The tile installations in the window of the shop on Broadway are very interesting and colourful.

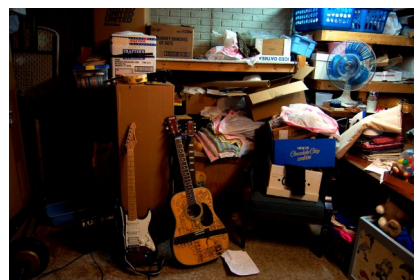

Council will also be taking steps to prepare for the approaching fire season by turning its attention to roadside slashing to reduce roadside fuel and mowing firebreaks in township areas.

I urge all residents to help keep our community safe over the summer months by starting to make your property fire safe now. This includes clearing long grass, leaves and branches, undergrowth and vegetation, ensuring gutters are clear, and removing rubbish and other flammable material lying around your property.

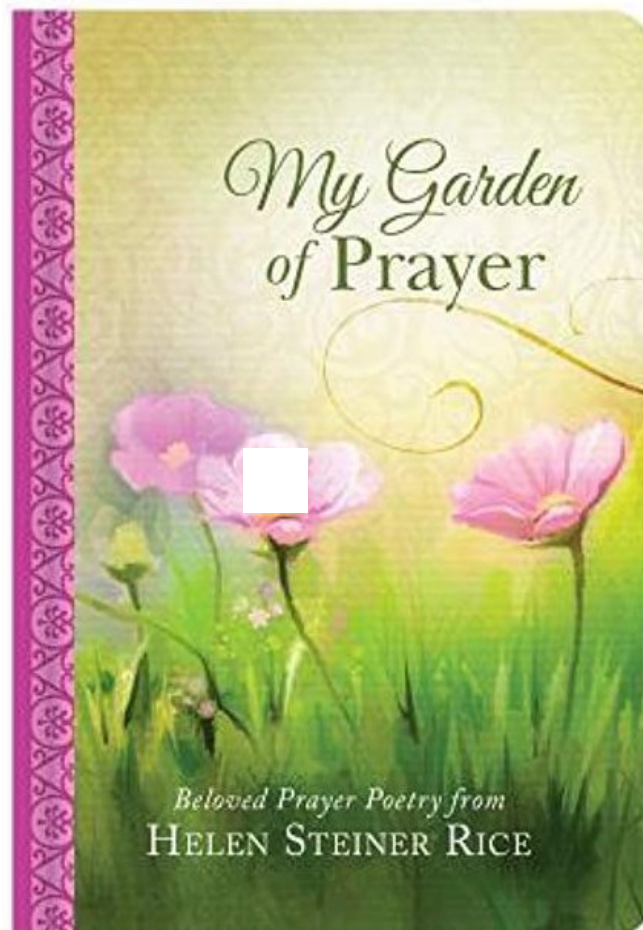

WORKS UPDATE

Bet Bet Creek Road: The Central Goldfields Shire works team has commenced a drain replacement project on Bet Bet Creek Road, Bet Bet – 1.2 kilometres south of McKenzie Road. Bet Bet Creek Road is closed between McKenzies Road and Dunolly-Timor Road and will only be open to local traffic. Works are expected to take approximately three weeks to complete.

Tarnagulla Out 'n About

Many of the residents, former residents and descendants and friends of those who lived or passed through Waanyarra and who have attended the Waanyarra Reunions through the years, also maintain a keen interest in Tarnagulla.

This year the Tarnagulla Out 'n About weekend has changed its name, date and venue and this year will be known as Tarnagulla Revisited and be held at the Recreation Reserve Saturday 20th October 2018 and at the Victoria Hall on Sunday 21st October 2018.

There will still be a History display in the Pavilion at the Recreation Reserve on a reduced scale, but still overseen by David Gordon, as well as entertainment and food stalls and Garage Sales.

A highlight will be a Celebration of Dame Nellie Melba held at 2.00pm on Sunday 21st October 2018 at Victoria Hall, together with an Exhibition of Rare Memorabilia. Anyone who has attended one of Rachel Buckley's productions will know just how professional and great these are and early booking is advised. Her productions are usually sold out by the day.

Despite the plaque erected at the Victoria Hall by the former Shire, indicating that Dame Nellie Melba had performed at the Victoria Hall, this is in fact quite erroneous. One of my great aunts, a Comrie, was in the same class as Nellie at PLC in the 1880s and it was never mentioned by the Comrie family and there is no mention in the Tarnagulla & Llanely Courier. Likewise Lola Montez, courtesan and entertainer, who, amongst other exploits, entertained miners on the Victorian goldfields with her famed "Spider Dance" is also noted on the plaque as having performed in the Victoria Hall, but she had left Australia in 1856 and was actually dead before the Victoria Hall was built.

Another event of interest will be the Tarnagulla & District Golf Club "Three Club Monty" on Sunday 14th October 2018. Mary McNamee has revitalised the Golf Club and it has hosted several enjoyable days in the past.

Last October, a workshop was held in the tiny Goldfields' town of Tarnagulla in Central Victoria to brainstorm how the town could benefit from the Climate Change Innovation Grants being offered through the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP).

