Following their performances, the crowds would be eager for further glimpses of their idols, watching them enter their Rolls Royce for the short journey down Spring Street to where they were staying at the Windsor Hotel. Upon learning that the Oliviers would oblige their fans and supply autographs, I purchased an autograph book, leaving it at the Princess Theatre for signing. Several days later, after much anticipation, I was able to collect it, complete with both autographs. The book has been one of my most valued possessions since that time'.

In deciding to eventually part company with the book, the suitability of its new home was of major consideration to the lady, with the main concern being that she would prefer it to stay in Australia, hopefully with a private collector to whom its provenance had some meaning.

When I listed the book on eBay, detailing the provenance and knowing it would receive much interest, I could not have foreseen the fact that, within Australia, there was someone who, due to his own personal interest and obsession, was desperate to obtain these particular autographs and was the ideal future custodian. Thankfully, after a spirited bidding war, he was the successful bidder! He then told me the background to his obsession!

During 2006, he had visited the town of Marietta, Georgia in the US, the 'Heart of the South'. During his visit, the more he learned, the more fascinated he became with the history of the Southern States. The friend he was visiting, suggested that if he really wanted to know what the old South was really like, he should watch 'Gone With the Wind'. He had heard of the movie and knew that it featured Clark Gable, but at that stage he had never seen it or heard much about Vivien Leigh. On watching it, although it did not markedly increase his knowledge of the old South by any means, he thoroughly enjoyed the movie and its depiction of an era of 'graciousness and elegance that would never be seen again'. He was also 'captivated by the classic beauty and outstanding acting of Vivien Leigh'. He mentioned that he has now seen the movie many times, but the pleasure of seeing Vivien act the part of Scarlett has never diminished.

Not long afterwards, he became interested in collecting autographs, but only from the early Hollywood era, as he said 'the movies made back then were made for entertainment not just a budget'. As a consequence of his increasing passion, he decided to collect autographs of the principal actors of 'Gone With the Wind', however the international prices for some of these were prohibitive. In the meantime, he had added quite a few autographs to his collection, including two from Laurence Olivier. Despite much searching however, Vivien Leigh's autograph had eluded him up until this time.

At the end of the eBay auction, the gentleman was stunned to learn that he had been fortunate enough to become the new owner of the object of his all-consuming quest, not to mention at a price he considered reasonable. Upon eventually receiving the book, he opened it and as he said 'On the first page was Vivien's signature in fountain pen. It looked magnificent!'

He stated that he was 'completely caught up in the atmosphere created by the provenance!'

As a collector, he could completely identify with the lady's anticipation at being able to obtain the autographs of actors she admired so much. He could also relate to the personal value she placed upon the book, saying that 'already it has become one of my most valued possessions!'

As a postscript to this story, the gentleman informed me that he was aware that the National Library in Canberra had, in 1994, purchased an album containing 500 photographs taken on the occasion of the 1948 tour of Vivien Leigh and Laurence Olivier. He has assured me that his autograph book will never be for sale in his lifetime but that he is intending to leave it, after hopefully enjoying it himself for many years, to the National Library. As he stated, upon his passing, it will complement the album of photographs in the National Library's collection and be kept for posterity.

The local lady was ecstatic that her treasured item had gone to a dedicated collector and was very pleased with the amount it realised. A most desirable outcome for all concerned.

# Mandeville's coming back to life as Madam Chi Chi

Having undergone renovations for some 18 months, Mandeville's Coffee Palace, now Madam Chi Chi, is soon to re-open its doors to the public, ushering in a new era for the historic building as a delicatessen.

Moving to Maryborough more than 10 years ago, owner of Madam Chi Chi, Belinda Fabry, decided she needed something new in life, setting sights on her dream of opening a deli in the town that captivated her heart.

"I came to Maryborough to teach at the Maryborouth Education Centre originally and I've found nothing but a town that just envelops you," she said.

"It came to a time in my life where I felt I needed to have another challenge and I decided to open my own deli, but to do that I needed to go and get some experience and learn those skills.

Ms Fabry said she furthered her dream by spending several years working within the hospitality industry following her teaching career. "Going out and speaking to people and producers face to face is really important in providing people with not just great produce but the story behind it," she said. "There are so many people around who can't wait to tell their story".

Located on the corner of Nolan and Napier streets, the historic building started life as the Yorkshire Hotel in 1863, before becoming Mandeville's Coffee Palace in the latter half of the 1800s.

Ms Fabry said the history visible in the building caught her eye immediately. "When I first saw the building I just fell in love with the space. It's one of those spaces that just calls for people and conversation," she said.

"I wanted to bring the glory of the place back, this space has been calling for the longest time. I've put everything into it and I'm just waiting for the doors to open."

Renovations have included the removal of walls to open the interior space up, the installation of a commercial kitchen and a general facelift for the building's interior.

Ms Fabry said it's important to not only create a social space, but also a place that boasts quality local and imported products. "It was really important to me to create a space that had great food, great wine and great coffee, but I also think it's important to provide quirky homewares and opportunities to come and do different things," she said. "I want people to be able to come here, have good food, catch up with friends and just chill out." Madam Chi Chi is also set to act as a community space, with Ms Fabry planning to host community events such as craft beer tastings, meat smoking Q&A sessions and a mothers' network, all of which are on the horizon.

# Travels with Cynthia

The catalyst that started my series of travel articles was the time when my friends found me a copy of Ram Gopal's autobiography, which I had edited and typed, back in my young travelling days. Writing about and remembering that exciting time of my life, triggered so many long forgotten memories.

Returning to my time with Ram, I recall how he brought out from India a number of dancers and musicians to perform with him at the Edinburgh Festival.

