Dear Editor.

Through the pages of your newspaper I would like to tell readers about exciting plans to allow every kid in Western Victoria the chance to start kindergarten a year earlier.

A re-elected Labor Government will invest almost \$5 billion over the next decade to deliver a full 15 hours of three-year-old kinder, helping make sure local kids are ready for school and set for life.

This will be the largest social, economic and educational reform ever undertaken in early childhood learning and is great news for families here in Western Victoria.

Right now, many families are forced to scrimp and save to cover the costs of three-year-old kinder – around \$5000 a year for 15 hours.

But too many kids are missing out, with new research showing nearly one in five families do not have their child enrolled in early learning because of the cost.

Under Labor's plan, around a quarter of families in Western Victoria will pay nothing at all, and for families with a higher income, the Labor Government will cover 65 per cent of their child's kindergarten costs.

This represents a saving of at least \$3500 for families whose children attend a standalone kinder.

Those with kids who go to long-day-care will also benefit, with these centres given funding to employ teachers in their threeyear-old rooms.

All evidence shows that early education can shape a child's entire future and an extra year of kinder will make the world of difference to local kids and their families.

Travels with Cynthia

After our Wimbledon adventure we three girls moved to a flat in Hyde Park Gate in London, quite close to Hyde Park. It is time to introduce my two friends by name. Mary and Anne Marie were from Sydney and had been to school together and, as it happened, had attended one of the sister schools run by the same order of French nuns where I had been schooled. We met at the fun table on the ship going over and from then on teamed up as a threesome.

While we were flat-hunting, the girls stayed with Anne Marie's brother who had moved to London and married there, and I found a bed sitter in Baker Street, home of the fictitious Sherlock Holmes, but that didn't stop tourists knocking on the door looking for 221B, which doesn't exist. My tiny room had just enough space for a bed jammed under a sloping roof, cupboard and small table and chair. When it was cold I opened the door of the toaster and sat in front of it.

When we found our flat it was quite smart and even had a concierge downstairs. We were able to afford it because we had a fourth person. Jill was a first-year out doctor and a friend of Anne Marie's brother, and she was a nightmare. I shared the second bedroom with her and thank heavens she spent more nights at the hospital than at home. She found the flat so it was in her name and we paid her our rent. Jill was a heavy smoker (doctors used to smoke back then) and she liked to keep the bedroom window shut, even though she smoked in bed while reading her notes. I would sneak over and open the window when I heard the heavy breathing, but in no time at all I would hear the window bang shut.

One time we had a visit from one of my Australian friends who had recently arrived. We did so much catching up that she missed the last tube. Since Jill was supposed to be sleeping at the hospital that night, we gave Jill's bed to my friend. Horror of horrors, however, we were woken up after midnight to find a furious Jill demanding to know who was in her bed. At least it wasn't a bloke. In the morning Jill had gone leaving a note of eviction on the table for the three of us. It took a lot of sweet-talking to convince Jill not to turn us out in the snow.

During our stay in that flat we were all working through agencies as temporary fill-ins for people on leave. I was in the translation news department at the BBC, hence had both day and night shifts. Shortly after our arrival at Hyde Park Gate, Anne Marie turned on her bedside lamp one night to discover horrid little insects on her bed. We discovered that they were bed bugs and we all freaked out when examining the other beds. It turned out that the previous tenants had been staying in Egypt prior to coming to London and it was assumed the bugs had come in their luggage. Trunks and suitcases were supposed to be stored in the basement, but apparently theirs had been left in the bedrooms. The management arranged for fumigation and put us up in a nearby hotel overnight. Then, of all things, I received a phone call from my Aunt Jean to say she had arrived in England and would be coming to London to see me the following day. There was no way I could tell her the reason why we had to vacate the flat as she would inform my mother, so I told her I had to work overtime for two days and then we would catch up. That worked well, but then when we were back in the flat, I was on night shift and after collapsing into bed at about 7am, my aunt would come pounding on the door at 9am. "Come on, get up, we have all London to see." I would beg for a bit more sleep and she would say "Nonsense, you young things can manage without much sleep". So I

would prop open my tired eyelids and sally forth to show off London to my dear Aunt Jean.

