Dunolly Bakery's pasties get national tick of approval

Renowned for its quality goods, the Dunolly Bakery has brought home a bundle of national awards for its pies and pasties. The bakery's traditional and vegetarian pasties were named the second best in Australia, while their plain mince beef pie and chicken, leek and mushroom pie are recognised as being third best in the nation following Australia's Best Pie and Pasty Competition, held by the Baking Association of Australia. No stranger to claiming an award or two, the Dunolly Bakery was voted gold medal winner for the Best Bakery of Central Victoria in 2016 and has taken out business of the year and customer service awards in years gone by.

Dunolly Bakery owner Rod Stuart said it's a great feeling to be recognised nationally and all credit goes to the bakers. "It's good to be

recognised. I think the bakers are more excited than me, they've done all the hard work and it's good to recognise them," he said. "Two silver for the pasties and two bronze for the pies is a pretty great effort. This is the first time we've entered this competition so we'll know what to expect next time." With business keeping busy over the colder months, Mr Stuart said the bakery will have a crack at the awards again next year, aiming for gold.

Westpac Bank Maryborough Closing

Maryborough's Westpac Bank branch is preparing to close its doors for good later this year after nearly 60 years of operation.

One of six bank branches in Maryborough including ANZ, Commonwealth Bank, Bendigo Bank, NAB and Bank Australia, the Westpac branch has been in Maryborough since 1960 and as of 6th September 2019 will cease all operations. The Westpac spokesperson confirmed the closure to *The Advertiser* this week.

"After careful consideration, we have made the difficult decision to close the Westpac Maryborough branch. We continually review our services to ensure we are meeting the changing needs of the communities across Australia and are responding to how our customers are choosing to bank with us. We wish for the Maryborough community, including local businesses and our customers, to know that any decision to close a branch is not one we make lightly and it takes into consideration customer usage, location and proximity to other banking services."

The spokesperson said a decline in branch transactions and a rise in online and mobile banking led to the decision to close the branch.

"Over the past two years we have seen branch transactions decline by 20 percent at Maryborough," they said.

"At the same time, our digitally active customer growth has grown to more than 4.6 million and we now have more than 2.5 million Westpac customers using mobile banking.

For this reason, it is imperative that we continue to invest in

our customers' channel of choice which is why as a group, we have invested in a number of digital banking services so our customers can bank when and where they want.

"At the same time, we have invested in providing greater access to banking solutions for those who do wish to use over-the-counter transactions by extending our Bank@Post Partnership, particularly in regional and rural communities where the need for this service is greater."

The closure has been deemed a bad sign for the community by both Member for Ripon and Shadow Treasurer Louise Staley and the owner of the property which currently houses the Westpac branch, Daryl Powell.

Mr Powell, who is the director of Campbell Powell Properties Pty Ltd said he is very disappointed Westpac is closing the branch.

Grant to bring big musical to Maryborough

Maryborough's creative scene has received a boost thanks to a \$3,000 grant through the Andrews Government's Small Regional Presenters' program.

Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced Dunolly Theatre Company is one of 13 community groups across the state that have received support to bring a classic musical to Maryborough Town Hall.

The funding will be used to present Johann Strauss' *Die Fledermaus* by the Gilbert and Sullivan Society of Victoria at the Maryborough Town Hall on 20 July, 2019. The performance will also showcase the talents of locals and members of the Dunolly Theatre Company.

Ms Pulford said she was delighted the funding would be used to further promote live performances in the Central Goldfields Shire.

"Congratulations to the Dunolly Theatre Company team on this grant and the work you do to strengthen our local creative scene," she said.

"Victoria is the creative state and the Small Regional Presenters program is one way we are ensuring that communities in the Central Goldfields Shire can enjoy the benefits of creative and cultural participation," Ms Pulford said.

Launched in 2016 the Small Regional Presenters Program enables regionally-based community groups, venues and organisations to attract artists and performances to their communities, supporting the costs of presenting shows.


On a spiritual level, being a compassionate crystal it has the ability to transmute pain and negativity, thus opening



Young people urged to have their say

Council is urging young people in the community to have their say on what they need in our Shire in terms of services and support. The feedback will help in the development of Council's Youth Strategy. The strategy aims to ensure young people feel supported and have access to employment, recreation, social, health and education opportunities. Young people are extremely important to the future of smaller shires such as Loddon. Retaining, growing and diversifying Loddon Shire's population is a key strategic objective for Council, which includes retaining youth. We already know that a lack of availability of services, education providers and employment have been identified as reasons young people move elsewhere. We need to hear from young people regarding how we can address these issues to make staying in our Shire an appealing prospect.

