


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

# Blue-green algae warning issued for Cairn Curran

Fishers, boaters, swimmers and campers may want to reconsider their plans of heading to Cairn Curran Reservoir after high levels of blue-green algae were detected.

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) released a warning on Tuesday urging residents to avoid direct contact with water in Cairn Curran Reservoir after monitoring detected high levels of the algae. Warning signs will be positioned at major recreational areas around Cairn Curran Reservoir and will remain in place while high levels of the algae are present. The reservoir will not be closed to the public. Warnings are also in place for Lake Eppalock and at Maryborough's Lake Victoria.

Visitors can still sightsee and enjoy other activities at Cairn Curran Reservoir that do not involve direct contact with the water. GMW recommends water users at Cairn Curran Reservoir seek an alternative water supply. Blue-green algae occur naturally in waterbodies and can present a risk to the health of humans and animals. The algae are potentially toxic and may cause gastroenteritis if ingested. According to the Department of Health and Human Services, blue-green algae contain toxins which may cause skin rashes, itchiness, sore eyes, ears and nose, asthma, numbness of lips and limbs, nausea, vomiting or diarrhoea. The DHHS advises that if you do have contact with affected water, remove any clothing and wash yourself thoroughly with clean water after coming ashore and rinse wetsuits before wearing them again to remove any traces of algae. Seek medical advice if you have any health effects after recreational water activities. Pet owners are also being warned to keep their dogs away from algae affected water, as dogs can be poisoned or die from contact with some types of blue-green algae. If they do come into contact with the water, wash them thoroughly with fresh water and dry them to prevent them grooming themselves and ingesting algal residues. If you are concerned, take your dog to a vet. GMW has said it is unknown how long the algae will remain at high levels and that they are continuing to monitor the situation at the reservoir.

# Gordon Gardens consultant to begin work on council master plan

Work on Dunolly's Gordon Gardens is set to begin in the coming weeks with Central Goldfields Shire Council officially appointing a consultant to work on the gardens this month.

Melbourne-based landscape architecture and urban design consultant Michael Smith and Associates have been contracted by council to transform the gardens, which are bordered by Market, Thompson, Bull and Barkly streets, over the coming months.

The gardens feature a number of existing buildings and community facilities and council have been working with locals to create a master plan to upgrade the area.

Around 60 community members turned out to a consultation session in December last year and Central Goldfields Shire Council manager operations Glenn Deaker said council is looking forward to working with the newly appointed consultant. "Michael Smith and Associates are based in Melbourne but they have done work for council in the past," he said.

"They've done urban design framework for Talbot, the same in Maryborough and Dunolly so they've done a fair range of work for us. They do a lot of work for regional towns around central Victoria and they're very good at looking after heritage areas." Mr Deaker said work is expected to begin in the coming weeks and more community consultation will take place during the implementation of the master plan.

"They've (Michael Smith and Associates) already gathered information from council on the gardens, including from our December community consultations," he said. "We got a lot of community feedback which we broke into different categories. The master plan will focus on what the strongest points from those categories are and then it'll be about prioritising those points."

The garden is scheduled to be completed before the end of May and Michael Smith and Associates will be conducting further consultation with community members in April.

#### **Charter adopted**

At its meeting last month, Council adopted the Victorian Local Government Women's Charter. Councillor Colleen Condliffe was appointed as the Charter Champion.

The Charter recognises the need for increased women's participation in key decision making forums in the community and in democratic governance.

The Charter promotes the principles of gender equity, encouraging diversity in representation and participation, and women's active citizenship.

The Victorian Local Government Association (VLGA) is encouraging all Victorian councils to formally adopt the Charter. According to the VLGA, 71 councils have formally adopted the Charter (now 72 including Loddon Shire).

Our last meeting was held on Tuesday 5th March at Carisbrook Senior Citizens Hall, with five committee members and nine members of the public in attendance. Amongst the matters addressed were updates on the billboard situation, with advice that VCAT had upheld Council's decision to not grant a planning permit for the sign at Potts Lane.

The decision on the Madman's Lane billboard, which was to take place at Council's meeting on 26th February, 2019, was pre-empted by the lodgement of an appeal with VCAT by the applicant, based on the fact that the date for Council's decision was outside the 60 day timeframe. The Administrators advised that the application would have been refused in accordance with the recommendations from Planning Department and VCAT will be advised accordingly.

Some other matters discussed included updates on the issue of NBN shutdown on days of high fire danger, FOI request regarding waste costs, the lack of a doctor on hand for emergency situations regarding home visits and the Carisbrook flood levee. Discussion also took place on zoning, future Council election, ex-CEO court case, Listening Posts and more.

It is intended that our media updates will now be released on a more regular basis, so other issues raised will be expanded upon more fully in future publications.

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## Stories from Cynthia

Just over a week ago my 20 something, eldest Granddaughter had a motor scooter accident in Thailand. She has been living there in a place called Bang Bon (shades of our Bung Bong), not far from Bangkok, and teaching English to small children at a private school. She had gone out for dinner with some friends and they were riding home together when a taxi pulled out in front of Jemma and she went through the taxi window, breaking her nose, lacerating her face and damaging her shoulder. The ambulance took her to hospital and her mother, my older daughter Melanie, flew over next day to give her the motherly support we all need in a crisis.

Melanie's day-by-day account of her stay at Jemma's flat, which is supplied by the school, is an eye-opener and I found it very funny. Even Jemma laughed through her painful face when she read it, so now I will share some of it with our readers. I might mention that Mel has been to Thailand and other parts of South East Asia before but always staying in tourist hotels.

