## NEW KITCHEN UNVEILED

Hard work and determination has paid off with the unveiling of a new kitchen at the Dunolly Pre-school. Pre-schoolers, committee members and the Maldon & District Community Bank were on hand to see the new kitchen in action.

The previous kitchen was in poor state, with improvements long overdue. The new kitchen is already being put to excellent use by the preschool and other community groups who use the Maude Street facility.

Melissa Freemantle, Preschool President, explains the benefits of the new kitchen. "It's so user friendly and really brightens up the place. The upgrades, especially the dishwasher, allow our parent helpers to spend more time with kids instead of doing dishes.

It's taken the drudgery out of cleaning, plus it's a real time saver, especially for bigger events and busy days."

Trish Ipsen, Dunolly Preschool teacher and director, praised the improvements. "It's absolutely fantastic to have the new kitchen in place. It's a morale boost for staff and given a new lease of life to our preschool facility."

The commitment of the preschool committee and families was key to the project's success. Twelve months of work, including fundraising, working bees and grant writing, took place.


#### **160th Anniversary Celebrations**

## Reminder drought-affected communities

As the new kindergarten year kicks off, the Andrews Labor Government is reminding families in Victoria's drought-affected communities that they are eligible for free kindergartens in the year before school.

As part of the drought assistance package announced last year, free kindergarten is available to all families living in 10 drought affected local government areas of Victoria.

Families in these communities have been doing it tough as they face difficult dry conditions and financial hardship — and they deserve the support of government.

To clear up any confusion caused by the Coalition's misinformation campaign in these communities, the Government is writing to kindergartens and local governments to make clear the range of support available for them and local families.

To make it easier, families will be automatically eligible for free kindergartens if they live within one of the 10 local government drought affected areas.

The Labor Government also announced last year a new funding model for small rural kindergartens to help address the uncertainty caused by fluctuating enrolments year on year in small communities.

Under the new funding model a small rural kindergarten with four enrolments, for example, will receive \$67,056 this year – more than \$22,000 better off than under the previous Liberal Government's model

#### For the Sake of the Children

We all know that there are children in this world who suffer terrible plights: children in war torn countries who are forced to flee; children in harsh famine conditions; children in underdeveloped countries who live in grass huts with dirt floors and no fresh drinking water or sanitary conditions. We bemoan their fate and sometimes even donate to relief funds and charities to help them. But what of our children here in Australia who may not suffer the horrors described above, but still have to face their own demons. So many of us are unaware that we have neglected, deprived, abused and generally disadvantaged children right in our own backyard. So who helps them?

Well, I was proud to find out in detail that my very own son Brett, and his partner Debbie, do. I had known that he and Debbie ran camps for disadvantaged children; but I had no real concept of what that meant until I visited them in Sydney last week. I thought that perhaps disadvantaged meant children of less affluent parents, who had the opportunity to go to a fun camp for a week. I had visions of kids hiking and boating and playing games, which does happen at these camps, but the bigger picture is that they are given a safe environment to escape from their grey, depressing everyday lives; to forget for a while that they are pushed from pillar to post within the system, sometimes escaping the frying pan, only to fall into the fire. Many of these children have been the victims of physical, mental or sexual abuse; been neglected or, worse, abandoned, or even run away and lived on the streets until being rescued.

Brett and Debbie run Camp Kiah (several locations in NSW and Victoria) with a staff of qualified and dedicated youth workers. Their mission is to focus upon building self-confidence and self-esteem for the young person that allows them to acknowledge and work on their emotional and behavioural difficulties while enhancing their strengths. They are taught they are worthwhile and valuable people, something many of them don't believe due to their past experiences.

As an off-shoot of Camp Kiah, Brett and Debbie are beginning a new project called Treehouse where they are trialling a permanent fostering system giving a stable home to small groups of children with the same foster parents. I personally experienced a very full day with the three children in the first house. Each child has their own set of problems and needs a great deal of attention and patience. They can quite quickly turn a fun play session into a major melt down drama as I experienced when I attempted to stop the youngest child from eating pebbles. Try to pull pebbles out of a two-year-old's mouth without getting bitten or slapped. Not easy in the best of circumstances, but when the child is in fact five years old and has that extra bit of strength, but has a two-year-old mentality due to

neglect and malnourishment, you can see it gets more difficult. I survived not being bitten, but got a terrific whack in the face by a feisty little fist. All you can do in these circumstances is gentle restraint until he stops his tantrum and patience and soothing words to calm him down. Harsh words or punishment will not work as he will retreat even further into his shell. I found this to be a fairly trying day, and it was only one day. I'm in awe of Debbie, Brett and all the other youth workers who do this every single day. Kudos to you, guys! You do a magnificent job.

