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## Council Plan refresh adopted

Central Goldfields Shire Council adopted the refresh of the 2017-2021 Council Plan at an Ordinary Meeting of Council last night (28/08).

The Council Plan is developed every four years and under the Local Government Act it must be reviewed annually. It sets out the strategic direction for Council and guides our work by setting our priorities and actions towards achieving our vision and transparently outlines how it will be achieved.

The Council Plan 2017-2021 was informed by the Central Goldfields Shire community and stakeholders as part of a community consultation process. Additional community consultation was carried out in April 2018 as part of the Have your Say campaign.

More than 500 residents provided feedback via listening posts, postcards and an online survey.

Central Goldfields Shire Council Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said it was great to see one of Council's most important documents finalised.

"The refresh of the Council Plan was made possible thanks to the hundreds of residents who took the time to provide us with feedback as part of the Have Your Say campaign.

"Your feedback provided us with valuable input that helped us inform the updated Plan to ensure it is community driven and relevant.

"The Council Plan drives our decision-making and planning for the next three years and we look forward to working closely with the community in its delivery."

## Carisbrook Flood Community

### Reference Group

The Carisbrook Flood and Drainage Management Plan Implementation Community Reference Group was appointed at an Ordinary Meeting of Council last night (28/08).

At the June Council Meeting, Council approved the establishment of the group, the terms of reference and the expression of interest process.

Five members of the Carisbrook community expressed an interest in membership and Council last night approved the appointment of Ms Alison Teese OAM; Mrs Helen Broad; Mrs Patricia Coutts; Mr Hayden Stewart and Mr Keith McLeish.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said the group was established to work closely with Council staff and the community.

Its mission is to effectively and efficiently deliver the remaining flood management infrastructure and establish good community practices around flood management.

"Each of the members of the group has direct experience in working with the Carisbrook community and will be in a position to feedback progress of the implementation of the Carisbrook Flood and Drainage Management Plan with the community."

Implementation of the Carisbrook Flood and Drainage Management Plan has commenced with creek clearing and levy construction. Stages 1 and 2 of the Flood Levy were completed and Stages 3 and 4 are pending Council acquisition of the land required for levy construction.

## Renowned artist's works to go on show at Gallery

Works from one of Australia's leading landscape artists are going on display at the Central Goldfields Art Gallery this weekend.

Opening at the Gallery at 2pm on Saturday 8th September, the Jeff Makin: Survey exhibition will be launched by Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey.

Prior to the official opening, Jeff will give a free artist's talk at 1.30pm where he will explain some of the inspiration and background for his art. All community members are welcome to attend.

Jeff Makin: Survey is a specially curated exhibition that highlights the beauty and majesty of the landscape stretching from Mount Macedon through to the Grampians.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said the Gallery's latest exhibition will be the latest in a series of popular displays.

"Jeff Makin is an artist of reputation and I have no doubt his works will bring in locals and visitors from near and far," he said.

Being a fulltime artist for decades, Jeff has explored the picturesque and sublime elements of nature and carries on the tradition of painting outside, en plain air, of the Heidelberg School of Painters living in Australia during the 19th century.

Jeff is represented in major public and private collections throughout Australia.

The exhibition will be on display at Central Goldfields Art Gallery from this Saturday 8 September to 14 October 2018.

Jess should have realised after seeing the ducks procrastinate about entering the water. Rafts of thin ice floated, creating fractal geometry upon the surface. Water continued to tumble over the small weir, but at a reduced rate. She gazed up the rise toward the powered sites of the caravan park.



The morning sun felt warm on her skin but also highlighted her hard-won wrinkles and gaunt stare. The overnight tourists were off again; a process repeated everyday as they arrived late and departed early in their flash cars and modern caravans. How Jess envied their ability to just trundle away to a better life.

That life was not to be hers. Fate and bad choices had decreed that she had to do it tough. And, by God, how starkly defined and unyielding it was. She had been beaten black and blue by yet another drug-addled partner and turned out onto the street with unaddressed debt; an intellectually disadvantaged thirteen year old son named Noah; a clapped-out Holden Commodore and a large dog called Brute. The dog was now living in the car because the vehicle didn't go anymore and there was nowhere else to house the animal. Jess shared a Kmart tent with her latest partner, Justin, who was younger than her, but he at least had a job, enabling them to pay the caravan park fees. Noah occupied another Kmart tent next to them. The nights were sub-zero and shivering had become second-nature. That hadn't prevented Justin from forcing himself on her last night. She wondered how he could possibly feel amorous in the spiteful cold.

"Get off me ya frigging scumbag!" she had cried out in the hours before dawn. "Justin, get off me I said!" Jess had screamed at him again and again but it only seemed to encourage him. "What about Noah?" she had implored. Jess was painfully aware of her son lying in the tent next door, so close that she could almost reach out and touch him.

