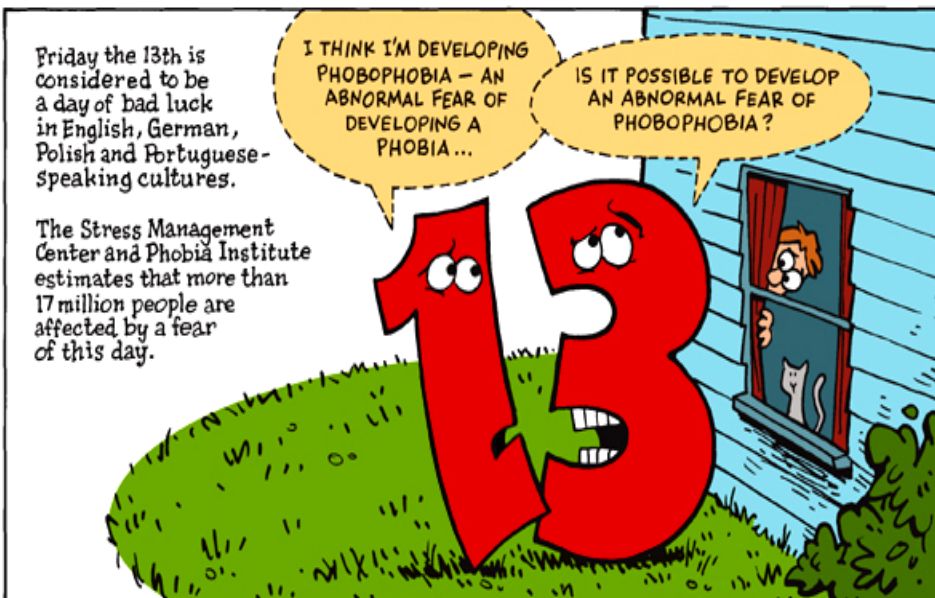

Dear Editor,

The BUSH USER GROUP will be holding a rally in Avoca on Saturday the 21st of July at 11am, meeting at the Soldier's Memorial on High St.

The rally is regarding the VEAC investigation in Central West Victoria

The changes they are considering will affect residents of Dunolly, our town, and the businesses that rely on income from these bush users.

All the public land in three large areas in Central West Victoria totalling 4800 square kilometres is under threat from being locked up, or having access severely restricted, depending on the outcome of this investigation by VEAC. This includes State Forests, stream frontages, unused roads (right of ways), water production areas and uncategorised public land. The push is to turn these areas into State Parks.

State Forests are managed by DELWP whilst State Parks are managed by Parks Victoria. Unlike State Forests, State Parks generally do not allow

The media has covered rallies in Maryborough and Beaufort and we are starting to get heard.

National Parks are a great idea, but we have more than enough and there is no need, or reason to further restrict the use of the land for people's benefit. The state forests around Dunolly are also on the list of areas to be "protected". Parks Victoria are over-worked and underfunded; they are not able to keep up the necessary maintenance to protect the over 100 parks they already have.

A Maryborough local is warning other residents of a new phishing scam targeting pensioners.

The resident, who wishes to remain anonymous, claimed he has received a number of phone calls in the past few days from an organisation claiming to be working with Centrelink and The Australia Government. According to the resident, the scam sounds like a legitimate call and plays a recorded message before asking for personal details.

"It is run in a way that is focused on the government giving people a pension rise and wants you to give them your personal details and account number", they said.

The scammer will ask you to provide or confirm your personal details, saying that the bank or organisation is verifying customer records due to a technical error that wiped out customer data.

Blood Service driving into town

The Australian Red Cross mobile blood donor centre will be rolling into town next month and residents are being urged to roll up their sleeves to help save lives.

Bookings for the annual blood drive are now open and Australian Red Cross Blood Services regional communications manager Victoria Erin Lagoudakis, said the organisation is encouraging Central Goldfields Shire residents to sign up.

"There are still plenty of blood donation appointments available to give this life-saving gift", Ms Lagoudakis said.

