Leatherwork by Mary-ann Scull and paintings by Greg Holland and others – sorry I couldn't get all the names of the artists, but it was all splendid work.

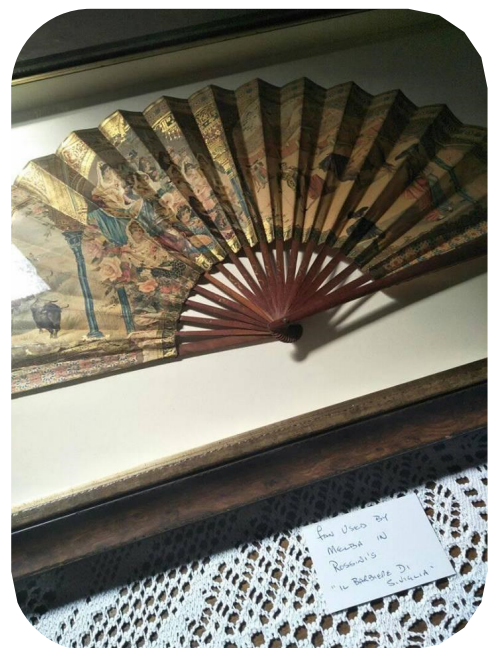

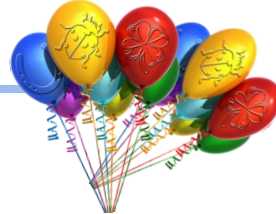

State-of-the-Art CT machine to be installed at MDHS

Maryborough residents will no longer be forced to travel to Bendigo or Ballarat for CT scans thanks to a huge funding boost to the Maryborough District Health Service's radiology department.

Minister for Health Jill Hennessy was in town on Wednesday to announce \$1.3 million in funding to allow MDHS to purchase a cutting edge CT scanner. The scanner will allow the hospital to treat more patients more efficiently and effectively and those who previously had to leave Maryborough for scans will now be able to access the same services at home.

MDHS CEO Terry Welch said he is "delighted" with the funding which he says will have a significant positive impact on patients.

"To have a new CT scanner announced is a great advancement for our clinical services," he said.

"The reality is we don't want people to travel when they don't have to. Our community has needs and we want to be able to provide those needs locally and be as accessible as possible." According to Mr Welch, the scanner will provide more services and a wider clinical scope in a "safer and more effective manner". "The new scanner provides a lower dosage of radiation which means it's much safer and at times we will now use the scanner where previously we would've done an x-ray. The beauty with that is it gives a much improved vision and clarity of picture," he said.

The new technology will also allow the hospital to branch into new areas. "We hope to expand in the future and offer cardiac scanning here," Mr Welch said.

"We know we have a high cardiac and obesity rate and an enormous amount of clinical chronic conditions in Maryborough that we have to manage.

Mr Welch said he hopes to have the new CT scanner installed and functional after Christmas and that the government funding will give MDHS a "very effective outcome". Ms Hennessy also announced a further \$67,500 for the hospital to fund a new swipe card access system to keep health staff safe at work. The funding will pave the way for 43 new swipe card entry points at the hospital and Mr Welch said staff safety is a major focus for MDHS.

"Staff safety is paramount and the swipe card system is a great step forward," he said.

"We have an old building with many access points and this funding will allow us to lock down the facility at night and make it far more secure and safe." The funding comes from the state government's \$250 million Regional Health Infrastructure Fund and Ms Hennessy said Labor's focus is on making sure health services have the equipment, technology and support they need. "CT scanners are so important. They give people access to a quicker diagnosis closer to home," she said. "Labor funded the last CT scanner here two years ago and we've got a proud history of supporting Maryborough which we'll continue to do. "We're also really concerned about the occupational violence and aggression that many of our health service workers are exposed to. They come to work to care and it's unthinkable that they should ever be the subject of any form of occupational violence.

Travels with Cynthia

This is a diversion from my regular travel diary as it's quite possible I could be drying up with my overseas travels.

