COVID-19 business support and Hardship Policy

At its meeting this month, Council elected to waive a number of fees applicable to businesses in the Shire.

This includes caravan park registration fees and fees related to food premises, accommodation, hairdressing and beauty premises, and barbers.

The waiving of these fees aims to assist these businesses in managing the impact of COVID-19. The waived fees will be funded from the \$400,000 allocation set aside for initiatives to support the community to recover from the impacts of COVID-19.

Council also adopted the updated COVID-19 Hardship Policy, extending its application to 31st December 2020, due to the ongoing impact of COVID-19.

The policy helps ratepayers experiencing difficulty as a result of COVID-19 in making payments of rates and waste charges raised by Council.

Local Government elections

Following advice from the Victorian Chief Health Officer, the Minister for Local Government Shaun Leane, has announced that Local Government elections will go ahead as scheduled this October. This includes the Loddon Shire Council election.

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is preparing to deliver local council elections during the circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic. Elections will be conducted entirely by post — a safe and completely confidential method of voting.



Ballot packs will be mailed out to every enrolled person from Tuesday 6th October to Thursday 8th October. Voting closes at 6pm on Friday 23rd October.

The postal vote receipt period will close at 12 midday on Friday 30th October. Only votes posted before the close of voting can be accepted.

The latest date all results will be declared is Friday 13th November.

For community members looking to stand as a candidate in the upcoming Loddon Shire Council election, candidate nominations open on Thursday 17th September and close at 12 midday on Tuesday 22nd September.

Before you can nominate as a candidate, you must first complete the mandatory Local Government Candidate Training. For more information and to access the training, go to: www.localgovernment.vic.gov.au/council-governance/candidate-training

Ripon Volunteer Organisations encouraged to apply for equipment grants

Volunteer organisations in Ripon, such as CFA brigades and SES units, can now apply for grants to fund new equipment, Member for Ripon Louise Staley said.

Applications are now open for grants under the Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP), with co-contribution grants of up to \$150,000 available, providing \$2 for every \$1 raised by those volunteer groups.

"Volunteer emergency groups are the backbone of our communities here in Ripon, so these grants provide an excellent opportunity for those groups to replace or upgrade vital equipment," Ms Staley said.

"Grants can be used by CFA brigades to help purchase new trucks or tankers, by SES units to fund operational equipment, or by other volunteer agencies to fund facility improvements".

"We have seen the wonderful work our volunteers have done in protecting and rebuilding our communities. From dealing with bushfires to recovering from storm damage to the task of rebuilding destroyed fences and infrastructure, our volunteers make crucial contributions every day to our communities in Ripon".

"I strongly encourage all volunteer emergency services organisations in Ripon to apply for these grants so they can continue to support our communities."

Council Meeting on Tuesday 25th August report:

Council receives end of year update for Action Plan Central Goldfields Shire Council received its end of year update on the 2019/20 Annual Action Plan. In total, 90 projects and initiatives are identified in the plan and 61 of these are completed, 22 are in progress, six are not progressing and one is not due to start. Key projects still in progress will be carried forward into 2020/21 – as identified in the Draft Action Plan that was adopted at the August 11 Council Meeting.

Some of the projects completed include the Changing our Story anti-family violence project, construction of the all-access Changing Places change rooms at the Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre, Economic Development and Tourism Strategy, secure funding for the Maryborough Skate and Scooter Park and develop a 10-year capital works program to inform the 10-year financial plan.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said it was encouraging to see nearly all projects and initiatives had been completed, or were well under way despite the challenges of the pandemic.

"All the items listed in the Action Plan aim to benefit residents in different areas such as economy, community and natural and built environments. This update is testament to staff from across the organisation and the huge body of work that has been carried out over the past 12 months."

Dunolly and Carisbrook flood study amendment

At a meeting of Council on Friday 25th August, Central Goldfields Shire Council resolved to update existing planning controls for identifying flood risk in the townships of Carisbrook and Dunolly.

The updated planning controls will be introduced through an amendment to the Central Goldfields Planning Scheme known as C031cgol. This amendment will update the planning scheme maps and controls to identify the risk of flooding and flood damage on all new development on land within the nominated overlays.

In May this year, Council together with the North Central Catchment Management Authority, invited the community to provide input into the development of township flood studies for Carisbrook and Dunolly. Several submissions were received; with two resolved and five remain outstanding.

At the same Council meeting, Council also agreed to request the Minister for Planning to appoint an independent planning panel to consider the five outstanding submissions.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said implementing the planning scheme amendments is of high importance to the Shire.

"Implementing planning scheme amendments associated with flood risk for the townships of Carisbrook and Dunolly is recognised as a high priority in the North Central Regional Flood plain Management Strategy 2018-2028."

Council adopts Tree Management Plan

Central Goldfields Shire Council adopted the Tree Management Plan at its meeting. The Tree Management Plan will ensure Council manages the risks associated with trees within all our townships — this includes street trees, trees in parks and gardens and caravan parks.

It enables Council staff to develop an inspection regime appropriate to the level of risk posed by the tree and its location, and then to undertake pruning and maintenance as required.

Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said more than 6088 trees have been assessed and recorded within our municipality.

"It's so important that we continue to preserve and maintain our trees for our whole community to enjoy now and in the future.

