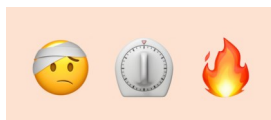

Option 3

Dear Editor

In *The Welcome Record*, 6th March 2019, on page 6, the Central Goldfields Shire announced they had completed a draft rating strategy and indicated their preferred option was Option 3.

The reasons given were -

1. Simplify the rating system
2. Improve equity between ratepayers
3. Comply with proposed changes to the municipal change legislation
4. Minimise the annual impact on each property.

On reading Option 3, it becomes apparent that Option 3 does not -

1. Simplify the rating system
2. Worsens equity between ratepayers
3. It anticipates complying with legislation not yet passed
4. It maximises the impact on properties outside Maryborough to their detriment.

For an appointed council to propose such an unfair option beggars belief.

As Option 3 states, the rate rise for properties outside Maryborough would constitute "vote shock" for those ratepayers. Such a change should only be considered by an elected council.

I urge all ratepayers to look at this strategy and inform council to accept the first option, which is to maintain the present system at this stage.

Nicole and Jacqui are a same-sex couple who live in Dunolly with their four children. They bought a nice, big house with a large garden and equipped it with all sorts of fun activities for their kids. They even have a life-sized boat as a playhouse.

Nicole and two of the kids belong to the SES as they believe in being active in the community. Nicole is dealing with cancer at present and is having ongoing treatment. Two of the children are autistic but cope extremely well. Nicole and Jacqui have always led quiet lives, keeping to themselves a lot of the time. They do not flaunt their relationship, nor force their views on others.

So it was a shock when last October/November awful things started to happen. The wingnuts were removed from the wheels of both women's cars at different times and they both narrowly avoided bad accidents. This is even more appalling as anyone watching the premises would note that they have a two-year-old child in the cars most times and often all four children.

Then later hateful slogans were painted on their fence, telling them to leave town. Finally, last week one of their cars was set alight and totally burned and the attached camper trailer stolen.

This vilification has frightened the children to the extent that the eldest girl is now sleeping with the dog in her bedroom for comfort. The fear is that the perpetrators

may return and cause more damage to the cars, or even to the family.

This shameful and criminal behaviour is difficult to understand as Dunolly has always been known as a broadminded, tolerant town of anybody and everybody with no discrimination of any sort.

And in our age of enlightenment, not many people would think twice about a same-sex couple. It is quite well-accepted by the majority of people and also legal. So who could be targeting this quiet family?

The only possible saving grace could be that the victims believe the perpetrators may be from Ballarat, where similar crimes have been committed. A car parked outside for a long time before the fire, turned out to have stolen number plates.

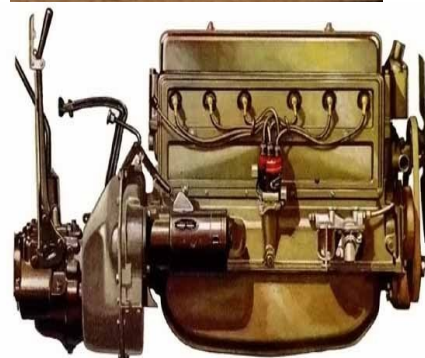

Draft Rating Strategy. The Council released a draft rating strategy at the February Council meeting. This may mean significant changes to rates and we encourage all ratepayers to read the document, in particular in the categories of Residential – Other and Farm.

The document can be found at:

www.centralgoldfields.vic.gov.au/haveeyoursay

The four proposed options have implications for all ratepayers. Option 3 is the Council's preferred option. Submissions have to be made to Council by 1st April, so there is only a short time left before the closing date.

The CGR&RAI have a view that this change in strategy is so significant that it should have been distributed by Council to all ratepayers via the Rates Notices process, ie by email or post as appropriate.

