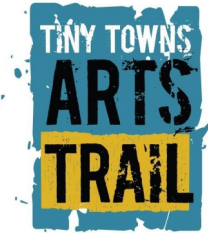

Dear Editor

I would like to take the opportunity to encourage Central Goldfields residents to protect themselves against the flu this winter and get their flu shot.

The flu isn't like the common cold - it can hit quickly and last for weeks, meaning time off work or school and staying away from family and friends.

For vulnerable people in Western Victoria, like children, the elderly and people with chronic diseases or a weakened immune system, the flu can have serious and devastating outcomes.

The message is simple - you never forget the flu and its awful symptoms, so don't forget your flu shot.

Everyone should get their annual flu shot anytime from mid-April onwards to be protected for the peak flu season, which is generally June to September.

The flu shot is now available from general practitioners, community immunisation sessions and many pharmacies.

Some of our most vulnerable Victorians will be protected with a free flu shot including all Victorians over 65, pregnant women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and anyone with a chronic condition or weakened immune system.

The flu doesn't discriminate, and anyone can be affected, that's why it is so important that everyone in the Central Goldfields Shire protects themselves against the flu this season.

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## 2019-2020 Proposed Budget

The Proposed 2019/2020 Budget was endorsed at Tuesday's Ordinary Meeting of Council.

The Proposed Budget is underpinned by the Council Plan, which sets the strategic direction for Council.

It reflects our vision to be a vibrant, thriving and inclusive community.

Community members are invited to view and respond to the Proposed 2019/2020 Budget via written submission or in person.

Written submissions regarding the Proposed Budget are invited and should be submitted to

Council by close of business at 5pm on Wednesday 29 May 2019, with the opportunity for submissions to be heard at a special hearing at 5.30pm on Tuesday 11 June 2019 at the Community Hub, Burns Street, Maryborough.

The Proposed Budget has a surplus of \$1.03 million and includes a \$10.29 million investment into key infrastructure projects and \$120,000 for community planning for eight townships.

### Rangers checking pet registrations

With pet registrations due earlier this month, Shire Rangers will be conducting random pet registration checks from Monday 29 April, 2019.

Owners can face fines of more than \$300 for each dog or cat that is unregistered.

If you live in a residential area, you are allowed to have two dogs and two cats unless you have a permit stating otherwise.

In rural areas, owners can own four cats and six dogs without a permit.

### Rating Strategy endorsed

Central Goldfields Shire Council adopted the Rating Strategy 2019-2021 at Tuesday night's Ordinary Council Meeting.

This strategy reduces the municipal charge to 10% and remove rating category differentials.

Changes to the municipal charge will be phased in over three years while changes to the removal of the differential rating categories over five years.

### Central Goldfields Shire Council Administrator appointed to Board of Sport Australia

Congratulations to Administrator Hugh Delahunty has been appointed to the Board of Sport Australia, which is the nation's primary sports administration and advisory agency.

This is yet another opportunity for our rural community to be represented at a National level.

### Internet upgrades

The Maryborough Regional Library is about to receive an internet connection upgrade.

From Monday 29 April, the Library is upgrading to a Telstra fibre connection. The new connection is set to go live during the week.

It is expected the new connection will allow internet speeds to reach 50 mbps.

The Library is expected to remain open during the upgrades.

The public can access the Library's free Wi-Fi by connecting via their own device or accessing the on-site computers via their library card or by obtaining a guest pass.

## MAYORAL COLUMN

### Draft budget out for comment

Following its consideration at the April Council meeting, Loddon Shire's 2019/20 Draft Budget is now out for public comment.

The draft budget sees Council remain in a strong cash position with a small surplus and no new borrowings. It proposes a 2.5 per cent average rate rise which is in line with the State Government's Fair Go Rates System capping level.

Kerbside rubbish collection charges will increase by 2.5 per cent – this is to assist in ensuring management of waste remains cost neutral.

In addition to ongoing delivery of services to the community, the budget contains a capital expenditure program of \$13.68 million. This includes \$4.71 million for roads, \$4.51 million for recreational, leisure and community facilities, \$0.92 million for urban and road drainage, \$0.26 million for footpaths and \$0.55 million for parks, open space and streetscapes.

There is a continuing commitment to Council's Community Planning program of \$750,000 as well as support for aged services and early years programs.

Hard copies are available for inspection at Council offices in Wedderburn and Serpentine as well as at post offices, resource centres and neighbourhood houses across the Shire.

Written submissions to the draft budget will close at 5pm on Friday 24 May 2019.

Council will meet to consider submissions at the Council Forum on Tuesday 11 June. Council will then consider adoption of the Draft Budget at its Ordinary Meeting on Tuesday 25 June 2019.

