Fiona Lindsay awarded OAM



Dunolly's Fiona Lindsay was recognised for her service to the community on Saturday, where she was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia as part of Australia Day honours.

Over the past 14 years, Ms Lindsay has built a healthy list of local organisations, groups and committees she's been involved in, but said her move to Dunolly was an "accident".

"We were looking to move to the country and central Victoria was an area we were familiar with and liked very much," Ms Lindsay said.

"We were looking around and thought we'd be building a house and happened to see this place when it was looking so sad in February 2004, in the middle of the drought."

Ms Lindsay said the house, a two-storey Georgian building, is what sparked it all for her.

"We immediately embarked on restoring the house, so the project became a gateway into meeting people," she said. "Moving to Dunolly was a happy accident."

Through working on the house Ms Lindsay said she and her late husband became close friends with the architect and things really kicked off from there.


"I was invited to chair the planning group for the Dunolly 150th anniversary and that was a fantastic way of getting to meet different people and community groups. That's where it all started for me in Dunolly," she said.

"I'm quite comfortable in a coordinating role and I suppose it's really about stimulating groups, it's not about the detail of the meeting procedure. It's about facilitating a project to take on the next step."

Over the past 14 years Ms Lindsay has held various roles including president of the Dunolly Historic Precinct Committee, chair of the Rural Transaction Centre, president of Dunolly and District Inc., president of the Northern Goldfields Tourism Association, chair of Dunolly Hospital Auxiliary and has been involved with the Maryborough District Health Service for eight years.

Despite her community involvement, Ms Lindsay said she was both humbled and surprised by the award. "It was a great surprise. I said to some people when I first saw the email 'oh this must be a scam, this is ridiculous'," she said. "I'm very happy to receive this award. I've always been an active member of committees, so the achievements I've received recognition for are certainly those of the people with whom I work. "It's a shared recognition of how things have been improving and changing in Dunolly. "It's all about recognising the work people do — the work of the whole community keeps the wheels turning. "My colleagues in the different committees deserve thanks, this award reflects the work we've all done. I think we work well as teams."

Residents urged to use common sense during Western Victoria's extreme heat

An alarming number of children have been rescued from hot cars in Western Victoria, prompting Labor MP Jaala Pulford to issue a new warning for people to take care of each other in the heat.

New figures show between 1 September 2017 and 31 August 2018, paramedics responded to dozens of calls to people locked in vehicles in Western Victoria, including:

- 45 in Ballarat
- 8 in Moorabool Shire
- 3 in Horsham
- · 3 in Southern Grampians Shire
- 3 in Ararat Rural City
- · 2 in Central Goldfields Shire
- 1 in Northern Grampians Shire

With another hot day forecast today, the Andrews Government is promoting the Never Leave Kids in Cars and Survive the Heat campaigns.

Ms Pulford said the Never Leave Kids in Cars campaign warns parents about the dangers of leaving children in hot cars where they are at great risk of life-threatening heatstroke, dehydration and organ damage.

"The temperature inside a car can double in just minutes in extreme conditions and a child's body temperature rises three to five times faster than an adult's," Ms Pulford said.

"While taking your child with you may seem like an inconvenience, leaving them in the car is risking their life," she said

Extreme heat kills more people in Australia than any other natural disaster and can affect anybody. During the 2009 heatwave, the number of deaths in Victoria was 374 more than under normal conditions and almost 80 per cent of those deaths were people over 65.

Simple steps to stay safe during heatwaves include: Drinking more water by taking small sips from a drink bottle throughout the day

Keeping cool and seeking out air-conditioned buildings Planning ahead and scheduling activities in the coolest part of the day

Looking out for most vulnerable – this might be your neighbour living alone or the elderly.

Ms Pulford said people at the highest risk of heat exhaustion include people aged over 65, people with a preexisting medical condition, pregnant and breastfeeding mothers and babies and young children.

"We want the people of Western Victoria to be smart this summer – stay cool, drink water and look out for each other, especially children, the elderly and those with medical conditions," Ms Pulford said.

Finally, it was an honour to preside over two citizenship ceremonies on the day, which coincided with the Australia Day celebrations. The first ceremony took place at the Eddington Australia Day breakfast, and the second that evening at the Pyramid Hill Australia Day celebrations.

Events highlight our Loddon River

As summer continues, the natural beauty of our Loddon River at Bridgewater remains a highlight, not just through the many recreational activities on the river, but also through major events.