Some animated discussions on the night led to the formation of the Tarnagulla Alternative Energy Group (TAEG) to further investigate the town's needs in relation to climate change. TAEG applied for the grant to complete a study of the town's current level of climate change preparedness for the purpose of developing a plan to increase the town's resilience.

Having been successful in their application, the Tarnagulla Alternative Energy Group is working in collaboration with DELWP, the Tarnagulla Action Group and the RMIT Centre for Urban Research's Climate Change and Resilience group - who will be conducting the study.

TAEG are currently finalising their project plan to set up the study. The study will have a strong focus on the social, economic and physical impacts of challenges related to climate change. By strengthening their social capital and economy and addressing any identified issues prior to unexpected challenges arising, Tarnagulla will be in a position of strength to face potential challenges.

Through the process of the study, TAEG also intend to develop relationships with relevant services and government organisations and to investigate how different agencies and processes can work with the community in situations of adversity. This would include determining how their local emergency processes function and understanding their own role before, during and after a disaster.

The members of TAEG anticipate that, participating in the study, which includes several workshops as well as fun and informative events, will strengthen relationships between Tarnagulla residents.

Tarnagulla Alternative Energy Group President Linda Kennedy said, TAEG members are very enthusiastic about the project and look forward to launching the study in the coming months.



People are increasingly being caught out by celebrity endorsement scams, with reports to Scamwatch increasing 400 per cent and losses increasing a staggering 3,800 per cent so far in 2018.

These scams often appear as online advertisements or promotional stories on social media or a seemingly legitimate, trustworthy website. They include fictitious quotes and doctored or out-of-context images of the celebrity, such as presenters from the TV show Sharktank, promoting a product such as skin care creams, weight loss pills, or investment schemes.

The ACCC's Scamwatch website has received almost 200 reports in 2018 and losses totalling more than \$142 000. People aged 45 and older accounted for 63 per cent of losses to these scams. Women are more likely than men to be a victim.

"The growth in these scams is very concerning, particularly as over half the reports we received included a financial loss. Most people lost between \$100 and \$500 and in one case, a victim lost more than \$50 000 through fake celebrity endorsement of an investment scheme," ACCC Deputy Chair, Delia Rickard said.

The scam works when consumers sign-up for a 'free trial' for a product. As part of this process, they have to provide their credit card details. The 'free trial' however, has strict terms and conditions such as having to return the product within a near impossible-timeframe, and an automatically renewing subscription that is difficult to cancel. These terms are often only visible on the document that arrives with the product.

"The groups behind these celebrity endorsement scams are organised and sophisticated fraudsters who are often involved in other scams. It's easy for them to create fake ads and websites to give credibility to their con, so people need to be very careful and sceptical about ads they read on social media and websites," Ms Rickard said. "It is vital to research and read independent reviews of the company. Consumers should verify celebrity endorsement of products from the celebrity's official website or social media account."

The ACCC is calling on Google, Facebook and Instagram to do more to crackdown on these fake ads to prevent scammers reaching potential victims.

"Most of the reports to Scamwatch involve these scam advertisements running on Google ad banners or as ads in Facebooks news feeds. These tech giants must do more to quickly suspend ads, as every time consumers click on a scam ad, they are at risk of losing money," Ms Rickard said. "If you are caught up in one of these scams, call your bank immediately to try and arrange a chargeback and to stop any further debits to your credit card."

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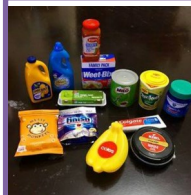
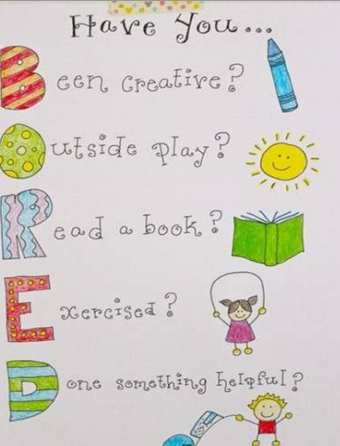

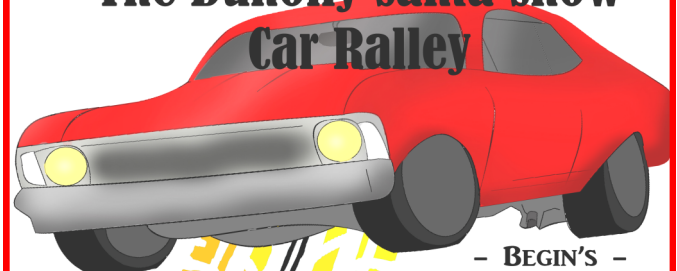

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Strong support for aeromedical station

The Maryborough Aero-medical Transfer Station (MATS) steering committee is reassuring residents the project is gaining momentum and is well underway.

Now that the Maryborough Ambulance Auxiliary centenary celebrations are concluded, the focus is directed towards establishing the MATS, which will assist the improvement of health outcomes for Maryborough and the surrounding area.

Once complete, the transfer station will provide a safe and secure environment where patients from Maryborough and district communities can be treated and transferred quickly from a road ambulance to an emergency aircraft ahead of transport to specialist hospitals.

