned activities and we hope they will continue to do so.

DDI is responsible for co-ordinating Australia Day celebrations and we now have a format that works well for local residents. DDI also has a responsibility to convene public meetings on issues of local interest that are not being addressed by other community groups. Over the last 12 months we convened a public discussion about the Murray Basin Rail Project in October and in March we hosted a well-attended forum with Coliban Water about water quality and water security. As the contact body for tourism development in the district, the DDI executive met with consultants contracted by Bendigo Regional Tourism who are marketing the region as a tourism destination. They are keen to promote the interesting features of small towns and to this end have already generated two articles about interesting local people that will appear in the Herald Sun. We anticipate there will be further benefits from working with Bendigo Regional Tourism and it is very helpful having Joel Chadwick, our shire Tourism Manager, on the Board.

Finally, I hope that DDI provides a meaningful meeting place for its membership and that our projects and

involvement in local issues are of benefit to the community. Special thanks are due to Marion Da Costa as Secretary for her work in keeping the information flow with members and following up on many of our initiatives. Similarly, Rod Stuart is appreciated for his willingness to take on yet another Treasurer's role in Dunolly.

Fortunately, this one is not too complex. Contributions from Cr. Bob Henderson are always appreciated, as is Joel Chadwick's consistent involvement.

Someone to be our office manager, drawing up rosters, making sure we have paper and equipment and doing all the odd jobs around the office.

Someone to help with printing and distribution around town and to depots in the surrounding areas.

You don't need to have a great deal of expertise in any of these roles. You can learn on the job and there is are people to train and support you along the way.

The pay is terrible (there isn't any), but the work is interesting, challenging and satisfying. All that is needed is an interest in the paper and a commitment to spending a few hours each week, helping to put the paper together.

With a larger group of willing workers the pressure on everyone would be reduced, the work load spread around and burn-out of our volunteers reduced.

Naturally Loddon Festival

Art, nature, community celebrations and the region's rich farming and goldfields history will be effortlessly interwoven in the 2016 "Naturally Loddon" Spring Festival. This much-anticipated highlight in Loddon Shire's annual calendar offers 10 premier events staged over eight weeks designed to showcase Loddon's multi-faceted communities and the best of its natural attractions.

The festival launch will take place at John and Sonia Piccoli's Star Spanner Sculpture Gardens, just outside Boort, on 4 September.

What follows is a run of family-friendly events – all affordable – beginning with a vintage machinery display at Wedderburn over the weekend of 10-11 September and ending on 30 October with Wedderburn's Naturally New Age Festival and farmers' market.

Dunolly Horse Activity Club Navigation Ride this Sunday

There will be around 30 horses competing in a Navigation Ride being run by Dunolly Horse Activity Club on Sunday 14 August. Riders are coming from as far as Deniliquin and Mornington Peninsula to compete. We ask that drivers be aware that there will be horses crossing roads and riding through streets and through the bush on Sunday and to please be considerate and slow down as horses can get spooked easily.

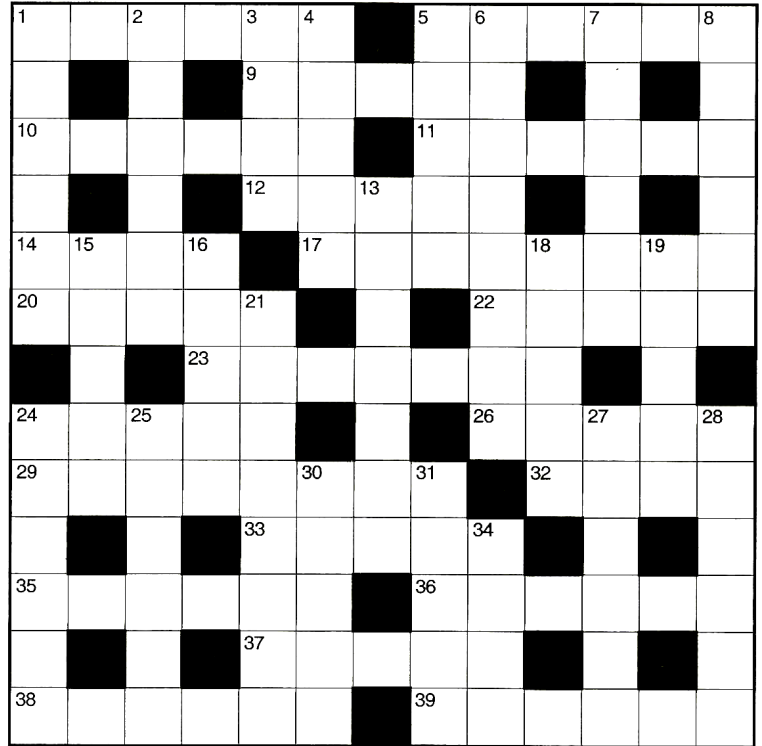

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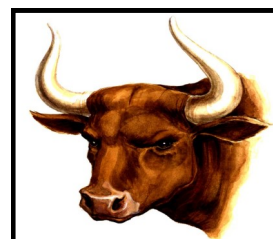

Container House

Vicky's View

Shipping containers are an uncommon house building material. But thanks to TV shows such as Grand Designs they are not completely unknown. However, using six forty foot containers is definitely unusual, a bit like playing with giant Lego. Dominic Jackson has been working with his giant containers in Carisbrook for the past four years. At first it was limited to weekend work, but currently he is able to put in a seven day week to hopefully get it completed by Christmas.

He has always been attracted to the Industrial Look, and said if he was in Melbourne he would be converting an old warehouse. However Carisbrook does not have many conveniently empty warehouses, so containers were a logical substitute. In order to get a building permit the project had to be fully engineered. "Using containers is definitely not a cheaper option," said Dominic.

The containers used are B grade, which means they are wind and water tight, though they have a few dints. Once the stumps were ready, the containers arrived by truck and were put in place. A crane was needed to get a container up to the second storey. The outside walls have a variety of cladding, including render, wood and original steel. One outer door is painted red which looks great against the steel wall.

Inside the entire building is double glazed and very well insulated, which muffles the sound of the outside traffic as well as giving it a cosy feel. Most of the plastering has been completed with some of the inner walls being left visibly steel container which adds to the industrial feel.

A spiral staircase leads up to the second floor. It had not yet been securely bolted in place so it was an adventure climbing it. "I've used recycled things wherever I can" said Dominic "and the staircase came from a butcher's in Melbourne". The view from the upstairs window was worth the uncertain climb.

Downstairs huge glass doors and plenty of smaller windows make sure there is lots of light in the living area. A floating floor will complete the industrial look. Dominic has pretty much designed the house himself and is sure it will be energy efficient. Thanks Dominic for generously allowing us to view your home. It was excellent.
