## Re: Energy Saving Program

There has been a lot of talk in recent years about skyrocketing power bills and I'm really pleased to report to your readers that the Andrews Government is taking action to alleviate stress on consumers.

People in Western Victoria can now register for the Government's \$50 Power Saving Bonus when they visit the Victorian Energy Compare website and search for a better deal on their gas and electricity bills.

I've been on the website myself in recent days and it's a really easy way for local residents to find a better power deal.

On average, people who use the independent comparison website save \$330 on their energy bills in the first year alone. In fact, seven out of 10 people have found a better deal.

I remain confident our campaign to help people identify better deals will force retailers to reduce power bills, which in turn will ease costs on Victorian households.

To be eligible for the \$50 bonus, households will simply have to use the website between now and the 31st of December.

People only need to compare deals - they are not required to take up an offer or switch plans.

I urge readers of The Welcome Record to search for a better energy deal and register for a \$50 Power Saving Bonus by visiting compare.energy.vic.gov.au.

# New grants helping battle ice addiction

Community groups in Western Victoria are playing their part to tackle ice abuse, thanks to funding from the Andrews Government through the Community Ice Action Grants.

Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today launched the next round of grants as part of the Labor Government's Ice Action Plan, to help curb ice abuse across Victoria.

The Community Ice Action Grants provide recipients with up to \$10,000 each to create initiatives that will help prevent and reduce ice related harm in their own communities.

Over the past three years, 38 grants have gone to services across Victoria including health services, sporting clubs and local safety committees.

Past recipients include Donald's Connect Youth, Ballarat and District Aboriginal Co-operative, Bendigo Community Health and Moorabool Drug Action Group.

Ms Pulford says ice affects everyone, from the breakdown of families and communities to increased hospital admissions and assaults on first responders.

"The use of ice is taking a terrible toll on our communities, and initiatives like the Community Ice Action Grants will support community groups to come up with their own ways to educate people on the dangers of ice," Ms Pulford said.

"Every local community is different, and we're proud to be supporting groups to respond to ice through strategies that they think will work for their area," she said.

The recent Victorian Budget invested a record \$259.9 million in alcohol and other drug services, including the ongoing implementation of the \$87 million Drug Rehabilitation Plan released last year.

Applications for the next round of Community Ice Action Grants are now open, with groups across Victoria invited to apply for funding to tackle ice abuse. More information about the grants can be found at ice.vic.gov.au/safer-communities.

# **Family Violence Awareness Forum**

On Friday 20<sup>th</sup> of July, Maryborough Rotary, working in partnership with the Loddon Campaspe Community Legal Centre (LCCLC), will bring together experts in the field of family violence to help the community better understand the complexities in dealing with this issue in Regional Victoria.

Both organisations are members of the Go Goldfields Family Violence Action Group, and respective lead agencies for the "Community" and "Justice & Accountability" pillars of work within the Go Goldfields Family Violence Action Plan.

'The forum is open to service providers, employers and community members in Central Goldfields, other Rotary Clubs and more broadly to any person or organisation who would like to better understand the complexities that exist within the response to family violence' said Rotary club member Garry Higgins.

'The day will include an impressive line-up of experts who will open your eyes to a system that many of our community members experience' he added.

The program, modelled on a conference run by the Law Institute of Victoria in Melbourne in 2015, aims to provide an up-to-date overview of the family violence system in Victoria, with an emphasis on issues and options for people affected by family violence in rural and regional communities.

The family violence system can sometimes seem "invisible", and people might not be aware of what is happening to address family violence in the community. The Forum will raise awareness of the many services that are working hard to respond to family violence in Central Goldfields Shire, and some of the great local initiatives underway. Guest speakers and panellists will also discuss the challenges experienced by women seeking assistance for family violence, and how we can improve or strengthen the way that local services respond.

There will be a strong focus on issues for regional and rural communities. 'We know that women in regional areas can face additional barriers to safety due to poor transportation and communication infrastructure, geographical isolation, and feelings of shame or fear about speaking up in small towns where it can be hard to maintain privacy. We will explore some of these issues, and what can be done to make it easier for women to report and seek assistance for family violence in rural and regional Victoria' stated Annika Kearton from Loddon Campaspe Community Legal Centre.