### Activating Open Spaces Strategy out for comment

At its April meeting, Council also resolved to advertise the draft Activating Open Spaces Strategy for public comment.

The Activating Open Spaces Strategy is a key strategic planning tool that aims to develop and maintain public open spaces throughout our Shire. It provides strategies designed to activate and optimise the use of reserves and open spaces to maximise the wider health and wellbeing, social and recreation objectives of residents.

### Recycling – white goods and metal

During this financial year, 147 white goods items were collected in Loddon Shire (at 5.88 tonnes) and 152 tonnes of metal (this excludes hard waste collections).

White goods contain significant amounts of metal, plastic, insulating material, refrigerant (gasses) and other non-renewable and valuable material. By recycling the various components of white goods, it keeps toxic substances from entering the environment.

Recycling scrap metal also means that waste products come full circle to become new materials and products. Recycled scrap metal has a lot of uses – from sheet metal to piping and wires to food containers, as well as cars and furniture. It also reduces the demand to extract raw commodity metals.

### Did you know?

The Fire Services Property Levy (FSPL), which is an amount that appears on rates notices, is a state government levy managed on behalf of the State Government by local councils. The FSPL has a fixed and a variable component, with the rate determined yearly by the State Revenue Office. All funds collected by Council are forwarded to the State Revenue Office. 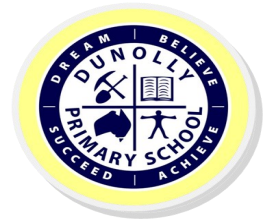

## Maryborough Ambulance Auxiliary

This month we are talking about asthma and how to prepare, protect or respond if you are faced with this scenario. In case of emergency, always call Triple Zero. Asthma is a life threatening inflammatory condition affecting the airways. When exposed to certain triggers a person's airways narrow, making it hard for the patient to breathe. Asthma is a chronic condition which can take anywhere from a few minutes to a few days to develop. During an asthma attack, chest tightness, coughing, wheezing, and a shortness of breath may be the main symptoms. These symptoms can quickly worsen. Signs of a severe asthma attack:

- Gasping for breath
- Severe chest tightness
- Inability to speak more than one or two words per breath
- Feeling distressed or anxious
- Little or no improvement after using blue reliever medication (Airomir, Asmol, Bricanyl or Ventolin)
- 'Sucking in' of the throat and rib muscles
- Blue colouring around the lips (which can sometimes be hard to see if the skin colour also changes)
- Pale and sweaty.

If a person is having an asthma attack, you should commence asthma first aid:

**Step one:** Sit the person upright, remain calm and provide reassurance. Do not leave the person alone.

**Step two:** Without delay shake a blue reliever puffer and give four (4) separate puffs, one (1) puff at a time, preferably through a spacer device. Ask the person to take four (4) breaths from the spacer after each puff.

**Step three:** Wait four minutes

**Step four:** If there is little or no improvement repeat steps two and three.

If there is still no improvement, or you are concerned at any time - call Triple Zero for an ambulance immediately and state that the person is having an asthma attack. Continue to repeat steps two and three while waiting for an ambulance to arrive.

