

Dear Editor.

Recently I put a letter in this paper about the Local Government Inspectorate's investigation into the Central Goldfields Shire and raised some guestions.

Now their chief municipal inspector David Wolf has paid a visit to Maryborough with a corresponding front page story in the Carisbrook Mercury. It has a happy photo and lots of positive statements but misses out horribly on content. This is spin designed to fool a gullible public.

Mr Wolf said amalgamating many charges against Mark Johnston was a good thing for witnesses and costs, but that didn't matter as most of the serious charges were dropped. The Inspectorate have never given a reason for this. He cited a successful prosecution. However, their successful prosecution only amounted to about 0.02% of the missing money.

Mr Wolf's comments in the article were a complete whitewash of the 2017 Inspectorate report. Grant money is unaccounted for and some invoices used multiple times for acquittal of different grants. They know who signed off for these acquittals but they were never charged. One staff manager claimed false wages of about \$60,000 but no charges laid. Mr Wolf's response is that we "should not dwell on matters from the past." Actually it is the Inspectorate's job to investigate the past.

In my experience, if a public servant gives an irrelevant or false answer then go to a higher level.

So that this does not happen to another shire I ask the Minister of Local Government, Adem Somyurek to introduce a policy that if the Inspectorate discovers criminal activity and chooses not to prosecute that their files be then passed on to the police.

As we all age, the possibility of a sudden unexpected heart attack increases. Therefore, it was great to read in last weeks Welcome Record that Eddington now has an AED (Automated External Defibrillator)

Of all the sudden cardiac arrests that occur each year, more than 95% of the victims die before they reach hospital. Survival rates improve dramatically if an AED is accessible within 5-7 minutes.

Veronica Palmer said that theirs is registered with the AED locator App but after lots of Googling I was unable to find any such devices to be found in our area.

We need to know where they are in our community and how to quickly and easily access them.....time is of the essence.

Veronica has now let us know that the defibrillator is on an external door at Eddington community centre

How many do we have here in Dunolly and where are they located?

Is it possible to have another training/familiarisation session for those that were unable to attend last time? Could we also have a phone contact list for our local police, fire and SES units?

Not all residents have computer access at the ready.

Helping Western Victorians to stay safe in the sun

People from across Western Victoria will be better protected from the sun's damaging rays thanks to new grants being made available by the Andrews Government. Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced the School Shade Grants Program and the Community Shade Grants Program are both open, providing funding for shade structures, tree planting and other sun protection measures.

The Labor Government is giving a big \$10 million boost to the programs, paving the way for about 1,000 schools and community groups to install shade over the next four years.

As part of the boost, schools and community groups will be able to share in \$2 million for other protective measures such as hats and sunscreen.

Ms Pulford said the programs make sure that more Victorians than ever can access much-needed shade when the hot sun hits hard thanks to new shade sails or newly-planted trees.

"We all love spending time outdoors on nice sunny days, but the sun's UV can be dangerous and deadly if we don't protect ourselves," she said.

"Our grants programs have helped hundreds of schools and community groups provide the protection Victorians need to prevent cancer and I'd encourage people to apply for these new rounds of funding," Ms Pulford said.

Dozens of community groups and schools in Western Victoria have already benefited from the Labor Government's shade funding including Hamilton Lawn Tennis Club, Ararat North Primary School, Moyston Primary School, Talbot Football Netball Club, Natte Yallock Recreation Reserve, Maryborough Lawn Tennis Club and Rainbow P-12 College.

Australia has the highest rates of skin cancer in the world, with two in three people diagnosed by the age of 70.

In 2017, melanoma was the fourth most common cancer in Victoria, with 2,993 invasive melanomas diagnosed and 270 deaths. The five-year survival rate for Victorians diagnosed with invasive melanoma was at 90 per cent in 2013-16.

Oncology appointments close to home for Central Goldfields residents

Families in Central Goldfields Shire will be able to get the specialist care they need closer to home following a funding boost from the Andrews Government.

Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced the Labor Government had delivered on its commitment to fund 500,000 specialist appointments in regional Victoria, thanks to a \$136.2 million investment in the Victorian Budget 2019-20.

Some 125,000 specialist appointments are funded across regional Victoria this financial year alone.

In Maryborough, patients needing specialist cancer treatment will benefit from 2,000 more local oncology appointments in 2019-20 at Maryborough Hospital.

