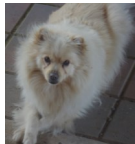
Barcode Error on Rate Notices

Fond farewell for Freemantle Stock Feeds

After six decades of providing quality feed to the nation, local business Freemantle Stock Feeds is closing its doors.

Growing from humble beginnings in Eddington, the business has been running steadily for 63 years but after a lifetime of hard work, owner Graeme Freemantle is finally taking a much-deserved permanent break.

Graeme made the decision to retire from the business after lengthy deliberations and the company ceased trading at the end of June. A final auction will be held on site this weekend and afterwards the mill will be officially closed down.

"The Freemantle name will keep going with some companies that bought certain sections so that's good to see. I might be finished but I think the name will go on. It's a good, strong name." A two-day auction will run this Friday and Saturday to sell off thousands of items including farming machinery, trucks, antiques, tools, trailers, tractors and feed.

The auction will run from 9.30 am to 5.30 pm on Friday and from 9.30 am until late on Saturday at Freemantle Stock Feeds in Eddington.

On my birthday, Jim took me to an upmarket restaurant with a floor show. In London we all had to be careful with our money but we knew this venue would not be cheap but never realised just how not cheap it would be.

Our first cocktail was about 10 pounds, then a girl came with a tray of corsages and not wanting to seem mean Jim bought one, only to discover it was more than the price of a cocktail. So it went on. Everything was totally exorbitant, so instead of going into shock, we made the best of it and as everything appeared, the photographer, the wine etc. at these astronomical prices, we started laughing and finally became hysterical.

In the end a fun night.

Then there was Jonathon, whose parents, a naval Commander and his wife, were also on board, travelling home with Jonathon and his sister, Pamela. They made me so glad I had declined my mother's offer to accompany me when my schoolfriend had to cancel. Pamela, in particular, was monitored nightly. "Would she be off to bed soon?" etc. But the two of them were great fun. However the life and soul of the party was Don Foy. He told us he was the black sheep of the family who owned the big department store in Sydney, Mark Foys, and he was an absolute clown who always kept us amused.



Apart from those constant friends we met many other nice men in our travels, like the American GIs in occupation forces in Germany. However, don't forget, we were innocent convent girls so there are no lurid tales to tell.

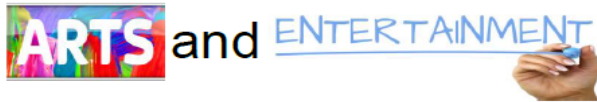

Shoppers warned of rise in scams

Coles Maryborough staff are warning residents about on-going gift-card scams after they noticed an increase in locals falling victim to the crime.

Coles Maryborough customer service manager Mandy Street said check-out staff have noticed an increase in locals, particularly elderly residents, purchasing multiple gift-cards, after being told they have unpaid utility bills.

"These scammers are very convincing and tell their victims that they have an unpaid fine, usually a utility bill, that they have to pay via gift-cards," she said. "The scammers are saying they are from a variety of different organisations and companies."

"When people are purchasing multiple gift cards, we always ask them what they are for," Ms Street said.

"Staff are being vigilant to try and stop people from falling victim to this sort of crime," she added.

"We also have a number of warning signs placed around where the gift-cards are for sale to try and warn people."

"If anyone asks to be paid with gift-cards and instructs you to buy a gift-card, it will be a scam. There are no circumstances where a legitimate business or government department will ask for payment in that way," she said.

These people can be quite persistent on the phone, but if people are unsure or have any doubts, they should hang up the phone immediately.

"If someone is targeted, they can report it to Scamwatch and if they become a victim of a scam, they should report it to police."

According to the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission's Scamwatch, in July 2018, Australians lost \$12.7 million to scams to more than 14,700 reports for the month.

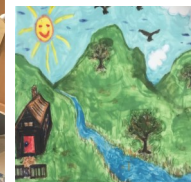

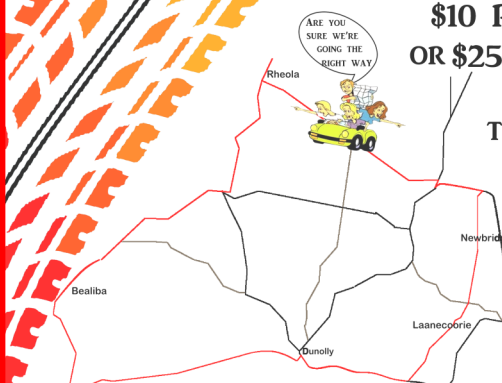

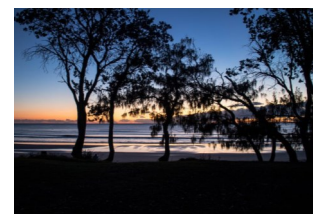

In the Know with Microblast Computers

Welcome to our September Newsletter. We want to keep our customers' computers safe by keeping you informed of potential threats/risks to your computer and your online experience.

A sophisticated new phone scam whereby criminals impersonate the Australian Tax Office has stolen almost \$190,000 from victims in just two months. The newest scam involves a three-way phone call as follows: First, the fraudster rings a potential victim pretending to be from the tax office, saying that a large bill needs to be paid immediately. When the victim challenges the claim, the scammer then loops an associate into the call. That person then pretends to be the victim's tax agent and confirms a bill needs to be paid. In some cases, the scammers falsely threaten legal or police action if the bill is not paid. ATO Assistant Commissioner Kath Anderson said scammers are taking advantage of the time of year to prey on vulnerable taxpayers.