The forum will include a keynote address from Mary Barry, the former CEO of Our Watch, the national organisation to prevent violence against women and their children. Our Watch was established by government in 2013 to drive nation-wide change in the culture, behaviours and attitudes that underpin and create violence against women and their children. Its mandate is to stop violence before it happens.

In the afternoon a panel discussion will explore the roles and responsibilities of service providers involved in family violence response, and the supports available for both affected family members and perpetrators.

The discussion will also highlight the ways in which members of the community can drive family violence prevention and support people seeking assistance. The forum is aimed at the following people:

- Service providers
- Community, sporting and service groups
- Rotary Clubs throughout Australia
- Emergency service workers and volunteers
- Employers wanting to support employees important for employers who now offer family violence leave as part of employee EBA.
- Youth workers
- Education providers
- Local Government Authorities (LGA)

Community members either directly or indirectly impacted by family violence

Through the support of Go Goldfields this is a free event with numbers limited. Lunch will be provided with interested persons encouraged to register ASAP to secure a place at the forum.



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# Travels with Cynthia

Returning to our cruise to the Greek Isles, all the islands were so beautiful and had their own characteristics. Crete is famous for the birthplace of Zeus in Greek mythology and the largest of the islands. Rhodes has the romantic old city with its ancient castle, but I think Mykonos is my favourite. Apparently it has become the mecca for the young partygoers who behave in a similar fashion to the young Bali tourists. However we only saw the charm of the beautiful island in sparkling sunshine overlooking the blue, blue Mediterranean. Like the picture postcards, all the houses are square and sparkling white with blue shutters and doors, and there are mazes of little cobbled streets with shops of every sort, and quaint cafes and heaps of jewellery. One shop was selling clothing of all descriptions, but everything was white. I found it most appealing and imagined myself drifting down the little lanes swathed in diaphanous white wearing a big white hat. Our ship wasn't leaving till late, so after a lovely Greek meal in a café with whitewashed walls festooned with grape vines and geraniums, we sat on a tavern terrace on the edge of the water, drinking retsina and looking at all the lights winking up on the hills. Sadly we had to say goodbye to lovely Mykonos.

When we arrived at Santorini, our ship wasn't able to come right in, so passengers had to be ferried to the island in tender boats. Santorini is perched atop volcanic cliffs as a long time ago the volcano erupted and half the island disappeared into the sea. To arrive at the top there were three choices, donkey ride, climb 600 steps or take the chair lift. Which do you think we chose? If you said donkeys you were wrong as I didn't think it was fair to them as I am a sponsor of a rescued donkey back home. That's my excuse anyway. Much as we would have loved to climb the steps in the hot sun, Liz and I decided to take the chair lift.

After exploring all the interesting spots, we found a café perched on a rock with a view across the sea to everywhere, but the only problem was that you almost had your head blown off. On our rock a dish of ice cream was the equivalent of \$20, whereas down below a café in the square served the same ice cream for \$5. The boatman offered to wait as this was the last boat, our ship sailing in half an hour at 11pm. Finally we had to go without the errant husband; his wife carrying on and wailing away. When we disembarked, there was the missing man who had come back earlier without finding his wife on the island so thought she had returned. Relief all round.

Whilst visiting the shops in Santorini we bought some presents for family and when we sailed off Liz discovered she had left her credit card in the last shop. This caused consternation as we didn't know how to arrange its return but never fear, back in Athens at our dear little Hotel Diva, our lovely Fagilles who had looked after us before ,was able to contact the shop and have the card returned. We love you Fagilles and Billis, the canary. We love Greece.

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# In the Vegie Patch

Winter is on us again. Plants will make very little growth from now until the springtime. Winter is more of a preparation period. Fertilising, weeding and keeping weeds under control. The main fertiliser to use now, is the N. P. K., the symbols for nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. These are the main elements required for spring growth. The absence of any of these elements will show on the leaves of most plants. All gardeners know animal manure and compost is first class plant food.

A few vegies can be planted, parsnip seeds can be sown after the end of May, but it can be difficult to get them to germinate. Very often the small mite in the soil at that time of year will eat the young shoots before they emerge. After forming the rows, run some boiling water along them before sowing the seeds, it helps to kill pests and warms the soil for a little while at least. Cover seeds with a thin layer of soil before adding a layer of compost. Very often a thin crust will form on the surface and the fine shoots cannot break through the surface.

Plants of early maturing onions can be transplanted out, like flat white, early globe and odourless; these varieties are less likely to run prematurely to seed. Spring onion plants (not seeds) planted now can be very useful in the springtime when most of the long keeping browns are finished.

