I can't think why I didn't get a train there but it seems I had made up my mind so Elsa's father drove me out of the city to a likely spot to get a ride.

I had to walk a fair way before someone finally stopped. It was a smartly dressed businessman in a big sleek car. I felt a bit worried after I accepted and climbed in next to the driver but he was a perfect gentleman and took me as far as his turn off. Once more I took to the road and along came a little farm truck filled with hay and driven by a young rosy cheeked lad, with stiff blond hair, wearing work overalls. He seemed a very safe bet and I got in without a second thought. As we had no common language, I used my phrase book to communicate and explain why I was on the road alone. After a while my little farm boy turned off into a side road and stopped the truck. He then asked for my phrase book and after riffling through a few pages he found the word "you", then looked for another page and showed me "kiss" and then "me".

In a single action I grabbed my bag, opened the truck door and ran with the farm boy's giggly laughter following me up the road. Phew, I thought, I certainly didn't see that coming.

I then decided to stop at the first bed and breakfast or similar place to stay the night as it was now getting late. I walked for miles and it grew dark and there were very few houses to be seen. Then out of nowhere I saw a light twinkling on a hill and on the road a sign saying in English "Welcome Inn". A miracle. When I staggered in the door I was warmly greeted by the proprietors and how comforting it was to be given a hot meal and a warm bed. In the morning I met some other young travellers, two of whom, a German duo, who had been in the same predicament as me, in that they had given up on finding a stop- over for the night until they came upon the Welcome Inn. ## **A Tanberg Tribute**

In his excellent tribute to Ron Tandberg last week, Brian Burbridge referred to a cartoon donated by Ron, which was auctioned here in Dunolly at a "Save Dunolly Hospital" fundraiser. As a fan of Ron's incisive and amusing contributions to The Age, I attended the auction intending to obtain the work. I was the winning bidder and the framed artwork, occupies pride of place in my home. I also won things I hadn't intended to win - a guided tour (thoroughly enjoyed), of the Tarnagulla Poverty Mine decline, for instance!

At the time of the auction, Ginny the escaped elephant, and the Victorian government's decision to log old-growth forests, were both prominently covered in the media. Ron brilliantly combined both issues in his cartoon in which Ginny was caught because there was no forest left in which she could hide!

No obfuscating politician was safe from Ron's cutting humour. One cartoon that springs to mind is a two-drawing offering - in panel one a small child asks his father, "Dad, what's a tosser?" His father replies, "You'll know one when you see one!" Drawing two is wordless and shows the child pointing to Tony Abbott on the TV screen as his dad nods approvingly. # Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan adopted

At an Ordinary Meeting of Central Goldfields Shire Council, the Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan 2017-2021 was adopted.

Central Goldfields Shire Council Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said the four-year plan aims to improve health and wellbeing in the municipality.

"The Plan provides Council with a strategic approach to local public health planning and aims to protect and improve the public health and wellbeing of our local community.

"It outlines a Plan for how Council will work towards achieving maximum health and wellbeing for the municipality over the next four years."

The Plan was informed through a community consultation process which involved

Central Victoria Primary Care Partnership, Asteria Services, Maryborough District Health services, Go Goldfields team, Women's Health Loddon Mallee, and Department of Health and Human Services (VIC).

### Murray Basin Rail project update

The Ararat to Maryborough line has reopened for driver training. The reopening of the 87-kilometre rail corridor more than a decade after the last train rolled through follows an intensive works program.

Over the past six months, work crews have laid more than 130,000 concrete sleepers, distributed almost 200,000 tonnes of ballast and used 7,600 tonnes of steel rail. With trains returning, we ask the community to be aware of trains operating and to take care around level crossings.

## Car Boot Sale Saturday 10th February



#### **ICE FOR THE GOLDFIELDS**

Ice in your drink on the goldfields was an expensive luxury as it had to be brought out from the east coast of USA.

It was the Geelong inventor, James Harrison, who first developed a process for making ice in 1851. This led to the first ice-making machine in 1854. He improved his patent in 1855. This was a major Australian invention that often just gets a passing mention in history. He also developed a cooling process for breweries, thus starting a tradition in Australia of drinking cold beer.

