Targeting Farm Crime

CRAFT SHOP INC.

Dear Editor,

I'm pleased to report to readers of *The Welcome Record* plans by the Andrews Government to create a specialised farm crime unit to target farm crime, including livestock and equipment theft. Farming is tough enough as it is without our farmers being subject to theft.

I'm delighted the Government is taking this issue seriously with the creation of a Farm Crime Coordination Unit. The unit will be led by Inspector Karl Curran, who will oversee a team of more than 70 new Farm Crime Liaison Officers, previously known as Agricultural Liaison Officers. Their work will be backed up with extra administrative and coordination support. This new team will provide a dedicated response to target farm crime by monitoring crime trends and patterns, developing intelligence and working with local police to address crime in rural areas. The unit will also work closely with and provide advice to Victoria's farming and agricultural community, and provide intelligence and operational advice to Victoria Police command.

While farm crime contributes less than one percent of all offending in Victoria, we know it has a huge impact on communities throughout Western Victoria — particularly the theft of tools, livestock and firearms.

We take this type of offending very seriously, we've listened and we've acted.

Support Group for residents impacted by mental illness

A free support group for local residents supporting a friend or family member with mental illness is now up and running in Maryborough and looking for new members.

The group is designed for those caring for someone with a mental illness, or family members and friends supporting someone with mental illness, to come together and share their experiences.

Local Jason Clark was inspired to organise the group after his first hand experience supporting his partner who suffers from a mental illness.

"My partner suffers from mental illness, so this support group came from me not really knowing what I could do to help," he said. "It's also extremely hard to find any help here, being a smaller regional area."

The first session was held earlier this month but with a low turnout. Mr Clark said he's hoping to attract more people and make the session a regular occurrence.

"The first session was very quiet, which I expected. I didn't really push it, but I'd like to make it bigger, perhaps a monthly catch-up," he said.

"I would really like leadership from other areas in the community such as the hospital and police to get involved.

"This is just about supporting each other; it's for those involved around the outskirts of mental illness.

"Mental illness has a stigma around it and we need to change that. If you had a broken leg you would be treated for it and no one would think twice about it. Mental illness needs to be put in that same category, not surrounded by stigma and hidden away."

Council Changes Occupancy Policy

Central Goldfields Shire Council has altered its controversial policy in response to community group concerns.

The second draft of the policy was endorsed at the council's meeting last Tuesday night. This version will now be available for public comment until the end of October with a special hearing to be held on 13th November. The council is calling for groups to make further comments to help it finalise the policy. The release of the policy in May created an uproar among community groups.

The council held a consultation session in July which was attended by 64 people, and it received 18 written submissions on the policy.

Chief Administrator Noel Harvey told Tuesday night's council meeting that the community input, taken on by the council staff, had resulted in a "much, much better second draft."

Administrator Karen Douglas said the council had received "a very welcome amount of feedback."

"I think people understood what we were trying to do, and I really do believe people have helped us find what we would like to achieve and a way to achieve that," she said. "And I think it is going to be interesting to see the second round of how we can finesse this particularly important policy.

"It is really important that we get some order out of the bit of chaotic landscape that surrounded all this area."

Administrator Hugh Delahunty also acknowledged the "enormous community input" into the development of the policy.

"We have taken on board a lot of comments from our community in developing the policy we have before you here tonight," he said.

"Again, it is about protecting the users of the facilities; it is also protecting the council and more importantly gives us a more transparent way forward for people who use council property right across this shire."

Council is required by legislation to regularly review its Planning Scheme. This means reviewing whether the Planning Scheme provisions, such as local planning policies, zones, overlays and schedules have been effective in achieving the objectives and strategies of the planning scheme. Any proposed improvements to the planning scheme that flow from the review would be carried out as planning scheme amendments separate to the review. Further public consultation will occur on any proposed changes.