Now is a good time to plant out strawberry runners, they like a cold start, and grow during the winter months. Rhubarb crowns can go in as well. Prepare beds with compost and rotted manure. When ready, pick by pulling the thickest, healthiest stalks off gently; do not cut them and leave a stub. Do not take more than half the stalks of any one plant. The stalks must be cooked before eating and do not eat the leaves as they are poisonous. It is worth planting out some late plants of broccoli or sugar loaf cabbage, if space is available in the garden. All winter greens need to be fertilised now, to make strong healthy plants.

#### **Fruit Trees**

Do not prune this month, as early pruning will encourage early growth of buds, and leaves can be burnt off with frosts. This month thinning out can be done. That is not pruning, but unwanted limbs or late shoots from last season can be cut out, right at the base, with a sharp saw that is suitable for the job.

Grape vines can be pruned from now on, but some vines are cut back differently to others, so when pruning vines, it is best to make sure that they are cut back right.

## Hellebores

Autumn and early Winter is the best time to plant hellebores. They need good drainage and do not like very wet or water logged soil. Avoid sandy soil as they will usually struggle. Prepare beds by adding lime and organic matter. Well-rotted garden compost, well-rotted manure, leaf mould and spent mushroom compost are ideal. Plant about 60cm apart. Hellebores can be grown in pots. The hybrids cross varieties are best and will need regular repotting as the roots quickly fill the pot.

Remove old foliage from established hellebores, leaving new growth. This tidies up the plants and will allow flowers to be seen. Remove any build-up of mulch around base. For tall shrubby species, leave foliage on until after flowering and trim in Spring. Feed plants with any complete fertilizer with nitrogen, potassium and phosphorous and give a light dressing of dolomite lime

The Dunolly D Sharps had an interesting experience on Monday 9th July when they attended the recording studios of Goldfields Radio station 99.1FM.

As you may know, the D Sharps (of whom I am a member) are our resident A Cappella singing group who perform for a number of our community events.

We were invited to record some of our more popular songs to be played on the radio over a period of a few weeks. Initially though, our background story and the entire repertoire of songs was played on the show **Discovering Dunolly** at 5pm on Tuesday 10th July by our resident DJs Lynda Vater and Susan Day. Unless your are a regular listener, you will most likely have missed the show on Tuesday as our paper comes out Wednesday to advise. However, Discovering Dunolly is replayed at 6pm on Thursday 12th July. Listen in and see what you think.

# Tour of the Historic Dunolly Township

Welcome to the Central Goldfields. This is the place where the largest gold nugget in the world was brought to be assessed, cut up and weighed. Dunolly is a major centre from that period when gold was king. The town however did not start in this position but around 10km north-west of here. In fact, it is the third location it occupied. The most likely reason was that the 20 mile distance for a Cobb and Co Team of horses was the distance of Dunolly from Maryborough. But it also meant the mass of some 25,000 miners were following the gold trail. Dunolly had many changes in its structures over the years and they will be noted as we progress. The tour leaves Alvah Art Gallery and heads back into town. This site of 16 acres was riddled with mine

holes. It is also crossed by 3 quartz reefs.

Take 2<sup>nd</sup> turn left into Havelock Street. Note the Hospital on left. This was initially a two story building and was later extended to be a massive building. Due to the authorities not agreeing with some of the building timbers that were used it was rebuilt as a single story.

Past Bull St and on the left is Chauncey Cottage (built 1859 by George Letts as an inn). In 1861 Phillip Chauncey purchased it and it was extended in 1864. Phillip Chauncey was the District Surveyor. Passing over the rise you will note the concrete tank on your left – this was the

pressure tank for the town supply but now is an emergency for fire-fighting. On your left and further back is the town protection levee and a water storage in the early mining days. This failed under pressure and flooded the town.

As we turn the corner and in front of you note one of the industrial areas. Take the next left. The building on the corner is currently the Art Precinct. Up to the next corner and turn right. The Roman Catholic Church, St Mary's, circa 1871 is built of local stone. Further down the hill is the RSL Hall that was originally the Presbyterian Church circa 1865. In front of the hall is a pine grown

from a seed of the Lone Pine Tree from Gallipoli. At this corner look further left and the large shed is the site of the original Church Union Mine. Turn right here into Barkley St and travel down to the next corner noting the buildings on this corner allotment. The first is the original school of the Church of England and the second is the last built of the three, being the main church, circa 1869 (inside is a magnificent Fincham organ). Turn right here and note the building on the next corner to your right as this is the original Church of England parsonage; in particular note the section on the right of the building as that is the original chapel in which the parishioners worshipped.