## In the Vegie Patch with Alf

It has been a very hard season on gardens and gardeners, wondering how to keep deep rooted plants alive. There is no way a hose can take the place of natural rain. Hose watering will not penetrate the soil like the rain does. Once fine soil gets very dry, it is inclined to reject the water. The garden looks like it has been watered, but stir up the soil and you find the water has not reached the roots of even shallow rooted plants.

This month is brassica planting time. It is worth risking planting out these plants as we might get an early break in the season. If not it is not a big loss out of the pocket. The seeds of the broccoli and cauliflowers can still be sown this month. They do adapt themselves to climate conditions. Cabbage and brussel sprouts do need to be planted out this month, so as to mature in mid-Winter. Late brussel sprouts are not very successful, they will form very poor heads once the warm weather sets in and also the small grubs and insects penetrate the heads. All young plants transplanted out in the hot weather do need protection from the hot sun, for at least the first two or three weeks. A 20 to 30 cm flower pot make good covers and they also hold the moisture in. I use them on all young plants and find them very successful. It is worth chancing the sowing of other veggies, if it is even a small planting. Great Lake lettuce, Chantenay carrots. This variety sown now and up to mid-March will come in very useful in the late Winter and early Spring. Lettuces do need to be shaded in warm weather or else they fret and rot. Lettuce can be sown in pots and removed to the shade on hot days. Silver beet, swedes, radishes, celery and dwarf beans. Beans can be sown up until the end of February or early March. When using light straw mulch, wet it down and then apply some soil on the top, or else a strong wind will deliver it back to you again. Mulching has a wonderful effect on plants over the summer months. It helps to keep the moisture in the soil. It is not what the plant uses, it is what the sun and the wind dries out.

**Fruit trees.** Now is the best time to thin out unwanted wood right from the base; it does help to stop gum from forming on the limbs for the next season. If unwanted non fruit bearing limbs are cut out at the base now, they will not make new growth next season at that point. It does help in the pruning for the Winter.

## Improvements to benefit Central Goldfields kindergartens

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, has welcomed local kindergarten students into the new kinder year, with a commitment of more individual attention than ever before.

Ms Pulford said improved educator-to-child ratios introduced on the 1<sup>st</sup> of January will lead to more individual attention and care for kindergarten kids in the year before school.

The Andrews Government is investing up to \$83.7 million to help kindergartens meet the new staffing requirements, supporting eligible community-based kindergartens to hire additional staff.

The new ratios will mean one educator for every 11 children - down from one per 15 - giving kids more individual care and attention.

Ms Pulford said the Government is also getting on with the job of building and upgrading new and existing kindergartens under its \$50 million kinder improvements commitment.

Funding includes:

- \$7,500 for Dunolly Pre-school to replace shade sails.
- \$1,449 for California Gully Kindergarten for a printer and smart TV.
- \$1,500 each for T.L. Stone Kindergarten and Dunolly Pre-school for iPads and computers.

Ms Pulford said early childhood development is at the heart of the Government's vision to making Victoria the Education State.

"In 2016 we are delivering better services and strengthening the quality of our early years services so local kids get a great start in life," Ms Pulford said.

#### **Clunes Booktown**

Tourism Minister, John Eren, said the Government was working hard to grow a calendar of events across regional Victoria. "This grant will help the Clunes Booktown Festival market its great event to attract more visitors to the region," Mr Eren said.

The Clunes Booktown Festival will be held between 30 April and 1May.

## Funding for farmers' markets to start up and expand

The Member for Western Victoria and State Agriculture Minister Jaala Pulford has announced grants of up to \$30,000 to help establish new farmers' markets or to expand existing market activities.

Grants are available through the Farmers' Markets Support Program, which is designed to facilitate the development of farmers' markets throughout regional and rural Victoria.

Set-up and expansion grants of up to \$30,000 are available and business plan and feasibility studies of up to \$10,000 are also available.

Ms Pulford said farmers' markets are an important source of income for small agricultural businesses in Western Victoria and also provide a regular meeting opportunity for local producers and community members.

"In addition to the role they play within a local community, farmers' markets also act as a tourist attraction for many regions and help to stimulate local economies through flow-on sales in nearby towns and tourism attractions," she said.

"In my electorate, farmers' markets in places like Talbot, Wedderburn and Clunes are extremely popular events for both locals and visitors," Ms Pulford said.

Accredited farmers' markets provide consumers with assurance that the produce they purchase has been directly grown by the seller, which means the profits are going straight to the local producer.

Funding is also available to help non-accredited markets to obtain accreditation from the Victorian Farmers Market Association. The Victorian Farmers Market Association is the industry organisation whose purpose is to support and promote authentic farmers' markets throughout Victoria.

"Through the Farmers' Market Support Program, the Andrews Labor Government is helping to ensure our local producers can get their outstanding produce direct to the community," Ms Pulford said.