Community Reporting Tool

The Loddon Shire Council has joined other councils to participate in the Community Reporting Tool trial which has been developed by the Victorian Equal Opportunity and Human Rights Commission (the Commission). Commission found that many people from other cultures and other languages who speak had understanding and standing up for their rights. After speaking to multicultural and multi-faith leaders, the Commission found that it was often intimidating or difficult for people to make a complaint if they felt that they needed justice. The Community Reporting Tool has been developed to provide a simple form that makes it easier for people to make short, direct and confidential reports about racism, discrimination, hate-speech and religious vilification.

The tool allows someone to log an incident in a more simple way and still have the option of taking it further, but doesn't replace the existing complaints service. This demonstrates that Loddon Shire Council is committed to creating a safe and inclusive neighbourhood for all residents. CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOC. INC.

At our meeting held at the Maryborough Hub this week, some of the agenda items included a report on our meeting with Chief Administrator Noel Harvey regarding the downgrading of Maryborough Aerodrome to Aircraft Landing Area status, an update on the flood levee situation and mention of some matters arising from last week's Council meeting.

Council has now adopted the Master Plan for Gordon Gardens in Dunolly and changes will start to take effect gradually, as funding becomes available.

Following on from the initial community consultations, Council has now also endorsed the second Draft of the Community Occupancy Policy; we are pleased to see that this has been somewhat simplified and has taken into account many of the community concerns. There is now to be a second round of consultations, with submissions to close on 31st October; for anyone wishing to speak to their submissions, there will be a hearing on 20th November.

It has been interesting to see that Federal Member for Mallee, Dr Anne Webster has made appointments to visit both Maryborough and Dunolly this week. This will be the first time she has officially visited towns in our Shire since before the election and there has still been no word on the original intention for her to open an office in Maryborough.

Our next meeting is to be held at the Senior Citizens' Hall, Urquhart St. Carisbrook on Tuesday 12th November, at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome, you do not have to be a member to attend. Please come and have your say and help us to make a difference within the community.







Since I last wrote, summer has turned to autumn on Orkney; the barley has been harvested and the farmers are gearing up for over-wintering their cows inside. It's not the cold and wind that the cows can't take, it's the wet! The paddocks here are already pretty water-logged and the mud the animals churn up ruins the grass, not to mention the winter gales that spread salt over the paddocks!

We have already had a weekend of force nine gales with wind which disrupted the ferries and sounded like a banshee had been set loose around the house. The waves which throw themselves along the cliffs and beaches here when the wind blows have dumped tonnes of seaweed on the beaches and it is easy to see how kelp gathering and burning was a big industry in the past. (Kelp ash is an alkali used in the production of soap and glass).



Fortunately we have a very solid stone farmhouse to hide in with oil fuelled radiators to warm us.

Speaking of oil, you may have already realised that Orkney lies in very close proximity to the North Sea oil fields. In 1976 the Claymore and Piper fields were discovered and developed,130miles southeast of Orkney and a new industry for the islands was born. The island of Flotta was chosen for development as an oil terminal and a 30 inch pipeline now brings oil ashore there. Oil tankers are a familiar sight around the islands and there are two oil platforms in for rest and recreation and probably revitalisation in Scapa Flow at the moment.

The oil terminal provides jobs for locals and is mostly welcome. While Orkney may play a major role in the oil industry, the good news is that renewable energy is the major supplier of electricity on the islands. Given the almost constant wind, it is not surprising that wind turbines abound. The countryside is dotted with small turbines; in fact there are over 700 micro-turbines scattered throughout the islands. Most farms and businesses produce close to 100% of the electricity they use and every school has its own turbine.

The turbines are small and unobtrusive in the landscape. They don't kill birds or affect people's health and you always know where the wind is coming from by glancing at the nearest turbine.

It's not just wind that supplies power. Believe it or not, despite the short winter days and inclement weather, solar panels are frequently seen and Orkney is leading the way with tide and wave power development. What this means is that the islands produce 120% of the electricity they consume, the excess being exported to mainland Scotland.

There are also plans to power the many ferries which ply between the islands here on hydrogen instead of diesel by 2021, and electric cars are really taking off on these small islands where long distance travel is not possible.

Orcadians are really doing their bit for climate change! It would be nice to think they were exempt from its detrimental effects, but sadly there isn't an island anywhere on the planet remote enough for that.
