Celebrating 21 years of local community banking

The Maldon & District Community Bank celebrated its birthday a little differently this year, with a toilet roll 'cake and the giving of gifts to the community.

Gifts of \$1000 were provided to two local groups, the Dunolly Primary School community and the Mount Alexander Community Pantry. The funding will help these organisations support vulnerable community members during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We were keen to mark this exciting milestone, but we had to be creative and adjust our celebrations in line with COVID-19 restrictions," noted branch manager, Adam Balzan

"So we created a toilet roll cake, and we also decided to provide presents to the community — as you can't have a birthday without cake or presents!

"We are pleased that as part of our 21st birthday celebrations we are able to support two community groups including the Dunolly Primary School with gifts," Adam said.

Dunolly Primary School has been working diligently to support its students and school community during the COVID-19 restrictions. The Community Bank's donation will enable the school to extend this support.

"On behalf of the Dunolly Primary School community I would like to thank the Maldon & District Community Bank for the generous financial donation towards helping families during the COVID-19 health crisis," Principal Katie Lovel said.

"The local groups we have supported, the Mount Alexander Community Pantry and the Dunolly Primary School community, have been extremely grateful as they are taking up the challenge to address the needs of those who are further marginalised due to the crisis and some who have now found themselves relying on others," said Ross.

Home gardens set to save households \$250 a year

Covid-19 has sparked a rush to establish home gardens and a desire for self-sufficiency, but how successful are these "grow your own" attempts and is there a risk that people will find themselves out of pocket?

The results have just come in from a state-wide citizen science project called "Edible Gardens" led by the University of South Australia, undertaken prior to the pandemic, and the news is encouraging.

Researchers investigated the productivity, efficiency and potential financial savings of almost 100 home food garden areas established by 34 people in South Australia. Overlooking garden setup costs, 79 per cent of people who established vegetable gardens were estimated to save more than \$250 on their annual grocery bills, according to Dr Georgia Csortan.

Dr Csortan, a UniSA expert in urban food production, says considering the median setup costs of a food garden (\$500), 65 per cent of the study gardens were also calculated to break even within five years.

Applying a wage-rate to time spent growing a food garden, the researchers found that just over one in six of the study gardeners produced enough food to cover their ongoing garden costs and effectively pay themselves the Australian minimum wage of \$18.93 per hour.

"This is the first time the economic value of sustainable home vegetable gardens has been quantified to this level of detail in Australia," Dr Csortan said.

The results are even more significant in the era of Covid-19 as people self-isolate, quarantine, look for ways to save on food budgets and find new ways to occupy themselves during the lockdown. "The swell of new food gardeners is a wonderful outcome from the restrictions of the Covid-19 crisis, but we need to ensure their efforts are not in vain," Dr Csortan said. "How good would it be to come out of this pandemic with households and communities which are more resilient, more productive and more inter-connected than ever?" "If done well, home gardens are an excellent way for people to remain productive, get in touch with nature, connect with the community and educate children in tangible, fun ways about where our food comes from. "While social distancing means we cannot reach out physically to our neighbours and friends, home gardens give people the opportunity to share or swap their produce and exchange tips, maintaining that human connection."

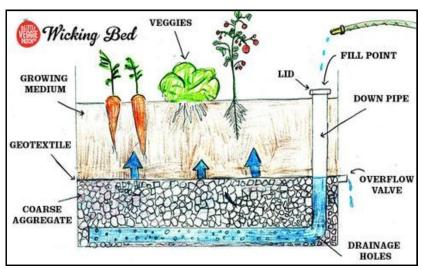
Dr Csortan said urgent, coordinated education programs are needed in productive gardening to help new home gardeners ramp up their food production and avoid common mistakes.

She said growing food is not as time consuming as most people think, requiring on average just over an hour's attention each week.

Installing the right irrigation system is crucial, to save time and money, and growing food in different ways (a mixture of in-ground beds, raised beds, wicking beds, fruit trees or keeping chickens) helps to provide more consistent and diverse year-round harvests.

