# Works continue on Dunolly's Gordon Gardens Masterplan

Works are continuing on Dunolly's Gordon Gardens with new outdoor fitness equipment, a bicycle/scooter pump track and shade structure to be completed over the coming months.

Part of the Gordon Gardens Masterplan project which is funded by the State Government's Healthy Heart of Victoria initiative, tenders are currently being advertised for the garden's latest project, with works on the \$140,000 project expected to be completed by spring.

The fitness equipment will be chosen in consultation with the Maryborough District Health Service and will be used in exercise programs for older adults, while the shade structure will be installed above this equipment to provide sun protection.

The bicycle/scooter pump track is a modular system made of timber composite whichforms a circular track of around 65 metres and will be suitable for use from early stages of riding a bike or scooter through to adults.

The announcement of these works comes just weeks after the completion of an almost \$30,000 basketball court at the gardens.

Central Goldfields Shire chief administrator Noel Harvey said the Gordon Gardens precinct is set to become a "recreation centre" for the community

"Getting people active is very much what the focus for these projects at the gardens is all about," he said.

"The Gordon Gardens are a very popular area of town in Dunolly and that was evidenced by the number of people who had input into the masterplan — it's a real credit to the community; they've really taken ownership of this.

"The Gordon Gardens is going to become a recreation centre in many respects for people of all ages in the community, the facilities here were substandard so this is a great step forward."

While works are continuing steadily as part of the masterplan, Mr Harvey said it's a long term project which he expects won't be complete for several years.

"This is a long project and it really is driven by an approach of where funding is available, we'll grab it," he said.

"There are a lot of elements of this project which are yet to come and it will take several years before we get to completion, but each step forward is an exciting one and we'll continue to apply for funding where we can."

Council will consult with the community on the colours of the shade structure and equipment to align with heititage aspects of the park.

John Sleeman 1932 - NLA

### **John Sleeman**

John Harvey Crothers Sleeman was born on 28th January 1880 at the Albion Hotel in Goldsborough. Sleeman had a varied career shifting from state to state and job to job. He was politically motivated but kept changing allegiance until finally settling on the Labor Party. He also settled on becoming a journalist.

He was involved in rigged horse racing, pornography, bribery and any other means by which he could make money. In 1922 he was gaoled for three months for attempting to bribe a politician to bring down the Queensland Government.

Sleeman's writings were very racist and often aimed at the Chinese. He was a strong advocate of the White Australia policy. Despite his gaol conviction and a number of libel cases against him for his writing, Sleeman still managed to get a high profile political job. This was in 1930 as speech writer and publicity officer for the New South Wales Premier, Jack Lang.

Sleeman accepted payment from some Chinese businessmen in Sydney to change his allegiance. He then started writing positive stories about the Chinese in newspapers and journals. Then when Japan invaded China in 1937 he also started writing negative stories about the Japanese. This continued until 1938 when the Japanese offered him more money to write good stories about them. This link developed and he became a well paid spy supplying the Japanese Consulate with information gleaned from his political contacts. He was also able to influence some politicians to stop a trade embargo being placed on Japan. In his newspaper articles he explained why the Japanese had no territorial ambitions towards Australia.

This all changed when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbour. The next day Japanese in Australia were placed in internment camps and the following day John Sleeman was put in with them. He appealed to his high political contacts saying he was a British subject and had not been charged with any offence. He was released on 21st January 1942 only to have his case reviewed and he was put back in the camp on 2nd April. Sleeman had been in the Japanese Consulate a few days before the attack on Pearl Harbour while they were burning their documents.

This doesn't mean he was privy to prior knowledge of the attack as the consulate staff probably did not know why they were told to destroy documents. But he must have realised something was about to happen. Sleeman remained in the camp for the rest of the war. He died in Sydney on 16th January 1946.

For his activities, Sleeman has been described as the most dangerous man in Australia.

In the House of Representatives on 26th March 1947 Arthur Caldwell said "No alien who ever came to Australia was more traitorous to Australia than Mr J. H. Sleeman."

### What's happened?

Australia Post is aware of fraudulent emails being sent using their branding and prompting customers to click on a link. The emails falsely claim a package hasn't been delivered, due to its weight exceeding the limit and it includes a link to click on to 'Pay Fee' or seek 'Further information.'

These links lead to a fake Australia Post website requesting personal and financial information.

### How do I stay safe?

Note that Australia Post will never email or text message you asking for personal information, financial information or a payment.

If you receive one of these messages, delete it and don't respond.

