Last Chance to Vote for Dunolly Project

Anybody in Victoria can vote for Pick My Project projects, A new arrival to Dunolly, Deborah Halpern, has teamed up with Anna and Philip Ashton's Ministry of Fun and Judy Meldrum, to submit an exciting application for 'Pick my Project' for our region, 'Dunolly's Festival of Fun and Creativity'.

The idea is to be able to fund tutors to run a wide variety of visual and performing arts workshops catering for all ages and abilities. Workshops will be delivered through the year as tasters (1/2 day), one-day and two-day masterclasses, by experienced professional artists. These will be organised by renowned sculptor and artist Deborah Halpern and the Dunolly Ministry of Fun. Cost for most would be free, to allow the widest possible uptake. The finale would be a festival celebration, showcasing work created through the workshop program, mini-workshops, a market and video projection of the experiences.

Cookery Corner

BRAISED PORK CHOPS WITH PRUNES AND APRICOTS

Ingredients



- 4 trimmed meaty pork chops
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 cup oil
- 2-3 cloves garlic, crushed (1 teaspoon)
- 2 large onions, sliced
- 4 cups chicken or beef stock
- 2 cups red wine
- 12 (approx.) pitted prunes
- 12 (approx.) dried apricots
- Season pork with salt and pepper.

Method

1. Place flour on a plate or in a shallow dish and season with salt and more pepper.
2. Coat the pork in the flour, shaking off the excess. Heat oil in a heavy oven-proof pan, add pork and cook a few minutes on each side to brown.
3. Remove pork and drain off oil leaving approximately 2 tablespoons.
4. Add garlic and onions and sauté for 3-4 minutes until golden. Return chops to the pan. Add stock, wine and dried fruit.
5. Place in the oven at 180°C for approximately 45 minutes or simmer until pork is tender.
6. Remove pork to serving dish. Bring the remaining liquid to the boil, reducing if necessary, until thickened and 'sauce like'. Check seasoning and pour sauce evenly over pork chops. Serves 4.

Union Jack Club London

Here I am still in the Union Jack Club at Waterloo in London, Liz has just flown home and I have two days to fill in before Mike arrives. I

decided to take in a stage show and found an interesting sounding play at the Adelphi, not far from the club, just one station away on the Underground. As I walked

through the tunnel at Waterloo on my way home to the club it was already dark. London winter days get dark at 3 o'clock. Other commuters gradually disappeared down different exits until I suddenly found myself alone except for one pair of footsteps behind me. Then a voice called out "Excuse me lady, can you stop a minute please." Looking behind me I saw a shabby-looking old hobo hurrying to catch up. I panicked and took to my heels as fast as I could. Yes, me the intrepid traveller who had hitchhiked alone in my youth across Scandinavia, running like a scared rabbit from a probably harmless old man.

As it turned out he was harmless because when I panted into the Club and told the man at the desk, he said "Oh that's old Jake. He's a regular round here, scrounging money for booze." And how was I to know, but I felt foolish!

The next day proved me even more ridiculous. When travelling in Europe years before, I had kept up by mail with a Welsh girl whom we girls met and travelled with for a week or so.

Report illegal rubbish dumping

In a previous column I mentioned the conclusion of Council's "fee" free waste trial. A report regarding the trial will now be prepared for Council's consideration.

As also mentioned, residents are still able to dispose of up to four cubic metres of metals and up to one cubic metre of recyclables (glass, cardboard, plastics) for free at Council's waste facilities year-round. Additionally, Council holds hard rubbish days once a year in townships across the Shire around the week after Clean Up Australia Day.

Therefore, it is a shame to hear of the occurrence of illegal rubbish dumping in our Shire, including on roadsides and in our beautiful natural bushland.

According to the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) Victoria, illegal dumping can range from a single bag of household rubbish to large items such as TVs, appliances and electronic waste, furniture, mattresses, industrial wastes, construction and demolition materials, garden waste, packaging, tyres, old cars and soil.

Illegal rubbish dumping not only spoils the natural amenity of our environment, but also carries with it consequences for those caught.

The EPA states that illegal dumping of contaminated fill material, tyres, manufacturing, construction and demolition waste is an indictable offence. This can attract a maximum court penalty of \$610,700 or seven years imprisonment for an individual, and more than \$1.2 million for a corporation.

If you come across rubbish that has been dumped in bushland, please call Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) on 131 186.

For rubbish dumped on Council roadsides and reserves, contact our Local Laws Officers on 5494 1200. Please provide as many details as possible to help staff investigate the incident.

When will my bin be collected?

To help ensure your bin is being collected, Council would like to remind residents to place bins out the night before your collection day. Your waste bin will be collected weekly, and your recycling bin will be collected fortnightly. Hours for collection service are between 6am and 5 pm on your nominated day for collection.

Any material left beside your bin in plastic bags (or other containers) will not be collected, and please make sure you do not contaminate bins with the wrong waste materials – such as nappies in the recycling bin. Your bin should also be placed facing the road (with wheels and handles away from the road).

If your bin has not been emptied on its scheduled day, please contact Council's customer service team on 5494 1200 and they will contact the Council's waste contractor.

To find out more, including the bin collection timetable go to www.loddon.vic.gov.au/Live/Your-home/Garbage-and-recycling.

I also encourage you to download the free Loddon Mallee Waste and Resource Recovery Group waste information App.

The App provides you with a personalised bin collection calendar (with optional reminders), information on materials and their correct bin, and hints and tips.

It will also provide waste and recycling services and facilities information (including contact details, opening times and maps), and lets you report a problem directly to Council.

