Ron and Maree will take their pizza oven to functions and they also visit festivals in the area. You can contact them on 0409 043 407.



New arts program a big win for Western Victoria

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, is encouraging arts groups, societies, venues and local councils to apply for funding to attract the best performances in an effort to strengthen regional touring in more places across the state.

The Small Regional Presenters program will be available to support regional arts presenters – including not for profit arts groups and societies, venues and local councils – to present professional arts events and experiences in their communities. Ms Pulford said grants of up to \$15,000 will be available to support the presentation of a single show or live event, a series of shows or an annual program.

"We are lucky in Western Victoria to have some great musical talent and this program will give us the opportunity to showcase the best stars in our part of Victoria," Ms Pulford said.

"Arts touring brings significant benefits to towns, to communities and to artists and Victoria has a strong history of regional tours by major companies as well as independent artists," she said.

Small Regional Presenters builds on existing programs that support Victorian arts companies and producers to embark on regional tours. It provides a focus on the other end of the touring cycle by supporting regionally-based arts groups and venues to attract shows to their area.

Small Regional Presenters is part of the Labor Government's \$20 million Regional Arts Package, delivered in the 2015/16 Victorian Budget.

Funding will be offered through three grant rounds in 2016-17.

Applications to the first round of the *Small Regional Presenters* program close 5pm, Wednesday 16 November 2016, for shows taking place from 31 January 2017 onwards.

Community presenters seeking to apply must be members of Regional Arts Victoria.



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In the Vegie Patch

October is the most successful month for sowing seeds or planting out the summer growing plants. The days are longer, therefore more sunshine to warm up the soil. The main seed crops are carrots, parsnips, beetroot, silver beet, celery, leeks and radish, and also some late sowing of dwarf peas can be very successful and ready to harvest near Christmas time.

Leeks are a handy standby, if any gardener didn't get around to planting out onion plants.

Celery must be sown during the good sowing months, as it becomes very bitter when cooked if left in the soil too long, and slow growing if not in good fertilised soil. Lettuce also needs to grow rapidly to be fresh and not bitter when ready for eating.

A small sowing of dwarf beans can be sown this month. It is a risk to sow a large crop yet, as there can be very heavy frosts this month, so don't waste space sowing a large crop at this stage; the space is much better saved for later on when the risks of frost are much less.

Butter beans do like the summer months to grow and to produce a good crop.

Potatoes can go in the soil this month also; they take at least three weeks to emerge and if sown too deep they take even longer. Deeper sown tubers take less water as the soil is much cooler.

Now is the time to sow tomato seeds or planting out plants. Seeds sown where they are to remain in the seed bed can be covered by a plastic bottle with the bottom cut out. Place more than one seed in the same position, and when they start to grow, just leave one healthy plant to each bottle. Press the bottle firmly into the soil; it helps to keep slugs out from eating the young plants. It is also wise to treat the soil with boiling water before sowing, as there could be some small pest that gets locked in the cover.

For Fruit Trees

Stone fruit trees can now be sprayed with Copper fungicide; it helps to keep out diseases.

Apricots are more susceptible to many diseases than other stone fruit.

Lemon trees can be pruned this month, if need be. Older lemon trees are better pruned each year; they are inclined to develop sick looking limbs and dry tips. Fertilize all citrus trees now and every six weeks during spring to autumn. Use a citrus food or poultry manure. They also need a lot of iron. Put one tablespoon of iron sulphate in four and a half litres of water and apply once in spring, once in summer and once in autumn. Also seaweed emulsion is a good boost to keep soil nourished - three tablespoons to four and a half litres of water.

Wet conditions raise spraying concerns

Agriculture Victoria is reminding farmers of the importance of correctly using agricultural chemicals during wetter periods to ensure that the risks of unwanted outcomes are minimised.

Agriculture Victoria State-wide Specialist for Chemicals Steven Field said the recent wet conditions may result in farmers feeling significant pressure to use chemicals for a range of reasons.

"Farmers may be aware that fungicides could be in short supply in some areas and they may look to use a chemical on a crop that it is not registered for.

"That is why we are encouraging farmers to ensure they take into account their legal obligations and don't take short cuts", he said. "Inappropriate chemical use may result in a range of adverse outcomes such as unacceptable residues, increased resistance, or spray drift."

Mr Field said many farmers may be considering whether to apply a fungicide to their crop, if they haven't done so already. Some important things farmers must be aware of are to:

- Only use Schedule 7 Dangerous Poisons in strict accordance with the label and not to use
- them unless they hold an Agricultural Chemical User Permit.
- Not use other agricultural chemicals (e.g. Schedule 5 or 6 chemicals) at a rate greater than the maximum label rate, more frequently than the label states, or in contravention of any prohibitive ('DO NOT') statements.
- Not spray any chemical in inappropriate conditions, such as in strong winds, inversion conditions, where there is a high risk of causing spray drift onto neighbouring crops pasture, or other sensitive areas such as houses and waterways.

Peak industry bodies like the Grains Research and Development Corporation, Pulse Australia and others have published guidance material for farmers which compliments farmer's responsibilities to ensure they read and understand the individual product label prior to use.

Bealiba Progress Association October meeting

Our Monday night meeting was well attended. Due to the many activities across the shire, Cr. Bob Henderson was unable to be with us. Much of the discussion at our October meeting centred on complaints and reports of water damage, drainage, grass growth and safety in public places.

We have, over the past few years, worked at developing a good relationship with the shire regarding reporting works and concerns and community requests. One of the best ways you can report an issue is with your smart phone. Use the free app. "Snap Send Solve". This app is universally used by many shires and government bodies and will allow you to send a photograph and short report to the relevant department. This means the complaint is documented and lodged and will be responded to quickly. In addition we have our local councillor attend meetings to help us understand the process of council, budgeting and scheduling of works. This means that the progress association can spend its time looking at solutions and cooperative community approaches to work together to keep our town tidy and safe.

One of our annual activities is a big clean up at the cemetery. For this we work with the cemetery trust's permission to mow, weed and generally clean up the cemetery prior to holidays and other important times. Our next working bee is scheduled for Sunday 6 November at 9am. Please bring gloves, rakes, mowers and whippersnippers... your chair, hats and cold drinks. We plan a sausage sizzle for the workers at 12noon, so if you plan to attend please let Heather know on 0427 732 093.

The other important matter that was discussed was the ability and legality of small, not for profit organisations like the BPA to fundraise. Fundraising is part of the Progress Association Charter, but these days there are many regulations to address and work within. The good news is, as a group of volunteers with a fundraising turnover of less than \$10,000, we are not required to register as a fundraising body with consumer affairs. However this means we cannot raise money directly for other groups who do have fundraising turnover of more than \$10,000. But we can donate to them. However, to run a raffle, permits may be needed with the gaming commission. Again the good news is that permits are not required if we run small raffles under \$500 value. We can sell tickets on the day of drawing to the general public, and presale tickets to our members past and present and their families. Hopefully this clears up some confusion as fundraising is important to small communities, not just to meet running costs of projects, but to contribute to larger projects that require fund matching to meet grant requirements.



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