At this corner turn left and immediately on your right is the second post office opened 1872 (note the

veranda on the street). The next building on the corner of Bourke St was the Lands and Survey Office, circa 1861. Next door, in Bourke St was the Gold Office, circa 1861. On your left is the original market area, and it contains a number of facilities, but the park areas are named the Gordon Gardens after General Gordon. In the centre is a fountain built in 1887 to honour Queen Victoria.



On the far corner, on your right and on the next corner of Bourke St (formerly Court St) and Market St, where the units now exist, was the Police Court and Petty Sessions and by following on we get to the Court House with Stables at the rear and a Gaol to the right. The interesting part of this is the fact that this Court House was the earlier Town Hall and the current Town Hall was the Court House that had a fair bit of extension work done on it. The precinct has recently been given an upgrade. The Court House is one of the best original such buildings still intact. A must see.

On the next corner, to your right, is Belleview Mansion, circa 1869, built for James Bell, a prominent local businessman, JP, director and MP. The red brick house opposite was originally a private hospital, St Helens. On to the next corner and the cream brick house was the site of the first church, the

Congregational Church, circa 1860 and its manse is located next door in Tweeddale St. Turn left here and on your left is the original Wesleyan Manse, circa 1863, followed by the Hall, circa 1887, the Infant School at the rear, circa 1905 and the main Church, circa 1863.



Before turning left at the next corner look ahead to the building on the right on the next block. That is the site of the famous Crouch Fishing Reel. Head down Barkly St. past the bowling club and immediately to your right is a two- story red brick building was originally Tatchell's Stables, circa 1873 that stabled Cobb and Co horses. On Broadway you will later see the Cobb & Co Office and Bendigo Hotel all part of the same complex. This is the best example of such a complex still basically intact right down to light fittings and wall paper.

Turn right down to the next corner, to Broadway. On the left are some units, but this was the last position of the Bet Shire Offices and they ceased being used in

1995. Turn right and the following will be noted. On the left 2<sup>nd</sup> building – is the Museum and out front is an original post box that was moved to this site from Tweeddale St. It is one of three in town. This building was previously the town library. Next left Rene Fox Gardens, then the current Town Hall

On the right, first is collectable store and Caravan Museum – previously a garage and many other features.

Next a house, then Gold prospectors store. Next Royal Hotel - a hotel has always been on this site starting with a tent version in 1856 (called Let and Let Live) Originally the Royal was built in brick in 1894 - currently under renovation.

On the left is a two-story red brick building, circa 1867, that was the second version of the London Chartered Bank and it met its demise in the depression. It was to this bank that the Welcome Stranger was brought in 1869.

On your right is the Daly shop (original family still in residence) followed by the Cobb and Co Office, Billiard Room and Hotel and then five significant original shops including a chemist shop.

Opposite is the Grocery Shop that had an interesting past where it was an annex of the MKM Knitting Mill (1944 to 1983). Time may be spent reading the labels on the buildings, especially the green shop down from the Railway Hotel.

If we cross Bull St and read the labels on the next buildings, then pass the current Pharmacy in an ex garage, you pass a house then the restaurant that was the original site of James Bells Licenced Grocers store. Next on left is the Iron Mongers building and on the corner is the ex -Children's Health Centre. There are a number of other interesting buildings and

features that another trip would reveal.

Ask about the original winery or the silos (the original was 1 mile long).



# Delivering Future Benefits For Maryborough Passengers

The Andrews Labor Government has allocated \$130 million to a new rail infrastructure project that will pave the way for more future train services to Maryborough and allow for the return of passenger rail to Dunolly.

Minister for Public Transport Jacinta Allan was in Maryborough to discuss the benefits of the Freight-Passenger Rail Separation Project, which will also enable passenger services to move through the Ballarat Station precinct more easily.

The Freight-Passenger Rail Separation Project, announced by the Labor Government last week, will include converting the existing broad-gauge track between Ballarat and Maryborough to dual gauge.

The project will retain the dual-gauge connection between Maryborough and Dunolly to allow future passenger rail to Dunolly.

