Touring the Goldfields

On the last Sunday in January, I had the very unexpected, but distinct pleasure of being driven around the many sights of the old Goldfields via Bealiba. My cousin Norman, from the city, called in and took me touring.

We first drove out through Bealiba and onto the deserted town of Tunstalls (which I had never heard of). It was settled in the latter part of the 1860s soon after the discovery of gold by a man named Pharaoh Tunstall, and his mate John (Jack) Harper. John Harper just happened to be Norm's Great Grandfather! The town was first called Tunstall's Hill, and at the height of its activity, the population was 1400 to 1500. There were quite a lot of pubs and grog shops, as well as the usual array of grocers, butchers and blacksmiths and so on. But the gold petered out in a short time and by 1869 Tunstalls was deserted. The residents and their belongings moved on to rushes in other areas. The whole town was demolished, and all that remains today are the stones from a few old chimneys, a few caved-in cellars and

all the old bottles, as well as quite a few misshapen handmade bricks. There is also a very small dam which would have been dug by hand and horse-work. It would have been a tough life for those who lived and worked there. But they survived somehow. Norm is living proof of this, as his Grandparents and his Dad were born in Bealiba.

We went up to the Old Bealiba Reservoir to have a look around. This was the water supply that pumped water down to the steam trains and the town. The pumping shed and a broken down jetty is still there, and with the surrounding bush and its birdlife, makes a very attractive setting. We then drove up around the modern reservoir which is also a great bush site, and very popular with caravanners and campers. Last, but not least, we went up a very bumpy, water-damaged, track on the end of Mt Bealiba, where the hills of the Pyrenees looked lovely in the distance. It was a most pleasurable time spent with a like-minded nature lover and "Bushie".

Dunolly Library Services Update

Farewell Goldfields Library Corporation

This service has now concluded and it's time to return all borrowed books. The books can be dropped at the Dunolly Rural Transaction Centre, Broadway or at the Maryborough Regional Library. The last collection is **Monday, 13 February**, so please ensure all books are returned by this date.

Will there be a new library service for Dunolly?

At present Council is scouting locations for a temporary library to visit Dunolly twice weekly, starting mid-February, (date to be confirmed). This will be a pop-up service provided through the Maryborough Regional Library.

Will a static library be established?

Council is negotiating for a venue for a temporary static library, and this is a slow process. Obtaining the necessary permits and permissions can take at least 6 weeks.

Looking long term, Council has completed and submitted an application for Living Libraries Funding, so that a permanent static library can be established. The Living Libraries Infrastructure Funding Board meets in February, and we await their decision eagerly.

What does Community mean to you- why do you volunteer?

That's a question I have asked myself lately. People are more likely to point out the faults of your chosen volunteering position than stride up to you and shake your hand, but when you work for a community institution like *The Welcome Record*, or the Museum, RTC or the Neighbourhood Centre, the local school or Kindy, you invest your sense of self with that particular choice and don't like to see them disrespected or insulted. I am also an administrator on two community Facebook pages and realise that it is a position of responsibility. We all know that just because it is on Facebook doesn't necessarily make it true and we must check the facts before pressing that Share button. Recently there was a post that alluded to the fact that DNHC Woodworkers Shed was funded by the Bendigo Bank. I rang Sharon at the DNHC and she very candidly shared the fact that the Woodworking Shed was government department funded 12 years ago, but three years ago the woodworkers received a \$3000 grant to buy a storage shed for the club. That is why a photo of Mike (the main volunteer at the Woodworking Shed) is in the Dunolly Bendigo Bank. It is easy to jump to conclusions on the viability of said woodworking shed, (which has as many female members as it has male, and has been inviting people to come and join in and learn new skills for years) and share across Facebook to invite others' criticism. This is just one example. There are others. We are all in this community together, all trying to move forward, help others and engage with different sections of the community. Yes, we can all work together but please, can we do it without the micro-managing and swipes from the sidelines? This small town would cease to work smoothly without its volunteers and its community institutions, so please be kind and use a little bit of good spirit when people are just trying the best they can.

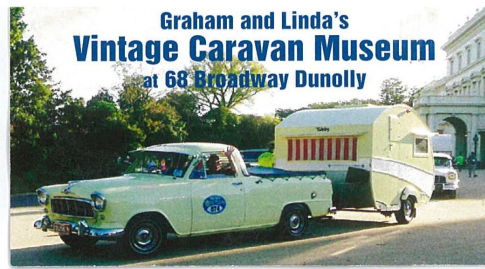

In 2001 Mike approached the Neighbourhood Centre about running a Woodwork Group. What a great idea! **But Where?** We didn't have the facility to do such a thing.