Alongside phone calls, there has been a dramatic increase in phishing emails and false text messages sent to taxpayers to convince them to hand over confidential personal information.

This year the ATO has taken action to shut down more than 90 fake tax office websites.

Anderson said in many circumstances a taxpayer's personal data is more valuable to scammers than physical or online transactions. "Scammers aren't just looking at getting a quick fix through an upfront payment. They are increasingly looking to get your personal information, and once they gain this data they can sell it or use it to impersonate you for their own financial gain," warned Anderson.

"One taxpayer received an email which appeared to be from the ATO.

The email requested her to click a link to download her BAS for lodgement.

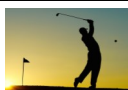

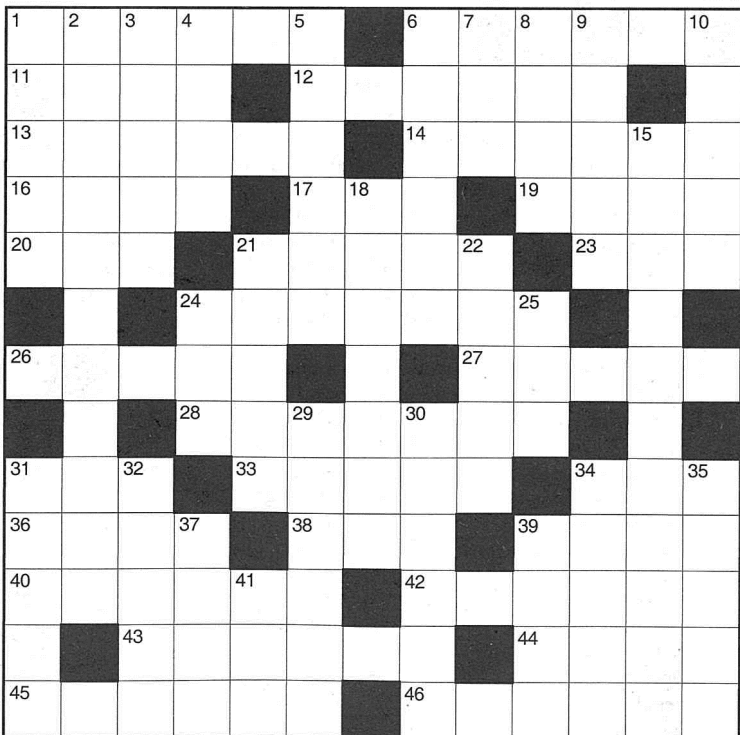

In The Veggie Patch

Planting time is creeping up on us again. The soil is very dry and cold yet, but some frost hardy varieties can be sown. Seeds of carrots, parsnips, silverbeet, radish, swede, beetroot, spring onions, lettuce, the small ones like the green or brown mignonette are a good start off for the season of the lettuce family.

It is not too late to plant out long-keepers or odourless onion plants (not seed). The main sowing of parsnips can be sown this month, they don't mind a cold start to germinate and grow. Carrots sown this month could result in a good percentage of them running to seed before maturity. October is the right month to sow the main crop of carrots. All fine seed like firm soil, they will not germinate well when sown in very loose soil, as the seeds must have firm contact with the soil.



Greenfeast peas sown this month will grow rapidly, and be ready to harvest in December. They're very good bearers and even a small sowing will give very good results. The stalks make good mulch, and the space is available for another variety of veggie.

For frost tender plants, tomato, capsicums and the pumpkin family, sow seeds in containers, and the plants can be transplanted when the risk of frosts are much less. It is wise to have a later sowing in containers, if the first plantings get frosted, then there is the later ones to take their place. If the later plants are not needed so much the better, it is only the loss of a few seeds.

A small sowing of potatoes can go in the soil this month, they take three weeks to emerge and can be covered over if a frost is forecast. Potatoes like a rich, but well drained soil. Plant your potatoes about 10cm deep and 30cm apart, leave about 80cm between each row. Sprinkle with some Blood and Bone and water in well. Keep moist, but not wet. They can also be grown in a cylinder of chicken wire about 1m in diameter supported with 3-4 star pickets or strong garden stakes. Prepare the soil at the base of the cylinder by adding compost or well rotted cow manure. Plant approx. 4 potatoes in the prepared soil and cover with straw, manure and a sprinkling of Blood and Bone. As the plants grow, add more straw and manure so that the tips of the stems are still visible. Repeat throughout the season as the potatoes grow to however high your chicken wire is.

For Fruit Trees

Inspect stone fruit trees every few days for aphids. They are usually on the leaf when it is formed. The leaf then curls up and the pest is hard to eradicate. Spray with white oil or they can be washed off with the hose. With such a dry season as this one is, fruit trees should be given a good deep watering now, fertilised and then mulched. This will help them over summer time.



SPRING GARDEN TIPS

September is a good time to plant perennials. They have time to establish themselves in the ground during the spring season. This is the best time of the year to plant them, and also you will get them at the best price.

Spring is also the perfect time to get a head start on weeds. Remove them now and you won't have a "weed garden" in summer.

Use organic mulch to enrich soil and retain water. Mulch is also a great way to keep weeds down.

Take cuttings from plants you love and expand your garden. Australian native plants make great cuttings.

Go mad with fertiliser. Before the growing season gets into full swing, just about everything will appreciate a good dose of fertiliser. Blood and bone and dynamic lifter are perfect for Australian natives. Just throw a handful over every four square metres. Potted plants will love liquid fertiliser for a quick boost and a dose of slow-release fertiliser to keep them going. Use specialist fertilisers for roses, citrus and orchids as they contain the particular nutrients these plants need.