Justin had laughed, "He's got to learn some time." He had then shaken her roughly and demanded, "Whose money pays the rent, huh?" Jess had succumbed, as always. Life could be worse, she supposed, but not by much.

In contrast, Noah possessed such a sweet disposition despite the glassy look in his eyes denoting the absence of something there. Jess wished she could do better by him. He didn't deserve this kind of life and it was heart-breaking to witness his unabashed gratitude for the small gifts that she managed to scrounge for him. Luckily, Noah thought that camping out in a tent in winter was some kind of big adventure, but he really should have been in school instead of wasting his days on the riverbank.

One day her debts would be repaid. One day she would have a loving partner and a roof over her head. One day Noah would be able to live independently and productively. But, for now, the only thing for Jess to welcome was the coming of summer and an end to this bleakest of winters.

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## Memorial Service for Talbot Master



Talbot Masonic Lodge arranged a memorial service for their Master John Bourke which was held at the Maryborough Masonic Centre in Havelock Street, on Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> August 2018.

A funeral service was held at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Preston on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> July which was followed by a private cremation.

To allow local members of Freemasonry and the public to pay their respects, a service, including a Masonic Service, was conducted with the earthly remains of John (his ashes) present.

John Bourke was midway through his second term as Worshipful Master of Talbot Masonic Lodge when he, was brutally murdered in his own home in tragic circumstances; allegedly by two youths who have been arrested and charged.

Previously John had acted in the capacity as Master of the Robbie Burns Lodge in Sunshine and though handicapped in body through Brittle Bones Disease he never accepted being crippled and was certainly not handicapped in mind.

To honour the tenacity of John's character, a series of Memorial Lectures, have been set up with production to commence very soon.

Those lectures called Lessons in Life will target students during their transitional years of grades six, seven and eight.

Distribution will be assisted by the Life-Be-In-It organisation and Robert Palmer of The Education Professionals, along with Canadian Dr Jennifer Fraser one of that nation's top neuroscience researchers, who was appointed to the federal task-force to address the youth crisis in Canada.

This task-force concluded that creating schools and universities which employ the ancient practice of mindfulness had much merit because cutting-edge neuroscience shows how much it enhances brain function; being the way to invent the future by harnessing our past and linking it to our technological genius and advancement.

By this initiative Freemasons in Victoria hope that something positive can be achieved through these disastrous circumstances, thus helping to prevent young people from taking the wrong pathway in life. By this method, Freemasons hope that a lasting memory of John Bourke will endure.

## John Bourke Memorial Oration

While we hold these teachings close to our hearts the time is right to provide the reasoning for these virtues to students in the formative years of their thinking, namely the transitional years from primary to secondary education. For this reason, we will be producing a video series on "Lessons in Life" targeting years six, seven and eight.

A common introduction will be narrated by our Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Keith Murray, with the first video now in production and narrated by Most Worshipful Brother Vaughan Werner Past Grand Master based on the virtues of Integrity and Honesty.

Bro Robert Palmer based in Geelong, is 2IC of Life-Be-In-It and has a company named The Teaching Professionals, intends to use these videos which will be made available via a new website to be called "Live More of Your Life.com" and linked to our Freemasons website.

These productions may also be published internationally because we also have on board a highly regarded expert in Canadian, Dr Jennifer Fraser – one of the top Neuroscience Researchers who believes that: **"Creating schools and universities that employ the ancient practice of mindfulness, because cutting-edge science shows how much this enhances brain function, is the way to invent the future by harnessing our past and linking it to our technological genius and advancement." DR Fraser seeks to be a part of this transformation.**

We also have support from New Zealand through Dal McGuirk, a retired Dean of faculty in Auckland.

We hope by this initiative that the memory of John Bourke and the tragic way he died will then be turned from something negative into something positive for our future society and to his memory for the way he faced life handicapped in body, but not in mind, will live on.

The teaching profession will be welcome to use these videos in lessons without charge.

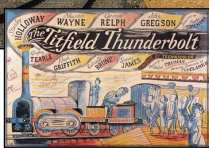

Today we are arriving in London from the continent and heading for the Union Jack Club at Waterloo. This club is intended for ex-servicemen and women and their families and since my husband, Mike, was in the regular Army, we were eligible to stay there. It was like that twenty years before and hadn't changed, so we found that we could stay in a five-star hotel in Melbourne for the same price as a two-star hotel in London. ## Women's Health Survey and Women's Health Week

Jean Hailes for Women's Health surveyed more than 15,000 women across Australia this year to find out their greatest health concerns, habits and needs. The result is a deep insight into the wellbeing of women across the country as they juggle busy lives with work, home and family demands and the increasing pressures of the digital world.