Gordon Gardens Upgrade

ABOUT THE PROJECT:

A new bicycle/scooter pump track, outdoor fitness equipment and shade structure will be installed at the Gordon Gardens in Dunolly as part of the Healthy Heart of Victoria initiative. Each of the projects were identified as part of the Gordon Gardens Master Plan which was developed last year.

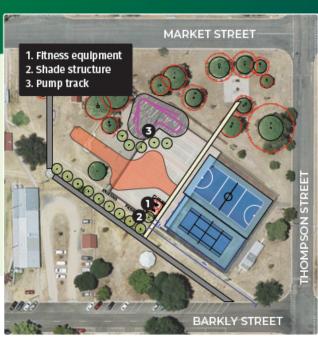
What will the project deliver?

The bicycle/scooter pump track is a modular system made of timber composite that will form a circular track of about 65 metres. It will be suitable for use from the early stages of riding a balance bike or scooter to larger bikes for young people and adults. It's the perfect playground and play space for all wheels and all ages, providing outstanding health and wellbeing benefits through fun. The image below is a similar facility that is located at Victoria Park in Ballarat.



The four pieces of outdoor fitness equipment chosen will be in consultation with staff at Maryborough District Health Service and will be used as part of exercise programs for older adults.

A shade structure will be installed above the equipment so users have sun protection. The colours for the shade structure and the equipment will be decided in consultation with the local community to align with the heritage aspects of the park. This equipment will benefit all the community to strengthen muscles without going to a gym – and it's free.

What is the timeline for the project?

The tender for the project is currently being advertised with a contractor expected to be appointed by the end of May and the project ready for play by Spring, 2020.

Who is it funded by?

This \$140,000 Gordon Gardens upgrade project will be delivered thanks to funding from the State Government Healthy Heart of Victoria initiative.

What is the Healthy Heart of Victoria initiative?

Funded by the State Government, the \$5 million Healthy Heart of Victoria initiative aims to make residents living in Loddon Campaspe communities more active, more often.

To date the Healthy Heart of Victoria initiative has funded the following projects in the Central Goldfields Shire:

- \$51,272 for the Maryborough Community House Kitchen Garden and Community Playground
- \$137,131 for the Goldfields Reservoir path upgrade, nature play park and parkrun, Maryborough
- \$29,647 for Basketball Court in Gordon Gardens, Dunolly

What's on and what's on hold for children in the Central Goldfields Shire

A special edition of the popular What's On for Children flier has been produced to advise of changes to programs and services accessed by children and families during COVID-19 Government Stage 3 restrictions.

The What's On for Children in Central Goldfields formally known as the Stuff for kids and families in the Central Goldfields flier is usually distributed throughout the shire every term providing information about free activities. It is a reference point for families and services to promote what's on during each school term with a focus on local services such as playgroups, family and general support services, and library services.

The first flier originated from members of the Maryborough (Vic) Mighty Mothers Group more than four years ago and was further developed by the Go Goldfields Children and Families Partnership and Central Goldfields Shire Council.

In response to COVID-19 service adjustments, the Go Goldfields Children and Families Partnership quickly formed a communications sub-group including Best Start. District Aboriginal Cooperative (BDAC), Department of Education and Training (DET) and Anglicare. Their priority is to update the community about what services were on hold or had changed their operations and the What's On flier was identified as a great option for these communications.

"Collaborating with this initiative aligns with Best Starts' overall objectives of improving outcomes for children," said Merran Fleming, Best Start Facilitator, Maryborough District Health Service (MDHS).

Community Influenza Vaccination Program

We have received a supply of the 2020 influenza (flu) vaccine and will run a series of community flu vaccination sessions for eligible people.