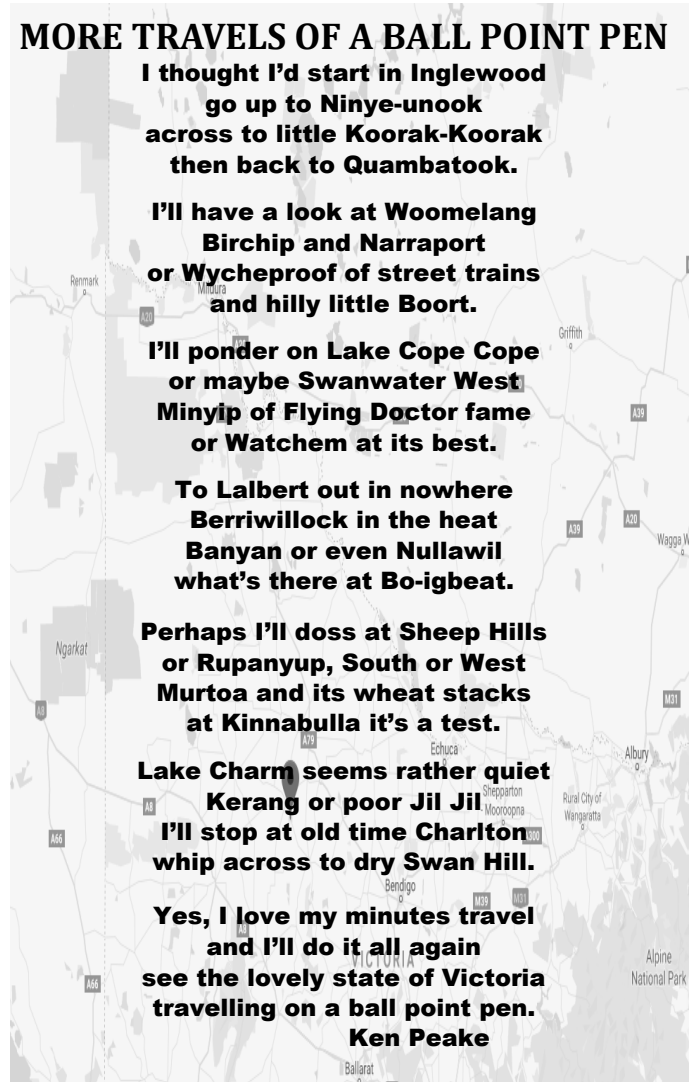

### End of Fire Danger Period Reminder!

The Fire Danger Period will officially terminate at 1am on Wednesday 1st May in the Central Goldfields Shire; and began on Monday 29 April in the Loddon Shire.

Residents are reminded to abide by fire regulations and even after the end of the Fire Danger Period, the summary offences act still applies. Conditions remain dry and escaped fires are still possible and whilst there has been little rain, autumn conditions such as temperatures, relative humidity, dew points, etc are typically conducive to burning.

CFA District 02 Operations Manager Bill Johnstone said "burning off should always be a last resort. Residents are instead encouraged to dispose of waste in other ways, such as mulching, using green bins or taking green waste to local transfer stations where domestic quantities of green waste are accepted."

Mr Johnstone went on to say "residents must also ensure that if you comply with local laws and have to burn off, the only material that can be burnt is dry wood as any other materials including rubbish, green waste and leaves are prohibited as they create excessive and toxic smoke which is detrimental to health."

Each municipality has their own local laws about lighting fires. Contact your local council to find out what local laws apply and note that these may be in place all year round; and so you may still require a permit to burn.

CFA North West Region Community Safety Manager David Allen commented "any time a fire is lit, you must notify your neighbours as well as the Burn Off Notification Line on 1800 668 511. By doing this, you may just save an unnecessary callout by your local CFA members."

Mr Allen added "You need to have an adequate supply of water available to extinguish a fire and these must never be left unattended for any reason at all. In addition to this, you should not leave your fire (even when extinguished) until it is cool to the touch."

### Vegetable and Tomato Soup with Pasta

Vegetables are lightly sautéed first so that they will have more flavour. Add chicken stock or water and finally, tomato soup.

You can garnish with some parsley or for a different flavour, add a spoonful of finely grated cheese such as parmesan.

Ingredients

2 tablespoons olive oil or a vegetable oil

30g butter

1 large onion finely diced

1/2 cup carrots finely diced

1 stalk finely chopped celery

1 clove of garlic, crushed or finely chopped.

About a dozen small mushrooms cut into halves

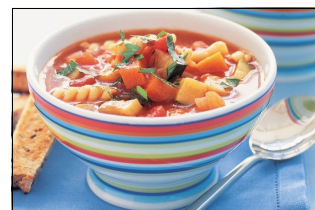
2 cups water or chicken stock

1/2 cup small pasta such as macaroni

1 445g tin of tomato soup

1. Place the oil and butter in a saucepan and heat. Add the onion, carrot, celery garlic and cook, giving it an occasional stir until the vegetables have softened. Add the mushrooms and cook another couple of minutes.
2. Add the water or chicken stock, cover the pan and cook until vegetables are quite tender. This should not take too long if they have been cut small.
3. Add the pasta, tomato soup and simmer again until the pasta has just softened, but still a bit firm to bite.  
You can serve immediately or reheat.

## Travels with Cynthia



Recently I watched an episode of Poirot where he visited Rhodes. Seeing his ferry arriving at the quay with the grand and imposing castle filling the screen took me back to the day our cruise boat arrived at the same spot and how impressive it was walking within the shadows of the huge stone walls.

Inside the old town there are many shops, cafes and little galleries but if you cross a large courtyard and go through a gate in the big stone wall you are suddenly in the new town and what a contrast. It's just the same as any modern place with very little atmosphere, so we skedaddled back through the gate into the lovely old town.

The Grand Master's Palace is another beautiful building in Rhodes. After climbing many stone steps you arrive at an open plaza flanked with huge pillars and it was there I saw my first live statue. It was a Greek athlete holding a discus so we decided to take a photo. In a flash the statue came to life and we discovered that it was a man entirely covered in a silvery white body paint and beside him an ancient jug for donations. In the years since I have seen these living statues in the CBD of Melbourne but that was my first experience of such a fascinating idea.