Mike was very willing to run the group in his own workshop, and so the Dunolly Neighbourhood Centre Woodwork Group was born! We set up a presentation workshop at the Centre; 25 people attended and 15 signed up as members. There were two sessions a day, twice a week, run at Mike's own workshop on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

In the meantime we started to look for a place of our own (the old scout hall, the Dunolly station building, the abandoned petrol station), but none of these buildings were suitable and so we looked around for funding to build a shed. We approached the Men's Shed organisation, and various government and philanthropic trusts for a grant and were successful with a State government grant to build a 10mt x 6mt shed on a concrete slab with all electrics.

So, we had the shed, but you can't run a woodwork group with no woodwork equipment can you?

Once again we looked around at various trusts for grants. F.R.R.R came to the rescue and gave us a grant to buy four wood lathes, power tools, hammers, nails, screwdrivers and all the sundries you need to run a successful workshop.

We have been very lucky over the last 15 years in receiving grants from various organisations; also fabulous donations of wood, equipment and bits and bobs from members of the public.

The Bendigo Bank very kindly gave us a grant to put up a small shed to house the overflowing donations of wood we receive and our members have a fabulous array to choose from, depending on what project they are working on.

Just to clarify; we are not a member of the Men's Shed Organisation. We welcome male and female members.

The Shed, at the moment, is open every Tuesday morning from 9am till 12 noon, but we would like to open on other days (one person can't do everything). We do need a skilled, responsible person (male or female) to volunteer to undertake and commit to running another session. If this is you, please get in touch with the Centre! We are open to suggestions, maybe a women only day or a men only day?

In the meantime if you love to work with wood you're welcome to join the Neighbourhood Centre Woodwork group. Fees are \$20 per year and \$5 per session.

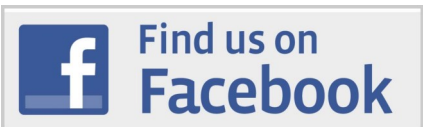

No excuses —

Don't leave kids in hot, locked cars

New Ambulance Victoria data reveals paramedics are getting an average of four call-outs a day across Victoria for kids left in locked cars – including the Central Goldfields Shire.

With February's hot temperatures looming, Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, urged local families to never leave their kids in cars.

Ms Pulford said the Andrews Government is working with Kidsafe and Ambulance Victoria to increase awareness of the dangers of leaving children in parked cars.

In 2016 Ambulance Victoria were called to a staggering 1562 callouts for kids left in cars. One in five required hospital treatment. Last year there were also callouts to rescue children in hot cars in Maryborough and another one in Clunes.

"Despite heat warnings and significant penalties, an average of four kids a day are being put at risk of serious heat-related injury or death by being left unattended in parked cars. In the worst of these cases, firefighters rescued children from locked cars before they were treated by paramedics," Ms Pulford said.

"Temperatures in a car can more than double within minutes, meaning on a typical summer day the temperature inside a parked car can quickly become 20-30 degrees hotter than outside," she said.

Experts say children's body temperatures rise three to five times faster than an adult's, meaning they are at greater risk of life-threatening heatstroke, dehydration and organ damage when left in a hot car.

"Make no mistake, hot cars can kill - so there are no excuses, and no exceptions," Ms Pulford said.

"It may seem challenging for busy parents, but every time you get out of the car, even briefly, you must take your kids with you, no exceptions," Ms Pulford said.

In Victoria, it is against the law to leave children unattended in a car.

Parents or carers could face fines of nearly \$3,700 or up to six months' jail, or both

Ambulance investment paying dividends in Maryborough

The Andrews Government's record investment in ambulances and the health system is paying dividends, with ambulance response times and elective surgery waiting times showing an improvement compared to a year earlier.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said Victorian hospitals have experienced unprecedented demand with 443,084 patients presenting at emergency departments across Victoria over the summer months, the latest health performance data shows.

Last November's unprecedented thunderstorm asthma event pushed hospital emergency departments to the limit, but the latest data confirms doctors, nurses and paramedics rose to the challenge.

Ambulance Victoria analysis indicates that its December quarter State-wide response times are slightly above those of the previous three months, but, without the surge in callouts for the thunderstorm-asthma, would have remained steady.

Hospital emergency department attendances also climbed as a result of the respiratory illness surge, but on most measures were an improvement on the previous three months.

Ms Pulford said Ambulance Victoria data confirms people in the Central Goldfields Shire can have confidence that in an emergency, they will get the care they need, quickly. "The proportion of ambulances in Central Goldfields which arrived within the benchmark 15 minutes for the most time-critical patients – including cardiac arrest, heart attack, major trauma and stroke patients – improved to 60.5 per cent in the December quarter, up from 58.8 per cent a year earlier," Ms Pulford said. "Our record investment in ambulance services means more patients in Maryborough, Carisbrook, Dunolly, Talbot and other parts of the Shire can have every confidence they will receive the care they need sooner," she said.