"The safety of our community is also paramount. We know that there have been a number of tragedies involving tree failures in other council areas.

"Investigations into such tragedies have highlighted the need for robust tree management plans that would best mitigate risk of these tragedies happening locally.

"Without a formal management plan Council has a heightened exposure to reputational and financial risk in the event of such an occurrence.

"The Tree Management Plan will allow Council to appropriately manage the risks associated with trees in our townships."

Still a long way to go but very pleasing to hear reports of commencement of some work. Update regarding 1/3 Nightingale St Maryborough — proposed student Nurses Quarters. The compulsory conference listed for September 2020 has been vacated and the hearing in March 2021 has been retained pending specific reports being provided by developer. More to come on that.

Council rates are now being sent out. We ask everyone to compare this year's and last year's notices and take notice of the changes (if any). This newly introduced Rates strategy we feel will be under the microscope with the newly elected councillors.

Please remember one thing. Under administration many policies and regulations were altered, some immediately on taking up appointment. There is no reason the same can not apply.

We must all now take interest in what is happening around us and be forward in raising issues. If we ask our new councillors to be up front, we the community must also use the same ethics. Raising concerns does not make you a complainer or negative detractor, it makes you a concerned person who cares about your Shire.

Covid is heading in a downward direction it seems.

Call for candidates for the upcoming Central Goldfields Shire Council election

Nominations to stand as a candidate for the Central Goldfields Shire Council election open on Thursday 17th September. The election will be held entirely by post. 'If you would like to represent your community, I encourage you to nominate as a candidate this election,' said Electoral Commissioner Warwick Gately.

The eligibility requirements for candidates have recently changed. If you are thinking about standing for election, make sure to confirm your eligibility and complete the mandatory online candidate training before lodging your nomination. This includes candidates who are currently or have previously been a councillor.'

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Victorian Electoral Commission's recorded candidate information session will be able to be streamed online from Thursday 3rd September and will be complemented by state-wide interactive candidate seminars based on the information session video.

To watch the information session and find out how to join an online interactive seminar, candidates can visit the VEC website at vec.vic.gov.au The Candidate Handbook is also available on the VEC website.

Candidates must make an appointment during business hours with the Election Manager to lodge their nomination forms and pay their \$250 nomination fee. They must have completed the online candidate training, as this is required by law and will be shown on each candidate's nomination form.

Candidates may make a nomination appointment with the Election Manager by calling 1300 112 717 from Wednesday 16th September. Candidates can also pre-fill a nomination form using the online Candidate Helper at candidatehelper.vec.vic.gov.au, available from Thursday 3rd September.

Nominations must be lodged by 12 midday on Tuesday 22nd September. Late nominations cannot be accepted. It is an offence for a person to nominate as a candidate if they are not qualified to become a councillor.

More information on nominating as a candidate is available at vec.vic.gov.au, and Candidate Information Kits can be requested from the Election Manager.

Enrolment closing for the October Council elections

Eligible residents and ratepayers have until 4pm Friday 28th August to enrol or update their details for the October Victorian local council elections. All Victorian councils, except for Casey City Council, Whittlesea City Council and South Gippsland Shire Council, will have elections in October.

Australian citizens who have recently turned 18 years or changed address can enrol or update their details online at vec.vic.gov.au/enrolment

There are also additional enrolment categories for occupiers, company nominees, non-resident property owners and non-Australian citizens who pay rates. These people should contact their local council for further information.

If I haven't answered it properly then I apologise.





DEB'S FUN FOOD FACTS From around the World

Chimichurri Sauce

This week in our virtual travels I thought we could go to Argentina, whose inhabitants are, I believe, renowned for being big meat lovers just as we are, for the most part.

Chimichurri is an uncooked sauce principally used for grilled or barbecued meat.

Argentine in its origins, there are several stories of how it came about. One such story is that the name came from Jimmy's Curry, Jimmy being an Englishman or Irishman, no one is sure, who joined the fight for Argentine independence.

His name was difficult for the Argentines to pronounce so it morphed into Chimichurri.

There are other stories about its origins, I suspect no one really knows; the real point here is that it is delicious and will enhance any meal.

There are some myths with regard to Chimichurri — It is not pesto, it is not a version of Argentine tomato sauce, it's not a marinade and it's not pureed herbs.

Before I start I have to say I add coriander to my Chimichurri. Now if you are not on team coriander, and I know there are many of you out there who are not, you can simply omit this from the sauce, it will be fine without it, this is simply my personal preference.

I also want to add that if finely chopping is not really in your repertoire then you can use a mechanical device, just don't overdo it.

Ingredients

½ cup olive oil

2 tablespoons red wine vinegar

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

1 bunch finely chopped flat leafed parsley

1 bunch coriander, finely chopped

3 - 4 cloves of garlic, finely chopped or minced if you prefer

1 small red onion, finely chopped

1/4 - 1/2 teaspoon dried chilli flakes to taste

2 tablespoons dried oregano

1 teaspoon coarse salt

Pepper to taste

Method

Combine the chilli, garlic, onion, vinegar, lemon juice and salt in a bowl and let it sit for about 10 minutes.

Stir in the coriander, parsley and oregano.

Whisk in the oil. Allow it to stand for a while to let the flavours develop.

There you're done.

This sauce will go with your steak, chicken or fish readily, really any barbecued meats.