This includes the recent Australian Masters Water Ski Championships, hosted by the Bridgewater Water Ski Club (and featuring some of Australia's best competitors), as well as the 16th Annual Bridgewater Triathlon and Duathlon this Sunday 3 February.

Works are continuing to take place along the foreshore as part of Stage 1 of the Bridgewater Foreshore Project, including the laying of turf and installation of the irrigation system.

Further works will see the installation of shelters and seating, and interpretive signage along the foreshore.

This first stage of the project has been made possible thanks to \$300,000 from Regional Development Victoria and \$100,000 from Loddon Shire Council.

Council has applied for funding for Stage 2 of the Bridgewater Foreshore Development project, which includes the construction of a boardwalk and viewing platforms.

This application is part of the broader funding package submitted with our Victorian and New South Wales counterparts to the Federal Government's Regional Growth Fund.

In addition to the Bridgewater Foreshore Stage 2, the package includes upgrades for the Wedderburn, Pyramid Hill and Boort caravan parks.

Heat wave conditions in Victoria and interventions by the Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO) have again reinforced the need for stabilising policy in the energy market. The Australian Energy Council's Chief Executive Sarah McNamara said that all parts of the energy system are put under stress during extended periods of high temperatures. "This is probably the biggest test we've had since the Hazelwood and Northern power stations closed, and it highlights the fact that we could use more reliable supply in the market.

"A significant amount of preparation went into planning for this summer. Generators and the market operator should be congratulated for doing everything they can to avoid power blackouts. "Record temperatures in South Australia followed by heatwave conditions in Victoria today stretched the system to its limits and required AEMO to step in to maintain electricity supply. "This is not the way a 21st century grid should operate. "But the situation we are in could have been avoided. The fact is that, without a national climate and energy policy, such as the National Energy Guarantee, would-be investors can't make investment decisions to build replacement generation. "We need a guiding policy to provide that investor confidence, so we can ensure that we have enough generation ready to go when it's most needed. The NEG remains the best option for this purpose and a viable way forward."

Travels with Cynthia

When I first started reminiscing about my younger travelling days, I wrote about my arrival in

England and staying with my aunt and Grand-mama in Brighton. The house which she had repainted blue from grey to banish anxious worries was where Aunt Frances moved after Grandpapa died . Previously the family had lived in an ancient old house in Thames Ditton in Surrey. Aunt Frances was a single lady after her fiancée was killed in the Second World War, so she decided to open a school at the Lodge on the property for - wait for it - "children of the gentry", teaching them piano, painting and embroidery. It sounds like something out of Jane Austen, does it not. I have a photo of her standing outside her little school, accompanied by some of her "genteel" pupils.

Years later, when I met Aunt Frances I found her to be an adventurous lady, willing to tackle new things. By then she would have been in her sixties. She decided to go swimming with me, which I have already mentioned in a previous article. She had never learned to drive but had always wanted to, so she hired a car for me to drive her and Grand-mama and Auntie Madge, who also lived in Brighton, all over the county and beyond. One day we went to Worthing on the coast to visit a friend and her sister. I immediately decided I wanted that house and wished I could have bought it. I was still at the stage of reading the romantic classics so this house held immediate appeal. It was an old three-storey stone dwelling built right on the edge of the cliffs and in winter the wild seas lashed against the walls and waves hit the windows shutting out the light. I would have loved that.

My aunts would have liked me to stay on and offered to buy me a car so we could all go touring. Although I was living in London I went regularly to Brighton for weekend visits, and the idea appealed but so did the drawcards of family and home in dear old Aussie.

Brighton has some lovely architecture and grand hotels, once known as the venue for the boss and secretary's naughty weekends, but they still had the Potted Palm tea lounges and tea dances in the afternoons and of course the famous Brighton Pier with the magnificent pavilion at the end. I believe this building was partly destroyed by fire a few years ago and the concert hall fell into the sea; however it was planned to reconstruct it to resemble the original structure.

After I returned home to Melbourne I received a letter from Ruby Popplewell, my aunt's Worthing- by- the sea friend, to tell me my aunt had bought a car and after four failed driving tests had finally received her driving licence. Ruby told me she took her life in her hands every time my aunt took her for a spin. Apparently it really was a spin as aunt whizzed round comers far too fast and drove at great speed with her passenger hanging on for dear life.

Dear old Aunt Frances!


