## **Crouch Fishing Reel** — Part 2

A brief history of the Crouch Fishing Reel as written by Arthur Crouch in December 2015

There were some advantages to this arrangement and some obvious disadvantages. The main advantage was a ready supply of good quality reliable workers and much of our success over the following 10 to 15 years was due to them.

The main disadvantage was of course the long distance away from Melbourne, both for travelling and for expensive long distance telephone calls.

The fishing reel business began to boom and raw material supplies began to become more readily available and to be of better quality. This enabled us to build a very robust fishing reel. By selecting the best aluminium alloys and developing the best manufacturing methods, we were able to make a spool which was very strong and yet still quite light. This is a very important feature of the Crouch reel - the spool has to be light enough so that you can cast directly off the spool and still retain control of the revolving spool with a finger tip. We took great pride in the quality of the reels we were making and I believe we developed a good reputation for quality and service. This was due in no small measure to my father's background in clock making and to instilling in us, his sons, an interest in all things mechanical. And we were all pretty keen on fishing as well. At one time we decided to try and market a fishing rod which would be of a most suitable length and stiffness to suit casting with a Crouch reel. We did make a batch of 250 split cane rods, but we found the process to be very labour intensive and we decided to leave it to the specialists like J. M. Turville and Jarvis Walker. I used a Turville split cane rod for years which had been made to suit the Crouch reel.

After several years, about 1953, my eldest brother decided to leave the business and in 1958 my next older brother decided to leave also. My father and I carried on the business with about four employees until January 1960 when my father died from heart problems, aged 69. He had lived a very full and active life and had involved himself in many other civic activities and charities in the district

At this time I decided that as we had been experiencing a drop in sales over the last couple of years, that it was time to bring out a new model of the Crouch reel. I thought it was time we acknowledged that there are quite a few left handed anglers in the world, and in about 1962 we introduced the "Crouch 77" reel to cater for both right handed and left handed winders.

Let's stop calling this project anything except what it is. Works of art inspired by Deborah and whether or not that brings tourists to the town is yet to be seen.



Windows 7 was released on 22 July 2009.

After January 14, 2020, Microsoft will no longer provide security updates and support for PCs with Windows 7. If you continue to use Windows 7 after support has ended, your PC will still work, but it may become more vulnerable to security risks.

This means, YES, your computer and applications will continue to work just fine. However, over time support and availability for regularly updated applications such as Adobe Reader and Anti-Virus/Malware applications will fall away. Other products affected will include things like printers as manufacturers stop writing drivers to support them under Windows 7. Older, existing devices will continue to function just fine, but new devices may or may not work on Windows 7.

There is a lot of fear, uncertainly and doubt over this, with some re-sellers actively promoting the idea your computer and operating system (Windows 7) will some how magically stop working. It won't. It will continue to work just as it always has, with the possible exception of new software as mentioned.

Yes, we will continue to support machines with Windows 7 within the limitations of no support from Microsoft or hardware manufacturers. In fact for the last 12 months we have encountered an increasing number of new computers which simply will not run Windows 7. This is simply because of new hardware with no drivers from the manufacturers

Yes, we still support old machines with old operating systems. Windows XP, Vista, Windows 8, we even have a couple of Windows 98 machines we still support, although these are single function, non-internet machines. Are you more likely to get malware because you are using an older operating system? Well, yes and no. Yes, because the anti-virus vendors will drop support for Windows 7. No, because no matter what operating system you use whether it is Windows, Linux, MacOS, Apple IOS or Android, there will always be someone writing malware for it, and yes, Apple Mac does get malware infections.

#### When should you upgrade?

If you use the Internet extensively, whether for general browsing or business, probably sooner, rather than later. Will the banks be supportive if you're scammed after January and still using Windows 7? Hmmm, maybe, maybe not.

There is still a free upgrade (no licence cost) to Windows 10 for computers using Windows 7 or Windows 8. The upgrade is not advertised by Microsoft, but it is still available.

If you aren't sure if your computer will run Windows 10 adequately and it is already running Windows 7, the chances are it will run Windows 10 just fine.

We are more than happy to provide some free advice on whether a particular computer will run Windows 10.

Update from Central Goldfields Ratepayers & Residents Assn Inc.

