Carpet Bowls Bealiba Style

On a hot and humid summer evening 17 carpet bowlers gathered in the Bealiba Hall eager to begin their year. On three mats, all of which seemed way too short and narrow to an inexperienced eye, the players did battle with each other and themselves.

The intense concentration on each face as they stepped up for their turn was amazing. It was astonishing to learn that the carpet bowls group has been meeting like this for more than 50 years now. Life member Shirley Coburn said it all started when Bealiba resident Sam Whitehead took a trip, perhaps to Queensland, where he learned to play carpet bowls. On his return he persuaded the Bealiba RSL that carpet bowls would be popular in their town. Several RSL committee members paid for the mats and bowls out of their own pockets, and over time the carpet bowls club paid them back. When the Bealiba RSL disbanded, the Bealiba Hall took the club on and it is now known as Bealiba Hall Bowls. They meet weekly for most of the year and membership costs \$5 per person per year and \$3 per person per night to play. This includes a cuppa and supper at the end of the evening. A member donated raffle is drawn monthly.

Once a year the Bealiba bowlers visit the St Arnaud and Avoca carpet bowls clubs, and once a year they host these clubs at Bealiba. Some Avoca players come out to Bealiba each week as well.

At the beginning of the evening president Joe Battisson welcomed everybody back for the 2020 year of bowling.

Members said the sheer entertainment of the evenings and the chance to socialise with others was what brought them out week after week. One newer member said "I would be a hermit without it". New members are made very welcome. Certainly everyone made us feel welcome. So if you think Thursday evening carpet bowls might interest you try the Bealiba Hall at 7.30pm. You might be very glad you did.





Measles in Victoria

Two new unrelated cases of measles have been identified in returned travellers from Nepal and the Philippines. This brings the number of cases of measles identified in Victoria this year to three. These cases were infectious on their return flights to Australia.

Measles is a highly contagious viral disease that causes symptoms such as fever and sore throat followed by a rash that spreads from the face down the body. Unvaccinated infants are particularly at risk of contracting measles and complications of the disease in children may include pneumonia, encephalitis or even death.

Free measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine is available to all people born during or since 1966 who do not have documentation that they have received two measles-containing vaccines, or are unsure of their vaccination history, regardless of Medicare status.

Did you know?

If you had elected to pay your rates in full, you would have paid by last Friday. The rates collected by Council help fund services within the community such as family and children's services, aged and disability services as well as essential infrastructure such as roads, footpaths, parks, gardens, swimming pools and sports facilities.

An amount that appears on rates notices is the Fire Services Property Levy (FSPL). This is a state government levy managed by local councils on behalf of the state government. The levy ensures all property owners contribute a fair share to our fire services, not just those with insurance. Grants available to Protect Ripon's History

Funding is now available for groups working to protect Ripon's most important cultural landmarks and buildings through the Living Heritage Program, says Member for Ripon Louise Staley.

This round of the grants program will provide vital funds for repairs and conservation works on significant places and objects while supporting traditional trades and increasing tourism opportunities.

Grants between \$20,000 and \$200,000 will be available with applications encouraged for conservation works to places located in areas impacted by bushfires.

"These grants will help keep our rich heritage and history alive in our communities," Ms Staley said.

"It is vitally important, both economically and socially, for rural and regional communities like the ones in Ripon to preserve their stories and landmarks so future generations can know and appreciate our history."

Applications are open to local councils, community and not-for-profit organisations, and committees of management. Application for the round five of the Living Heritage Program opened on Monday 17th February.

CFA: Fire season is far from over

Victorians are still at risk of fast-running scrub and grass fires, CFA has warned as it issued a reminder that February is a month that has seen some of the state's worst fires over the years.

While conditions have recently eased in some parts of the state, parts of Victoria are still very dry and above-average temperatures are expected for Victoria throughout February and into March.

CFA's Assistant Chief Officer (North West Region), Gavin Thompson, said now was a good time to revisit bushfire safety plans, especially if household circumstances have changed with the return of family members to work and school

"Our message to the community is that there is still the risk of fast-running scrub and grass fires and we are not out of the danger zone just yet. This is still fire season and you still need to be prepared," he said.

Despite recent rains, significant fires remain active in the state with firefighters continuing to work on bringing them under control, and any new fires could still be problematic in many parts of Victoria.

As relief and recovery efforts are ongoing in communities throughout East Gippsland and North East Victoria, a serious threat remains across the state.

"Victorians are reminded that some of the most devastating fires in our state have occurred throughout the month of February, including the St Patricks Day fires in 2018, Black Saturday in 2009, the North East fires in 2003, and Ash Wednesday in 1983. Going further back, the Gippsland Fires in 1965, Red Tuesday in 1898, and Black Thursday in 1851 all took place during February," ACO Thompson said.

"One of last bushfire season's highest-impact fires, the Bunyip State Park fire destroyed 29 homes and many more outbuildings. That fire didn't start until 1st March and burned more than 15,000 hectares before it was contained two weeks later."

Mr Thompson said weather modelling indicates there is a strong chance that Victoria will exceed the average temperature, particularly in the north of the state, which could also continue into March.

"That means as we move through the next few weeks with those hotter conditions, there's potential for grass fires particularly to have considerable impact on spike days."

Following last year's bushfire season, CFA's annual Bushfire Community Survey showed that 52 per cent of respondents considered the risk moderate, minor or non-existent.



Break-ins at the school and golf club

Break-ins and property damage plagued businesses and clubs this week, with two incidents in Dunolly.

The Dunolly Primary School and Dunolly Golf Club were both broken into. The school was broken into on Wednesday morning and the school alarm was activated at 6am, but by the time police arrived the offender/s had already left.

