Dunolly's new touch free water fountain

Dunolly has become the first town in the Coliban Water region to have a "touch-free" drinking fountain available for community use.

Coliban Water Executive General Manager Customer, Community and Stakeholder Affairs Lauren McLean said the fountain was installed earlier this month in Gordon Gardens and has touch-free sensors, which allow the user to refill a drink bottle.

"This fantastic initiative was delivered in partnership with Central Goldfields Shire Council, allowing community members and visitors to Dunolly to stay hydrated while out and about – and most importantly, do so in a safe way.

"The current environment has meant many public drinking fountains have been temporarily closed to ensure the health and wellbeing of our communities. Safer alternatives for public drinking stations are now starting to emerge, as the industry and suppliers respond to community needs," Mrs McLean said.

Central Goldfields Shire Council Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said council is always looking for ways to innovate and provide safe, smart services to its community.

"The touch-free" sensors on this fountain have allowed us to add this piece of infrastructure to Gordon Gardens for the benefit of local residents.

"We've delivered a number of significant upgrade works to the Gordon Gardens precinct recently – including the basketball court, pump track and outdoor exercise equipment. This is part of the State Government's Healthy Heart initiative —and so this drinking fountain complements this work and will mean our Dunolly community can keep hydrated whilst active."

Mrs McLean said there are also numerous benefits of drinking tap water with a refillable drink bottle.

"Drinking tap water is a great alternative to bottled water while contributing to a healthy lifestyle. That's what the Choose Tap campaign is all about. We know there are benefits for not only your health but also the environment and your pocket.

"Our communities are moving towards a sustainable future as we all look to reduce our plastic use. This new fountain will become a valuable piece of community infrastructure that will encourage refillable drink bottle use instead of single-use plastic bottles.

"This project also supports our Strategy 2030 plan, in particular working towards healthy people and environment, and also green and active communities. Water underpins our liveability and this addition to Gordon Gardens provides increased amenities for the community."

Coliban Water is working with councils to install more touch-free drinking fountains in the region.

DEB'S FUN FOOD FACTS From around the world

This week we're travelling to France, the home of the best patisseries. Let's tackle something that people often think is hard but is in fact quite easy, if you follow the steps.

Choux pastry, or in French, paté a choux, choux means cabbage and paté means paste, this is because the pastry resembles tiny cabbages. When it is baked the puffed pastry has little crinkles similar to cabbages.

There are 2 rules really, 1 stick by the measurements and 2 do not open the oven during cooking.

Ingredients

80 ml water

40 gm butter, cubed, room temperature

50 gram plain flour

2 eggs, room temperature

Method

Preheat oven to 200C

Put the water and butter in a saucepan over a medium heat. Stir until the butter melts and the mixture starts to boil.

Add all the flour to the mixture and using a wooden spoon beat until it is combined.

Put over a low heat and stir for 1-2 minutes until the mixture forms a ball and starts to come away from the sides of the saucepan.

Take from heat and let it cool a little. Whisk the eggs separately and add 1 to the mixture, beating well. Gradually add the 2nd egg and beat until the mixture falls from the spoon but still holds its shape.

Use baking paper to line a tray and pipe your shapes.

Brush your pastry with a little of the remaining egg.

Bake for 25 minutes or until the pastry is puffed and golden.

Take from the oven and turn off. Using a small knife pierce the bottom of each puff to release steam and return to the oven for 15 minutes.

Remove from the oven and place on a wire rack to cool. Now you are only limited by your imagination for fillings, homemade whipped cream, lemon curd etc. You can also use savoury fillings at your next gathering.

Private fires a leading cause of bushfire

More than a quarter (27%) of bushfires are caused by escaped private fires, equating to more than 6100 bushfires over the past 10 bushfire seasons that should never have happened, new CFA data shows.

"Unfortunately, many bushfires start from escaped campfires and recreational fires. It's vital to know how to properly light and maintain a campfire to make sure it doesn't go bush," Acting Chief Officer Cook said.

"We urge people to exercise extreme caution when cleaning up properties using private burn-offs and encourage people to visit our website for tips on how to safely do that.


"It includes advice such as always checking fire restrictions with your local council and registering your burn on 1800 668 511, to check and monitor weather conditions, and having sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading." Not always will the interaction obtain the outcome you require, but you should leave feeling a reasonable understanding has been achieved and the belief that the staff member has done everything to inform you of the situation.

You should feel comfortable to ask questions of all council employees and also believe they will give you advice which will be beneficial in a non-intimidating way. We are a team and a team that works together achieves together.

Most of our concerns should be dealt with by the shire itself. Our elected councillors should only be involved if there is a situation which you and the shire can not resolve.

Our elected councillors have their task and it is not the day-to-day running of the shire. Understanding the process and two links above you will have a very good start on how to address enquiries.



COVID-19 and garage sales

Loddon Shire residents are reminded that outdoor garage sales are not permitted under the Third Step of the Roadmap to reopening as they are on private residential property.

The public gathering limit only applies to public spaces, and therefore is not applicable to household gardens or privately owned outdoor spaces. You can only have up to two people visit you at home each day.

The two people may be from different households and may visit separately. Your intimate partner and dependents are not included in the cap.

CFA declares the FDP for each shire at different times in the lead up to the fire season. It depends on the amount of rain, grassland curing rate and other local conditions.

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History Of the old Dunolly Library



Recently the Central Goldfields Shire Council announced our Dunolly Library is finally under construction. This information got me thinking. I knew I had heard stories about the genesis of the library, but they were cloudy in my memory. So, when in doubt, find a source who was involved.

In 2013 residents of Dunolly were informed of a decision having been made to reduce the existing library service to a level that was not acceptable to the residents.