Ms Pulford said the \$500,000 funding boost to Maryborough District Health Service is part of the Labor Government's plan to make sure that regional Victorians get the same world-class healthcare as Melbourne patients.

"The last thing local patients need when they're battling illness is long, costly and inconvenient trips to Melbourne to get the treatment they need. We're fixing that," Ms Pulford said.

"Our investment means that Central Goldfields patients will no longer face huge bills for private oncology appointments or pay for costly trips to Melbourne to see a specialist. It means more time to recover at home with loved ones," she said.

"Country patients deserve the very best access to healthcare as people in Melbourne and that's exactly what we're delivering," Ms Pulford said.

CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOC. INC.

Last week, some of our members attended a public meeting by PMAV in Maryborough, assisting us in gaining some understanding of the differences between the VEAC proposal to redesignate some sections of State Forests to National Park status and the proposed World Heritage listings for parts of the Victorian Goldfields.

In attendance were approximately 40 people, consisting of PMAV members and visitors, representatives from Bendigo and Ballarat Councils, Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey and President of Central Goldfields Branch of PMAV, Bill Schulz.

The meeting heard that whilst the VEAC recommendations have now gone to Parliament to be voted on; over 2,000 signatures on petitions have now been received.

These are to be presented this week during the BUGU 'We Want our Bush Back' rally outside Parliament House. The proposed World Heritage listings however, will involve some buildings and individual historical sites over 13 municipalities within regional Victoria, not entire areas; it is anticipated that this process may take up to eight years.

This Friday sees the VCAT hearing involving the Regional Billboard Co. regarding the proposed billboard for Madman's Lane. This had been taken directly to VCAT by the applicant, as when it was originally submitted, Council had not responded within the designated time.

These and many other issues will be discussed at our next meeting, which is to be held in Dunolly, on Tuesday 3rd September at the SES Building, Broadway (entry at rear of building) at 7.30pm. We are anticipating a strong attendance and would love to see as many people as possible from Dunolly and surrounds.

Firstly, I would like to welcome you all to the sixth Annual meeting of DDI, Dunolly and incorporated. We exist to encourage and support local business, tourism and cultural activities, and assist in the development of the district.

We have welcomed Jenny Scott, Kerri Jongebloed and Susan Day as new members.

There has been quite a lot of activity over the last twelve months in a variety of endeavours.

The new 'Post Office Sign', which has been a major work of coordinating advertisers and graphic designers, has now been installed. Thank you to John Moir, Ken Skeats, and Marion for their perseverance in bringing this project to its completion. There are still advertising spaces available on it!

The Tiny Towns Arts Trail, ably coordinated by Judy Meldrum, was once again held on the weekends bookending Anzac Day, and generated significant visitor numbers and awareness of arts activities and practices within our town and neighbouring communities. A community grant from The Welcome Record assisted with publicity costs.

The 'Sense of Place' sculpture project, created by community members and auspiced by DDI, should soon be in place when the Gordon Gardens Master Plan has been accepted by the Council and works can commence. Australia Day celebrations were once again held in rather warm conditions, but still well-attended, with local entertainment and the presentation of our Citizen of the year and Junior Citizen awards.

Rod Stuart is our representative on the Committee of Maryborough, giving Dunolly a voice. Rod and Susan Day have also been involved in the Loddon Mallee Leadership program, which has also organised a town visit to showcase Dunolly to other participants.

The offer, via Bendigo Regional Tourism, for participation in a digital mentoring programme was taken up by Rod, John and Philip.

In our role as supporting other community groups, we have provided letters of support to the Historic Precinct, Museum and Hospital Auxiliary towards their applications for community grants from the Maldon Community Bank...all of which were successful.

We have had continued involvement with the Shire over several issues.

The future library continues to be discussed, with the current temporary accommodation regarded as less than

The principle of installing a dump point for caravan waste has been approved, but the location is still a point under discussion, with the previously-favoured spot near the Gordon Gardens having been ruled out.

We assisted in the coordination of the Tourism and Economic Development strategy discussion evening with shire representatives and local businesses

Several members attended the consultation sessions regarding the development of a master plan for the Gordon Gardens. Liaison with the Shire has also seen progress in the upgrading of bike track signs which had become damaged.

In October, we assisted with the Rail Revival promotion at the station, where the proposal for the return of passenger rail services was promoted. So far there has been no further mention of this.

