Western Victoria – a great tourism destination that keeps growing Victoria has cemented its place as Australia's best tourist destination, with new data showing that 2018 was the tourism industry's biggest year on record. The Grampians experienced positive numbers, welcoming 51,300 overnight visitors in 2018.

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Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, welcomed the rise, saying it showed the strength of the region's tourism offerings.

Visitors to Victoria spent an unprecedented \$8.5 billion in 2018, up 12.9 per cent on the previous year, driving economic growth and creating thousands of jobs.

Data from Tourism Research Australia shows Victoria welcomed three million international visitors who stayed a combined 72.9 million nights in the state.

Ms Pulford said Victoria's tourism industry is growing at almost three times the national average.

"Victoria is a truly world class destination for international visitors and this strong growth shows what a popular destination the Grampians is for travellers from across the globe," Ms Pulford said.

"Western Victoria has something for everyone, whether they're looking to explore our natural attractions or our food and wine options. It's obvious why the figures released show how strong tourism is in Victoria when we have attractions like the Grampians right in our backyard," she said.

The increase in tourism spending was largely driven by visitors from across Asia, with expenditure by visitors from India, China, Indonesia and Taiwan showing strong growth.

These key growth figures indicate the increasing strength of tourism across Victoria, outpacing the rest of Australia as a tourism hotspot for visitors from around the world.

The figures also show Victoria is well on-track to reach our aim of growing our total overseas and domestic visitor spending to \$36.5 billion by 2025.

Tourism is one of the key contributors to the Victorian economy and employs around 215,000 people.

To be held at Nolens Park from 12.30pm to 3.30pm, the Connecting to Country Event will bring the cultural significance and stories from the area to life.

Boort and the surrounding marshes, lakes and rivers are culturally and spiritually rich. Within a 20-kilometre radius of Boort it is understood that there are more than 2,000 scar trees, making the area one of the largest (if not the actual largest) collection of scar trees in the world. The area is also home to many cooking mounds and artefacts.

The day is a chance to hear and learn from traditional owners and elders. There will also be a barbecue lunch, Welcome to Country, weaving workshop, boomerang painting, traditional stories, cultural artefact display and much more.

Event Sponsorship Scheme applications

Applications are now open for Council's Event Sponsorship Scheme. The scheme, which started in 1999, provides assistance to community groups organising events within the shire.

Under the scheme, community groups can submit applications for funding under the Major Event Category or Minor Event Category.

The Major Event Category provides \$1,000 towards events of regional or state significance. For example, state sporting events and/or major festivals, and that attract a significant number of visitors from outside the region.

The Minor Event Category provides \$400 towards events of local and sub-regional significance, such as annual sporting tournaments or local community festivals. These events will be of local and sub-regional significance, for example, annual tournaments and community festivals and will attract a moderate number of visitors from other communities.

Recycling - what happens to tyres?

As mentioned in my last column, over the coming weeks I'll be focusing on a range of different areas relating to council's recycling processes. This week, I thought I would start with tyres.

From Monday 1st July 2018 to Wednesday 20th March this year, 128 tyres in Loddon Shire were collected (this does not include tyres from hard waste collections).

The tyres are sent to Melbourne where they are processed into a range of different products.

These products include athletics tracks, brake pads, building insulation, material for construction of roads and drains, matting products and new tyres (including tyres for your wheelie bins).

Tyres are also reprocessed for other products such as non-slip surfaces, road surfaces, cement, paper and steel production, playground, road and sporting surfaces, and adhesive for tiles.

Fire permits for farmers issued next week

Central Goldfields Shire Council is issuing local landowners with permits to undertake controlled burning from Monday 8 April.

During the Fire Danger Period, these permits are only issued for farming purposes and farmers are encouraged to prepare their properties prior to applying for a permit.

Controlled burns are designed to assist with the removal of stubble and grass, to enable farmers the opportunity to prepare their lands for cropping.

If a permit holder fails to adhere to the conditions contained within the permit, it will result in police attendance and potential legal action occurring.

In addition to this, breaching permit conditions, or lighting a fire during this time without a permit can result in fines of more than \$19,300 and/or 12 months' imprisonment.

Wednesday 10th April 2019

As part of ensuring compliance with permit conditions during this period, burns may be inspected by the municipal fire prevention officer, Victoria Police or the Country Fire Authority with any non-compliance resulting in the permit being cancelled and the appropriate authorities informed.

It is important to note that permits will not be issued for piles of green waste or general waste.

If you believe a fire is not a controlled burn call 000 immediately.

Council enters into Ambulance Victoria lease

Council has entered into a 21 year lease agreement with Ambulance Victoria. The lease is for a 408m site for the Maryborough Aeromedical Transfer Station at the Maryborough Aerodrome.

