

Dunolly CFA Takes Delivery of new Vehicle

I had the opportunity today to take a look at the new Incident Control Vehicle (ICV), now an integral part of Dunolly CFA's operation. Brigade Captain Ken Duell, together with 4th Lieutenant Cheryl Renfrew, took pleasure in demonstrating the many features of this new addition, (which has a greatly-increased capacity over the previous vehicle), and describing how these will be a bonus in fighting any future fires.

Ken pointed out that the purchase of this vehicle is partly the result of community fundraising efforts, with approximately \$27,000 of the \$85,000 cost coming from donations; the balance coming from a VESEP Grant and other sources. The previous 10 year old utility has now been decommissioned.

The vehicle will be used as an ICV, where the Incident Controller can be based outside the actual fire-ground to give directions and provide incident planning for the trucks involved in the actual firefighting.

It will also be utilised when and if required, as part of Strike Teams all over Victoria.

Whilst not being fitted out as an actual firefighting vehicle, it contains fire blankets for protection of its occupants, together with many other necessities for its use as an ICV. Equipped with four radios, together with a Defibrillator, it will also serve the local community well. The Defibrillator will be on hand if the vehicle is in town, so in an emergency call to 000, if the paramedics are unable to arrive quickly enough, this vehicle and its team will be on call to assist as a back-up. This is a potentially life-saving function and will be a great asset to Dunolly to have a service like this available. So, in the future, if you wonder how your CFA donation is spent, this is a perfect example of how it will ultimately benefit the community.

DEB'S FUN FOOD FACTS

From around the world



Hello there virtual world travellers. We are leaving the USA and going to Germany, but we're still on the dessert train.

I hope you approve.

What could we choose from all the delicious desserts coming from Germany? Well I thought Bee sting would be just the ticket. I'm sure you'll all adore this one.

The bee sting is a German classic and I hope I get this right; it's called Bienenstich. It's a soft yeast dough which we will fill with some divine vanilla custard cream and we will top it all off with a delightful crunchy honey almond topping.

It's really quite a simple dessert for such a fantastic outcome.

Ingredients:

Dough

- 1 cup lukewarm milk
- ¼ cup sugar
- 7 grams dry yeast
- 2 eggs
- ½ cup melted butter
- ½ tsp salt
- 4 cups flour

Custard Cream Filling

- 5 egg yolks
- 48 gm cornflour
- 2 cups milk
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup thickened cream (not light cream)
- 2 tsp cream of tartar
- 3 tsp icing sugar
- Honey Almond Topping
- ⅔ cup butter
- ¼ cup thickened cream (not light cream)
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 ⅓ cups almond slivers
- 1 tsp vanilla

Instructions

Start with the custard cream

Whisk the egg yolks and cornflour in a bowl

Bring the milk and sugar to a simmer, simmer for about two minutes, ensure that it doesn't boil or stick.

Stir about half the hot milk into the egg yolks to

slowly warm them. Then slowly pour this mixture into the saucepan, whisking constantly. Cook until the filling thickens; this should take about two minutes. Whisk continuously.

Stir in the vanilla. Press this custard through a mesh strainer and cover with plastic wrap to stop a skin forming. Refrigerate for at least two hours.

Make the dough

Preheat oven to 100C. Line a baking pan with baking paper and set it aside.

If you have a stand mixer with a whisk attachment, then use it for this step.

Stir the milk, sugar and yeast. Let that sit for about 10 minutes, it should start to get foamy.

Add eggs, butter and salt and whisk to combine.

Attach the dough hook and add the flour using a low setting until the dough comes together. On medium speed, knead for about five minutes; your dough should feel sticky but not stick to the bowl.

Put your dough into a lightly oiled bowl, roll the dough around so that it is all oiled. Turn off the oven and put your bowl in to rise for about 15 mins. Leave the door ajar.

Take the dough from the oven and heat again to 100C, on a lightly floured board roll out your dough into a 22cm x 30cm rectangle. Transfer to your baking tray, turn off the oven and place the dough to rise for about 30 minutes, it should double in size. Leave the door ajar. While you wait you can make the topping.

The topping

Bring the butter, cream, sugar and honey to the boil. Simmer for about two minutes. Take it from the heat and stir in your almonds and vanilla.

When the dough is risen take it from the oven and preheat to 190 degrees. Spread the almond topping evenly over the dough.

Bake for about 30 minutes or until you judge it is cooked through.

Allow it to come to room temperature.

Finish the filling

Whisk the cream until soft peaks form, add the cream of tartar and icing sugar and whisk until you get stiff peaks.

In another bowl mix the custard until smooth then fold in the cream.

Now you're ready to assemble your creation.