If you are ever unsure of the legitimacy of a message, contact the business it claims to be from separately to check it is likely to have sent the message. If you've sent personal or financial information to a scam email address or entered it into a scam website and you're worried your identity may have been stolen, you can contact IDCARE, Australia's free national identity and cyber support service, on 1300 432 273. IDCARE also has an IDCARE factsheet for customers impacted by Australia Post SMS scams.

We encourage you to share this information with your family, friends and colleagues.

Emails or other online messages which pretend to be from organisations you know, to try and trick you into handing over personal information, is called phishing. The Australian Cyber Security Centre has a video on *How to Spot a Phishing message*.








### Major upgrades underway at Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre

A \$600,335 upgrade to the Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre is under way.

The project has been made possible thanks to \$430,000 from the State Government's Sport and Recreation Victoria Community Facility Funding Program, \$113,556 from the Federal Government's Move It Australia Grant Program, \$49,878 from Council as part of the 2019/2020 Budget and \$6901 raised through community funds at the Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre.

As part of the major upgrade, the existing male and female change rooms will be renovated and a Changing Places changes room will be constructed in the swimming pool area.

The Changing Places change room will be a fully accessible space with change table, toilet, shower, ceiling mounted hoist and compliant grab rails.

The existing men's and women's change rooms will be renovated with new toilets, showers, seating, flooring, improved ventilation, installation of water efficient fittings, installation of non-slip flooring, new benches to suit people with mobility issues, hand basins and dividing partition walls in men's and women's change rooms.

The upgrade project will also deliver a disability friendly entry to the pool area, modifications to the main reception area, a new pedestrian pathway and disabled car parking. Future works at the Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre will include improvements to the floor and seating replacements on both courts in the Matthew Dellavedova Stadium. These include resurfacing and relining with one court featuring netball and basketball lines while the other will include markings for a variety of sports.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said the major upgrade was a welcome one for the Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre.

"We know the Centre was in need of renovation and we are thankful that through both Federal and State funding we've been able to make this project a reality for our community.

"This project will see the Centre become a first class sports and leisure centre for not only those in our Shire but for those travelling to use our facilities from further afield.

"We hope the upgrade encourages more people in our community to get active more often and I'm looking forward to seeing this project complete and enjoyed by those of all ages.

"With the Centre currently closed due to the Government Stage Three restrictions we've been able to get this project moving quicker than hoped and with less inconvenience on our users."

Contractors, FNG Group, are delivering the renovations in the pool area while Council's Works team will undertake the line marking.

Both projects will be complete by Friday 31st July.

These works will complement the LED lighting replacement in the basketball stadium which was carried out earlier this year.



200 years after Florence Nightingale's birth, nurses are on the front line, battling a silent killer.

It seems fitting that on the 200th anniversary of Florence Nightingale's birth, nurses are being celebrated the world over for their bravery, kindness, skills and sacrifice.

The International Day of the Nurse coincides with the worst pandemic in a century. COVID-19 has already infected more than four million people and killed more than 280,000, including a rising tally of healthcare workers.

Being on the frontline of the pandemic has been bittersweet for the global nursing profession, according to Professor Marion Eckert, Director of the Rosemary Bryant AO Research Centre and Professor of Cancer Nursing in South Australia.

"2020 is the International Year of the Nurse and the Midwife," Prof Eckert said. "We should be planning celebrations this year but instead we are battling a silent killer, leaving not only ourselves vulnerable but our families, too."

Nurses comprise the largest single workforce in Australia, numbering around 380,000 in this country and 28 million worldwide, eclipsing every other profession.

Their role is important in normal circumstances; right now, it is pivotal to containing a disease that is crippling health systems and economies across the globe.

"The value of nurses has never been more prominent. Every day they are going to work, not knowing if they are going to be infected, or inadvertently infect others. It becomes all encompassing, yet they have to put that aside and focus on the task at hand — caring for others."

Prof Eckert said the community recognition and appreciation has helped nurses cope in these difficult months, particularly in countries where the coronavirus has left an enormous toll. "People clapping in the streets and their neighbourhoods, supermarkets opening early specifically for healthcare workers, and simple gestures like cafés giving free coffees to nurses are all making a difference," she said.

And despite the stresses currently facing the nursing profession, there are opportunities emerging from this crisis. The fast tracking of tele health services is allowing nurses to connect with remote and rural communities in ways they have never done before.

The newfound respect for nurses and interest in their role also bodes well for future investment in nursing education and research.

Dr Bryant said Florence Nightingale, acknowledged as the world's founder of modern nursing, would be "blown away" by the global efforts of the nursing fraternity to defeat COVID-19.

"It was her work in the Crimean War that led to modern infection control and the saving of so many lives. She was the first person to demonstrate that cleanliness and distancing hospital beds were the key to fighting disease." Two hundred years later, Nightingale's legacy is crystal clear.