- \* A great place to be



## Have your say on the future of Red Gum parks and reserves

Parks Victoria, with the community, is developing a management plan for Victoria's River Red Gum parks and reserves. Nine new parks were created in 2010 to protect the health of the Murray River and River Red Gum forests. The management plan will guide the protection of Victoria's River Red Gum floodplain forests and wetlands, cultural sites and explore opportunities for tourism and recreation.

"Parks Victoria and the community will work together to guide the protection of these significant protected areas and enjoy their benefits for many years to come," said Parks Victoria Chief Executive Bradley Fauteux.

"Community input is an essential part of the planning process and we are seeking all views of interested individuals and organisations.

"This is a great opportunity to have a conversation and contribute to the future management and health of Victoria's River Red Gum parks."

Parks Victoria is working with all interested Traditional Owner groups in the River Red Gum planning area. The planning process will ensure Traditional Owners can provide input on their aspirations for future use and involvement in management of their traditional lands.

There are a number of ways to contribute to the plan:

- Community meetings will be held in 2016 in the region's major centres. Dates and locations will be advertised in local media and on the Parks Victoria website: www.parks.vic.gov.au/redgumplan
- Public submissions will be accepted and carefully considered in preparing the plan.
- Parks Victoria rangers will be distributing information during peak tourism times in the parks.

The draft plan will be available for public consultation in late 2016 on the Parks Victoria website. The management plan will cover the Red Gum forests along the Victorian side of the Murray River between Wodonga and the South Australia border. Some of the areas to be included in the plan are:

- Gunbower National Park
- Hattah–Kulkyne National Park
- Warby–Ovens National Park
- Kings Billabong Park
- Leaghur State Park
- Lower Goulburn National Park
- Murray–Kulkyne Park
- Nyah–Vinifera Park

Sections of the Murray – Sunset National Park.

The plan will not cover Barmah National Park as the long term strategic directions for the park will be determined through the Yorta Yorta Traditional Owner Land Management Board.

Ms Carnell has held the position of CEO of the Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry since 2014, which represents more than 300,000 businesses across Australia.

Minister for Small Business, the Hon Kelly O'Dwyer MP, said the Government acknowledges small businesses make a substantial contribution to Australia's economy with over two million small businesses generating around a third of economic output.

#### Regional Victorians to help shape infrastructure future

People in regional Victoria will play a key role in helping shape our state's future as part of formal consultation to develop a 30-year infrastructure strategy for Victoria, Infrastructure Victoria CEO Michel Masson said.

Mr Masson said all regional Victorians had an opportunity to get involved in stakeholder and community consultation activities from today.

"Our discussion paper Laying the Foundations outlines draft objectives for the strategy and we want to know if we've got these objectives right, how we could improve them and if we've missed anything.

"This stage is about setting goals and identifying challenges and opportunities, rather than jumping to solutions.

"Feedback gained in this phase of consultation will help us refine and confirm our objectives and ensure our strategy development is focussed on the right things."

Mr Masson said Infrastructure Victoria would also convene two citizen juries - one in Melbourne and one in Shepparton - to ensure the views of everyday Victorians, including those in regional and rural areas, were captured in the development of the 30-year strategy.

"The Shepparton jury will not be considering infrastructure issues local to Shepparton, they will be providing input on behalf of regional Victoria."

Citizen juries bring together randomly selected people to deliberate on a problem. Infrastructure Victoria will ask these juries to consider the question: What should we do to meet Victoria's infrastructure needs? Like a court jury, they will consider evidence and hear from experts before delivering a verdict. The reports of the juries will be considered by Infrastructure Victoria as a key input into the strategy.


Jury members will be sought through a random selection process to ensure a representative, crosssection of people who are involved. The unedited recommendations of both juries will be published on the Infrastructure Victoria website.

Mr Masson said Infrastructure Victoria had developed an online consultation portal to make it easy for people to have their say.

"Our consultation program is a genuine opportunity for people to help shape Victoria's future and I urge people to get involved," Mr Masson said.



On This Day In Dunolly - 17 February 1909 Household Hints in The Argus - "Graf ' (Dunolly) describes what seems to be a very simple process of jam making; " I never make much trouble of jam making. I stone the fruit, allow it to stand overnight with half its weight of sugar (brewers) added. When ready to put it on the stove, I butter the bottom of the preserving pan, place in it several cleaned half crowns and pour in the fruit and sugar. I heat the remaining half of the sugar and add it when the jam is about half cooked. I never stir the jam The coins do the work much better than any stirring would do it. The fruit remains whole and the appearance of the jam is much improved. In adding the hot sugar I gently move it with a wooden spoon to mix it and prevent it settling in one spot, but I do not put the spoon deep down into the jam. I place an asbestos mat under the preserving pan and regulate the heat In this way jam making interferes very little with the ordinary day's work." \*We don't recommend tossing copper coins into jam or using asbestos anywhere. But feel free to make as much jam as you want.\*