Darkness and Light exhibition

Fire Restriction are still in force

Fire Restrictions are still in force and will remain so until it is deemed safe to terminate. Unless we get some significant rainfall or local conditions are suitable, it is likely that the Fire

danger period can run its course and terminate in line with CFA legislation on Wednesday 1st May 2019.

Residents are reminded that fire restrictions remain in force due to ongoing very dry conditions.

Permits may be issued for primary producers, stubble burns, and pest and weed control but not for general burning off of rubbish, etc from Monday 8th April.

Municipalities in CFA District 20 (Gannawarra, Campaspe and Loddon shires) will also begin issuing permits from the 8th April for primary producers;

There is a zero tolerance policy for any unlawful fire during the fire danger period meaning that offenders will find themselves facing court and potentially large fines and/or imprisonment;

"We are still in the fire danger period, which means that fire restrictions remain in place. If you intend to burn off or have an outdoor fire at this time of year then you must comply with restrictions or obtain a permit." "With a number of people camping during the Easter break it's important to understand fire restrictions, particularly if you're planning to light a campfire. It's also just as important to be aware that campfires are banned on total fire ban days and regardless of whether it is a Total Fire Ban or not, no fires can be left unattended at any time!"

"Fire restrictions limit the ways you can use fire on your property, including machinery which may produce sparks or flames. Any fire can quickly threaten lives and property given the right conditions."

"Fire restrictions remain in force for a very good reason and that is to try to prevent fires from starting unnecessarily! It's up to you to stay informed by checking the fire danger rating for your area daily and to act to protect yourself and your family by leaving early on hot, dry, windy days. Don't wait and see."

"It's everyone's responsibility to prevent fires from starting and spreading."

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


RUSH'S DAIRY

James Rush was born about 1818 probably in England. He married Catherine Ward and they immigrated to New South Wales. From the births of their children we know they were at East Maitland in 1843 and Sydney in 1845. From there they came to Port Phillip where James worked as a shepherd and Catherine would have been a hutkeeper. They were at Glenmona Station about 1846 living at the Daisy Hill Hut. This later became Amherst.

The other shepherd at this hut was Thomas Chapman who discovered gold and started the Daisy Hill Rush of 1849. Although not successful this was the first ever gold rush in Australia. No doubt James and Catherine would have been involved in this. They may have looked for gold or they may have supplied food to the many hopeful prospectors or the Native Police who arrived to keep order. None of the 200-odd people who arrived had any real knowledge of how to find gold. Most just walked around looking for it. There were no pans or cradles. Within a few weeks it was all over and forgotten until the main gold rushes started.

James and Catherine Rush shifted to Charlotte Plains Station about 1850 and moved into a shepherd's hut at the bottom of Tullaroop Creek. This was about 300m upstream of the current Eddington Bridge near where the lucerne mills are now. James was a shepherd and Catherine looked after some milking cows. The place became known as Rush's Dairy. There were crossing places here on both the Tullaroop Creek and Loddon River.

When the gold rushes started, this became the preferred crossing for travellers to Maldon or Bendigo. For those travelling to the goldfields around Dunolly there was a bridge over the Bet Bet Creek. This bridge was erected privately but by whom is not recorded.



Perhaps it was built by James Rush to encourage travellers past the dairy?

At any rate in the 1850s and early 1860s this bridge was known as Rushes Bridge.

James and Catherine Rush and their seven children left the district for Creswick about 1860, three or four of them having been born at Rush's Dairy. By this time there were other bridges at Eddington and Bet Bet. The name Rushes Bridge was changed to Middlebridge. Later it was changed again and we now know the area as Betley.



Almond and Pear Tart



2 tablespoons butter

1 cup S.R. flour

1/2 cup plus 2 teaspoons sugar, divided

3 tablespoons plain flour

4 cups sliced peeled fresh pears (about 4 medium)

3 tablespoons sliced almonds

Melt butter and milk in a pot. Add flour and mix together. Chill then roll into 10 inch circle. Place on a baking tray lined with baking paper.

In a large bowl, combine 3/4 cup sugar and flour, add pears and toss to coat. Spoon over pastry to within two inches of edges. Fold up edges of pastry over filling, leaving middle uncovered. Sprinkle with remaining Stock Photo sugar.



Bake at 200C for 15 minutes or until crust is golden and filling is bubbly. Sprinkle with almonds and bake five minutes longer. Using paper, slide tart onto a wire rack to cool.



St. Arnaud Rail Station Renovations for Community Use

Works are underway to restore the heritage listed St. Arnaud Rail Station and open it up to the community as an arts and education hub.

The works are being carried out on behalf of VicTrack by regionally based Searle Brothers building contractors.

They include replacing floors, repairing walls and ceilings, rewiring, creating new access paths, and building a kitchenette and accessible toilet.

