Loose cannon fires up town

Have you heard about the Tarnagulla cannon? A memorial situated in the little town 184km northwest of Melbourne. Once the cannon was part of the impressive armaments of Her Majesty's Victorian ship 'Nelson'. The ship was scrapped in 1898 and its cannons were sent all over Victoria. Tarnagulla's cannon was carried by rail from the Williamstown naval dockyard, and the locals couldn't wait to give it a go. On May 23, 1900 the townsfolk held a monster picnic to celebrate the Relief of Mafeking, South Africa, and decided to fire the cannon in salute. It was loaded with 16 pounds of blasting powder and was tamped with mud and bags and primed. The local MP fired the charge and cannon hurtled backwards in a cloud of black smoke and dust. An old woman was blown by the blast into a nearby swimming pool dam, where the cannon came to rest beside her. But not before it had knocked over the town's pride, the Fighting Gladiator statue, while the smouldering wadding from the cannon's mouth started a bushfire. There was another overenthusiastic firing of the gun when Federation occurred in 1901 - with another thunderous explosion that rocked the town. Yvette Saint

Kindergarten Funding

This week, more than 75,000 Victorian kids will have their first day at kindergarten in Victoria, including many in the Central Goldfields Shire.

Over the course of the year, early childhood teachers and educators will use their expertise and knowledge to build those children's social, emotional, literacy and numeracy skills, their critical and creative thinking, their perseverance, sociability and self-esteem. These children will directly benefit from the Universal Access funding agreement, which sees 15 hours of kindergarten per week provided at low cost to families for children in the year before school. Research clearly links kindergarten participation with better school performance, improved job prospects and higher wages on entering the workforce.

It represents a shared commitment across Australian governments to investment in early education, and to the social and economic benefits that follow. We don't want the class of 2017 to be the last year that has access to this vital early education.

Under the *National Partnership Agreement on Universal Access to Early Childhood Education*, Victoria pays for more than two-thirds of government funding of 15 hours of kindergarten in the year before school, with the Federal Government contributing the rest. The current agreement is set to run out at the end of 2017. In 2017, every single one of Victoria's 2300 funded kindergartens will be providing children with 15 hours of quality, teacher-led preschool education in the vital year before school, showing how in demand this additional support is.

The Andrews Labor Government this week has launched a petition for the 15 hours campaign asking Malcolm Turnbull to commit once and for all to ongoing funding for 15 hours of kindergarten for children in the year before school. Victorian children deserve certainty and I urge your readers to sign this petition.

Use fumigants correctly

Using fumigants correctly is critical in protecting this year's bumper grains harvest.

Agriculture Victoria Statewide Specialist Chemicals, Steven Field said there are a variety of fumigants on the market, including nitrogen and carbon dioxide, but the bulk of stored grain is treated with phosphine generated from products containing aluminium phosphide.

"In Victoria anyone using aluminium phosphide products must hold appropriate authorisation such as an Agricultural Chemical Users Permit issued by DEDJTR.

"All fumigants must be used in gas tight, sealable storages, the most common of which are silos.

"Many silos on farm may not actually be gas tight, including some that have only recently been purchased," he said.

Mr Field said all silos used for fumigation should meet the Australian Standard AS2628 and be subjected to a pressure test prior to fumigant use.

"Using fumigants in non-gas tight storages is well known to increase resistance as eggs, pupae and larvae may survive and will carry genes promoting phosphine resistance onto subsequent generations," he said.

"Despite the committed efforts of some in the grains industry, dealing with this issue over successive years has proven to be difficult.

"The increased resistance to phosphine, in insect populations, highlights the need for everyone involved to take this matter seriously. Failure to do so will lead to phosphine becoming ineffective, leading to increased costs for farmers and potential difficulties in gaining access to export markets."

The Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) has funded a Grains Storage Extension Project through to 2018 which has delivered high quality resources and educational material for farmers to use.