By the time of the Dunolly Rush in 1856, Harrison was producing 3 tons of ice per day at his Geelong Factory. His process was expensive and he suffered a lot of buyer resistance from the public who believed pure ice was better than the manufactured product. So for several years ice production competed with imported ice

In northeast USA the first icing of the season occurred in July 1856. The same time as the Dunolly Rush took off. There were two types of ice production in USA. Carvers were sent out to cut off blocks in frozen lakes. There were also farmers who had purpose built containers they filled with water. They could then harvest blocks of ice of consistent size and shape.

They were loaded on the Clasca and packed in sawdust to reduce evaporation. The Clasca left Boston for Melbourne on 8<sup>th</sup> August. Despite being only 658 tons the ship carried 600 tons of ice and eight passengers. Clipper ships were preferred as they were the fastest ships available and could do the trip quicker than any steamship. Their only risk was being caught in the doldrums crossing the equator.

After a four-month voyage the Clasca docked in Port Melbourne in early December 1856. The ice was loaded onto a special train to Flinders St, then taken by cart to the Melbourne Ice Works in Queen St. Here they were able to advertise the first ice shipment for the season. The Melbourne Ice Works delivered in bulk only to the inner suburbs at a rate of 5<sup>d</sup> per lb.

This left a speculative opportunity for the goldfields. Carters could buy blocks of ice then try and make it to Dunolly in three days or less.

At Dunolly the block of ice was jealously guarded by the bartender. He would use an ice pick and break off a chip only for those who paid for it. Ice in your drink was just as expensive as the actual drink. Ice was just as much a status symbol of the decadence of the successful miner as it was for actually cooling a drink down.

#### **MINING NAMES**

Red Streak Lead – This is a common place name at Dunolly and many other goldfields. The term red streak is given to Pliocene leads. Leads from this epoch are rich in iron oxide. These rocks, when rubbed on the skin, leave a red streak.

Smugglers Glen, Mt Moliagul – In the 1850s there was an illicit still hidden in a gully on the north side of Mt Moliagul. It supplied alcohol to the numerous sly grog tents on the goldfields.

Cockatoo Gully, Smugglers Glen – Two miners on their way to Mt Korong in the summer of 1852 followed some cockatoos to find water. They then dug a hole and found gold.

Gibraltar Hill, Craigie – Named because the ground was thought to be as hard as the Rock of Gibraltar.

Majorca — It was named after the Spanish island because of two nearby earlier rushes called Gibraltar and Minorca.

### The Rise And Fall Of Emma Hawkhurst

Emma Hawkhurst was on the crest of a wave; surfing a rising arc; on top of her game. At thirty years of age she was young to be elected Mayor of a regional municipal council but her ambition was boundless. As a successful businesswoman, she aspired to be a real mover and shaker. If recent wins were anything to go by, she was achieving those goals admirably. Emma ensured that she looked the part: crisp linen skirts, sensible shoes and a restrained display of jewellery. Her white Mercedes-Benz E-class Cabriolet sparkled in the sunlight. It was parked in a personal space directly opposite her (contrastingly) austere Council office.

This exciting project will begin to roll out in April and will feature in the Tiny Towns Arts Trail, continuing through to late October with a launch and community celebration.



# Gold discovery still keeping Dunolly Caravan Park busy

The benefits of a significant gold nugget discovery are still reverberating in the Dunolly community, months after the precious metal was discovered.

After a 320gram gold nugget was discovered in the Dunolly goldfields in September last year, the Dunolly Caravan Park is still reaping the benefits of prospectors, who can make up to 94 percent of the park's patronage, flocking to the town.

Prior to the substantial nugget being found, regular prospectors might have stayed up to three weeks – now they're staying for more than a month, caravan park lease holders Peter and Caryl McFadden say.

"A lot of people have seen the piece of gold and it gave them an incentive to go out and try harder," Mr McFadden said. "We've had a lot more people detecting and subsequently, we've had a lot more gold found." Stopping short of calling it a "mini gold rush",

Mr McFadden described the push for gold as a" renewed effort". Our regulars have been going out and staying out longer," he said. While there is "most definitely" gold still out in the goldfields, the McFadden's say prospecting isn't without its challenges. "It is a lot harder.

Twenty years ago, if the guys weren't finding three ounces (85grams) a day, they were having a bad one," Mr McFadden said. "These days, if they're finding anywhere between three and 10 grams, they're having a great day. It's still as popular as ever," he said.

According to Mr McFadden, most of the gold found in Dunolly is within a 15 kilometre radius of the town, or even in Dunolly itself. We had a guy walking down the road with his head down and found a 15 gram piece of gold. We get all sorts of stories like that," Mr Mc Fadden said.