"Around one in three Australians will require blood or a blood or a blood product in their lifetime. We all expect blood will be there when we need it but it's only there due to the generosity of blood donors."

According to the Australian Red Cross Blood Services, one blood donation can help save three lives.

My Health Record and what you need to know

In 2018 a **My Health Record** will be created for all Medicare eligible Australians who choose to have one.

My Health Record is the name of the national digital record system.

Having a **My Health Record** means your important health information like allergies, medical conditions and treatments, medicine details, and test and scan reports can be digitally available in one place. It is a secure and private online record.

Healthcare providers like doctors, specialists and hospital staff may be able to see it online from anywhere at anytime when they need to, like in an accident or emergency.

On Tuesday 11th July, Samantha McIntosh from "pnh Western Victoria" came to Dunolly Town Hall and held a free 60 minute session explaining this government funded initiative.

Approximately 15 people attended the session and were given the opportunity to ask questions and take home information.

The session supplied advice on the system, including:

- What is it? How do you use it?
- Privacy and security
- Access - parents/carers/family/health/ professionals
- What to do if you do not want a record.

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## In the Veggie Patch and other gardening tips



Another month gone with very little help to plant growth and very little rain.



However, this month might turn the tide towards the gardens. July is getting very close to planting time and more growth for the plants. Long keeping onions can go in the soil later in the month, also seeds or plants of spring onions. Onion plants need a firm foundation and not very rich soil. In rich soil they make too much top growth, with soft necks. Dwarf peas can be sown now until early October. Melbourne Market are the early variety with Greenfeast later. All varieties of peas can be sown this month. Peas like deep soil and plenty of lime. Blood and bone is also a good help for growth. A small sowing of carrots



is best at the present, or else a percentage of them will run to seed, once the good growing weather starts. Carrot and parsnips grow better with plenty of sand in the soil, and a good dressing of lime, to give them a good colour. All Seasons variety is the best early one, and is resistant to virus diseases and is less likely to run prematurely to seed. Other seeds that can be sown this month, swedes, lettuce, silver beet, spinach, radishes and beet root.

When broad beans are at their growing stage, a good dressing of potash, run along between the rows, is the best for this variety of veggie. If they get too tall later on, then cut the tops off. They will then make more shoots and therefore have more bearing heads.

### Fruit Trees

Winter pruning is recommended for newly-planted trees until the tree has achieved the desired height and shape. Established fruit trees are better pruned in late summer. If your trees were not pruned then it is best to give them a prune during this Winter. Stone fruit trees, such as peaches, nectarines or apricots should be treated for leaf curl with one or two applications of a fungicide spray such as copper sulphate or Bordeaux spray. Spray the trees in Winter while they are still dormant and just as the buds begin to swell. Follow-up spray again when the flowers open. You need to spray enough to cover all the bare branches of the tree so that it's dripping. Apply organic fertiliser to fruit trees at the end of July, so that the slowly-released nutrients will become available when the new growth commences.

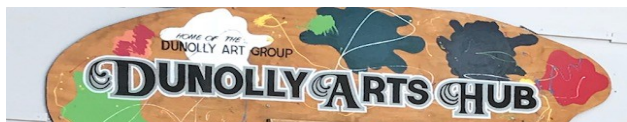

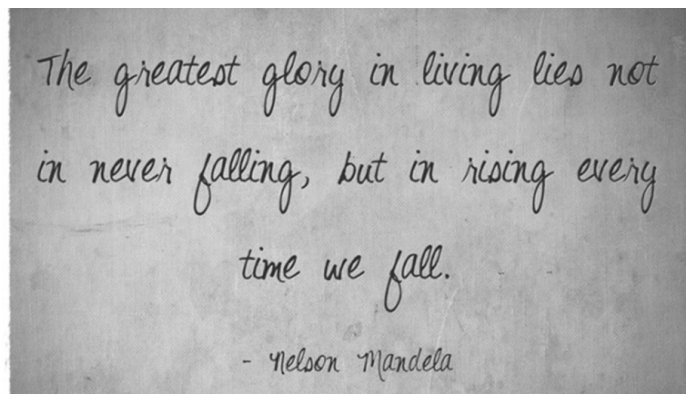

## Application for open pit mine near Dunolly gains approval

Fiddlers Creek Mining Company's project to begin open pit mining near Dunolly received the final tick of approval last month, with works set to begin by the end of the year. At last month's ordinary Loddon Shire Council meeting the planning application from Fiddlers Creek Mining in association with GBM Gold and Truelight Mining for open pit mining at the site known as Harvest Home, five kilometres north of Dunolly was unanimously approved.

