Dear Editor.

As one of your local Members of Parliament and the Minister for Agriculture, I'm a great advocate for programs and initiatives that encourage young people to take up farming as a career.

Our Government is backing the next generation of Victorian farmers through the Upskill and Invest Young Farmers Scholarship Program.

Since this program began in 2015, Young Farmers Scholarships have helped a diverse range of young people grow their careers in agriculture by upskilling, implementing new on-farm initiatives and boosting their professional

Over the course of the program, 38 young farmers working across the agriculture supply chain have received scholarships which have helped fund their study in areas such as primary production, business management, research and technology.

It's my firm view that young people in rural areas should have the opportunity and support they need to reach their full potential, and that's why our Government is backing dedicated young farmers through the Young Farmers Scholarship Program.

Up to \$10,000 is available for farmers and farm workers aged 35 years or under to help them with professional development and career progression.

This includes \$5,000 for study, backed by a further \$5,000 to invest on-farm or in professional development activities to help put new skills into practice.

Applications close on the 24th of April, 2018.

2018 FLU VACCINES NOW AVAILABLE!

We are pleased to announce that the 2018 government funded seasonal influenza vaccine is now available at the Dunolly Medical Practice.

Annual vaccination is the most important measure to prevent influenza and its complications. Vaccination is recommended before the onset of each influenza season. The period of peak influenza circulation is typically June to September for most parts of Australia. While protection is generally expected to last for the whole season, optimal protection against influenza occurs within the first three to four months following vaccination.

It is free for the following groups:

- All adults aged 65 years and older
- All children aged 6 months to <5 years (new Victorian government funded program)
- People aged 5 years and over who have a medical risk factor that increases their risk of complications from influenza; for example, severe asthma, lung or heart disease, low immunity or diabetes.
- All Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander persons aged 6 months to < 5 years or 15 years and older.
- · All pregnant women anytime during pregnancy

All of the entrants get a Participation Certificate. Remember - 6.30pm on Friday 20th April; tickets at the door.


Arts Hub Weekly

Small town Tarnagulla commissions Climate Change Study

The town of Tarnagulla has been successful in applying for a Virtual Centre for Climate Change Innovation Grant through the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP).

The \$50,000 grant will be used to conduct an intensive study of the issues faced by the town with regards to climate change and research ways of becoming more resilient during extreme weather events.

The study will have a strong focus on the social, economic and physical impacts of challenges related to climate change.

The Tarnagulla Alternative Energy Group (TAEG) is in collaboration with RMIT Centre for Urban Research's Climate Change and Resilience group who will be conducting the study, DELWP and the Tarnagulla Action Group.

Paul Davis from the Tarnagulla Alternative Energy Group said local residents, organisations and government agencies will be consulted throughout the process of the study to gain a better understanding and assist in creating a needs-based model.

"The aim of the study is to investigate ways to increase resilience directly related to our town and tailor appropriate action for our local community.

"We are taking a proactive approach by investigating our strengths, issues and challenges now so that we can be strong as a collective. This way, we can be prepared for unknown situations that arise down the track.

"We (TAEG) believe that the results of the study will provide a good example for other small, rural communities in planning their own local approaches.

"We hope the study will promote community wellbeing, strengthen relationships with relevant organisations and increase overall preparedness of the town during times of need," Mr Davis said.

Support for dealing with Dementia

With an estimated 250 people developing dementia each day, the condition, which is the second leading cause of death among Australian, is expected to affect more than 1.1 million people by 2056.

The condition, which affects thinking, behaviour, the ability to perform everyday tasks and brain function enough to interfere with the person's normal social or working life, has no cure.

"They can help people reconnect and re-establish relationships with partners, families and friends which can be so important for their emotional well-being.

"Social engagement and keeping physically and mentally active are also key in contributing to better health and lifestyle outcome following a diagnosis of dementia."

Dementia Australia operates in all states and territories and provides services in regional and remote areas throughout Victoria, including Bendigo, with support provided across the Loddon Mallee region, including Central Goldfields Shire.

It is the national peak body for people of all ages living with all forms of dementia, their families and carers.

It offers counselling services for people living with dementia, their families and friends, early intervention programs which provide information, advice and peer support for people in the early stages of dementia.

<u>NEAREST THE PIN:</u> In the nearest to the pin competition on the 3rd hole, Brad Ryan's early effort proved too deft.



Report confirms four cases of deadly disease in 2017

With four meningococcal causes diagnosed in the Loddon Mallee region, which includes the Central Goldfields Shire, in 2017, the Victoria Government has extended the free meningococcal vaccination program.

Until December 31, 2018 year 10 students will have free access to the vaccine in order to protect teenage Victorians against the deadly disease.

The vaccination program was launched to combat increasing number of meningococcal disease across Victoria compared with five years ago. The majority of these cases are for increasing numbers of the previously 'W' and 'Y' strains of meningococcal debases.

State-wide, 89 cases were diagnosed in 2017, resulting in six deaths, compared to 78 cases in 2016 and 56 cases in 2015. Department of Health and Human Services figures reveal there were 26 cases diagnosed in regional Victoria in 2017, four of which were in the Loddon Valley region.

