Final decision made on sculptures in Dunolly



At an Ordinary Meeting of Council on 24th February, 2020, Administrators made an independent decision on the placement of two community art mosaic sculptures in Dunolly. A decision was made to place the Dingo artwork at 118 Broadway and the Kangaroo will be placed in the Rene Fox Gardens.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said the decision was made based on the community feedback received.

"We received 74 submissions as part of our recent community consultation process, 23 were outright objections, 26 objected to the Broadway locations but with an alternate location and 24 in support of the Broadway locations and one seeking more information.

"There was also a great deal of informal feedback provided on social media from all perspectives.

"We believe our decision is a good outcome based on all of the feedback received. Obviously there were a wide range of views that were heard and we believe this decision offers a compromise for the entire Dunolly community.

"We'll now work to get the sculptures in place as soon as possible."

The mosaic art works were developed through funding from the Regional Centre for Culture as part of a sense of place project.

The project was community developed and led with more than 400 community members participating in the project.

Council is responsible for the decision about the placement of the sculptures as they are to be placed on public land.

Four sculptures were created as part of the project, with the other two already in place at the Gordon Gardens. They are three dimensional pieces with tile work on all sides.

The sculptures form part of the Central Goldfields Art Collection and were gifted to Council at the end of the Regional Centre for Culture program.


Health emergency update 3rd March, 2020 **Nova Coronavirus COVID-19**


Preventative Measures:

Shuffle, shuffle, vine to the left

Rhythmic movement to music has been a universal human experience since time out of mind. Mothers rock their babies to musical beats. Toddlers move energetically to music. Ballet, calypso, and ballroom dancing are some of the distinctive dance disciplines arising out of different cultures and enjoyed by many. Every party and wedding sees amateur dancers get up and show their moves, while the elderly and less mobile tap their fingers and toes. Dance is a joyful activity bringing many health benefits to all dancers.

Bealiba Hall Line Dancing, aka 50 Shades of Boots and Knobby Knees, has been going for the past 11 months. They have a core group of six to eight regulars, which for a town the size of Bealiba is pretty good. Teacher Chris first

took it up about 25 years ago in Mildura. In those days all the dances were country done to and western music, so it was a surprise to see them dance to such songs as Amazing Grace (complete with bagpipes), a Latino number Corona and the ever popular Geronimo. All the music came from Spotify mobile through Chris' phone and a very tiny speaker. It was great.

While the group started off with a couple of dances they knew well, kept their places easily and were perfectly in time, it was not long before Chris

challenged them with a new and fairly complex dance. There was some discussion about vines and rolling vines which not everyone was comfortable with. But the longer line dresses showed off the dancers sway beautifully during the rolling vine steps. There were other strange terms too, hitch, b step, paddy, and shuffles, to name a few. After a number of walk throughs, the group was ready to try with music. Not an instant success, but by the end of half an hour or so it was pretty good.

Heather showed us a thick folder full of all the dances they have learned. She finds dancing a great exercise for her brain and often practises difficult passages at home until she gets it right. She has enjoyed mostly ballroom dancing throughout her life. Another dancer said she also practises at home so she can focus on moving her feet the right way. For someone who does not like exercise she finds dancing enjoyable. One participant "cheated" at the beginning of the new dance by hiding behind the others, but in the end got it pretty right. Teacher Chris said her parents taught her ballroom dancing when she was about four and she has been doing all types of dancing ever since. She loves teaching dance so others can experience the pleasure of it too. The great thing about line dancing is you don't need a partner or even numbers. She currently has a group in Maryborough as well, and is thinking about starting a group in Dunolly. She thinks she will start with a come-and-try session to see how much interest there would be. Some years ago there was quite an active group of line dancers in Dunolly, maybe some are still here.



There is more room in the Bealiba Hall for some extra dancers. Tuesday evenings at 7pm is the time to be there if you think you would enjoy it more than TV. Thanks to Chris, Heather, Pam, Diane, and Christine for their courage in allowing strangers to watch as they learned a new dance. Thanks also for giving us the pleasure of watching your more familiar dances. It was lovely.

Works around the Shire

Works will begin shortly to refresh the fence and memorial gates at the Soldiers' Memorial Park in Wedderburn. The gates will be removed while work is undertaken. Both fence and gates will be sandblasted and repainted in a close approximation to the current colour. Repairs to the fence and render will also be undertaken. Work is expected to take about two weeks. Works on footpaths are now complete in Boort, while footpath projects are currently underway in Inglewood, Wedderburn and Bridgewater. I am pleased to say that safety upgrade work on the Old Inglewood Reservoir is scheduled to commence in the middle of March.