Goldfields Criminal Investigation Unit, Detective Senior Constable Scott De La Rue said given the proximity of the golf club and school, police believe the two incidents are connected.

"We don't have a timeframe for when the golf club was broken into, but the offender/s forced entry and caused some minor damage. They stole some alcohol and a small amount of cash," he said.

An unknown number of offenders forced entry into the office block of the Dunolly Primary School at around 6am and did some minor damage, but no items where stolen.

"Schools don't tend to hold a lot of things of value and the valuables they have they tend to secure well. I think the offender/s who broke into Dunolly Primary School were just opportunistic and failed to find what they were looking for "

Det Sen Con De La Rue said members of the public who saw any suspicious activity during the time of the breakins should contact police.

"If members of the public saw anything unusual around that time on Wednesday or cars hanging around the golf club or school they can give us a call with any details," he said.

"We always ask people to be vigilant. If they see anything they think is unusual or any suspicious vehicles, take down the registration and let local police know."

Dunolly Primary School principal Katie Lovel said the incident was "disappointing" but that she was relieved nothing was stolen.

"Nothing's been stolen, it's just the damage done to the back doors and the inconvenience of having to relocate some classes during the morning while the investigators were here," she said.

"It's not something we've really seen here before so it's really disappointing and an inconvenience that we have to repair the damage done.

"We're very fortunate nothing was stolen so there hasn't been a huge interruption to the educational programs."

Ms Lovel said it has been "heart-warming" to see the students' response to the incident.

"The heart-warming thing is that the kids have such great pride in their school that they're outraged that someone would do this," she said.

"I've now got 80 little detectives on the case who have been searching for clues around the school."

The Murder Of Helen Ford

Helen and James Ford lived at Sandy Creek (Tarnagulla) in 1857. She worked at the Rising Sun Hotel washing and as barmaid. This hotel was run by William Stubbs and was near the creek behind the cemetery.

One night in April 1857 Helen's husband came into the bar but she refused to serve him as he was drunk. He punched her on the jaw before being thrown out. Later he came back in and threatened to kill her before again being thrown out. That night when she went home he punched her in the face drawing blood from her nose and mouth and either punched or kicked her in the abdomen.

The next day she died. Helen was 54 years old. An inquest was held the following day.

James was charged with murder and tried in Castlemaine. Although the inquest and death certificate named her as Ellen the witnesses at the trial who knew her called her Helen. So this article also calls her Helen. The doctor's evidence gave her death as inflammation of the bowels. Ford's defence lawyer jumped on this citing an earlier injury as a factor in her death. Although witnesses said he had beaten her previously, none could say that he had specifically hit her in the abdomen. As a result the conviction was reduced to manslaughter.

James Ford received a seven year sentence, the first five to be served in irons. However there was a shortage of prison space and after good conduct James was released after only two years and seven months.

In The Veggie Patch



Gardens are doing it tough this summer, as changeable weather conditions are expected through the year, but not usually within a single week. Drastic changes can cause many plants to drop flowers and fruit and lose condition ,opening them up to pest and disease attack. Try treating with a liquid seaweed solution to build up resilience.

Seeds to plant now are beetroot, broccoli, brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, lettuce, chives, coriander, kale, leek, parsnip, peas, radish, silverbeet, spinach, spring onion, swede and turnip.

Some suitable varieties of cabbages are mini cabbage; one of the fastest growing and slow to bolt, Sweet Sugarloaf is early to mature, or why not try the versatile Chinese cabbage womboc.

Cauliflower is more adaptable to season conditions, and can be planted out over a longer period. Snowball will mature near to three months from transplanting, All Year Round matures in 15 weeks and Paleface takes a long time to mature. If planting seedlings use fresh ones, as old brown looking plants are likely to bolt to maturity with small nearly useless heads. Sicily Purple is a vibrant purple Italian heirloom variety to add some interest to the garden and dinner plate.

Broccoli, Premium crop can be sown over a long period and best to make small plantings at intervals. Shogun has good disease resistance and is ready for harvest in about 16 weeks during cold weather. It will be too late after this month to plant brussel sprouts, they must mature in the cold months, or else the plants will make growth at the expense of heads. Dwarf beans can be sown up to mid March and still produce a good crop. A lot of the flowers of beans and tomato plants are burnt off over the very hot spell, causing slow production of fruit.

Chantenay carrots can be sown up to the end of March. They will grow and keep in the soil until mid September or later.

Fruit Trees

Peach, nectarine and apricot trees can be pruned when fruit has been harvested. As the trees are actively growing wounds heal faster reducing risk of diseases. Remove dead or diseased wood, thin out unwanted branches right from the base and remove centre growing limbs to open up the middle.

Apple trees bear fruit on spurs formed on two-year-old wood. Most healthy trees also produce a forest of young shoots, all reaching for the sky. They can be cut back hard now to leave short stubs, each carrying about six buds

Summer Garden Tips

- Recent hot weather and high humidity has led to lots of growth of weeds.
- Try to spend a few minutes a day hand-weeding to prevent them from taking over your garden, path or driveway.
- Remove old flower heads on summer flowering perennials to encourage the growth of new flower buds. This will tidy up plants and will give you a longer display of colour.
- Plan ahead and order spring bulbs now for planting in March. With a good range to choose from at this time of year, try jonquils, daffodils or bluebells for an easy display.
- For autumn flowers plant alyssum, cineraria, cornflower, cyclamen, English daisy, French marigold, Iceland poppy, lobelia, Russel lupin, pansy, polyanthus, primula, snapdragon, stock, sweet pea and viola