The following people are eligible for the free flu vaccine:

- All children aged six months to less than five years (Victorian Government-funded)
- All Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged from six months
- All adults aged 65 years and over
- All people aged six months or older who have certain medical conditions that increase their risk of influenza disease complications, for example severe asthma, lung or heart disease, low immunity or diabetes
- Pregnant women (during any stage of pregnancy)

If you do not meet these criteria, please contact your local GP or pharmacy to arrange your vaccine privately.

For those who are eligible bookings are now open for the following community flu vaccination sessions:

Friday 8th May: 12.30 to 3.30pm Thursday 14th May: 10am to 12noon Friday 15th May: 9.30am to 12noon

Loddon Shire COVID-19 updates

There has generally been good news over the past week or so, with reported numbers of new COVID-19 cases dropping across Victoria and the whole of Australia. While some states are beginning to talk about gradual easing of restrictions, at the moment in Victoria, the stay at home requirement remains in place.

This means you may only leave home for food and supplies, medical care and care giving, exercise and work or education. There have been reports of some people starting to return to normal activities; however it is too early for this.

The government will direct a gradual easing of restrictions when the time is right to avoid an increase in the spread of the virus. At this stage, restrictions remain in place until revised on Monday 11th May. I urge everyone to do the right thing and try not to look for loopholes.

Council meeting

The State Government recently passed the COVID-19 Omnibus (Emergency Measures) Bill 2020 in order to implement a range of temporary emergency measures to support Victorians.

The legislation amended the Local Government Act 2020 to allow virtual meetings for local councils to carry out their work remotely from Friday 1st May.

This is a common-sense approach to physical distancing measures to enable Councillors and staff to fulfil their duties without compromising their health. We intend to implement this approach for the May Council meeting.

Staying connected with the library

As mentioned in a previous Mayoral Column, the Goldfields Libraries are doing everything they can to stay with communities COVID-19 connected during restrictions. The library serves as an important social connector for many people in our community.

The library staff are working hard to make more of the collection available to more people by increasing e-book and e-audio collections and boosting online music and film streaming services.

Work has also commenced on how to gradually restore services once easing of restrictions begins. This may include limited access to the collection using a 'click and collect' process.

If you are at home with small children, you might like to watch the online Storytime sessions. There is a big range to choose from with new ones added all the time. Favourite library storytellers have recorded sessions to allow children to read, sing and dance along at home.

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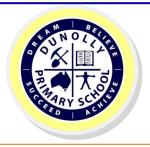
ANZAC Day 2020

Not My Best Idea

The until recently mild autumn weather saw many keen vegie growers produce a good late crop of green tomatoes. When I was given a big bag (thanks Terry) it got me thinking about the best way to eat them.

At first I made some fried green tomatoes (I loved that movie) but after one hearty meal I remembered why it was that I no longer make them. Just not that tasty. Then I recalled making some green tomato pickles about 40 years ago which had not been a big hit. Somehow they had gone lumpy. The green tomatoes sat on my bench for a while as I considered my next move.

Once again I turned to Google for assistance. Really it is difficult to remember how life worked before we could consult Google. There were quite a few green tomato pickle recipes. After reading a number of them it became clear they were all very similar. I picked what sounded like the simplest because the recipe contributor said she did not really like pickles but found these were tasty. That statement resonated with me. Cutting and dicing all the vegetables and letting them sit overnight in brine was the first step.

Next day I drained the brine and added the rest of the ingredients and brought it all to the boil as it said in the recipe. It seemed much less labour intensive than making tomato sauce. For a few years I went through the phase of having to make my own sauce. Such a lot of work making sure there was no skin left in the bottles. I hate it when tomato skin gets caught in the back of your throat. When I discovered spicy red sauce I stopped making my own

As I tasted my pickles it was horrifying to discover they were too salty. What now? Into my mind popped Paul from Laanecoorie telling me one evening to add vinegar to something if it was too salty. So I did. Not a lot, just a bit at a time. It took nearly a cup full but the saltiness was down to a palatable level after that. But not all my problems were solved.