Minister for Health and Ambulance Services, Jill Hennessy, said the Government's investment was making a real difference. "These latest figures confirm all Victorians can have confidence in our hospitals, doctors, nurses and paramedics. They have all done an exceptional job rising to the challenge of thunderstorm asthma, and the tragic Bourke Street incident," Ms Hennessy said.

"We have never experienced such demand on our health system, but we are treating and caring for more patients than ever before," she said.

Labor's \$500 million plan to improve response times – the biggest ever investment in ambulance services – will employ 450 more paramedics, buy new vehicles and build new ambulance stations across the state.

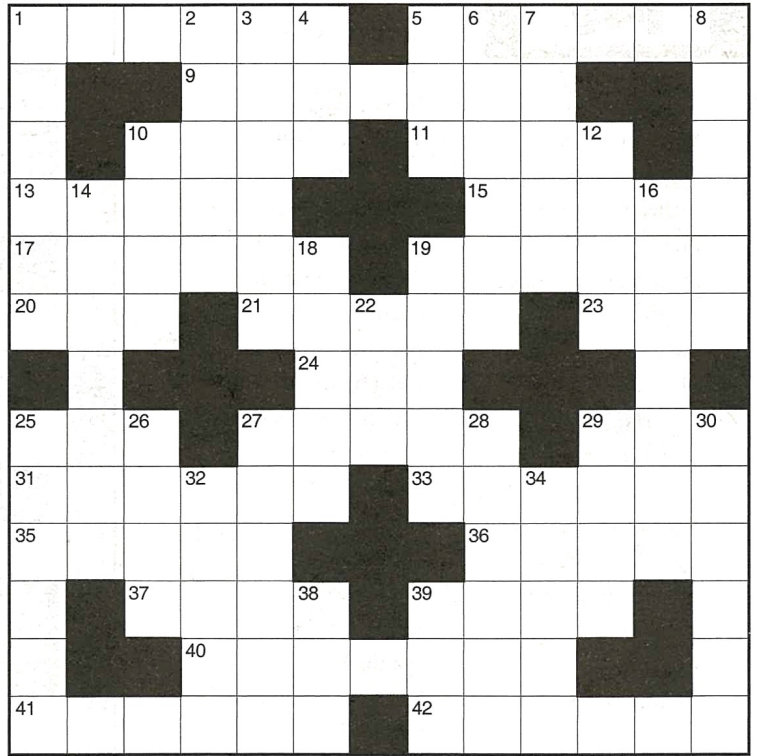

In the Vegie Patch



By now gardeners should be reaping the benefits of the early planting with more space available for Winter maturing greens. Years ago animal manure and bird droppings were used instead of artificial fertilisers. A good mixture of animal manure will give plants all the nutrients they need. On some soils potash or lime is needed. Extra potash will help to make plants immune from disease.

Now is the time to plant out Winter maturing greens. Some suitable varieties of cabbage are mini cabbage, one of the fastest growing and slow to bolt. Sugarloaf is sweet and early to mature or, why not try the versatile Chinese cabbage, Wombok?

Cauliflowers are more adaptable to seasonal conditions and can be planted out over a longer period. Snowball will mature near to three months from transplanting. All Year Round matures in 15 weeks. Also Paleface takes a long time to mature — sow from seed or use fresh cauliflower seedlings, as old brown looking plants are likely to bolt to maturity with small nearly useless heads. Sicily Purple is a vibrant purple Italian heirloom variety to add some interest to the garden and dinner plate.

Broccoli — Premium crop can be sown over a longer period and best to make small plantings at intervals. Shogun has good disease-resistance and is ready for harvest in about 16 weeks during cold weather. It will be too late after this month to plant Brussels sprouts; they

must mature in the cold months, or else the plants will make growth at the expense of heads. Dwarf beans can be sown up to mid-March and still produce a good crop. A lot of the flowers of beans and tomato plants are burnt off over the very hot spell. So that is the cause of these plants being slow to produce the goods.



Chantenay carrots (shorter and rounder) can be sown up to the end of March. They will grow and keep in the soil until mid-September or later.

Fruit Trees. Peach, Nectarine and Apricot trees can be pruned when fruit has been harvested as the tree's actively growing

wounds heal faster, reducing risk of disease. Remove dead or diseased wood, thin out unwanted branches right from the base and remove centre growing limbs to open up the middle.

Apple trees bear fruit on spurs formed on two-year-old wood. Most healthy trees also produce a forest of young shoots, all reaching for the sky. They can be cut back hard now to leave short stubs, each carrying about six buds.

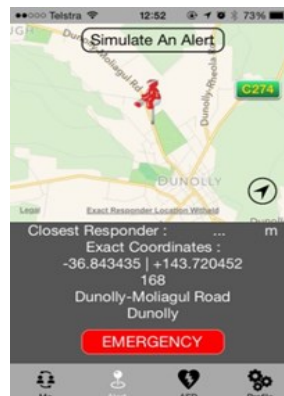
