Upon venturing into the Op Shop on any Tuesday, a hive of activity is obvious, with the happy group of volunteers busily sorting the donations which have arrived over the weekend. At both morning tea and lunch time, a large gathering around the table provides a convivial atmosphere where customers and friends are often invited to partake of tea or coffee, together with a range of home-made and other delicacies. Thursdays and Fridays are often slightly less busy, but the friendly welcome still prevails.

With our increased consciousness of the need to reduce waste, the role op shops play in communities is not only

increasing in importance, but also changing focus. The traditional role of providing venues for quality donations to be passed on to new owners at reasonable cost, whilst at the same time raising funds for charity, still remains. New clientele however, wishing to create their own individual style, produce fabulous upcycled fashion items from vintage clothing, blankets and fabric found in op shops. Also, in recent years, a new market has emerged where shops have seen a surge of mostly younger buyers looking to find that 'vintage or retro piece' like their parents or grandparents owned. This is evident by the Facebook groups with many thousands of members, solely dedicated to sharing their op shop 'finds' with others. Of course, books have always been popular in op shops but with a trend back to the 'old-style' of reading, as opposed to digital, many shops are noticing an increasing demand. These, together with other growing trends, have now made op shops the 'in' places to visit.





Our Dunolly Op Shop, after many years of operation, is still a favourite with regulars and newcomers retaining its old-fashioned customer service and ambience. Its value in providing a social hub for the volunteers and customers also cannot be overstated; some relying solely on their visit or roster day for their weekly social interaction.

The Op Shop is open every Tuesday from 9.00am to 2.00pm plus Thursday and Friday from 10.00am to 4.00pm; the monthly Car Boot Sales on the second Saturday of each month are also popular.

As always, visitors, customers, new volunteers and donations will be welcomed with open arms.

Yesterday the ducks from next door were going home from the dam and swooped in on the food. Never let a chance go by! They can eat a lot quicker than the other birds, who were most put out.

I hear that East Geelong is being referred to as South Dunolly because of residents fleeing down there from the heat.

It must be a form of cabin fever from not being able to do things outside because of the heat, but I was attacked by the urge to clean out my sewing cabinet. It is one of those Horn cabinets with all sorts of nooks and crannies. There were several reels of thread of course, my "good" scissors, a brush for dusting the works of the machine, bobbins, pinking shears, tape measure, a hole punch and odd buttons. That was only the top container inside the door — there are two more of them equally full of good stuff — and then there's the actual body of the cabinet to be excavated. More next week, I think.

There's a lot happening behind the scenes at the Ministry of Fun, in preparation for a series of workshops leading up to the 'Tiny Towns Arts Trail', and the public sculpture project with Deborah Halpern in terms 2 & 3.

Deborah has created many of Melbourne's most loved public sculptures, including 'Angel', who stood outside the National Gallery of Victoria for many years, before having a change of scenery at Birrarung Marr on the banks of the Yarra, and 'Ophelia', who graces the Southbank precinct. Her work is colourful and full of vitality, influenced by Miro, Picasso and Niki de St. Phalle.

Deborah has generously offered to hold an exhibition of her work at the Dunolly Courthouse during April, and will bring a range of media, works on paper and fabric, fused glass, ceramic mosaic, and fibreglass, to show just what she does. It will be really worth seeing!

She is also going to hold workshops to introduce some of these techniques ...the first of which will be over Easter weekend, 31st March & 1st April.... at the Ministry of Fun. We are also having workshops with David Archer from Adelaide, who makes automata, (mechanical sculptures), again leading up to the Arts Trail, in April. Details soon! These have been subsidised by the Regional Centre for Culture, so we are able to offer them at a substantially reduced rate. And there's more! Cookery Corner

Ginger caramel slice

Ingredients

125g butter, chopped 250g packet ginger nut biscuits, halved 395g can sweetened condensed milk 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar

Method

- 1. Grease a 4.5cm-deep, 20cm (base) square cake pan. Line base and sides with baking paper, allowing a 2cm overhang on all sides.
- 2. Melt 75g butter in a saucepan over medium-low heat. Process biscuits until finely chopped. Add butter. Process until combined. Press mixture over base of prepared pan. Cover. Refrigerate for 30 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, place remaining butter, condensed milk and sugar in pan over medium-low heat. Cook, stirring for 10 minutes or until sugar has dissolved. Increase heat to medium. Cook, stirring constantly for 10 minutes or until mixture turns golden and thickens. Pour over prepared base. Set aside for 10 minutes. Cover. Refrigerate for 2 hours or until set.
- 4. Cut into squares. Serve.

NOTE: For a stronger ginger flavour, stir in 1/4 cup chopped glace ginger through the caramel in step 3. You could also serve slice drizzled with melted dark chocolate. Set aside to set before serving. Makes 20

Weed Control Program underway

A Noxious Weed Control Program is underway in the Central Goldfields Shire. Contractors will deliver a program of spraying across nature strips in Maryborough, Carisbrook, Talbot, Dunolly, Majorca, Timor and Bealiba. The program will spray against noxious weeds including Caltrop, Gorse, Blackberry, St John's Wort, Boxthorn, Horehound, Spiny Rush, and Briar Rose. Residents may see a vehicle with a spray tank and contractors with a back pack hand held spray unit in their neighbourhood. Blue marker dye will be painted on the nature strip where spraying has taken place. The chemicals used are safe and there is no cause for residents to be concerned. Some areas will be sprayed a second time, with this stage of spraying works expected to be complete in June. The program is State Government funded - under the Roadside Weeds and Pests Program 2017-19 and the Roadside Weeds and Pests Management Program in Drought Affected Areas 2017 administered by the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning and will include a second stage of works later in 2018. The program of spraying is being delivered as part of the Central Goldfields Shire Roadside Weed Control Plan.

100% immunisation rate for Central Goldfields Shire Central Goldfields Shire has achieved 100 per cent immunity for 60-63 month old children – well above the state average, according to new data released by the Victorian Health Department.

The latest figures from the Australian Childhood Immunisation Register show that 95.3% of five-year-olds are now fully immunised in Victoria — the best immunisation coverage in the state's history. The figures indicate Central Goldfields Shire has reached the 'herd immunity' target, which is necessary to halt the spread of diseases. Central Goldfields Shire Interim CEO Vince Haining said he was thrilled to achieve a 100% success rate for pre-school aged children.

Abandoned tyres form a breeding ground for vermin, tyres can decay and contaminate soil and groundwater, and a tyre fire generates toxic smoke and is difficult to extinguish.

EPA regulations allow storage of waste tyres if you have a genuine use for them, but urges you to dispose of unused waste tyres in landfill or at a recycling facility.