As part of Council's commitment to enhance the sustainability and liveability of our Shire, a program has been undertaken to install 130kW solar panels at 13 high-use Council buildings. In addition, work has commenced to upgrade LED light installations at 19 Council buildings. In other works; the tender has been awarded for the Pyramid Hill culvert replacement work, on-ground works are scheduled to commence in April for the Sloan's Bridge project and a variety of reseal work is taking place around the Shire.

Maryborough Rail Group pushes for added services to boost patronage

Weekend services bringing tourists from Melbourne and Ballarat to Creswick, Clunes, Talbot, Maryborough and Dunolly, better promotion of events, and activation of the Myki ticketing system along the line are key priorities identified at the inaugural meeting of advocacy group Friends of the Maryborough Rail Line held at Maryborough Station's Tracks Café on 22nd February, 2020.

Thirty community representatives attended the meeting with a number of apologies from other residents of the towns along the line who were keen to become involved and show their active commitment and support for the Maryborough rail service and see it develop to its full potential.

Convenor Chris Meddows-Taylor, a former Mayor of Central Goldfields Shire Council, said the group clearly recognised the rail service was underutilised but believed that better promotion of opportunities for visits to the area — including the morning weekday service which returns to Ballarat and Melbourne in the afternoon — tweaking times to connect better with other services, work with community groups to encourage train travel for Melbourne events and activation of the Myki ticket system to create more flexible access would all boost patronage.

"The group clearly saw that the big opportunity to boost patronage and build the visitor economy especially at this challenging time would be regular weekend services bringing people into Creswick, Clunes, Talbot, Maryborough and Dunolly each morning and returning them late afternoon, possibly commencing with existing major attractions and events," Mr Meddows-Taylor said. "Realistically, there is a need for extra weekday services as we are well aware of many people who wish to travel by train but are now unable to do so as the limited service times are too inflexible," he added. An action plan has been developed to share with VLine, Councils and importantly State Government and to track progress.

"It was great that a local VLine representative, Regional Manager Dallas Martin, attended the inaugural Friends meeting so we are working hand-in-hand and sharing feedback with the service provider from day one," Mr Meddows-Taylor added. The Friends of Maryborough Rail Line plans to meet again on the first Saturday in May to review goals and progress.

Noel Laidlaw, President of the Rail Revival Alliance who attended the meeting said "the level of engagement and commitment at the meeting is a firm basis for community action and development of the Maryborough Rail Service. It shows again how much regional communities value their passenger rail services."

Cookery Spot

Date and Ginger Cake

Ingredients

125g butter, chopped 1 cup (150g) pitted dates, roughly chopped 3/4 cup white sugar 125g (3/4 cup) crystallised ginger,

chopped; 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda;

1egg, lightly beaten; 1½ cups SR flour **Method**

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees Celsius. Grease and line base and sides of an 18cm x 7cm square cake pan.
- 2. Place butter, dates, sugar, ginger, 1 cup of water and 1/4 teaspoon salt in a saucepan over medium-high heat. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer for 2 minutes.
- 3. Remove from heat. Stir in bicarbonate of soda (mixture will foam). Transfer mixture to a bowl. Set aside for 10-15 minutes to cool.
- 4. Add egg to date mixture and mix well. Sift flour over mixture and stir gently to combine. Spoon into pan. Bake for 40-45 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Stand in pan 10 minutes before turning out onto wire rack to cool completely. Cut into squares to serve.

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

New business to move into Sydenham Hill mine



Central Goldfields Shire administrator Karen Douglas and mine manager Peter Lawrence at the Sydenham Hill mine site which is set to be home to a new business soon.

Dunolly's Sydenham Hill mine site is set to be taken over for a new business venture, drawing on the region's rich gold history. The site, which has been in disrepair for some years, will this month be cleared and inspected by government authorities before new plant and equipment are installed. The new operators will then use the site to prospect for gold with environmentally friendly machinery, according to site caretaker Fred Davies.

Mr Davies said the new plant could create employment opportunities.

"Once the mine is completed it will hopefully employ a number of people," he said.

Central Goldfields Shire administrator Karen Douglas visited the site last month and said it's "exciting" for the region.

"It's quite an exciting thing and it's economic development in our shire," she said. "From our perspective it's great that we've got something, particularly related to gold, happening around Dunolly. It's a perfect fit. People keep telling me how much gold there is still around that area."

Looking after your best workmate

Working dogs are a great asset to farmers. These are some ways to care for them when travelling in a ute.

- Tether to only be long enough to stand and lie down, but not that they can fall off and potentially be dragged or strangled
- A floor mat on metal trays to avoid paws being burnt
- A fixed canopy over part of the ute to provide shade on hot days
- Caged dogs to have adequate ventilation, particularly when the vehicle is stationary
- Provide cool water regularly

Check before you click — Scammers pretended to be Australia Post multiple times in 2019.