Day 1 – Arrived at 4am and moved into Jemma's flat. No teabags and no normal milk. Will have to adjust. Tried to do dishes but no hot tap so thought aha, boil water in kettle but couldn't find plug to fit. Found a very small plug which wouldn't fit so devised a plan. Wedged piece of plastic round plug and it worked a treat. Only just got started and accidentally pulled out plug and lost water. Dammit have to refill kettle but now it doesn't work. Must have broken it. Right, she has a microwave so will heat water there. Can't find microwave plug. Give up on dishes; good intentions don't always work.

Day 2 – Jemma now home from hospital and I discover JEMMA'S RULES.

- In Thailand you don't wear shoes inside. Was wearing Birkenstocks which not acceptable because they squeaked. Changed to non squeak sandals as floor makes feet black.
- In Thailand you don't fill sink with water but fill large sponge with soap and rinse dish under tap after a good scrub with soapy sponge. Having trouble buying new plug –against Jemma's rules
- Do not put things on fridge too slippery.
- Do not use certain power points electricity a bit dodgy.
- Keep bed nice. In new Thailand life Jemma dislikes messy bed.
- Got razzing over kettle. Now have to heat water on teppenyaki grill. Takes forever.

Quite a transformation from Jemma's Canberra life.

On Saturday 16th March, Goldfields Sustainability Group will be holding a workshop to make Climate Flags.

Climate Flags is an initiative that resulted from a grass roots community project by Castlemaine locals who felt frustrated at being totally paralysed by the enormity and complexity of the issues surrounding climate change.

To move from paralysis into action they decided to use flags as the voices and heart felt messages of ordinary people. The flags would be joined together on strings and then displayed in public places to express the feelings of ordinary people, changing feelings of distress to a collective feeling of hope. Climate Flags symbolise community support for action on climate change.

Sewing the flags is the first step towards making our own local versions of Climate Flags. We will then arrange another session in the near future to give members of our community a chance to decorate and add their thoughts to the flags and have them joined to other flags on strings, to reflect the thoughts of our community on climate change. The strings of flags can then be hung in public spaces and public events to stimulate conversation and reflection.

# An Obituary printed in the London Times - Interesting and sadly rather true

Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Common Sense, who has been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape.

He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as:

- Knowing when to come in out of the rain;
- Why the early bird gets the worm;
- Life isn't always fair;
- and, Maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge). His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place; reports of a six year-old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teens suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student, only worsened his condition.

Common Sense lost ground when parents attacked teachers for doing the job that they themselves had failed to do in disciplining their unruly children.

It declined even further when schools were required to get

parental consent to administer sun lotion or an aspirin to a student; but could not inform parents when a student became pregnant and wanted to have an abortion.

Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches became businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims.

Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for assault.

Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to realize that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap, and was promptly awarded a huge settlement.

Common Sense was preceded in death, by his parents, Truth and Trust, by his wife, Discretion, by his daughter, Responsibility, and by his son, Reason.

He is survived by his four step-brothers; I Know My Rights, I Want It Now, Someone Else Is To Blame, I'm A Victim.

Not many attended his funeral because so few realised he was gone. If you still remember him, pass this on. If not, join the majority and do nothing.

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

# In the Vegie Patch



Autumn is with us again and we look for some cooler Fruit Trees weather, also some good rains, hopefully. Old plants that For any fruit trees holding a heavy crop of fruit, it is best to occupy space in the garden are better taken out, to make way support the limbs with props. By sowing green manure crops over the winter months, it saves weeding.

Sow mustard or rocket seeds where tomato, potato or pumpkin plants have been removed to help reduce nematodes in the soil. When plants are 30 to 40 cm high dig into soil, for best results keep soil moist to decompose greens and release beneficial chemicals.

Seeds to sow this month are silver beet, radish, beetroot, lettuce, white onions, spring and salad onions, English spinach, Japanese turnip, broad beans and Asian cabbages. Good fresh seedlings of broccoli and cauliflower can still be planted out, plus salad, spring onions and late leeks.

Plant garlic cloves in autumn, for harvesting in late springsummer. Garlic requires well drained, enriched (well rotted animal manure/compost) soil in full sun. Additional lime is also beneficial in soils with a neutral to low pH. Plant pointy end up, cover the cloves with soil, sprinkle some blood and bone or other slow-release organic fertiliser over the top and water well. Don't water again until the cloves have sprouted, then apply some mulch. For harvested potatoes, store in a jute bag and keep in a dark cool place; if exposed to sun and wind they soon go green and useless.

and it's wise to research which varieties best suit your local climate and soil, and which make good pollen partners before purchase.

Feed citrus trees with poultry manure. If they are flowering wait until the fruit is formed. Also dilute one tablespoon of iron sulphate in four and half litres of water and water around each tree.

#### **Growing sweet peas**



St Patrick's Day is the traditional date for sowing sweet peas in many parts of Australia, but this date should be regarded as a guide; they are climbers which will grow up anything they can get their tendrils around.

Grow up a trellis, tee pee, arbour, arch, or netting to create a temporary screen.

Choose a position in full sun where you can enjoy their colour and fragrance daily. Improve soil with compost and a small amount of lime. Water the soil well the day before planting and sow into a moist bed. Try to avoid watering again until after the seedlings have emerged. As the young seedlings appear, poke in some small twigs that will help guide them to the climbing support. Protect from snail and slugs. Water regularly and pick flowers frequently to encourage a prolonged flowering.