While council received one objection regarding the proposal based on the potential negative impact the proposal would have on the natural environment and the impact on the Harvest Home Road, Loddon Shire Council director operations Steven Phillips said the application had been endorsed by relative authorities.

"It's a relatively short project with a lifespan of around six months and while there will be some impact on the road, that will be managed through the conditions on the permit and monitored by council throughout the life of the project," he said.

"The project has been through all of the checks and balances and council was satisfied to approve the application."

## Interesting facts about pencils

- ✂ More than 14 billion pencils are produced in the world every year - enough to circle the globe 62 times.
- ✂ One pencil will draw a line 70 miles long.
- ✂ Pencils don't really contain lead. That grey matter is graphite and clay.
- ✂ The pencil was invented more than 400 years ago, in 1565.
- ✂ Famous novelists Ernest Hemingway and John Steinbeck used pencils to write their books.
- ✂ Pencils didn't have erasers on them until 100 years ago because teachers felt they would encourage children to make mistakes.
- ✂ It would cost \$50 in labour and materials for a person to make a 10-cent pencil.
- ✂ One million pencils are used annually on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange.
- ✂ The average pencil can be sharpened 17 times, write 45,000 words.
- ✂ A good-size tree will make about 300,000 pencils.

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Residents in the Loddon Shire Council have rated Council’s advocacy efforts as comparable to the state-wide average in the annual community report card. With a score of 54, Council’s lobbying on behalf of the community is equal to the average for councils state-wide and above the average for small rural councils (score of 53). Council also performed above the small rural council average on sealed local roads with a score of 50 compared to 49.

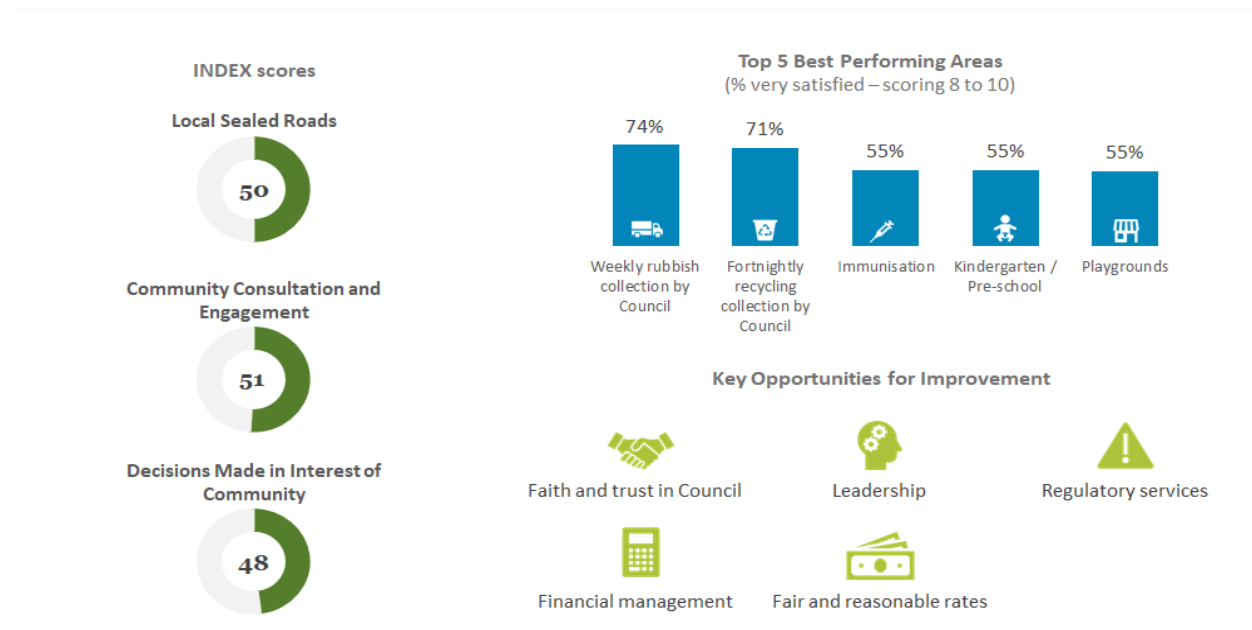
The survey, conducted by Key Research, collected responses from 460 residents in Loddon on a range of council services. The top five performing areas according to residents are weekly rubbish collection, fortnightly recycling collection, immunisation, kindergarten/pre-schools and playgrounds.