Council will continue to work closely with young people, community groups and other government agencies to maximise opportunities for young people who live and work in the Shire. Funding boost for regional shared services

Loddon Shire, together with Buloke, Hindmarsh, Horsham, West Wimmera and Yarriambiack councils, will share in \$5 million to work collaboratively to improve the quality, effectiveness and affordability of services to our communities. The funding, which was announced by Minister for Local Government Adem Somyurek, will provide regionally-shared finance and payroll services between the councils. This will result in more than \$8 million in productivity benefits and reduced costs over five years. The collaborative project is part of the Rural Councils Transformation Program, which backs large-scale, transformative projects at a regional level. This enables investment by councils to work together on projects that previously couldn't be achieved financially. It also helps councils to provide services to dispersed populations over large geographic areas over the long term.

Pet Exchange Register to improve sale transparency

Victorians can now find out where their pet comes from with the introduction of a new online database called the Pet Exchange Register (PER). Dogs and cats advertised for sale or give away now need a source number from the PER, which identifies an individual, breeder, business or shelter. Victorians getting a new pet will be encouraged to check the validity of a seller on the register before they bring their new dog, cat, puppy or kitten home.

It will be an offence for an advertisement not to have a valid microchip number and a PER source number – this applies to advertisers selling or giving away dogs, cats, puppies and kittens, as well as publishers of the advertisements.

Better recycling – part two

In this second part of handy hints around better recycling (thanks to the Loddon Mallee Waste and Resource Recovery Group), I'd like to mention other items that may cause confusion when it comes to recycling. Aluminium foil can be easily recycled. Just make sure it's clean (giving it a wipe down is fine), then ball it up and save it, such as in a coffee cup. Continue to add more foil to the ball, making it grow. When the aluminium foil is the size of a tennis ball it can go in your recycling bin. Rigid plastic tubs that meat comes in are also mostly recyclable – just check the container for a number in the triangle. If it has a number 1 to 6 it can be recycled. Peel the soft film from the top (it's okay if a little bit is stuck to the rim) and put any absorbent pads in the waste bin. It's a good idea to rinse the meat trays to prevent odours and remove residual fluid. Polystyrene is not recyclable through your kerbside bin, even if it has the triangle number symbol on it. As long as your polystyrene is clean, there are a small number of locations in the Loddon Mallee area where you can take it to be recycled. These can be found by downloading the Loddon Mallee Waste App via your app store and searching "Loddon Mallee" Broken drinking glasses don't go in your recycling bin. This is because glasses melt at a different temperature to glass bottles and jars, contaminating the recycling stream. Wrap broken glasses up in paper and place in the waste bin. Window glass should also be treated this way.

MOVIE STAR KOKO FROM DUNOLLY

Pure bred red kelpie Koko, who is fast becoming famous for his leading role in the newly released movie 'Red Dog', was bred in Dunolly. Dunolly resident renowned kelpie breeder and show dog judge, Carol Hobday, bred Koko for showing however, he did not quite meet her expectations.

'After he had fathered his first litter of pups he carried his tail too high, a bit full of himself,' Carol said.

'He was and is a lovely dog though, like a sponge, so eager to learn,' Carol said.

So when animal trainer Luke Hura asked if Carol had a dog suitable to train for the movie she suggested Koko. Luke was impressed with Koko and 'Red Dog' director Kriv Stenders who flew in to see him was taken aback. 'I think I've found my dog,' Kriv decided.

But Carol refused to sell Koko who was two and a half years old at the time.

'Once they're your pups, they're always your pups.'

It was here that Mr Harvey revealed that the funds had now been repaid without Council having to take action for their recovery. No doubt more will be heard and further questions asked on this subject in the near future.

The e-waste to landfill ban has now taken effect and residents are reminded that e-waste, with the exception of televisions, can now be deposited free of charge at Council's Waste Transfer Stations.

The survey on the 2019-2024 Waste Management Strategy will be online until 23rd July.

The Q & A Session regarding the Draft Property Occupancy Policy will be held on Wednesday, 17th July at 6pm at the Community Hub, Burns St. Maryborough; the closing date for submissions is Thursday 1st August at 5pm.

Submissions on the Gordon Gardens Draft Masterplan are invited before the closing date of Wednesday 31st July.

Stories from Cynthia

Now that I have rekindled my memories of all those years ago when I built our mudbrick house, I have remembered some other materials we used. I bought some railway sleepers which had been replaced and used them for the uprights. We had a tin roof of course and made it jut out wider than normal roofs to create eaves to protect the walls. The final procedure was the rendering and what a job that was. I can't count the number of gloves I got through doing that. You mix up a thin slurry of mud in a bucket and then smear it over the mudbrick walls to seal them. Of course I did that over a period of days and days and days.