The Jean Hailes Women's Health Survey 2018, launched on 1 September, reveals that almost half of women surveyed had been diagnosed with depression or anxiety by a doctor or psychologist. And two-thirds of women reported feeling nervous, anxious or on edge nearly every day or on more than seven days in the last four weeks.

"Anecdotally we hear more and more about the 'sandwich generation' of women, who are trying to juggle busy careers with kids and ageing parents," says Chris Enright, Head of Education & Knowledge Exchange, at Jean Hailes for Women's Health. "Our survey reflects that women worry about their health, particularly their weight, and getting enough time to themselves just to unwind, and 9.5% of women drink alcohol every day."

"These findings help us to understand the behaviours of women in relation to their health, and importantly, how we can help them to lead healthy lifestyles," says Ms. Enright.

"What we also found interesting is that half of survey respondents describe themselves as overweight or obese yet 70% of women say they do at least two hours of moderate physical activity every week," she says.

"Many women are trying to stay strong and healthy but almost a third of women who responded to our survey said they wanted to know more about healthy eating and nutrition."

There is also good news in the results. "Hardly any of the 15,000 women that we surveyed are regular smokers—90% hadn't smoked in the past year. And half of women describe their health as very good or excellent," says Ms Enright.

"At Jean Hailes, we are big believers in being proactive to maintain optimal health," she says. "Get to know your own body and what's 'normal' for you. Talk to your GP about any abnormal changes and ensure you get regular check-ups."

Women's Health Week: Running 3-7 September, more than 100,000 people across the country have registered to attend a Women's Health Week event or subscribed to receive free daily videos, podcasts, stories, recipes and much more. Landmarks across Australia will be turning pink during the campaign in celebration, including Flinders Street Station and the Sound Tube in Melbourne, Sydney Town Hall, Canberra's Royal Mint and SkyCity Adelaide.

## More help for young families in Central Goldfields Shire

New mums and dads in Central Goldfields Shire will be able to access dedicated support to help them get through their first years of being a parent thanks to a funding boost from the Andrews Government.

Currently, any Victorian family experiencing challenges and who need an extra helping hand is provided free access to Enhanced Maternal and Child Health support until their child turns one.

But a new \$37.7 million expansion to the program means mums and dads will be supported for a further two years, or until their child turns three.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said the expansion will also increase the number of support hours parents can receive from 15 hours to 20 hours a week.

"Children's needs don't just stop at 12 months and I'm pleased we can now provide Central Goldfields families with more support for longer," Ms Pulford said.

"Victoria's MCH service is world class and this expansion means more families, in fact thousands more, will be able to access it, and for longer," she said.

The change – currently rolling out across the state – will benefit 37,000 families every year when fully rolled out, up from only 12,000 families.

In Central Goldfields Shire, annual funding will be increased from \$74,763 to \$120,460, which will assist 61 local families.

Enhanced MCH is a targeted service for families who need some additional help and may be at risk of poor outcomes due to factors like parent-infant attachment concerns, premature or low birth-weight babies, children with a disability, parental mental health issues or family violence.

As well as providing information on child health and parenting, MCH nurses also give vital advice on a child's development and help ensure our kids get the best start in life.

They provide parents' support on a range of issues, including nutrition, breastfeeding, sleep and settling, childhood illness, allergies, skin conditions and early learning.

All families can also access the free 24-hour MCH Line phone service on 13 22 99, which is available for those with children aged from birth to school age.

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## Spring firewood season now open

The Spring Firewood Collection Season for 2018 is now open. Starting across Victoria this Saturday, the season closes on Friday, November 30.

"We want to remind people that it will once again be legal to collect firewood from designated areas on public land across Victoria from September 1, 2018 until November 30, 2018," Forest Fire Management Victoria district manager Paul Bates said.

"FFMvic and Parks Victoria staff will be patrolling parks, forests and reserves to make sure people are doing the right thing while collecting their firewood.

"It's important that people only collect firewood from designated collection areas in state forests or parks where collection is allowed, and to stay within collection limits.

"This includes taking a maximum of two cubic metres per person per day and a maximum of 16 cubic metres per household per financial year. This is to prevent households stockpiling large volumes of firewood from public land and denying others a supply.

The felling of any trees for firewood by members or the public is strictly prohibited.

The amount of domestic firewood available across Victoria is varied and some households rely on firewood for winter energy, so collectors are asked to consider others when taking firewood.

Under the Forest Act 1958, people who collect firewood outside designated firewood collection areas or firewood collection season or take more than the

maximum allowable amounts can face fines of up to \$7928 or a maximum penalty of one year imprisonment or both, if the matter proceeded to court.