As of 16th March, eight cases have been diagnosed throughout Victoria in 2018. Health experts predict this number will continue to rise as the peak season for meningococcal disease approaches.

Young people aged 15 and 16 years old are at a greater risk of carrying and spreading meningococcal bacteria, as one in five carry it in the back of their throats and can pass the bacteria to family members and friends.

The best way to protect young people, and the wider community, is through the free and safe vaccination on offer. One in 10 cases of meningococcal disease proves to be fatal with death occurring with 24-48 hours of diagnosis.

Two in every 10 people who survive the disease are left with a permanent disability such as brain damage or loss of fingers, toes or limbs.

"The meningococcal ACWY vaccine safely protects against four strains of meningococcal disease, the increasingly common 'W' and 'Y' strains as well as the 'A' and 'C' strains," deputy chief health officer Dr. Brett Sutton said.

"Ensuring eligible young people are vaccinated is essential in protecting the wider community from this deadly disease."

Symptoms of meningococcal disease include limb pain, sudden high fever, headache, vomiting, stiff neck or sore muscles, sometimes following by a red or purple rash.

The disease can progress very quickly and can lead to death or permanent disability. Up to 10 percent of infected people die, even if they are treated with the right antibiotics.

The bacteria can only survive outside the body for a few seconds and can only be passed from person to person by close and prolonged household or intimate contact, for example intimate kissing.

The vaccine is a safe and effective way to protect against meningococcal disease. The free program is available until December 31, 2018 at scheduled school immunisation sessions, local council community immunisation sessions and from a GP.





# MARYBOROUGH LIONS HATCH A CRACKER OF AN EASTER MARKET

While kids and many adults unwrapped chocolate eggs, Maryborough Lions Club hatched a cracker of a market on Easter Sunday. With close to 50 stalls lining sections of Nolan and Alma Streets and selling a wide range of wares, in just the club's second market in the town centre, it was a resounding success.

Trevor Stevens, Maryborough Lions Club's market manager, said the extra attractions during the long weekend helped boost the market, which started strongly on March 4th. "It was great to see so many new traders at our Easter market," Mr Stevens said. "We're very excited at the prospect of growth in our market, the boost for local businesses and support for our community projects. We're also reminding Maryborough's other community groups that the market is a great opportunity to showcase their services to local residents."

Between the furiously busy barbecue, stallholder fees, a raffle and donations, the club raised about \$1800 for new community projects, following on from the club's Liberty Swing project last year.

Lorraine Parker, Maryborough Lions Club president, thanked members for putting in such a big effort at the barbecue, managing traffic, collecting donations and providing information about Lions, which already has drawn interest from a prospective new member. "Our club members worked hard for the first CBD market last month and rallied again for the even bigger event at Easter, despite its falling in a long weekend."

Mr Stevens said that new stallholders were still being accepted for the CBD Tourist Market held on the first Sunday of every month and encouraged businesses selling goods ranging from fresh produce, preserves and cheeses to clothing, crafts and bric-a-brac to get in touch.

# **Station Domain Market to close**



After four years battling unpredictable weather, the Carisbrook Lions Club is closing the Station Domain Market, with their last market to be held on Sunday 27th May.

"We feel that we struggled since December, with getting stallholders and the bad weather," Carisbrook Lions Club president Jefferson Hoober said.

"We'd rather have a successful market or not one at all," he said. "The club is grateful to everyone who has supported them over the years."

When they first started the market, it had 65 stallholders, which increased to 100 at one stage, but has now fallen to 20.

"The unpredictability of the weather was a major factor in this decision." Mr Hoober said.

The heat, rain and wind made the event difficult for some stallholders who had to hold down their gazebos at times to keep them from blowing away.

The market initially grew quickly but had declined in recent years. Mr Hoober said it was becoming increasingly difficult to offer a variety of stalls. He said the recent move of the Maryborough Lions Club Market into Maryborough was not a factor in the Carisbrook club's decision, as it had been thinking about closing the market for a while.

"We want to see the Maryborough Lions Market do well," he said.

The Carisbrook Lions will now concentrate on bigger things for the shire, with a number of ideas already in discussion. "A fun run, an event day like Rheola Gift, and catering which has more value for money to put into the community organisations," Mr Hoober said.

"We're open for ideas, what people would like to see in the shire."

The club will continue to be involved with events in the town, such as the Energy Breakthrough; Relay for Life; Clean Up Australia Day; and footy gates. They will also provide catering for more events around the town.

Mr Hoober said he didn't believe the town would suffer with one less market, as there were a number in the district including the Maryborough Lions Market, the Avoca Market and the Talbot Market. Stallholders had been saddened by the decision but understood why the club had made it.

"I think the Lions Club members are weary but sad, but we know we can do bigger and better things," Mr Hoober said.

Since the market began, 10 new members had joined the club bringing total membership to 40.

Mr Hoober said it took about 100 hours to organise each market. The Carisbrook Lions Club will be hosting this year's Lions District 201V1-4 convention at the Maryborough Trotting Track in November. Club members from their district will come to the event over the Remembrance Day weekend.

Carisbrook will be catering for the event and they are offering camping, with 150 people expected to attend. There will be Remembrance Service, guest speakers, gala dinner, meetings and other activities for members.