The survey also revealed that more work needs to be done to improve residents’ perception of Council’s financial management, leadership and regulatory services.

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## Vegetable pie with a potato crust

Hearty and wholesome, a warming dish that uses Winter vegetables. Remember to choose small leeks with dark green tops. And there is no need to peel the mushrooms: just wash them briefly in water.

### Ingredients

1 kg (about 2lb) potatoes, unpeeled salt and freshly ground black pepper  
 2 egg yolks  
 1 tbsp. butter  
 1 leek, sliced and washed well  
 2 cups sliced mushrooms  
 1 zucchini, sliced  
 ½ bunch spinach, cooked or 1 packet frozen spinach  
 1 cob of corn or some frozen or canned corn  
 1 cup thick cheese sauce  
 A little grated cheese

### Method

1. Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F.
2. Boil the potatoes until tender, then peel. Mash or put through a mouli or sieve.
3. Season and mix through 2 egg yolks and 1 tbsp. of butter. Using about one-third of this preparation, line a pie dish—smoothing it out with the back of a spoon to a thickness of about 1-1½ cm (1/2 in). Bake this shell for 15 to 20 mins before filling it.
4. Meanwhile, in a large pan, cook leek in a little butter with mushrooms and zucchini, until excess moisture has evaporated. Steam or microwave spinach until wilted, squeeze out excess water and coarsely chop. Add corn and mix all vegetables into the cheese sauce.
5. Fill the potato crust with this mixture and spread remaining potato over the top of the pie. Brush with melted butter if you wish and sprinkle a little grated cheese on top.
6. Bake in preheated oven for about 30 mins and serve. Serves about 8.

### Rural Roads Maintenance

We're currently carrying out maintenance on our rural roads. Unsealed road-shoulder grading on the sealed road network is an important element of preventative maintenance. We own and operate a specialised road-shoulder grader that regulates the unsealed shoulder in a single pass. This work is best achieved when there is moisture in the road pavement so we are taking advantage of the cooler months to carry out this work. Unsealed road-shoulders on the sealed network that have recently been completed include: Landrigan Road; Stuart Mill Road; sections of Cotswold Road; sections of Avoca-Bealiba Road; Commercial Road; Talbot Road; sections of Rodborough Road; Smeaton Road; and Mooloort-Baringhup Rd.

The Short Flix Festival is underway with twelve local young people recently participating in a three-day intensive workshop. Led by professional filmmakers, Indimax Productions participants learnt about essential filmmaking practices such as scriptwriting, editing, camera operation and directing.

#### **Winter Garden Tips**

Sharpen, clean, oil and maintain your garden tools. Sounds tedious, but it's really rewarding, and will save you cash in the long-run. Practising tool hygiene will prevent the spread of disease. The local hardware store in Maryborough will sharpen secateurs if you are not game to do it yourself. Bare-rooted deciduous trees and roses can also be planted now. It is also a good time to move dormant plants.

Keep weeds under control; our plants might not grow during the cold weather but the weeds certainly do. Divide perennials or plant new ones. Some perennials can be propagated from root cuttings, which can be taken through Winter.

Protect plants that are not frost-hardy. Frost-tender plants in pots are more vulnerable as roots are above ground, wrap pots of plants with plastic bubble-wrap or hessian.