There was one young man, and I still remember his name, Ramdas Shinde, who came from a very primitive village where they still carted water and he had never worn shoes. When he was shown his billet he could not cope sleeping in a proper bed as he had always slept on a straw mat on the floor, so Ram decided to let him sleep on the floor in the rehearsal room, and he was quite happy there. Very soon he was joined by some of the other visiting musicians who also preferred the simpler way of living.

In order to give Ramdas a taste of city living, Ram asked me to take Ramdas to see the African Ballet which was performing in London at the time. He was totally in awe of the big theatre and large audience and became very excited with the dancing and thrilling music. Next thing he started beating in time on the back of the seat in front of him and loudly joining in with "tum, tim, tum, tum tim tum tum"

Oh my God, everyone was turning round, staring and glaring until I was able to restrain him. Of course everyone I told afterwards thought it was hilarious.

After the theatre I decided to take Ramdas to a café for supper. Luckily he was wearing shoes so we went to a trendy place I knew. It's strange, but considering how multicultural London was even then, with large numbers of Jamaicans working on the tubes and in the cafes, we got a lot of stares at a white lady coming in with a very dark Indian. I enjoyed it and asked for a table in the middle to give them all a good look.

The girls I lived with suggested we invite Ramdas for dinner one night so we stupidly decided to make curry to remind him of home, instead of good old English fare. # Shen Yun - A visual spectacular

Last Sunday, Monika and I had an experience that tantalised the visual and audial senses. We went to see the famed Shen Yun Chinese Dance extravaganza.

It was spectacular! The colours of the costumes alone was enough to enliven the senses, but then add the haunting music and the precise, yet graceful dancing, and the mind reeled with the pageantry.

Shen Yun, what does it mean? Shen is a generic term for myriad Buddhist and Taoist divine beings in Chinese spiritualism and Yun means rhythm and conveys a person's whole bearing – i.e., dancing. So put together it means: "Beauty of divine beings dancing in heaven".

Shen Yun was founded in New York in 2006 by followers of the Falun Gong religion whose mission it was to revive the classical Chinese dance style practiced for over 5,000 years, which they claimed was almost destroyed due to violent political campaigns like the Cultural Revolution by the Communist Party of China¹. The stories, handed down for countless generations, focus mostly on religious teachings and morals, and for this reason are not allowed in communist China. However, the rest of us have no such qualms and the troupe performs all over the world.

Each vignette was prefaced by a description both in Chinese and English, so we could understand the storyline.

Included were some comical stories, like the man who becomes pregnant after accidentally drinking from a magical fertility fountain.

As well, the trio of a monkey, a pig man and a sea serpent, which I recall from the old TV show, *Monkey Magic*. In all the stories the religious element was very prominent. The myriad deities descended from heaven to either help or punish the humans.

A very clever system was used to depict the gods coming to earth, or alternatively, the humans rising to heaven. A large video screen was the backdrop, with different scenery according to the story. The dancers then dropped off a ledge at the back of the stage and magically appeared as a computerised version on the screen.

There was also an operatic solo accompanied by a brilliant pianist, and a hauntingly beautiful musical piece played on the traditional erhu, a two-stringed instrument that produces a unique sound.

I recommend this show, but as Sunday was the final performance in Melbourne, you will have to go to Brisbane for the next performance, or wait until the troupe returns next year.

#### Shire records 100 percent immunisation rates again

#### Hard waste collections

In early March, Council will conduct its annual kerbside hard waste collection of metals, recyclables and white goods.

If you live in the township boundaries of Boort, Pyramid Hill, Mitiamo, Dingee, Serpentine, Borung, Wychitella, Korong Vale, Wedderburn, Inglewood, Bridgewater, Newbridge, Tarnagulla, Laanecoorie or Eddington, please place items out on the nature strip on Sunday 3 March 2019. Items should not be placed on the nature strip before 3 March 2019. Council staff will collect and remove these items from Monday 4 March 2019.

For residents in the Logan area, you can deposit hard waste at a collection point located on the Logan Kingower Road opposite the Avoca Forest Hotel on Sunday 3 March.

If you're a Fenton's Creek resident, you can leave hard waste at a collection point located adjacent to the Fenton's Creek Hall on Sunday 3 March.

This hard waste will also be collected and removed starting Monday 4 March 2019.

Items are to be sorted into piles (metal items, recyclable items and white goods). The total volume must not exceed one cubic metre in size. Please note, excessive or unsorted piles will not be collected.

Perishables, tyres, oils, batteries, paints and chemicals, car parts, mattresses, televisions, computers/monitors and garbage will not be picked up.

Any unsuitable items left behind after collections should be removed from your nature strip immediately.

## Community grant applications opening soon

Applications for Council's Community Grants Scheme will open in early March 2019.

Grants of up to \$10,000 are available for not-for-profit clubs and organisations based in the Loddon Shire to deliver projects that directly benefit residents.

The Community Grants Scheme aims to help not-for-profit organisations enhance the provision of activities, facilities or delivery of services to people in our community.

Successful grant applications are funded on a two-to-one basis. This means for every \$2 provided by Council, the successful applicants must contribute a minimum of \$1 towards the cost of the project. Up to 50% of an applicant's contribution can be in-kind.

Council started the scheme to assist recreation, sporting and service organisations to deliver projects that improve the quality of life for residents.

Last year the scheme allocated almost \$142,000 in funding across the Shire, with 26 groups receiving full or partial funding.

Applications for Council's Community Grants Scheme close at 5pm, Wednesday 1 May 2019. Please note, that applications must be submitted online through Smarty Grants. The link will be available on Council's website prior to the grants opening in early March. Support will also be available to assist with the Smarty Grants process. 