Any information the community may have about the illegal removal of firewood for sale can be reported to DELWP on 136 186, quoting Operation Sawdust.

Some firewood collection areas may be part of the Spring planned burning program. To check where to go to [www.ffm.vic.gov.au/planned burn](http://www.ffm.vic.gov.au/planned_burn), download the VicEmergency app or call 1800 226 226.

More information and updates, including interactive maps showing designated collection areas, will be available on [www.ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood](http://www.ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood) from September 1, or you can call 136 086 to find out more.

The environmental watering program that is underway by the North Central Catchment Management Authority in Gunbower Island has caused several road and track closures over the past couple of months.

FFMvic officers have been monitoring the water levels within the forest and have determined that all access roads to the firewood collection area are inaccessible.

Therefore, the designated firewood collection area in Gunbower State Forest will be closed for the 2018 Spring season.

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## My martial arts journey - Part one

People have been asking about my martial arts styles as they couldn't work out how I managed to win in most karate competitions, considering I only had been doing it for couple of years.

My martial arts journey begins when I was about three or four. My dad took me to see Kung Fu movies a few times per week, and instead of comic books, fairy tales or children's books, I grew up reading Kung Fu books. I had my first training manual when I was eight. I used to just go through every picture and remember all the steps in my mind, then tried to do the forms. Little did I realise that I had an excellent memory. I managed to do the forms by just watching them on films or studying them in books. When I practised them, most moves were easy. I thought this was quite natural.

We had to do Judo at school in Malaysia; the moves were different to Kung Fu, but I enjoyed it. I only studied that for a year, then I came to Australia in early 1980's.

I still watched a lot of Kung Fu movies but I didn't take up any martial arts until the late 1980's. I tried Wing Chun and Tai Chi on a casual basis until the early 1990's when I joined a Southern Style Kung Fu school. After few lessons, my instructor made me lead the class. I didn't really want to, so I hid behind some tall students, but no matter where I hid, all the students seemed to follow and line up behind me! I had to lead the class. A few months later, I was the assistant instructor for that branch and eventually took the classes in three different branches. It was a fun eight years in a male-dominated kung fu school, I was the only girl for the first two-and-a-half years. We did Lion Dance as well. Traditionally a Lion Dance troupe was only reserved for male students. Female students are not allowed to do it, but I broke the tradition. One day, when I was watching the Lion Dance practice, one of the students was running late, so the head instructor asked me to fill in for him until he turned up. After a few goes,

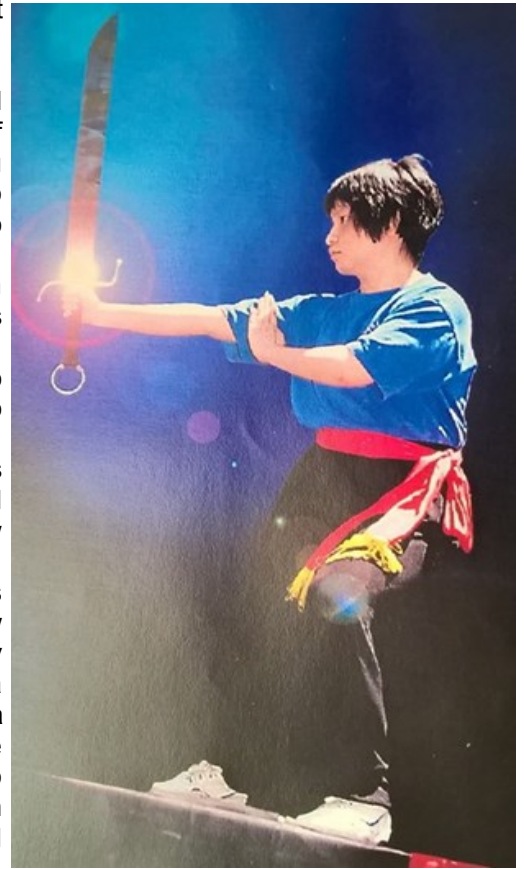
he told me I was in the troupe. You should have seen the faces of all the other male students and instructors!

Since I got into the Lion Dance troupe, all the other female students also wanted in. Eventually, the school got a pink lion for the girls, but they were only allowed to practice, not to perform in public. However, I was allowed to.

I eventually obtained my black belt in the late 1990's, There hadn't been any black belt grading for over 10 years and I was one of the first group to get them again.

I moved on to Tai Chi and Wushu (Northern Kung Fu Style) in the year 2000, training with one of Jet Li's Kung Fu brothers. I soon became the assistant instructor again. It was a fun time with many performances, and that's where I met Jason Stewart. My photo also appeared in an article in The Blitz Martial Arts Magazine when we were demonstrating Tai Chi Fan.