When I confidently looked for the glass jars which live in the back of the cupboard there were none! That was a panic moment.

What was I going to do with all that pickle? I hunted high and low for the jars, but finally realised they had all been put into the recycling bin after one mammoth spring clean. The only thing I could find was a few empty wine bottles.

'They should work ok' I told myself as I popped them into the oven to sterilize. I am never sure how effective that is but none of my sauce ever went mouldy or made us sick. Once the wine bottles were filled I congratulated myself on having such a brilliant idea. They looked great through all the green glass. Next day when I thought a cheese and pickle sandwich would make a tasty lunch I discovered the flaw in my brilliant idea.

How do you get pickles out of a wine bottle? The answer is - with great difficulty. Once I found an old swizzle stick with a scoop on one end it became much easier — and they have proved to be very tasty. Maybe having to fight the wine bottle for them puts an edge on your appetite.

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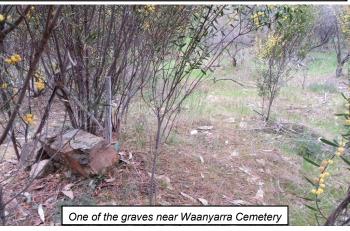

Waanyarra burial ground

Gold was first discovered at Jones Creek (Waanyarra) in 1853 and the Waanyarra Cemetery opened in 1858. So there is a six year period where it is not known where the people were buried. Some 200m west of the cemetery and on the opposite side of the road there are seven graves hidden amongst the diggings. These would date from this early period. When the gold diggings started getting close to the burial ground, the miners dug a trench to mark the point where no more digging was allowed. They then mined on all sides but left these graves untouched. The trench can still be seen in places. None of the graves are named. Two have local stones put on them that once may have been painted or had names scratched on them. In the 1990s wooden pegs were placed to mark each grave and a little parking bay made in front of the burial ground.

Albion Hotel, Goldsborough

John Sleeman managed the Albion Store in what is now Queens Birthday Mine Rd at Goldsborough. It was a branch store for D B Watson in Dunolly. In December 1878 Sleeman applied for a liquor licence for his store which he was changing to the Albion Hotel. As part of his application he stated there were 400-500 people within half a mile of his store. His licence was refused on the grounds that he was only 100 yards from the Wesleyan Church and that there were already too many hotels in Goldsborough. He tried again in July 1879 and was again refused a licence. He was eventually granted a licence in 1880. John Sleeman worked as a miner and it was actually his wife Mary who ran the hotel and store. It was just in his name. In 1882 Frederick Chenoweth became the licensee. He was also a miner so his wife Emily ran the store and hotel. Although the store kept going, the licence was dropped for a while during 1883. Mining was declining at Goldsborough and the other hotels had the bulk of the business. Then in early 1884 with the licence renewed D B Watson decided to move the building to a better location. The six room weatherboard building was relocated 3 km north to the reef mining area of Inkerman. In March 1884 it reopened in its new location and the licence was transferred to Evan Griffiths. Like the previous licensees, Evan worked as a miner whilst his wife Margaret looked after the hotel and store. The Albion Hotel disappears from the records so it probably closed about 1885. 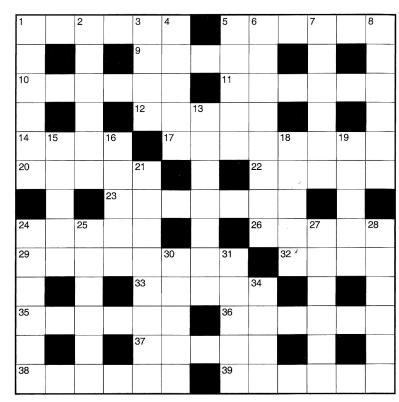

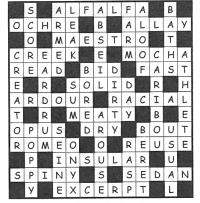