The meeting was held at Carisbrook Senior Citizens Hall Tuesday 12th November 2019 with 29 in attendance, opening at 7.30pm.

Issues raised were:

- The Airport decision by Administrators to de register the CASA Accreditation — Met with unanimous concern as to how a decision was made with the amount of invalidated information, lack of public consultation and lack of knowledge on new CASA regulations.
- Dunolly Arts Placement. We only addressed the actual placement of the pieces on Broadway decision. A unanimous decision was to oppose them and pending decisions announced in the coming days, our direction on action will await that. Again concerns regarding public consultation and neglect of heritage policy.
- 3. Carisbrook Flood western levy update. We received a notice from Snr Administrator Mr Noel Harvey prior to the meeting. An application will be submitted with plans for the building of the western levee in the coming week. Happy, relief and wait and see was the general response on that. Well done on the announcement.
- The 2018/19 annual council report This report highlighted some issues which raised management and performance concerns, this will be watched very closely.
- 5. Public consultation and council's ability to meet their own Service Charter This was met with very much concern. This is an issue which needs to be addressed and improved immediately.
- 6. Listening posts Not minuted, no annual report and no report on any issues raised at these meetings. The CEO promised updates and reports in the annual report. Again as for public consultation and service charter, satisfactory information or public notification not adequate.
- 7. Planning department staff turn over and assistance from this department There were two positive stories, just about every other participant stated it was far from good enough. This will be monitored very closely.
- 8. Executive and key management wages Looking at the figures in the annual report. There was huge concern as to now two years passed, an improvement should be seen and it is not apparent. Concern about targets being met to achieve that actual designated wage.
- 9. CGR&RAI have decided to affiliate with Ratepayers Vic and investigate joining Ratepayers Australia.

Next meeting at Maryborough Hub Burns St Maryborough Tuesday 3rd December 2019 7.30pm.

## Local sport set to score from VicHealth funding

There are more opportunities for people in Western Victoria to get fit and healthy with a number of local sporting clubs sharing in over \$737,000 in funding from VicHealth for sports clubs across the state.

Through VicHealth's funding, local sports clubs have created more opportunities for women and girls to get active by offering new female teams or programs, and providing facilities and equipment to ensure clubs can grow with their community.

The grants will also support clubs to introduce social, flexible and accessible sports programs to empower more people in the community to give sport a go regardless of their ability, gender or cultural background.

Building on the success of VicHealth's This Girl Can – Victoria campaign, 50 clubs across Victoria will also receive funding to promote active lifestyles as part of a state-wide movement to get more women active.

The Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said she was excited to see more activities, teams and opportunities for less active people in the community to get involved in sport.

"Active Club Grants help to create more fantastic opportunities for people of all ages, genders and abilities to get active and enjoy the benefits of a healthy lifestyle and I'm pleased that clubs in Horsham, Wedderburn, Casterton Lake Bolac and Merino have been successful in this round of funding," Ms Pulford said.

The grants include:

- \$2,070 for Casterton Croquet Club to introduce allabilities croquet.
- \$2,750 for Glenelg Pony Club (Merino) for a dressage program to encourage more women to participate in equestrian sports.
- \$1,544 for Horsham Sunnyside Bowling Club for a program to attract younger participants.
- \$2,995 for Lake Bolac and District Bowling Club for social bowls nights for older participants.
- \$1,289 for Lake Bolac and District Little Athletics for a program to develop the motor skills of young participants.
- \$2,710 for Loddon Darts Association to introduce more opportunities for women to play darts.

VicHealth CEO Dr Sandro Demaio said Active Club Grants have supported hundreds of clubs across Victoria to get more people in their community moving in new ways. "We're thrilled to be able to support local sport clubs in [electorate] to provide more opportunities for the community to get active through a sport they enjoy," Dr Demaio said.






## Council's fire season preparations well underway

Central Goldfield Shire Council's preparation for the upcoming fire season is well underway with roadside slashing commencing mid-October.

Due to substantial growth, the Carisbrook area was one of the first to be completed.

Council is currently slashing the northern areas of the Shire around Moliagul, Bealiba and Archdale.

Once these areas are complete, Council will begin to slash the southern areas of the Shire.

An additional slasher is currently in the Maryborough and Timor areas before moving to Daisy Hill and Majorca.

