Melbourne's premier Gilbert & Sullivan Company, Savoy Opera Company Inc., is bringing *Patience* to the Dunolly Town Hall on Saturday 8th June. *Patience* was Gilbert & Sullivan's sixth collaboration, opened in London in 1881, and ran for 578 performances. 20 Lovesick maidens have rejected their worldly Dragoons Guards to trail the aesthetic poet Bunthorne. Much to their dismay, Bunthorne spurns them for Patience the milkmaid, who in turn spurns him for yet another aesthetic poet; Grosvenor.

The outraged military men go to great lengths to win their ladies back and chaos ensues. A lampoon of the British class system, this tale pokes good natured fun at patriotism, party politics, and the rise of unqualified people to positions of authority. The opera lampoons the aesthetic movement of the 1870s and '80s in England and, more broadly, on fads, superficiality, vanity, hypocrisy, and pretentiousness; it also satirizes romantic love, rural simplicity and military bluster.

A mirthful and humorous show, its score features many of the legendary duo's popular songs, including Sad is that Woman's Lot, Twenty Love-Sick Maidens We and Love is a Plaintive Song.



Travels with Cynthia

Today I am not travelling very far, just back to my childhood and some of the memories we all have when growing up. When we were young we lived in Camberwell and had a big back garden, ideal for playing footy, and, because I had brothers only, I learned to play quite well. If my brothers tried to tackle me my mother would run out calling "Stop that. Don't hurt her," and I didn't mind her interfering at all.

One school holidays we decided to make an 8-hole golf course and measured up the back lawn to dig the holes. We piled up a mound of earth for a bunker and constructed a flag. As we didn't have proper golf balls, we used cricket balls and the boys made golf sticks by carving wood. Just when we were putting away we heard a scream of horror. Our mother had come outside and was gazing in shocked amazement at the series of holes we had dug in the lawn. We thought she would have admired our ingenuity, but no, we were ordered to refill the holes. Such a disappointment.

At the bottom of the garden, past the clothes line there was a

little hedge, and on the other side just bare dirt and quite a few weeds. One school holidays I decided to landscape that area and plant a nice garden. I was about 11 or 12 at the time. I worked very hard, digging and making flower beds and cutting out paths between. My mother had a beautiful front garden and gave me permission to take cuttings from anything I wanted. I did a tour and collected fuchsia, magnolia, lilli pilli, daisies and a few other bushes. Then I bought some packets of flower seeds. From then on I studiously watered everything and miraculously almost everything took and I invited everyone down to view my lovely garden. Then one day the doorbell rang and a council man stood there and told my mother they were laying new pipes at the back of the houses in our street and needed permission to dig up along our back fence for the new pipes. My poor mother didn't know how to break the bad news to me. When I found out, I shut myself in my room and told the family I was never setting foot outside again. Sure enough most of my careful planting was dug up, my little paths trampled on and it took a very long time before I showed any interest in gardening again. My life has always been dotted with little disasters, but I always manage to survive.

Regional Victorians left fending for themselves

Member for Ripon, Louise Staley, has called on the Andrews Government to address the shortfall in Police resources in regional Victoria.

There have been a number of startling incidents across Victoria that have fuelled local concern about police numbers and hours of operation in Ripon.

Reports that the victim of a home invasion in Apollo Bay called the police but officers weren't able to attend the scene, has once again underlined the Andrews Labor Government's lack of support for police in regional Victoria.

This incident comes after a man, who has since been charged with murder, tried to hand himself into the Gisborne police station found that the station was closed. The Gisborne station was closed because there were too few police to keep the station open overnight.

Here in Ripon, towns like Creswick are also without a local police presence at night.

Despite Victoria's population growing by around half a million people in the last five years, frontline police numbers are down over the same period according to The Police Association.

According to The Police Association, there were 190 fewer frontline police in the four year period between 2014 and 2018.

"Following media coverage of violent incidents going unattended, a number of locals have raised concerns about police numbers in Ripon."

MANTELL & WILLS

In 1856 and 1857 Mantell & Wills were gold buyers at Market Hill near Hard Hill, Dunolly. They chose Market Hill as it was opposite the police camp which meant they had a little more security than shops in the main part of Dunolly. There were no police stationed in the township. Mantell & Wills worked as agents buying gold for the Bank of Victoria. Mantell & Wills started their partnership in Dunolly and when they left, they both went different ways.

Alfred Currie Wills had been born in London about 1823 and went to New Zealand in 1841 as a surveying cadet. In 1848 he was surveying the South Island with Walter Mantell. Mantell was English and a naturalist with an interest in fossils. His father Gideon Mantell had discovered the first dinosaur fossil. Wills came to Victoria during the gold rushes. In Dunolly he met Theodore Mantell. Theodore was German and does not appear to have been closely related to Walter Mantell. A year after leaving Dunolly Wills was appointed police magistrate at Omeo. In 1862 he was promoted to Wangaratta. Here he tried the 14 year old Ned Kelly for the assault and robbery of Ah Fook. There was insufficient evidence and the case was dismissed. Wills died in Wangaratta in 1871 aged 48. Theodore Mantell was born in Hochspeyer, Bavaria in 1825. At Avoca in early 1856 he was buying 1,500 oz of gold per week. After Dunolly he went to the Ararat Rush where at its peak he purchased 1,000oz per week. He went to Stawell were he died in 1872 aged 47.