It will also untangle the congested rail network through the Ballarat Station precinct, creating separate paths for passenger and freight lines, including Maryborough services.

The project includes signalling upgrades, and redesigning the tracks through the station to remove congestion points, allowing trains to move through the area more easily.

The Armstrong Street Bridge in Ballarat will be replaced, and around one kilometre of track duplicated to allow two tracks to pass under the new bridge, getting rid of the existing bottleneck, allowing more space for trains to pass each other.

The project is just one of a suite of major projects, part of an unprecedented investment in regional rail infrastructure getting underway across the state.

Work has already begun on the \$1.75 billion Regional Rail Revival program to upgrade every regional passenger line in Victoria, enabling more services and better reliability for train passengers throughout the state.

# Scammers phoning as NBN rolls out

Residents are being warned of a remote access scam that has been circulating around Maryborough lately, with scammers impersonating Telstra and NBN employees.

Maryborough Telecommunications employee Carly Wilson has said the business has received a number of reports of locals receiving calls from a person claiming to be from Telstra reporting that the person's internet will be cut off due to the NBN being connected.

"We've had a number of people reporting to us that they had been contacted by a person who has been impersonating a NBN employee or someone from Telstra, who tells them their internet will be disconnected in a couple of days," she said. "Customers have told us that the scammers have tried to gain access to their computers or tried to get personal details from them. There are also instances where they will ask people to purchase iTunes gift cards. Obviously there is a bit of confusion around the connection of the NBN and scammers are taking advantage of that."

Ms Wilson urged residents who are unsure of the phone caller's legitimacy, to contact Telstra or to come into the store. "If someone has been called by Telstra alerting them to an issue, we will be able to tell them if it is legitimate or not," she said. "There is also currently no instance where a person's internet will be disconnected due to the NBN. There is at least a 12 month period across this region for people to make the switch to the NBN."

According to Scamwatch, more than \$430,000 was lost to remote access scams in May 2018, with more than 1000 incidents of the scam being reported.

A remote access scam is when a scammer phones you and pretends to be a staff member from a large telecommunications or computer company, such as Telstra, the NBN or Microsoft, according to Scam-watch. They will report that your computer has been sending error messages or that it has a virus. They may mention problems with the internet connection or your phone-line and say this has affected your computer's recent performance. They may claim that your broadband connection has been hacked.

The caller will request remote access to your computer to 'find out what the problem is'.

The scammer may try to talk you into buying unnecessary software or a service to 'fix' the computer, or they may ask you for your personal details and your bank or credit card details.

The scammer may initially sound professional and knowledgeable—however they will be very persistent and may become abusive if you don't do what they ask.

According to Scamwatch, for the month of May this year, 6.8 percent of all reports had a financial loss, 53.1 percent of victims were female and more than 270 reports were made by people aged over 65 years.

Maryborough Police Constable Samuel Fary urged residents to hang up the phone if they are unsure of the legitimacy of the caller.

"Scams are an ongoing issue and people need to be aware of them. If the person is claiming to be a particular provider, hang up and call them directly," he said. #### Compost update

The compost facility upgrade at the Carisbrook Transfer Station is now complete and will operate from Friday 6th July. The upgrade included the construction of a new 296 metre squared open-sided shed over the compost processing area and underground drainage. The \$145,000 upgrade was funded from waste charges paid by users of Council's waste services and will improve the health and safety of employees and community members.

Compost bags will be available for collection from Friday, 6th July. Council will honour the April, 2018 vouchers initially and, depending on supply of compost, the Transfer Station will determine future supply.

#### Tree plantings at Talbot and Dunolly

New trees have recently been planted in Talbot and Dunolly. In Talbot, Crab-apple and Ash trees were planted near the intersection of Maryborough-Ballarat Road and Ballarat Street North and in the public park along Scandinavian Crescent.

Several other trees were planted at Gordon Gardens in Dunolly including Ash, Tulip and Pin Oak trees.

#### Majorca Road

Stage two of the Majorca Road, Maryborough upgrade has been delayed due to wet weather and is expected to be complete by the end of next week.

The section of road, between Cadle and Nelson streets, is currently closed. The project includes underground drainage, new kerb and pavement renewal. The \$761,366 project has been jointly funded by Central Goldfields Shire and the Federal Government as part of the Roads to Recovery program.






