My Family Connections with John Flynn and the RFDS


I have written this story to coincide with the commemoration at Moliagul, Vic. of Rev. John Flynn's work and life on the occasion of the release of the new \$20 note featuring his image

John Flynn was a household name during my childhood in Sydney in the 1950s. Both of my parents were avid Presbyterians and as we had little choice as children, we went along with all the associated meetings, church services and social functions. Our father was an elder of the church, also Superintendent of the Senior Sunday School and our mother was the Superintendent of the Junior Sunday School. Not least in the work of the church, was promoting awareness of the Australian Inland Mission (A.I.M.), which had been founded in 1912 by the Presbyterian Church 'as her general contribution to the general welfare of Bush Settlers'. The focus was to provide medical services to those living in remote outback areas. Various film nights and talks were arranged, promoting the work of Rev. Flynn, so the story was well-embedded in our minds.

In 1932, John Flynn had married the secretary of the A.I.M., Jean Blanch Baird. Following John's death at the age of 70, in Sydney in 1951, Jean carried on her work with the Mission. My mother was involved with both the Presbyterian Women's Association and the A.I.M. and I remember, on one occasion, excitedly running in to tell my mother that Mrs. Flynn wanted to speak to her on the telephone.

From there, we moved to Broken Hill and once again my parents became part of the church activities. The wife of the Presbyterian Minister, Phyllis Gibb, was the person who had established the School of the Air in Broken Hill in 1956, modelled on the original one which had been operating in Alice Springs since 1951. The School of the Air radios were maintained by the RFDS and we often made both formal and informal visits to the Base to inspect the operation and listen to the children talking to each other and their teacher through the radios. In my father's Government position with Social Welfare, he had to cover the areas between the Qld, SA and Vic borders and nearly as far East as Bourke.

Many of his travels involved contact with the Flying Doctor and it became a fairly regular occurrence for him to travel in the aeroplane if he had to visit a property in the same vicinity. The Flying Dentist also accompanied the Doctor on occasions. Some of my late father's colour slides reflect the barren country over which they travelled on these visits. In his work vehicle and also in our house, there were Flying Doctor radios installed; these were an endless source of interest to me and my sisters. As we had the official 'shelter' operating from our house, we often had visiting children staying, sometimes before or after hospital visits. We were given one of the large medical kits with numbered bottles, so the Doctor could give directions over the radio as to which medication needed to be administered to a particular child.

I would like to advise you that concrete foundations are being poured in the main street of Dunolly, Victoria, 3472. Apparently this is for a modern mosaic sculpture? to be placed directly in front of a National Trust-registered building at 82 Broadway. The Daly's old Coach Office building is a step back in time and a lot of public monies have been spent restoring parts of this building. CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOC. INC.

The final Listening Posts in this round were conducted in the Shire last week. These were held as part of the Central Goldfields 2030 Ten Year Community Plan Project. The Plans are being developed in conjunction with the community and other stakeholders to 'reflect the uniqueness and priorities of the eight towns and their districts: Maryborough, Bealiba, Carisbrook, Dunolly, Talbot, Majorca, Bet Bet and Timor'. There is to be further community consultation, with Draft Plans being presented for feedback and with the project expected to be finalised by April 2020.

Even though the proposal for these Plans had been in place for some time, there was little or very short notice given in the media regarding the Listening Posts; once again part of an unfortunate communication issue between Council and the community. Council needs to be conscious of the fact that not everyone in the Shire owns a computer or has access to social media and many are reliant on the newspapers or local publications.

Council is also developing a Recreation & Open Space Policy 2020-2029. A series of community drop-in sessions commenced this week and will continue through until 30th October.

If you receive any of the above with an invitation that sounds "too good to be true" then you are probably right and you shouldn't accept it. You may receive emails that ask you to "click to unsubscribe" for something that you may not have even subscribed to — if you click on "unsubscribe" you are letting the scammers know that your email address is "live" and being used so that they can target you.

DO NOT answer calls from numbers that start with +216xxxx or any overseas numbers and DO NOT return their call — once they get you on the line they will keep you hanging on and you will end up with a huge phone bill as the number is actually a metered number — charges the incoming call.

Please keep in mind that the NBN, Microsoft, Telstra etc. WILL NOT ring you in regards to any viruses on your computer — they can't see what is on your computer unless you allow access. If you do allow them access, hang up as soon as you realise, turn off your computer, unplug your internet and then contact your bank and let them know what has happened and then take your computer in for repairs to close any backdoor access they may have setup.