It is expected the Talbot area will be slashed by the end of this week.

Council is co-ordinating its fire prevention methods with neighbouring shires to help ensure the community's safety and following the distribution of pre-season fire prevention notices in October, it is essential community members reduce fire hazards on and around their properties.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said that slashing is an important part of Council's preparations for the fire season.

"Slashing is a key part of Council's approach to the fire season. By minimising the amount of growth in and around our townships, we are helping to protect our communities this summer."

The main changes were to key the spool to the centre spindle so that it would not come unscrewed when wound the "wrong" way, to change the gear lever so that it would still be in the most convenient position whichever way the reel was used, and to place the finger hole at the top close to the saddle. Also to overcome the problem, which sometimes happened, of the side plate thread corroding and making the side plate difficult to remove. I made the two side plates out of a water resistant grade of Nylon. The new reel was very well accepted and sales increased markedly over the next few years. However after about 1966, sales started to get slower and the market was being flooded with cheap imported reels, so it became clear that there was a big disadvantage being so far from Melbourne.

With the warmer weather at hand and Christmas approaching, I just want to take the opportunity to remind residents about requirements for safety barriers around swimming pools and spas.

Safety barriers must be constructed around all swimming pools and spas that can hold more than 30cm (300mm) of water, to restrict access to the pool area by young children. This also applies to inflatable, wading and portable pools. Swimming pool and spa owners have a legal obligation to ensure that they maintain the effective operation of swimming pool and spa safety barriers.

Drowning is the most common cause of preventable death for children under five in Victoria, and pool barriers can help save lives.

On average, four young children die in Victoria in home swimming pools or spas every year and many more experience near-drownings.

## Did you know

Thinking of summer approaching is also a good time to check barbeque safety. Did you know that last summer there were over 100 dangerous barbeque fires involving LP gas cylinders in Victoria? Some of those fires turned into house fires, resulting in serious burns and damage to family homes.

So to stay safe, 'know the drill before you grill'. This means check your gas connection with soapy water to make sure there are no leaks. If no bubbles appear, it is safe to use. You can't refill an LP gas cylinder that hasn't been tested for over 10 years or if it has been damaged. Always exchange a cylinder at a reputable supplier. FDP for Macedon Ranges and Central Goldfields

The Fire Danger Period will begin at 1am on Monday, 25 November 2019 for the following municipalities in CFA's Loddon Mallee Region:

- ♦ Central Goldfields Shire Council
- Macedon Ranges Shire Council

The Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for Southern Australia released in late August identified potential for above normal bushfire activity across the coastal and foothill forests of East Gippsland, and there's also a growing risk north of the divide extending into south east New South Wales.

A warm and dry outlook also carries some risk that ash forests in the central highlands and Otways may dry out faster and become more flammable than normal during summer. Across the rest of Victoria, normal bushfire activity is expected, but CFA reminds Victorians that even an average fire season in the state can be a bad one.

CFA District 2 Operations Manager Bill Johnstone said the grass and bush are dry across the region and the fire potential is further increased by the warmer weather.

"Any rainfall we have experienced in spring will have produced growth, which could very easily become a high fuel load throughout the summer season if not properly managed," Mr Johnstone said.

"Reducing fuel loads will ensure that if a fire does break out, it has less chance of taking hold or spreading."

"While CFA and its partner agencies Parks Victoria, Forest Fire Management, and Emergency Management Victoria are doing everything we can to prepare for the bushfire season, we look to the community to use common sense and take responsibility for preventing fires."

Mr Johnstone said there was still a short window of opportunity to clean up your property if you haven't already done so. "People need to be aware that if using fire to clean up around their properties they need to register these on 1800 668 511. So far this year, out-of-control burn-offs and unregistered burn-offs have already caused unnecessary call-outs for brigades," Mr Johnstone said.

"You should not burn off when winds are high or high winds are forecast – not only on the day of your burn but for the days afterwards.

"For information about burn-off restrictions specific to your area, consult your local council."

Once the FDP comes into effect, CFA has a zero-tolerance approach to any fires that have started from negligent behaviour.

"Expect any fire you start to be fully investigated by CFA and Victoria Police," he said.

CFA does issue permits for a certain situations during the FDP. There are very strict conditions attached to these permits and the liability sits with the permit holder to ensure they always act safely.