Instead, I am going back to my early married years when my then husband was a jazz musician and usually toured with the band to holiday beach resorts over the summer holidays.

With three young children I had a better idea, to spend the holidays with Nana and Pop, my in laws who lived in Bondi. When the kids were very young (they were three little peas in a pod) Nana and Pop would book us on the plane and Pop always made the reservations. However this particular year for some reason Nana did the bookings and when we arrived at Sydney airport there was no one there to meet us.

It was late in the evening and some staff were going off duty and there I was with a babe in arms and two little toddlers, the older of whom was a little terror and every time the "magic door" rolled open, she ran through and luckily people would capture her and bring her back. Finally an air hostess saw my plight and offered to hold the baby while I made a phone call, only to be told by the neighbours that my in laws had left ages ago.

Then the miracle – Nana and Pop burst through the sliding door, Nana all agitated, Pop all annoyed. He said he should never have left the booking to her, sexist man. Back then the airport had two totally separate airline buildings, one TAA and one ANA. Pop always booked TAA and of course Nana booked ANA so they had been waiting at the wrong terminal.

Bondi was completely different all those years ago but amazing that despite being one of the most famous surf beaches in the world and regularly hosting international surf carnivals, there were no decent facilities for tourists or even regular beach visitors.

Of course it suited us that way at the time as there was free parking and a shop for ice creams; however the row of shops opposite the beautiful beach were tawdry and run of the mill businesses, like newsagent, chemist and milkbar and one rather seedy pub.

It wasn't until the late 80s that things started to change and the last time I visited my sister in law in Sydney I was amazed at the trendy outdoor cafes, up-to-date shops, a luxury hotel and wine bars.

Even so, I have very fond memories of lying on the old Bondi beach, Nana and I taking it in turns to watch the kids splashing in the water, and all of us making sandcastles together.

My kids could not have asked for a better Nana and she adored them.

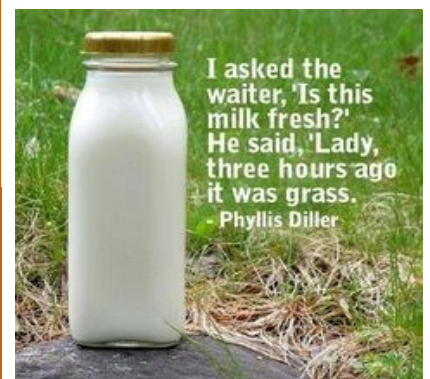

Dunolly-Bealiba RSL Sub-Branch calls on locals to purchase a Poppy this November. Thousands of Poppy Appeal volunteers around Victoria including at Dunolly-Bealiba RSL Sub-Branch, will begin selling the much-loved, iconic red poppy with 100 per cent of the proceeds to support current and former service men and women in need.

RSL Victoria is targeting \$3 million in this year's Poppy Appeal, with 2018 marking a most significant year; 100 years since the guns fell silent on the Western Front to end the Great War. Poppies were among the first plants to bloom in the devastated battlefields of France and Belgium, and since 1921, they have been used in remembrance of those who fell during times of war.

As a wave of young veterans are finding themselves and their families in need of assistance, it is as important this November, as it is every year, to donate to the Poppy Appeal.

"The Poppy Appeal holds a special place in the hearts of Aussies, and as we wear our poppy this year, we thank the men and women who have fought for Australia 100 years ago and today. "It's important to remember that the needs of our younger veterans are critical today. Wearing a poppy is also how we can support them and thank them for their service."

Welcome to our October Newsletter

You are receiving this email from us as we want to keep our customers computers' safe by keeping you informed of potential threats/risks to your computer and your online experience.

Scam reports and losses - August - 342 reports with losses of \$6933 and in September the number of victim reports rose to 361 with losses of \$7217.