There were people off our ship who were looking for the Colossus of Rhodes, one of the Seven Wonders, but of course it had long gone and the spot is marked with a plaque beside the water near the quay.

Another Greek island we visited was Patmos where you can climb the hill and have a magnificent view over the blue Mediterranean to other islands. It was here we were shown villas owned by film stars, one owned by Juliette Binoche, star of Chocolat and another by the Sultan of Brunei. Patmos has no fresh water on the island so a boat comes twice a week with water and the locals bring their containers to be filled. Patmos also has no rubbish disposal and the same thing happens; it is all shipped off to the mainland.

I think anyone who has visited the Greek Islands must hanker to go back again.

"Students in Western Victoria should have access to a great school no matter where they live and I'm proud we are investing in important maintenance to schools so students have the first-rate facilities they deserve," Ms Pulford said.

"Our schools in Western Victoria do everything possible to get the most out of their students, so it is wonderful news that they are among the schools set to share in this maintenance funding," she said.

A new evaluation system was put in place last year to provide more up-to-date information of the condition of school infrastructure to create a more timely and targeted allocation of Planned Maintenance Program funding.

The Andrews Government has already invested more than \$3.8 billion to deliver new schools and more than 1,300 school upgrades, supporting more than 5,000 construction jobs for Victorians.

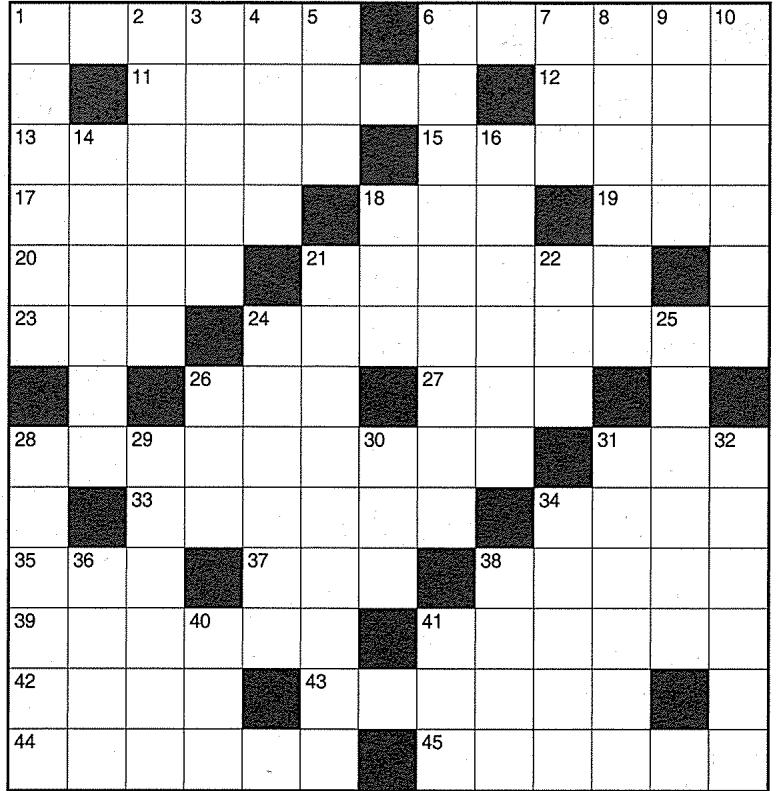

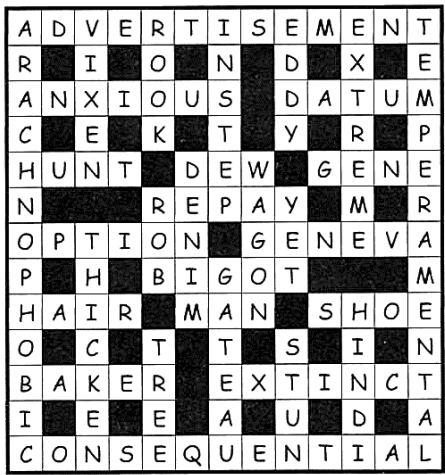

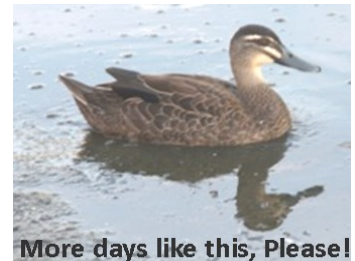

The weather was kind for this year's ANZAC Day. A respectable-sized crowd gathered on Broadway to watch the parade and basked in the bright sunshine. The event finished with a delicious lunch served in the RSL Hall and people mingling and swapping "hero" stories.