We held an informative session with Coliban water representative Rebecca McHutchinson, who enlightened us on plans for upgrading the water services to the town, promotional opportunities to increase awareness of Coliban's services and water saving measures that could be implemented. The community garden followed up from this with a water wise session.

Our website management has been taken over by Philip Ashton, giving it a new lease of life. It provides links to various community facilities and businesses.

Following a pub meeting last November, members combined to advertise in the Shire's Official Visitors Guide, giving a wide range of publicity for our local businesses.

With the increased interest in the retail sector, DDI has formed a retail subcommittee to focus on developing the retail business in town.

It has been interesting going through the last year's minutes and realising how much a small group of committed people has achieved.

We look forward to the next year and meeting the challenges it presents to us.

National Scams Awareness Week

The recent National Scams Awareness Week was an opportunity for the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) to warn people to be vigilant of scams.

There are countless types of scams with new ones constantly. Scammers becoming increasingly sophisticated with Australians predicted to lose a record amount in 2019, in excess of \$532 million. Investment scams, lottery and cryptocurrency scams are particularly common. According to the ACCC, scammers are increasingly using trusted brands like NBN to trick unsuspecting consumers into parting with money or personal information, with people aged over 65 particularly vulnerable.

Australians are losing more money to NBN scams than any other, with an average of over \$100,000 lost every

In response, NBN has launched an awareness campaign to help educate and protect people from scammers. This includes urging people not to share personal or financial information or give remote access to their computer or device to any unsolicited callers.

NBN does not make automated or robocalls. If in doubt, consumers should hang up and call their retail service provider to verify information.

If you think a scammer has gained access to your personal information, contact your financial institution immediately.

CHEDDAR AND SPRING ONION SCONES

Makes 12 180 degrees Ingredients:

2 tablespoons olive oil

6 spring onions, chopped

2 tablespoons finely chopped thyme leaves

1-2 garlic cloves, crushed

3 1/4 cups SR flour

125g cold butter, chopped

250ml buttermilk

200g mature cheddar cheese, grated

1/4 cup finely chopped parsley

1 egg, beaten for glazing

Salt and pepper

Method:

Heat oil in small pan over medium heat, sauté spring onions for 2-3 minutes, then add thyme and garlic. Set aside to cool.

Rub butter into flour (can pulse in food processor), remove to large bowl. Add onion mixture, 3/4 of cheese, salt and pepper and buttermilk.

Bring together with a flat bladed knife adding more buttermilk if too dry, do not work too much. Pat or roll out to 3 1/2 cm thick. Cut scones with a 6cm cutter.

Place just touching on a paper lined oven tray. Brush tops with egg wash and sprinkle remaining cheese over. Bake 30-40 minutes until golden and cooked through. Serve buttered.



Dunolly Saves Bottle Caps for Envision Hands

Over the past few weeks, quite a number of Dunolly residents have been getting into the swing of saving their plastic bottle caps to assist Victorian plastics recycling company, Envision, in one of their programs, producing colourful prosthetic hands for people in both Australia and overseas.

Currently, there are collection boxes at Dunolly Primary School, Dunolly Arts Hub (outside the back door) and Gold & Grain Cafe. The only types of caps that Envision can utilise, are the smaller type of flat caps, with a Grade 2 or 4 plastic. Caps are usually marked with a '2' or '4'; these appear mostly on soft drink, water and milk bottles, not wide-mouthed bottles or jars. Only caps on their own, without any attached plastic or metal, can be used; please also ensure that the caps have been washed.

The caps will eventually need to be transported to Melbourne and so far we have had some kind offers in this regard; it would be ideal if this could happen every few months or so, allowing space for more to be collected.

Envision also have a Go Fund Me link, to help raise funds for new equipment and for transporting caps, where communities are unable to have them delivered. This can be found at https://www.gofundme.com/envision-hands/

At this point, over \$10,000 has been raised from their \$50,000 target.

Envision is a not-for-profit community organisation which also assists the long-term unemployed within its recycling and education projects. Brightly-coloured prosthetic hands are created on a 3-D printer; many of these are in super-hero colours, which are popular with children over the world.

We hope you will join others in Dunolly and surrounds who are contributing to this worthwhile program and at the same time keeping these plastics out of landfill.

Recycling of other small items such as bread tags, to benefit other charities, has also been taking place in town, so please watch this space for further information and collection points in the near future.