Ten new trains for Maryborough

The Andrews Labor Government has introduced 10 new train services every week for Maryborough as part of a new V/Line timetable that delivers 80 extra services each week across regional Victoria.

The Parliamentary Secretary to the Premier, Colin Brooks MP, rode the first of the new services into Maryborough this morning.

The new services have been created by extending an existing Ballarat service to Maryborough in the morning and evening. Every weekday, the 9:17am train from Southern Cross to Ballarat service will run all the way to Maryborough, arriving at 11:38am. In the afternoon, a new service will depart Maryborough at 2:59pm and get to Southern Cross at 5:14pm. They are the first new Maryborough services since the former Labor Government reopened the line in 2010 after it was closed by the Liberal Party.

"Labor re-opened the line after the Liberals and Nationals closed it, and now we're adding the extra services the former Government failed to do," Mr Brooks said.

"It's part of our record investment in public transport, so people spend less time stuck on platforms, and more time with family and friends," he said.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said she had lobbied for the additional service and was pleased it had come to fruition.

"These new services will make a real difference for passengers in Maryborough, Creswick, Clunes and Talbot, giving them more choice about when and where they travel, and getting them home safer and sooner," Ms Pulford said.

The new timetable also introduces 10 additional services between Ballarat and Melbourne every week. The new services were funded in this year's State Budget, which also provided \$280 million for new regional carriages and \$198 million to rebuild V/Line after savage cuts by the former Liberal and National Government.

Cookery Corner

Microwave lemon chicken and parsley risotto

Ingredients

1 litre chicken stock

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 small brown onion, finely chopped

2 garlic cloves, crushed

2 cups Arborio rice

1 cup boiling water

1 ½ cups shredded cooked chicken

2 x 170g jars marinated artichoke quarters, drained

1 tablespoon finely grated lemon rind

½ cup roughly chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves

Method

- 1. Place chicken stock in a heatproof, microwave-safe jug. Microwave on HIGH (100%) for 2 minutes or until hot. Cover to keep warm.
- 2. Combine oil, onion and garlic in a 2 litre-capacity, heat-proof, microwave-safe dish (with lid). Microwave on HIGH (100%) for 2 minutes or until the onion has softened.
- 3. Add rice. Stir to combine. Microwave on HIGH (100%) for 1 minute. Add 3 cups of stock. Stir to combine. Microwave, covered, on HIGH (100%) for 10 minutes or until liquid is almost all absorbed.
- 4. Add boiling water and the remaining stock. Stir to combine. Microwave, covered on **medium** (50%), for 5 minutes. Stir in the chicken. Microwave, covered on **medium** (50%) for 3 to 5 minutes or until almost all liquid

 \mathbf{medium} (50%) for 3 to 5 minutes or until almost all liquid has absorbed.

5. Sir in artichokes, lemon juice and half the lemon rind. Stand, covered, for 5 minutes or until liquid has completely absorbed. Stir in parsley. Top with remaining rind. Serve. Serves 4, Preparation 10 minutes, cook 25 minutes (plus 5 minutes standing time).

Free positive parenting program for rural families

It is currently available free of charge to all grandparents caring for grandchildren, parents and rural families across Victoria.

Your information could be the key to helping the police prevent a bushfire.







At 34 years of age he has been running the family farm since his father passed away six years ago and his main goal is to make the farm more productive and to gain more knowledge which will help him make better decisions.

The scholarship was advertised in the newspaper in July last year and Mr Mullins thought he fitted the criteria and might as well give it a go.

"I was surprised when I got it and very grateful."

Before he went back to farming, he did a motor mechanics traineeship and had other odd jobs related to farming including being a roustabout working with sheep.

The course he has chosen is Lifetime Ewe Management and runs for two years, although the group needs five other farmers to be able to run and he is currently looking for other farmers who might be interested.

Mr Mullins farms sheep, lucerne and has a small amount of cropping.

The farm has been in the family for 100 years and he is the fourth generation to manage it.

"I encourage all young farmers to apply for these scholarships, its well worth it."