There was no sewerage connected in St. Andrews, so my student friends dug the hole for the septic and when the delivery man brought the tank he commented on how professional it was, as they had even dug a groove for the chain which is wrapped round the tank when lowered in and then pulled off. Anyone who ever had a septic tank will remember the horrific times when it overflows and on come the big gloves and the stick to unblock it and that terrible smell. Phew!

Once we set up house in our new home I told the kids that instead of all the rental places this belonged to us so they could put posters on the walls with no restrictions. However I did not count on Jeremy taking this so literally when I discovered he had bored a hole right through his wall to run a lead for his music speakers. He figured he could just mud it up again. I had entirely different ideas about that.

When we first bought the block we started collecting stuff in readiness for building. There was a wood stove and a bath and basin and other household items, but they gradually disappeared because the land was not fenced so people obviously thought it was thrown away junk. After all it was second hand stuff. So next thing was post and wire fencing and a private property sign. Then Dick built a makeshift bungalow hut to store things in. Later the kids put bunks in there for sleepovers with friends. When Jeremy started playing guitar and formed a little group they lined the inside walls with old mattresses to soundproof it, which was quite funny as there were no close neighbours and I could barely hear them up at the house. The mad thing was that Dick had propped the hut up on bricks in lieu of foundations, but it never fell over despite the music vibrations. I planted creepers over it so it looked quite quaint.

I also bought a whole swag of second hand bricks for the End Room and had them laid in parquet fashion. Once again I spent hours and hours and hours, this time on my knees, sealing the bricks and they came up a lovely, shiny bronzy colour. Just like my hands, but no sign of that now, just soft and white!

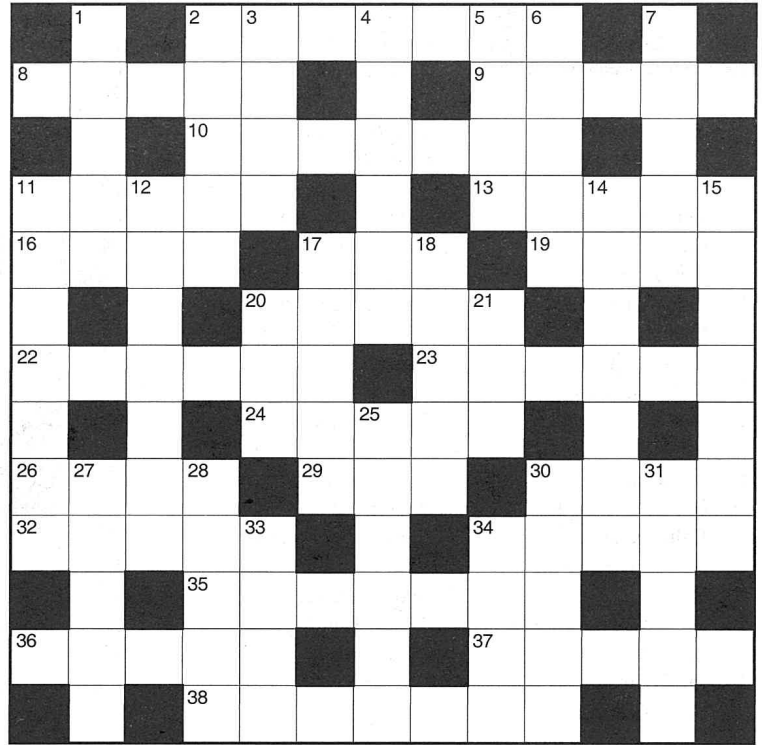

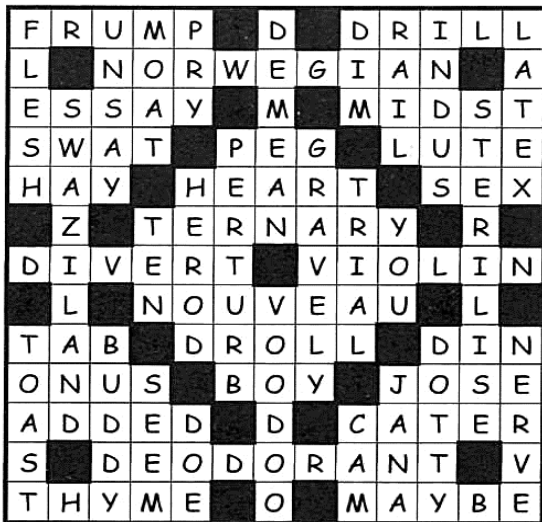