If you receive a call on a weekend telling you that your gas, electricity, phone, internet etc will be disconnected unless you make immediate payment. You will be asked for your credit card or bank account details — DO NOT GIVE YOUR PERSONAL DETAILS to them. The other option they will give you is to go to a store and purchase iTunes cards and they will call you back and take the payment that way. THIS IS A SCAM!

Scams are even arriving by snail mail. They look very good, typed, heavy bond paper, good English and looking very official. One even included an ABN extract and a request to renew the ABN by going to a website, and no it wasn't the business registry.

The ATO will also not threaten you with being arrested if you don't pay them immediately. Again, this is a SCAM! They will ask for Credit card details and if you don't have one you will be asked for iTunes vouchers (as above).

The Scammers are always thinking of new ways to get money and personal details from you.

Be vigilant. Do not ring back or click on any links within an email or sms as it will more than likely be a scam. Go to the official website of the company you believe you received the message from.

If you do receive a phone call, an official-looking email or SMS, DO NOT give out your personal information and rather than click on the links provided, do your own independent search.

Go to the website independently, or phone. Usually, you'll find you've dodged a scam. The best way to beat them? Absolute scepticism.

Dunolly Chosen for Australian Mountain Bike Orienteering Championships.

How good are the forests around Dunolly? Well, the answer to that is "Wonderful". In fact, the forests with their network of tracks and paths, has seen Dunolly chosen for one of the Australian Mountain Bike Orienteering Championships events to be held in late October.

We are about to host the 2019 Australian Mountain Bike Orienteering Long Distance Championships on 27th October. Up to 150 competitors from around Australia, New Zealand and Europe are set to arrive in here and take up the challenge of navigating and riding as fast as they can through the complex networks of tracks in the wonderful forests located around our area.

What is Mountain Bike Orienteering you may ask? Well, Mountain bike riders love to ride and orienteers love the challenge of navigating in the forest. Combine the two things and you have Mountain Bike Orienteering or MTBO. Riders are given a detailed map with a number of control sites to find, sent off to ride as fast as they can through the tracks in the forest to find those controls and get back to the finish. So, while riding fast is an advantage, the challenge is being able to ride quickly at the same time as thinking and planning where you are going to go. One may sometimes see a slower rider who navigates more accurately getting back to the finish quicker than the faster rider who pedals off in the wrong direction or becomes "geographically embarrassed"!

Ricky Thackray, Tim Doman and Joel Young who have recently returned from representing Australia in the World MTBO Championships in Denmark this year will be competing in M21 and setting the bar high for all elite riders. Another great aspect of MTBO is that it caters for not just younger elite athletes but also age classes for both men and women 40 years and upwards. Carolyn Jackson who was successful in winning 4 gold medals at the World Masters in Hungary in 2018 in the W60 category will be competing and she is also heavily involved in setting courses for the Sprint event.

The MTBO Championships will begin on Friday afternoon 25th October, with a Mass Start in Maryborough, from the Jack Pascoe Reserve. On Saturday, there are two events to be held; Sprint in the morning that starts from the Maryborough Prep -12 College and in the afternoon the Middle Distance also in Maryborough and then on Sunday 27th the Championships move to forest around the Dunolly area for the Long Distance event.

Currently MTBO competitors entered in the Championships range in age from 14 to 80 and course planners for each event have been busy setting courses of differing lengths to suit the different age groups and ensuring they provide an enjoyable challenge. A recent innovation to the sport has seen the introduction of electronic timing chips that are used by each competitor to record which controls they have visited and at what time. After the course is completed, it is the resulting printout and comparing by competitors of split times and routes taken to ride from one control to another that is definitely part of the enjoyment of the events.

For newcomers to the sport there is the option for interested bike riders to come and try the events by entering by coming along and entering 'On the Day'. More information is available on the Australian MTBO Championships website at:

Planned burn taking place this week

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMV) is set to carry out a planned burn along the Laanecoorie, Laane Track this week and is informing residents they may see smoke in the area as a result.

A fuel reduction burn of 224 hectares was expected to begin yesterday, three kilometres north west of Laanecoorie in the Waanyarra — Dunolly State Forest.

This burn should be completed between 10 am on Monday 21st October and 8pm Thursday 24th October. Residents may see smoke from this burn until Sunday, 27th October.

Smoke may be visible from Laanecoorie, Shelbourne, Eddington and Woodstock West. If residents experience any symptoms that may be due to smoke exposure, the Department of Health and Human Services advises that they seek medical advice or call Nurse-on-Call on 1300 606 024. Close windows and doors to prevent smoke from entering homes.