Last year, widespread scam text (SMS) messages were sent to people using the Australia Post brand. Scammers imitated the AusPost caller ID, often mentioning a "missed delivery" or "unverified address" — with a link directing people to a (fake) AusPost website. The site asked for payment or personal details, which hackers then stole and used. Clicking on these links could also infect your device with malicious software (malware).

Our top tips to protect yourself against scams like this are:

- Remember: your financial institution and other large organisations like Australia Post will never send you a link asking for personal or financial details.
- If the message seems suspicious, contact the person or business separately, using contact details you have found from a legitimate source.
- Don't click on links in unexpected messages or emails from people or organisations you don't know.

Keep everything updated – Including your phone. Hackers used a WhatsApp loophole to spy on users

Cybercriminals exploited a vulnerability in the WhatsApp smartphone messaging app to remotely install surveillance software and hack into users' confidential conversations. An update was issued on 15th May 2019 to address this vulnerability in the app, but there were concerns across the world that many users would ignore or delay the latest update and remain vulnerable to attack.

It's vital for your device's security that you keep your software up to date. Our top tips to protect yourself, now and in the future are:

- Turn on automatic software updates on your devices, including your phone.
- When a pop-up message from a trusted application requests an update, accept it.
- If you need to delay, set a reminder so you can update overnight or at a more convenient time.

Don't reuse your passwords — Hackers got access to millions of emails and users names in the "Collection #1" Data Breach.

In January 2019, Australian cyber security expert Troy Hunt made public a significant data breach affecting 773 million email addresses and usernames. Titled 'Collection #1', unauthorised access to usernames and other details on multiple websites and services resulted in email addresses and passwords being shared on a known hacking forum.

- Our top tips to limit the impact that a data breach may have on you are:
- Use a strong password (13 or more characters that are unrelated and difficult to guess) and don't re-use the same password on multiple websites.
- Use multi-factor authentication where available (like a code sent to your phone, or your fingerprint on a mobile device) to give your accounts an extra layer of security.
- Change your password on any accounts where you may have used the same email and password combination.

Final significant fire contained in Victoria

Following a long and challenging fire season that saw more than 1.5 million hectares burnt across the state, all significant fires in Victoria have now been contained. The Snowy Complex fire was declared contained on 27th February 2020.

For 98 days, firefighters, including staff and volunteers, from Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) and CFA and all emergency management personnel have been working hard to manage more than 3500 fires that have burned across the state since 1st November 2019.

More than 1200 FFMVic staff, thousands of CFA staff and volunteers, more than 450 contractors, 408 international fire fighters from the US, Canada and NZ have been deployed this season supported by the Australian Defence Force and defence forces from Papua New Guinea and Fiji.

"The hard work, professionalism and dedication of the FFMVic teams and the whole of the emergency services this fire season has been outstanding," said FFMVic Chief Fire Officer Chris Hardman. "They have suffered the loss of colleagues and spent considerable time away from families to help protect the state. I am proud of the work that has been done and that these fires are now contained, and I thank them for their commitment. While Victoria remains in the Fire Danger Period, our FFMVic teams are now working towards recovery and preparedness."

CFA Chief Officer Steve Warrington agreed it was a relief to see the final significant campaign fire contained after several months of fire activity.

"I am extremely proud, not just of the amazing work by thousands of CFA firefighters and support members, but of the entire emergency services sector as well as the community, which has pulled together to support one another." he said. "Now, I want them to be aware that despite recent milder conditions, parts of Victoria are still very dry and in warm and windy conditions, Victorians are still at risk of bushfire and fastrunning scrub and grass fires and fire restrictions remain in place across all municipalities. Stay alert and keep informed." Emergency Management Commissioner Andrew Crisp said

this was a great result for firefighters and all emergency management personnel who played a part in managing the fires and keeping communities safe.

"This is a testament to the commitment, bravery, innovation and determination of our people and I am proud of what was achieved under very challenging circumstances," he said. "My thoughts are with the communities impacted by the fires and we will continue to do all we can to support you through the long tail of recovery."

A spokesperson for the Bureau of Meteorology said "In terms of the weather conditions before and during the fires, spring and early summer rainfall was very much below average across much of Victoria. Parts of East Gippsland recorded its lowest rainfall on record for this period, contributing to extremely dry forest fuels. Lightning strikes from several thunderstorm events in December initiated numerous fires, many in difficult and remote terrain about the northeast and eastern parts of the Dividing Range.

"Fortunately, the weather became humid and rainfall totals between 50-100mm fell across the fire grounds during February."

The outlook for March favours wetter than average conditions across Victoria (apart from central and eastern parts of Gippsland which have no significant likelihood of either wetter or drier conditions), and maximum temperatures will tend towards average across most of the state.