Ambulance Victoria CEO, associate professor Tony Walker, said there was an increasing need for this type of facility across the state and several similar projects were already operating successfully in other regional centres.

"Just as it did 100 years ago, the Maryborough community has come together in an outstanding show of community support for the ambulance auxiliary and I am fully confident that it will not be long before this project becomes a reality," he said.

The steering committee said they are encouraged by the strong support from the administrators and staff of Central Goldfields Shire Council, Ambulance Victoria and Maryborough and district communities. According to a statement from the steering committee, a slide show presentation has been made to a number of community groups including the Mixed Probus Club, Maryborough Rotary, Maryborough CFA, Maryborough Lions and the Avoca Community Bank Branch, Maryborough Branch and St Arnaud agency of the Bendigo Bank board members.

Information has also been presented to members of the Avoca and Maryborough Men's Sheds.

An open night for Central Goldfields Shire residents is being planned and will be held at the Highland Society, to ensure all residents are informed regarding the progress of this community project.

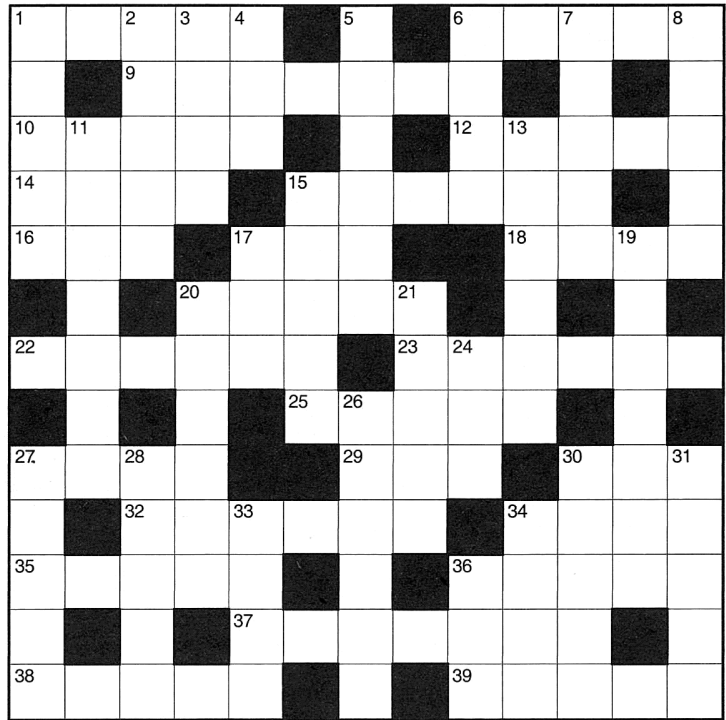

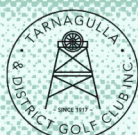

Vale Kenneth Morton 26 December 1931 - 20 September 2018



You will all be saddened to hear that Ken Morton passed away last Thursday at his home in Berwick. Ken was the founder and moving force in the establishment of the Families and Friends of Waanyarra in the 1980s, having been born in Waanyarra in 1931 and educated at the Waanyarra State School.

There was no greater promoter of the town and he was responsible for the reconstruction of the Cemetery records (lost in a fire many years ago) which have proved such a valuable resource to so many whose ancestors were born in or passed through Waanyarra.

Ken was responsible for the restoration of much of the Waanyarra Historic Cemetery and not only the identification of the headstones and memorials, but in placing plaques at the entrance to the Cemetery with the names of most of those buried there whose actual resting place could not be established.

The Cemetery records and many family histories were published on the "Waanyarra Revisited" website [<https://www.waanyarra.com>] which he established well ahead of its time and continued to update until recently. There are a number of historic photos and many photos of the work he organised to establish the Waanyarra Recreation Reserve and the shelter. There are also many Reunion photos from over the years. These all stand as a lasting memorial to his dedication to and love of Waanyarra.

He wrote a book "In Neptune's Wake" which he said was primarily as a family history for his children and which records the story of the Morton's, one of Waanyarra's pioneering families. Several chapters can be found on the Waanyarra website. Chapters on the lives and activities of the people in various branches of Ken's family were not considered appropriate for the website and unfortunately the book is no longer in print.

Rozanne, who was always by his side and assisting him, recently had a brain tumour removed, and is undergoing rehabilitation and she will sadly miss her long-time partner and the family will miss his cheery smile and attention.

Ken established the Waanyarra Reunion in the 1980s and I had the privilege to take over from him after the 2000 Reunion. Initially it was every two years, and after undertaking the preparation and distribution of the Newsletter and organising the Reunions, I could well understand why he did not hold them annually and in more recent times they have extended to every three years. He had a very active mailing list which, while we have lost a large number of those he included, has been increased to over 500 names. But the numbers of those able to and actually attending the Reunion has been steadily decreasing and no volunteer has come forward to take over from me.

You are all encouraged to farewell him at the celebration of his life at 2pm on Friday 28th September 2018 at the Nielsen Funeral Chapel, Korumburra Road, Warragul.