The project is being carried out in conjunction with heritage architects Quadratum Architecture, to ensure works are sympathetic to the heritage status of the building.

The building will be leased by the Avoca District Cooperative Limited, which manages the Avoca Community Bank® branch, Maryborough branch and St. Arnaud agency of the Bendigo Bank.

They will sublease the station to the not-for-profit community group Raillery Hub Inc. (RHI), who will manage the space.

Works are scheduled to be completed around the middle of this year.

RHI plans to create the first permanent community art gallery in St. Arnaud offering rotating exhibits in multiple mediums, in support of regional artists.

An artists' library lounge will also be available for creative people to use as they wish.

They will also offer a space for quality, regionally produced products, handmade art and craft to be available for purchase.

It's planned to have a launch at the completion of renovations with food, entertainment, kids activities, speakers and a fundraising auction.

The facility will evolve over time as volunteers, resources and funds become available.

What's happened?

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) have reported an increase in the number of scammers contacting members of the public pretending to be from the ATO.

The scammers are sending pre-recorded messages claiming that you have a debt with the ATO, and if you don't call to arrange payment, a warrant for your arrest will be issued.

The scammers are using technology to manipulate the caller identification so that your phone displays a legitimate ATO phone number (otherwise known as 'spoofing').

Does it affect me?

Calls are being received by hundreds of Australian taxpayers.

How do I stay safe?

Calls from the ATO do not show a number on caller ID (they always appear as a private number) and the ATO doesn't use pre-recorded messages.

If you receive a pre-recorded message claiming to be from the ATO, do not return the call and do not provide any personal details; either hang up or simply delete the voicemail.

Remember that a legitimate caller from the ATO will never:

- threaten you with immediate arrest
- demand immediate payment, particularly through unusual means such as bitcoin, pre-paid credit cards or gift cards
- refuse to allow you to speak with a trusted advisor or your regular tax agent
- keep you on the line until payments are made
 If you are in doubt about a call claiming to be from the
 ATO hang up and phone the ATO's official scam line on
 1800 008 540 to check if the call was legitimate or to
 report a scam.

CGR&RAInc Update

Inthe Vegie Patch

April is such a nice month; it gives us a good feeling to be out in the garden, and to sow some seeds or do some planting out. For April—seeds of white and odourless onions can be sown, not plants. Near the end of this month the seeds of long keepers can also go in the soil while it is still warm. Onion plants like a cold start, but seeds need warm soil to germinate.

Cos lettuce are great in cooler weather; they like well drained soil, but have shallow roots and need frequent watering, especially in hot and/or windy weather. Add compost and some fertilizer before planting. Another winter green is endive which can take the place of the winter lettuce. It is easy to grow and leaves can be pulled off them as needed but they are inclined to go bitter when left in the soil for very long; if so place a flower pot over them for a week or more and they will lose that bitter taste. Broad beans can be sown near the end of this month, but later sowings are more successful. Asparagus crowns can be planted out now; it is better to buy twoyear-old crowns. If you've got heavy, clay soil, you'll need to mound the plants up or dig in plenty of organic matter so that it becomes well drained. Dig a deep trench, about 75cm, for the long roots - the deeper the better. Then add organic matter. Asparagus is very hungry and needs plenty of organic matter such as cow manure, sheep manure, or old chook poo. Scatter it thickly down the bottom of the trench because they will love it. Do not cut spears for the first season. Late short varieties of carrots, sown now can still result in a very useful crop. They will not grow a large root, but can be very welcome in late spring when the winter crop is spent. Other crops to go in include Chinese cabbage, most Asian greens, spinach, rocket, broccoli, spring onions, celery, silverbeet and leeks. To keep pumpkins in good condition until the plants die off, cover the pumpkins over if a frost is forecast. Once they are hit with an average frost they will not keep very long.



Fruit Trees

Remove any "mummified" fruit still hanging on the branches and dispose of them in the bin. Peaches and nectarines are especially prone to brown rot, and mummified fruit is a major source of fungal spores.

If walnut trees need pruning, now is the right time. If pruned during winter they are more likely to bleed. Now the fruit tree leaves are starting to fall, don't waste them, they make very good mulch, and rot down rapidly.

Autumn Garden Hints

- While the soil is still warm, it's a good time to plant trees, shrubs, and herbs, as their roots will have a chance to take hold before winter.
- Cover ponds with netting to prevent autumn leaves rotting in the water.
- Divide overgrown perennials, collect their seeds, prune those that have finished flowering.
- Look out for slugs and snails now the weather is cooler. Go out at night and squash them or put out traps using saucers of beer. Surrounding plants with
- copper tape also works well.
- Move cold and frost tender plants under cover or indoors before they are damaged.




