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
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Commonwealth Acts old books

#### **CAMP**

Our camping program at Dunolly PS involves a 4 year rotation of locations starting with students in year 3. Over their time from year 3 – 6 students experience adventure type camps in bush settings at Malmsbury and Creswick for 2 nights/3 days, a city experience in Melbourne, and a beach experience at Queenscliff for 4 nights/5 days. Camps are seen as an integral part of the school curriculum and all students are expected to attend. They enable students to explore, extend and enrich their learning and their social skills development, in a non-school setting. Why all students are expected to attend camps and what are the benefits:

- To provide shared class and year level experiences, team building and a sense of group cohesiveness.
- To reinforce and extend classroom learning.
- To provide a program that delivers skills and knowledge that may lead to a lifelong involvement in worthwhile leisure pursuits.
- To provide a program that promotes self-esteem, resourcefulness, independence, leadership judgement, cooperation and tolerance.
- To further develop their problem solving and life survival skills
- To extend understanding of their physical and cultural environment

Teachers support students' many and varied needs to enable them to achieve success. We work with families who might have financial constraints and students who may have medical concerns such as bed wetting. Staff are highly professional and discreet in ensuring all students can attend.

#### **SUCCESS STORIES**

There are always many success stories from camps. From the student who was overwhelmed and very emotional about getting on the bus to five minutes later smiling and being relaxed, and now hasn't looked back and is having an amazing time. We have had two students who were very reluctant to have a go at surfing off the side of the boat. Miss Holding supported those students and gave them great encouragement to have a go. Through this support they gave way to their fears and had a go. They now have a great sense of achievement with a comment of 'Miss Holding I can't believe I conquered my fear of the ocean!'

What a great character building and self-esteem boosting time for our students!

#### **SNAKE SEASON**

With the warm weather now here snakes are becoming more active and a lot more visible.

Eastern Brown Snakes are most common in our region with the occasional Tiger Snake or Red Bellied Black Snake usually found around wetlands, creeks and rivers.

Some key points to remember about living in or visiting an area with snakes:

- 1. When left alone, snakes present little or no danger to people.
- 2. If you see a snake, keep calm and move yourself and anyone with you (including pets) away from the area.
- 3. Don't attempt to capture or harm snakes.
- 4. Maintain lawns and clean up around your house, as snakes are attracted to shelter such as piles of rocks and timber, sheets of metal, and building materials.
- Undertake first-aid training and ensure your first aid kit contains several compression bandages, and if someone is bitten, call 000 immediately.

If you encounter a snake, contact DELWP on 136 186 and they will put you in touch with your nearest snake catcher.

#### PHILLIPS GARDENS PUBLIC TOILET UPGRADE

Renovation works at the public toilets in Phillips Gardens will commence on Monday 5th November.

The works will be carried out by Council's Building and Maintenance team and will mean the public toilet facilities will be closed for two weeks. The nearest public toilets are located in Clarendon Street, opposite the Maryborough Courthouse and also the Woolworths Car Park.

# Fire cabin installed in time for fire season

A new fire observer cabin has been set atop the Mt Tarrengower lookout tower in Maldon, just in time for the start of what is expected to be an above average fire season.

As part of the \$1.2 million project undertaken by the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning (DELWP) to upgrade the Fire tower, project officer Fire Towers and Airbases, Andrew Johnstone, said the sixtonne cabin went into position as planned last week and is expected to be operational within the next two weeks. "It took 20 minutes for project contractor, JC Butko Engineering to lift the cabin into position, including adjusting the top of the frame to ensure it fit securely, then it was welded into place," Mr Johnstone said.

"Now the cabin is fixed in place, work is continuing on the internal fit out including installing power and vital communications systems."

DELWP is undertaking the work to ensure the cabin meets health and safety standards as well as improving amenity and safety for visitors to the lookout, Mr Johnstone said.

"The new cabin will provide improved working conditions for the fire tower observer who can spend up to 10 hours a day in the cabin over the summer "he said."

The new cabin looks quite similar to the old one but is slightly bigger, has larger windows with UV protection and better access for the fire tower observer. Instead of the fire tower observer entering the cabin via a trapdoor in the floor, entry will he via the walkway, around the cabin.

"The project also includes removing the old lead-



based paint from the tower, undertaking some structural repairs then repainting the tower.

"After the cabin is operational, the contractors will complete the works on the tower structure including replacing the ladders that connect each level and replacing three viewing platforms.

"Scaffolding will be removed in stages as the tower works are completed.

"Once structural work is completed, we're on the home stretch and the contractors will do minor touch ups to paint work and then final checks.

"The entire Mt Tarrengower Tower refurbishment project is estimated to be completed and open to the public by Christmas, weather permitting."

This tower upgrade is part of the Reducing Bushfire Risk program that further reduces risk on public land by supporting early detection and rapid suppression of fires through fuel management, up-grading fire towers, building new bridges and improving roads.