FFMV also advises that road travel may be hazardous due to low visibility associated with smoke. Signs may be in place to slow traffic and drivers are urged to obey all traffic signs and instructions from fire agency crews near the burn.

Access to walking tracks, car parks, camping grounds and picnic sites in areas close to or in burn areas may be restricted.

Our congratulations were forthcoming and best wishes for more successes in Stawell, Nhill and Maryborough before our next meeting.

Joy Turner answered our plea for speakers recently and her nephew David Alan who has been gardening Bonsais for 27 years had us all absorbed at his display of exquisite specimens, his successes and failures, the history that China was the first country in the 12th to 15th centuries to cultivate bonsai; later Japan carried on refining the art of bonsai. He made it look so easy and his explanations were impressive. He asked, "Did we think Bonsai was cruel?" and then explained that we prune roses, fruit trees and mowed lawns! He suggested that we start with smallleaf trees like fruits (to feed the cockatoos!) as bonsai does not work successfully with larger leaves like the Canadian Maple. Many of his plants began on our nature strips and so long as kept healthy with root pruning over three to four years they will survive in their wee pots with little healthy soil and regular but not overwatering so long as roots stay healthy. Pots may need moving to capture the sunshine/shade required each seasonal change hot areas are a killer of these delightful plants which manage so magnificently in little soil. Watering in the mornings steams the root system and the plant dies.

Therapeutic and addictive he admits it all is. He and his partner run a nursery with 5,000 trees with instruction in Bendigo. You are more likely to buy your first bonsai so that you can follow what happens to any type of tree with which you experiment. He demonstrated that the exciting older looking bonsai are designed not to look like a tree, regularly pruned to keep a neat profile and he passed around his smart phone with a wonderful photo of an 87 year old bonsai in a big pot. He had on display a 25 year old crab apple which produces small fruit but they have to be de-fruited accordingly. With smaller trees, roots should be trimmed early while roots are growing; comb and trim roots then replant in fresh soil. Larger established trees only need roots trimmed and re-potted each 3-4 years. Sit the pots in a tray of wet sand when trimming roots. In winter water 6-7 times weekly. Fig and Jade are frost prone, everything else is OK. His Japanese maple, 50 years old is worth \$3,000 and not for sale.

Repotting is done in the dormant season prior to leaf budding – as they wake up they need treatment.

David recommends that you start with the size tree you want. Larger is easier to tend and needs soil to survive so they are healthier in a bigger pot with more soil; repot in winter to a bigger pot. Work with your bonsais and check once a day. Maple (acer) takes a lot of pruning care; pines once a year; figs half hour each year.

Then David demonstrated how to shape with wires and prune a pine tree. Don't prune root and repot at the same time – leave six weeks in between. Cut training wire longer than the height of your specimen; hold the wire and twist around the trunk. Finally he wound it all down in circles onto the pot. Amazing and so cute. Keep soil moist, keep in the garden area; morning sun to midday and certainly not in a hot house.

He displayed how roots can be wired into holes in the base of the pot for stability.

While the lovely pots are so good but expensive he said old boots, old hollow trees will hold the water you need! Following our meeting lunch was at the Railway Hotel. Happily the D Sharps have been invited to play again at our December breakup. They are SO good.

Slow Cooked Lamb Shanks with Lentil Ragout Serves 4-6; Preparation 30 minutes; Cooking 2 hours and 15 minutes; Reheating 30 minutes.

Ingredients:

8 frenched lamb shanks (see tip)

2 tablespoons seasoned flour

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 onion, coarsely chopped

1 carrot, coarsely chopped

1 stalk celery, trimmed, chopped

1 long red chilli, finely chopped

400g can brown lentils, rinsed, drained

400g can crushed tomatoes

1 cup water

1/2 cup red wine

cup balsamic vinegar

1/2 cup chopped parsley

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to moderately slow, 160°C.
- 2. Toss lamb in flour, shaking off excess. Heat oil in large saucepan. Brown shanks in two batches, for four to five minutes. Transfer to a plate. Set aside.
- 3. Sauté onion, carrot, celery and chilli in same pan on high for four to five minutes, until onion is tender. Stir through lentils, tomatoes, water, wine and vinegar. Bring to the boil.
- 4. Place lamb and onion mixture into a large ovenproof casserole dish. Bake, covered, for 1 hour, stirring occasionally. Bake, uncovered, for a further hour, until meat is almost falling off the bone. Stir parsley through lentil mixture just before serving.