During the Fire Danger Period (FDP) fires cannot be lit in the open air without a written permit from CFA or a Municipal Fire Prevention Officer. FDPs are based on local conditions and take into account fuel moisture, fuel loads, grassland curing, weather and rainfall.

Fire Danger Period information and restrictions are published at cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/ restrictions-during-the-fire-danger-period. Please note that the latest restrictions will be published on this page the Tuesday before they come into force.

Victorians can find out "Can I or Can't I?" information at cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can or by calling VicEmergency Hotline on 1800 226 226. All burn-offs should be registered with the VicFire Burn-off notification line on 1800 668 511.

Fire Danger Period information:

- A written permit is required to burn off grass, undergrowth, weeds or other vegetation during the FDP. This permit may be issued by the Municipal Fire Prevention Officer or the CFA District Office. Please check with your municipality in the first instance.
- Lighting a fire in the open without a permit is an offence and can bring a penalty of over \$19,000 and/or 12 months imprisonment. Barbeques and fires for cooking and warmth do not require a permit, but must be lit in properly constructed fireplaces (to view complete conditions visit cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can
- The use of an incinerator, chainsaw/lawn mower, welding/grinding equipment and vehicles that come in contact with vegetation and machinery with an internal combustion/heat engine are permitted provided conditions are followed.
- Farmers can find legal guidelines and practical advice at cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare/farms – this information is important especially for new farmers, bush block owners or hobby farmers.
- A Total Fire Ban declaration means no fires can be lit for the declared district for that day unless there is a specific exemption or special permit issued. This applies irrespective of the Fire Restriction status.

The Tallymen would stand at the end of the gangways, weigh the bananas and then ring the bell and give the sellers a token which could be converted into cash at the end of the day. The crew would hurl the bananas hand to hand and throw them into the hold.

This all came to an end in Washington, where they were not allowed to dock. Apparently, new health regulations now banned the ships taking on bananas, mainly because there were always spiders and insects managing to join the bananas. There is a line in the song — "Hide the deadly black tarantula, Daylight come and we wan' to go home."

This time the ship went home with a lighter load.

## New 'Friends' group aims to enhance Maryborough train services

Advocacy group Rail Revival Alliance Victoria is proposing the formation of a "Friends of the Maryborough Rail Line" group to assist in the improvement of passenger train services along the Maryborough railway line

Rail Revival's President, Noel Laidlaw, said that nearly 10 years since the reintroduction of passenger trains to Maryborough, it was a good time to reflect and consider how the service could be enhanced to better meet the needs of passengers.

Currently, the train runs from Maryborough in the morning and mid-afternoon to Ballarat and Melbourne during the week with a morning and evening return service from Melbourne on weekdays. On both weekend days, a single train leaves Maryborough in the morning and returns from Melbourne in the evening.

"This service could be considered as a bare minimum," Mr Laidlaw said. "A few relatively small changes would vastly improve the train services for the people of Maryborough, Talbot, Clunes and Creswick. A weekend day return service from Melbourne was essential to allow passengers the opportunity to come up to these areas on weekends and return on the same day," Mr Laidlaw added.

"Similarly, on public holidays, there is no day return from Melbourne. The proposed Friends of the Maryborough Rail Line group could tackle these issues. It would lobby the government to have a review of the current timetables to ensure that they meet the needs of the community. The group would also lobby the government to reinstate passenger services to Dunolly as was promised prior to the Victorian election 12 months ago.

"A Friends of the Maryborough Rail Line group could also work with V/Line to ensure that facilities are maintained and improved. The group would provide V/Line with an ideal opportunity to gauge the views of the travelling public on Maryborough train services," Mr Laidlaw added. "Such a group could provide important feedback regarding the current timetable arrangements for all V/Line services into Maryborough, both trains and buses.

It is clear that some changes to the current timetable are required and a Friends of the Maryborough Rail Line Group would provide an ideal forum by which to gauge public opinion on timetable and service enhancements."

An inaugural meeting to form the group will be held at Railway Café & Tracks Bar at the Maryborough Railway Station on Sunday, December 15th at 2pm.

The annual end-of-year get-together for the Rail Revival Alliance will be held as part of this function. People interested in attending should phone Noel Laidlaw on 0448 568 429.