The App is available through the App Store or Google Play. Just search for "Loddon Mallee Waste" and download on your device.

Bins are the property of Loddon Shire Council and must remain at the property if you leave or sell your property.

PATTERSONS DIGGINGS

One of the earliest local gold finds was Pattersons Diggings. It is in the Harvest Home Forest 6 km north of Dunolly. These diggings were discovered in early 1853. The actual date is not recorded but it was probably in March. Just prior to this George Henry Patterson found gold in Jones Creek. It was not payable so he moved on. He was probably heading for Mt Moliagul as gold had been found there a few months earlier and supplies were available. On the way he came across a quartz reef sticking out of the ground and soon found gold in it. This he called Pattersons Reef, one of the first gold-bearing reefs discovered in the district. Then he dug in the gully below the reef, found gold and named it Pattersons Gully. In the previous three months gold had been found at Moliagul, Sandy Creek (Tarnagulla), Dunolly (Goldsborough) and Burnt Creek (Bromley). All these finds were in either Burnt Creek or Sandy Creek. Pattersons Diggings were the first local discovery not associated with a major creek.

Pattersons Diggings was not a rich goldfield but a small settlement grew up there that lasted into the 1860s.

George Henry Paterson or Patterson was born in Tasmania about 1807. After his gold discovery he and his family mined and lived at Pattersons Reef. In 1860 the family moved to the Dunolly Moliagul Rd where they ran a store. The store was on the Dunolly side of Lummis Lane. George Henry Patterson died there in May 1866 aged 59 and was buried with his wife Jane in the Dunolly Historic Cemetery.

Around school this week

There has been a lot of discussion generated from the segment on 60 minutes last Sunday regarding screen addiction in children. We understand many parents feel 'powerless' when it comes to technology usage in homes. A wonderful website with many tips and information is the <https://www.esafety.gov.au/education-resources/iparent>.

SCREEN TIME:

Fact: On average, outside of school, 10 to 14 year olds spend 23 hours online per week. That's a whole day out of their lives.

1. Try to encourage positive screen time, like content that you can view and enjoy together.

Discourage anything that is overly aggressive or disrespectful.

2. Negotiate key rules together, such as when screens can be on and when they need to be turned off. Young teens are likely to respond better to rules that they've contributed to and see as being fair and consistent.

3. Agree ahead of time on the rules and strategies to get your child to switch off from the screen. With gaming, think about a timer that signals that game time is nearly over and be clear about the consequences for not switching off.

Be consistent with rules and consequences. If you back down on these, your child won't be developing self regulation nor will they see there are consequences for all of our actions in life. If technology time is your child's 'currency' – the activity they respond to – use it to your advantage eg. Rule is when reading/homework is completed, jobs done – then they get half an hour of screen time. Will there be pushback from your child? **ABSOLUTELY !!** Don't give in to tantrums. While uncomfortable at the time, they do pass.


Again we have implemented the Grants Scheme and have disbursed monies to many organisations within the community. We intend to continue this practice each year to assist our community.

My martial arts journey - Part two

Around 2005-2006, we moved on to another Wushu and Tai Chi School and trained under another World Wushu Champion. This was a different sort of training, with lots of performances, especially in the Crown Casino every Chinese New Year. We were teaching for this school and had our own school in Forest Hill as well until 2010 when we moved to Dunolly.

I had great fun doing Wushu and Tai Chi, and of course I competed in many tournaments and won many medals and trophies.

My greatest achievement was to win a gold medal in Wushu at the Oceania Championship in 2005.

When we moved to Dunolly, we tried searching for Kung Fu schools but there were none, only Karate and Tae Kwon Do. Those styles didn't interest us much at that time, as they are not Chinese styles. Five to six years later, there was a Women's Self Defence class and Ladies Only exercise Group in Dunolly, so I signed up just for fun.

After a few lessons in Women's Self-Defence, the instructor, Peter Jackson, who was also the instructor for Kokoro Kai Karate Dunolly and Maryborough, told me that I would find karate much more challenging than women's self-defence, but I still didn't have any intention to join karate. Then, in 2016 at one of the Kokoro Kai lunch functions, my partner, Jason Stewart, said he wanted to compete in sparring at the upcoming karate competition in Maryborough. He had never done any karate before, but because of his martial arts

background and a few lessons with Troy Hoban, he managed to win 3rd place at the competition. I was the Table Official at that competition, just watching all the competitors doing their kata (forms) and kumite (sparring). I said to myself, "I could do this too." So in August 2016, I joined Karate. It has been a fantastic journey since.

I competed two months later at the Ballarat competition and won 2nd place in Kata. The following year in 2017, I told my instructor, Shihan Peter that I wanted to try out for the State Championship, but he told me I wasn't ready as I only had just started in karate. He asked me to wait another year, but for me every step and move that I made was a learning experience and I wanted to get more mat experience so that I knew what to expect the following year. So I competed at the State Championship and won a Bronze medal and got onto the State Squad. It was a great shock to everyone.

The next step was to get onto the State Team and I did and competed at the Nationals in NSW. I didn't win the National but I came 7th. That year I also competed in every competition which was held in Victoria and amazingly I won in all of them. I surprised myself too!

In another successful year again this year, I won in many competitions, but my greatest achievement was to win 2nd place in the Japan Championship in Yokohama in May.

I was very proud of myself when my instructor told me I was the first student in Kokoro Kai to compete at international level and the first one to win a podium place. I also got onto the State Team and recently competed in Queensland, winning the 1st round in kata but losing in the 2nd round. Overall I think I finished about 8th or 9th.

I think I will slow down a bit now due to my hip injury, I need time to heal.