Freezing Tip: Cool lamb shanks and ragout before freezing. Transfer to airtight freezer containers. Both the meat and the lentils can be frozen for up to 3 months. Reheating Tip Defrost lamb shanks in the fridge overnight. Place mixture in an ovenproof dish. Reheat, covered, in a moderately slow oven, 160°C, for 20-30 minutes, until boiling. Allow to boil for 3 minutes.

What's happened?

Australia Post is warning the community of widespread scam text messages telling customers there are problems delivering a package, or that a parcel won't be delivered "due to unverified shipping address."

The text messages use AusPost as the sender name (which means it appears in the same text thread as other legitimate AusPost communications) and asks you to click on a link.

The link leads to a fake website with the Australia Post logo, asking you to verify your address and provide a payment. By entering these details, the scammer can steal your personal and financial information.

Does it affect me?

These text messages have been sent to a large number of people.

The way mobile phones show SMS conversations means this scam message can look like a legitimate Australia Post text message. When scammers pretend to be legitimate or well-known brands to trick you into handing over your personal details, this is known as 'phishing'.

How do I stay safe?

Remember that Australia Post will never:

- Email or text message you asking you to click on a link to print out a receipt or label for parcel collection and tracking, or to access your package.
- Ask you to send an email with your personal or financial information, including any form of ID, passwords, credit card details and account information.

If you are not sure whether an email, text message or phone call is legitimate, contact the organisation the message claims to be from. Do this by searching for contact details on their official website, social media page or other independent source and not from any contact details in the message.

If you believe you have sent any personal information to a scam email address or entered it into a scam website and are worried that your identity may have been stolen, you can contact IDCARE — Australia and New Zealand's free national identity and cyber support service on: 1300 432 273.







Maryborough's Metro Petroleum owner JK was excited to officially open his new service station this week.

Maryborough's new service station open for business

Maryborough's fourth petrol station, Metro Petroleum, officially switched on its pumps this week, 12 months after its planning application was approved by council.

Situated on the corner of Napier and Nolan streets, the station saw its first customers on Wednesday afternoon and owner JK said after a long journey, it's exciting and a relief to finally have the business up and running.

The station is the fourth to open in town, in close proximity to Caltex, Coles Express and United Petroleum, and JK said he hopes to provide more choice and competition for the community.

"What I've heard from local people is that the petrol prices in Maryborough are very high all the time, so people are travelling to Ballarat and Bendigo to fill their cars up," he said.

"That also means that they're doing some shopping in those towns which is taking money away from local businesses which I think is hard for locals here.

"Metro has always been very good with their prices without compromising on the quality of their fuel, so it's one of the reasons we wanted to come here.

"Healthy competition is always a good thing. We're here to help people and make sure they get the best quality fuel for the best price."

A planning application for the station was submitted by Aksara Pty Ltd, 'on behalf of Metro Petroleum, to Central Goldfields Shire Council in August last year.

Two objectors, representing three people, raised concerns around the new station including the safety of pedestrians on footpaths because of an increase in traffic, the cinema opposite the site were concerned about their emergency exit point, and concerns about other service stations already being in town.

Despite the objections, the application was approved a month later with 31 conditions from council including restrictions on hours of operation — which was proposed to be 24 hours but was 6 am to 11 pm — restrictions of hiflo diesel dispensers, traffic flow and size of trucks delivering fuel.

JK said he was inspired to set up shop in Maryborough when he was looking to leave Melbourne for a tree change.

"I was driving through Maryborough while going to Ballarat and I stopped at the Bull and Mouth Hotel and just loved it. I loved the town and I knew I had to find a way to move here," he said.

In an effort to become as involved with the community as possible, the station will be serving hot and cold food from neighbouring business Madam Chi Chi.

"Instead of getting baked good products from suppliers, Madam Chi Chi will be providing hot and cold food for us to sell," JK said.

"It's a partnership where I can support the local community which is great."

The station will also be one of its kind in the area with the installation of an electric car charging station.

"This is something fancy and new that no one else in the town has and Maryborough is one of the only places in a very big radius to have this," JK said.

"It's bringing something new and innovative to the community which is always a good thing."

Aksara Pty Ltd also submitted an application for a second service station to be located at 32 Victoria Street, Carisbrook, which operated as a petrol station until 2008.

The submission proposed a six pump station which would operate from 6 am to 1 am daily, but council is yet to make a decision on the application.