Last Tuesday, 12th March, five residents attended a meeting with Independent Candidate for Mallee, Ray Kingston. Some of the matters raised at the meeting were health, NBN, transport, the national recycling crisis, local unemployment, crime, education, cost of living in rural as opposed to city areas, crime and also the proposed World Heritage listing and closure of forests. Thanks were extended to Mr. Kingston for making the effort to meet with residents and members of our Committee.

Our next meeting is to be held at ANA Hall, Ballarat St., Talbot, on Tuesday 2nd April at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome, you do not need to be a financial member to attend.

Helping local seniors to keep healthy and connected

The Andrews Government is helping improve the health and wellbeing of senior Victorians in Western Victoria who are at risk of becoming socially isolated.

The Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, is encouraging local community groups to apply for funding as part of the Labor Government's Senior Participation Grants, which will help support older Victorians remain involved in their community, reducing the risk of social isolation and loneliness. Ms Pulford said innovation grants of up to \$75,000 are available for new community programs that give seniors an opportunity to mix with others.

"An older person's ability to live independently depends on many factors including their health and wellbeing, family and community support and the environment they live in," Ms Pulford said.

"We want to work together to prevent loneliness and social isolation in older people living in Western Victoria. These grants will support projects that keep seniors healthy, well and connected in their community," she said.

One in 10 senior Victorians experiences social isolation and loneliness. Life events such as the loss of a partner, retirement, relocation or illness can also impact on an older person's wellbeing.

The Labor Government's \$700,000 Senior Participation Grant Program will focus on projects that help prevent loneliness in older people, by building on community partnerships.

Grants are open to local government, community-based agencies, multicultural and ethno-specific organisations, Aboriginal organisations, LGBTIQ services, local clubs and community groups.

VicPol and VFF working together on farm thefts

In July last year I asked farmers and community members to be vigilant about crime in rural areas. This followed a number of thefts from farms and break-ins in some of our towns. Unfortunately we have seen these farm thefts continue across Victoria. However, the Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) and Victoria Police are working together to try and curtail these crimes.

The VFF in conjunction with Victoria Police held an information session last month (which I attended) regarding this farm crime. There were many interesting points that came up during this session, including plenty of information about what systems work in trying to deter farm crime as well as the pattern of crime behaviour. Another important point raised was that Victoria Police have dedicated farm crime officers at a number of locations, including at Echuca and Swan Hill. According to the VFF, the Livestock and Farm Crime Specialist Group includes a list of officers specifically trained in dealing with rural crime (also known as Agricultural Liaison Officers or AGLOs). It is good to know that Victoria Police (and the VFF) are very much aware of and working together on the issue of farm crime – an issue that causes great frustration for our farmers and our rural communities.

Remember, if you notice any suspicious activity please get in touch with Victoria Police. If you have any information relating to a farm theft (or break-in) please contact Crimestoppers on 1800 333 000.

Autumn firewood collection season

The Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) has announced that the Autumn Firewood Collection Season for 2019 is now open until 30th June. The Autumn Firewood Collection Season for residents of Loddon Shire opens 18th March. An interactive map showing where you can collect domestic firewood is available from www.ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood

DELWP is reminding people to ensure they stay within collection limits. This is a maximum of two cubic metres per person per day and a maximum of 16 cubic metres per household per financial year. The felling of any trees for firewood is strictly prohibited. Collection is to be during daylight hours. DELWP staff will be patrolling parks, forests and reserves to make sure people are doing the right thing while collecting their firewood. Infringement notices, fines or even imprisonment can apply to those who don't obey firewood collection regulations. It's also important to check whether a firewood collection area is part of the autumn planned burning program. This may require affected firewood collection areas to be closed at short notice. You can also call this number to report any information to DELWP about illegal or suspicious behaviour in public land areas.

Entry into the fiesta is just \$5 for adults or \$20 for a family.

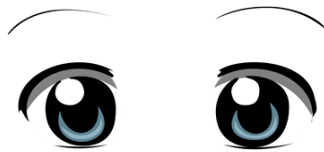