TWO Important scams

One scam that has been popping up lately is an email scam where they say that they have seen what you're watching, they put in a "password" (supposedly your own) and say that you will have to pay them \$700 in Bitcoin for them not to release your information – this is FAKE! It's a scam so please IGNORE IT. Just delete the email and don't click on anything. You can see a copy of the fake email on our website. Link to sample scam extortion email <https://www.microblastcomputers.com/scam-email.html>

Next scam is a fake email purporting to be from your email server. It requires you to 'logon' to your email server and verify your email username and password. The objective is to steal your email account details and potentially your other accounts, facebook, ebay, paypal, banks, etc. If in doubt, just forward the email to us and we will get back to you as soon as possible if it is real or not.

Warning about fake charity scams

Scammers are increasingly using fake charities or impersonating real charities to take advantage of people's generosity and compassion, with losses reported to the ACCC's Scamwatch increasing steadily over the past four years.

This week is Charity Fraud Awareness Week and Scamwatch is warning people to watch out for fake charities and offering some quick and easy precautions to take to ensure their money goes towards a legitimate charity organisation.

So far in 2018, Scamwatch has received 689 reports of fake charities scams with more than \$320,000 in reported losses. This compares to the whole of 2017 where reported losses were \$313,563.

"Australians are very generous, donating billions each year to thousands of different charities. Unfortunately scammers are increasingly using people's generosity against them by setting up fake charities to fleece them," ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard said.

"This is a particularly appalling scam as beyond just stealing money from unsuspecting victims, the scammers also take money meant for legitimate charities. Donations are the lifeblood that supports charities and their ability to help people in need."

Fake charities operate in a number of different ways. Scammers may approach people on the street (for example, posing as a monk, or a collector for a specific cause) or at their front door.

Scammers may also set up fake websites which look similar to those operated by real charities. Some will call or email people requesting donations.

"Fake charity approaches occur all year round and often take the form of a response to real disasters or emergencies, such as floods, cyclones, earthquakes and bushfires. The ACCC has seen horrific examples of charity scammers taking advantage of high profile tragedies like the Black Saturday bushfires and following last year's Bourke Street tragedy. We've also seen some recent examples of charity scammers using the current drought to rip off people" Ms Rickard said.

"The scammers have no shame. If they're not creating fake charities, they will impersonate real ones like the Red Cross, RSPCA, or Rural Fire Service."

"It's important people are aware of these scams and take precautions to ensure their money is going to a genuine charity," Ms Rickard said.

People can ensure their donation is going to a legitimate charity by phoning them directly or making a donation via their website. They can check the charity is legitimate by first looking up their credentials on the publicly available Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC) website.

Fire Danger period declared

The Fire Danger Period for the Loddon Shire Council area began at 1am, Monday 22 October.

During the Fire Danger Period several fire restrictions and regulations apply, including around campfires and barbecues, burning off and other activities.

If you're travelling outside our Shire, make sure you're aware of possible fire restrictions in other areas of the state. For a full list of municipalities with fire restrictions, visit www.cfa.vic.gov.au/fire-restrictions

Next "fee free" waste day

To support fire preparation activities, the next "fee free" waste disposal days are scheduled for 3 and 4 November 2018. These dates also coincide with the November long weekend.

"Fee free" waste disposal will take place on Saturday 3rd November at the Inglewood Transfer Station from 8am to 12pm.

On Sunday 4th November, there will be "fee free" waste disposal at -

Boort Landfill from 1pm to 5pm,

Pyramid Hill Landfill from 8am to 12pm,

Newbridge Landfill from 1pm to 5pm,
Wedderburn Transfer Station from 8am to 12pm and
Dingee Transfer Station from 10am to 2pm.

You can dispose of up to four cubic metres of general domestic waste free of charge. This includes green waste, mixed recyclables, general household waste, e-waste, television and computer screens, and white goods.

Charges still apply for tyres, bricks and concrete and mattresses, as these items have additional third party costs associated with their disposal.

Remember to bring your licence or rates notice to verify your address.