At this time Parliament was sitting in regional areas, to be more accessible. Well, one of our citizens decided to follow in the footsteps of Emmeline Pankhurst; she stood up in Parliament in Bendigo and asked why money meant for the Dunolly Library was being diverted to other services, thus reducing the library service. Who was this woman? Our own Judy Meldrum.

"Women are very slow to rouse, but once they are aroused, once they are determined, nothing on earth and nothing in heaven will make women give way; it is impossible." This is a direct quote from Ms Pankhurst, quite apt I believe, to stand up in Parliament, one lone voice, asks a difficult question, not an easy task.

Well it seems the question was asked well; the right politician heard the question and within weeks there were

discussions held on how best to proceed on providing a proper library service for Dunolly and surrounds.

But that's not all there is to this story. The residents of Dunolly also decided they needed to stand up and be heard. After a meeting in which the General Manager of Go Goldfields informed the town of the reduced library service the residents resolved they would not let it rest.

Just when you think Dunolly is a staid little town, you need to think again, there was a protest in the street.



The new library is to be located in the old Police Station, adjacent to Dunolly Courthouse on Market Street.


Uniting Church

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
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Flett Family History Part one by Cynthia Lindsay

Flett was one of the first family names I heard when arriving in Dunolly many moons ago.

There were, and still are, a great number of Fletts living in Dunolly and its surrounds. Anyone who has attended a musical event in the district will be familiar with the name Esmé Flett, a virtuoso on the piano who has accompanied all sorts of singers, as well as musical productions. From the age of five Esmé used to visit any place where she knew the neighbours owned a piano.

There were four homes: Davenport's, Abbott's, Cole's and Aker's, where Esmé appeared and proceeded to sit at their piano and bang and pound the keyboards, maybe aiming to produce a tune. At one particular shop, run by the Sandow twins, Esmé made such an impression that the two ladies decided to take her in hand. Blanche paid for 12 months of piano lessons and Myrtle became her teacher. It seems the Sandow ladies' belief in Esmé's musical talent was well founded because she started playing the St John's Anglican Church organ when only in her teens. From then on Esmé was always in demand as an accompanist for all sorts of functions, including Anzac Day, the Uniting Church's "Singing Christmas Tree", Rachel's afternoons, Gilbert & Sullivan productions and numerous occasions in the Town Hall. Many times the organ from the Uniting church was moved to the Town Hall. On one memorable occasion Esmé's piano was "walked" from the Uniting Church to the Cockatoo Café! That was during the time she played with the Wigwag Big Band.

Esmé's family goes back a long way in the district. Her great grandfather, Daniel Thomas, arrived in Bealiba alone as a young lad because both his parents died on the boat coming to Australia. His sister was adopted from the boat. Daniel decided to join the many prospectors seeking gold. He was known to get fired up after a few drinks and kept a gun over the fireplace and often threatened to use it on the Maryborough lawyer he accused of doing him out of some money. He had a large family and one son, Eddie Thomas, was Esmé's grandfather.

My grandson is also named Eddie Thomas and one day when visiting Mike's grave, he found a grave with his own name. I now realise it must have been Esmé's grandfather, who married Rose Thorp, her grandmother. Eddie went to the first World War and became a career soldier and later a captain in the Permanent Military Forces (PMF). He received the sad news of the death of his baby son from encephalitis when he was waiting in Western Australia to embark for Egypt.

Esmé's mother, Esther, married Sydney Laging, Esmé's maiden name. Esmé credits her grandmother on her father's side for her musical talent and Esmé's son, Rodney, as most of us are aware, plays trombone.

Moving to the Flett family, Keith, Esmé's husband, follows a long line of family who also settled in the goldfields area. That will be my next instalment. Cynthia

YEAR 6 GRADUATION

We are so happy to read in the updated Operational Guidelines that graduation can occur. Whilst it can't be as we would usually have it with families attending too, we are so happy the students will still get to enjoy an evening together to farewell their primary years. This is directly from the Guidelines

School graduations

Year 6 and Year 12 graduations are permitted face to face in Victorian schools. Students from the graduating year level and staff can attend in person. Parents/carers and other family members or friends cannot attend in person but could engage via an online broadcasting of the event.

All schools are required to follow public health directions and apply the operational health and safety advice to schools the graduation during ceremony. This includes staff and secondary students over the age of 12 years wearing face masks, physical and distancing practising hand hygiene.

Face masks can be removed briefly for photos or giving a speech. Singing and small ensemble groups (10 or fewer participants) performances can occur outdoors, with physical distancing of at least 5m between the performers and audience. No external performers are permitted.



Let's talk about the elephant in the room



Family violence has long been considered a private issue, but if we can better understand what it is, and talk about it, cultural change is possible.

Maryborough will be next to host a colourful fibreglass elephant, designed to help reduce the shame, stigma, and secrecy around family violence.

Tricia Currie CEO, Women's Health Loddon Mallee said she was pleased her organisation could provide a link between partners in Gannawarra and Central Goldfields to find the elephant its new location. "We are delighted to be able to provide support for this powerful community project" Tricia said. "Change can only happen if the 'elephant in the room' can be named and talked about. These 16 Days of Activism are to call out that violence against women is prevalent and preventable."

The arrival of the Elephant in the Room is part of the Central Goldfields family violence action group's coordination of a local 16 Days of Activism campaign. The 16 days of Activism is a global campaign which runs from November 25th to December 10th to raise awareness and encourage action towards ending violence against women and girls.

The Elephant in the Room project was developed in Wodonga by Gateway Health to encourage people to talk about family violence and has since travelled extensively throughout regional Victoria.