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Gibble Gabble Gobble

Rachel has done it again! At Buckley's of Dunolly last Saturday, the Melba Room was set-up for the Chamber Opera **Gibble**, **Gabble**, **Gobble** - a story of four school friends meeting again after 40 years at their school reunion.

The four performers are: Rachel as Tatiana aka Tizzy, soprano; Janet Brown as Theresa aka Tess, mezzo soprano; John Clancy as Sam, baritone and David Stephensen as Carlo, tenor. Alice Carpenter played the young prefect welcoming past students to the reunion, and David Steele was the piano accompanist. The libretto is by Chester Eagle and the score by Christopher J Wilson.

The story is set in the assembly hall of the fictional Grantham Grange Grammar where guests imbibe on cocktails while waiting for the dinner gong to sound. The four singled each other out; they were inseparable friends during school, but had lost touch as each one went about their own lives.

Hesitantly at first, dwelling on past reminiscences and the obligatory "do you remember", or "whatever happened to...." the four finally open up to share some deeply personal experiences, issues which will ring a bell with many.

I was reminded of my own school reunion. The stories were different, but the way in which the four portrayed them would resonate with most people - hesitancy, poignancy, anger, futility, remorse, even shame. All emotions that we experience in life and, more often than not, keep secret. And here with friends from so long ago, they were finally able to let loose and unburden themselves.

The libretto is well-written, but the credit should go to the cast who improvised much of the opera as there were no clear guidelines as to how it should be played. This goes to show the professionalism of Rachel and the others (although music is their passion, not their employment) who devised the structure of the play.

I think chamber opera is a difficult method of song as basically you are talking to music, with little in the way of musical structure. The diction has to be perfect and make sense while the voice rises and falls to show the emotion behind it.

Saturday's show was a preview for the world-premier performance at the Capitol. Theatre in Bendigo on Sunday.

Reminder - Train Coming to Dunolly

This **Saturday**, **13th October**, a train will be coming to Dunolly as part of an effort to put pressure on political parties coming up for election to honour their policies and commitment to extend the Maryborough passenger service to Dunolly. The service to Dunolly was closed in October 1981 by the Hamer Liberal Government under the *New Deal* timetable for regional Victoria., which consigned country residents to a cramped, inferior and inefficient coach service that still runs today.

The reintroduction of Dunolly to the Regional Rail Network will establish the town as a destination again and provide the townspeople with connection and improved mobility and a positive impact to the town's economy , cultural and social events, and tourism.

The train will arrive in Dunolly at 11.58am and depart 12.46pm. This will give passengers a brief period to view Dunolly and have some lunch at local businesses.

Locals are encouraged to go to the rail station to meet and greet.

The cost of the full trip Newport to Dunolly return is \$120; half trip \$80 and single sections \$30. Bookings are essential . Phone Noel Laidlaw 0448 568 429.

CREAMY CHICKEN POTATOES DIJON

A quick, easy and very impressive dinner dish.

Ingredients

- 6 medium potatoes
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 25g butter
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 2-3 cloves garlic, crushed (I teaspoon)
- 2 double chicken breasts, boneless, skinless and sliced into thin
- 1 tablespoon parsley, chopped
- 1 cup cream
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

salt and freshly ground black pepper

1/2 cup tasty cheese

Method

Pre-heat oven to 200°C.

- 1. Grease a shallow ovenproof dish.
- Slice potatoes thinly, then boil in a saucepan of boiling water for 10 minutes until just tender.
- 3. Heat oil and butter in a frypan, add onion and garlic and fry for 3 - 4 minutes until softened. Add chicken and fry until browned.
- Stir in the parsley, cream and mustard, then season well with salt and pepper.
- 5. Spread half the potatoes in the dish. Spoon over the chicken mixture, cover with remaining potatoes. Sprinkle the top with cheese.
- 6. Bake for 20-25 minutes until crisp and golden.