In September 1856 Mantell & Wills displayed in their shop window a controversial fossil. This was a giant wombat jaw found by miners in cement 9 m deep at Slaughteryard Hill, South Dunolly. This find predated the publication of Charles Darwin's 'On the origin of species' by three years. At that time few fossils had been found or studied anywhere, so there was much speculation as to how it could be buried so deep in solid ground.

John Ferguson of Dennis & Ferguson, storekeepers of Dunolly reported the find in the Bendigo Daily Mail of 30th September 1856.

Two weeks later it was being displayed at the Shamrock Hotel in Bendigo and had been purchased by the gold warden Joseph A Panton. The next year he passed it on to the National Museum. In 1972 they produced the model for the Dunolly Museum. The National Museum is now Museum Victoria.

There was great interest when it was determined that this fossil is not from the current species of wombat (Vombatus ursinus) but from its mega fauna counterpart. That is, a larger version that existed several million years ago. The Dunolly wombat is dated at $4\frac{1}{2}$ million years. Two other fossils were found at Camperdown and in 1866 they were given the species name of Phascolomys pliocenus as its unique features showed it to be different to the living wombats. This report was translated into French and issued at the 1866-67 International Exhibition in Paris. The species name was later changed to Vombatus pliocenus. This is derived from the geological time period of pliocene where it was found at Dunolly. More mega fauna wombat fossils were found in South

Australia in 1893. In the 1980s and 1990s work was carried out on these fossils resulting in the three Victorian specimens being reassessed as not the mega fauna wombat but the same as current wombats.

4½ million years ago the Burnt Creek Valley had a major fast flowing river. The wombat fell into this. Over time the river moved and eroded to its current level and now has a fraction of the water flow. The old river was buried under 9 m of stone and clay. The original riverbed has dried out, compacted and become cemented whilst major erosion each side has now left this as a hill.

NBN Scam Warning

If you receive a call from someone claiming to be from the NBN - they are scammers. DO NOT allow them access to your computer. No-one from NBN will contact you regarding the installation or maintenance of this service. Unfortunately the callers sound very professional – please don't fall for their tricks. If you have let them have access of your computer, they will show you where you have been "scammed"; however, what they are actually showing you is called an Event Log which tracks issues you may have had with your computer that is also sent to Microsoft anonymously.

You will NOT be contacted by Telstra, NBN Co etc. about any viruses/scammers as no-one else can see your computer UNLESS you let them in. As soon as they ask you to turn your computer on please tell them that you don't have a computer or just hang up; otherwise they will access your personal information and password files etc. If you are asked for payment using Apple iTunes cards then you are definitely being scammed. DO NOT buy iTunes cards for payment for anyone that you don't personally know as there is no way to track these once you have given the information/code to the scammer.

Protect your personal information by verifying who you are talking to. Tell them you will call them (the company) back and then check the phone number on their website and ring that number. If they are from a legitimate company they will have all of your details so ask them for the proof. DON'T give them your personal or bank account details.



Great prospects to find nuggets - do you have a Miner's Right?

Victoria's walking tracks are not exactly paved with gold but you never know when someone will stumble across a nugget, with a lucky family finding a 20-ounce piece of gold over the weekend. The nugget is reported to be worth around \$35,000, with the family discovering it by chance while walking their dog north of Bendigo on Mother's Day.

The find on the weekend is a timely reminder of both the enjoyment of walking in the Victorian bush, and the need to purchase a Miner's Right if searching for gold. Recreational fossicking is a great activity for families, friends and grey nomads, providing opportunities to exercise, relax and socialise as well as connect with Victoria's rich history and beautiful

Those out searching and panning for that nugget are also spending their money across regional Victoria in the bakeries, stores and servos that support local communities and jobs for country Victorians.

Fossicking and small-scale commercial prospecting can result in some big eureka moments. A recent episode of the Discovery Channel's Aussie Gold Hunters featured Mick Clark and Neville Perry discovering a 2.4kg gold nugget, worth around \$150,000, near Dunolly earlier this year.

Searching for gold and other minerals can be great fun, but fossickers must think of their safety and that of others - particularly after heavy rain when rocks can be dislodged and land near rivers may become unstable. Fossickers should always tell someone where they are going, when they will return and should always be beware of any old mine shafts in the area. Minerals are owned by the Crown on behalf of all Victorians, and recreational fossickers must hold a Miner's Right to keep any gold they find. Permission must be gained from property owners to access private land. Recreational fossickers must be mindful of their obligations and not damage vegetation or disturb Aboriginal sites.

Earth Resources Regulation's Inspectors based in Bendigo, Ballarat and other locations around the State can conduct spot checks.

To purchase your recreational Miner's Right or apply for a commercial Prospecting Licence visit earthresources.vic.gov.au and if you are keen to learn more about fossicking and prospecting, contact the Prospectors and Miners Association Victoria at pmay.org.au.