Carefully cut the cake with a long sharp knife, horizontally. Remove the top layer and spread the filling, place the top back on and refrigerate until the filling is firm, about 4 hours.

There you go I know you will enjoy this one, don't be daunted, it's worth it.

It seems that I made individual ones, as you can see by the picture but you get the idea.

Some historical information on Bee sting sweets.

Bienenstich or Bee sting cake is a German dessert made of a sweet yeast dough with a baked-on topping of caramelised almonds and filled with a vanilla custard, buttercream or cream.

One source cites a legend of German bakers from the 15th century who lobbed beehives at raiders from a neighbouring village, successfully repelling them, and celebrated later by baking a version of this cake named after their efforts.

The Maryborough Regional Library's outreach service to Dunolly resumed last week as works on the community's new library are on track to be completed before the end of the year. The twice-weekly outreach service, run out of St Johns Hall in Dunolly, was closed earlier this year due to coronavirus restrictions; however the service resumed on Thursday 23rd October, following the recent easing of restrictions.

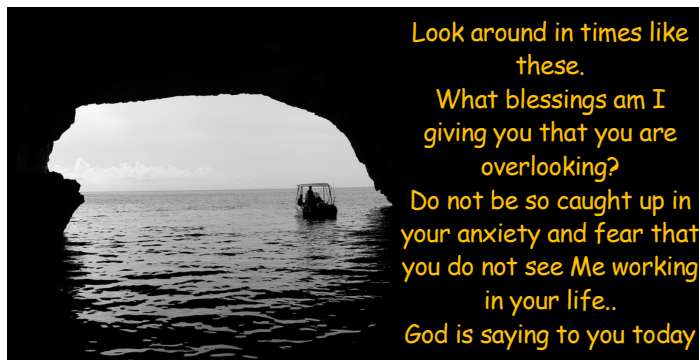
This Tuesday 27th October the committee met at the Op Shop to ascertain when we open it.

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Future of Talbot Caravan Park secured

The future of the Talbot Caravan Park is now secure with the Park to be re-registered for the next three years — as noted at the October Council Meeting last week (21st October 2020).

The re-registration will be valid from December 31st, 2020 until December 31st, 2023.

Central Goldfields Shire Council CEO Lucy Roffey said Council had been working closely with the Talbot Football and Netball Club and the residents of the Talbot Caravan Park since March to ensure the future of the Park and its residents.

“Council is the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning appointed land manager of the Crown Land portion of the Park facility – which means it is incumbent on Council to make sure the facility is safe for all users.

“Thanks to the hard work of the Talbot Football and Netball Club all health and safety obligations have been fulfilled to make the park compliant with Residential Tenancies (Caravan Parks and Moveable Dwellings Registration and Standards) Regulations – which is a credit to the Club, park residents and the Talbot community as a whole.

“We are pleased to re-register the Talbot Caravan Park for another three years, giving its permanent residents long-term certainty and ensuring the Talbot township has a vibrant economy.”

Council will now look to formalise management of the park through a contract lease agreement. Under this agreement, Council would work with the operator, currently the Talbot Football Netball Club, in continuing to improve health and safety conditions and to improving the facilities available to park users.

An independent formal market rental valuation will also be undertaken to determine whether Council should seek Ministerial exemption to negotiate directly with the Talbot Football Netball Club for the ongoing operation of the park.

Re-assessed Neighbourhood Safer Places Plan adopted

Central Goldfields Shire Council adopted the 2020 Neighbourhood Safer Places Plan ahead of the upcoming fire season at last night's (21/10) Council Meeting.

The Neighbourhood Safer Places Plan outlines places of last resort for residents during a bushfire and should only be used when all other bushfire plans have failed.

Under the CFA Act 1958, Council is required to conduct an annual review of designated Neighbourhood Safer Places to determine the locations' suitability.

The re-assessed designated sites are:

- Talbot – Pioneer Reserve (grounds only)
- Maryborough - Princes Park (oval only)
- Maryborough – Jack Pascoe Reserve (oval only)
- Dunolly – Gordon Gardens Reserve (grounds only)
- Carisbrook – Market Reserve (grounds only)

Central Goldfields Shire Council CEO Lucy Roffey said it is vital to have a Neighbourhood Safer Places Plan to help protect our community.

“The Neighbourhood Safer Places Plan helps provide guidance to our residents and where they should go, as a last resort, should a bushfire occur,” she said.

“It was timely to update our current plan due to the fire season fast approaching.”

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National Others Week (NOW)

"Kindness is a language the blind can see and the deaf can hear." Mark Twain.

Last week we discovered Spoonville and how this project is attempting to raise the spirits of people during these times of COVID-19. This got me thinking and I stumbled upon an event called National Others Week.

This week was to be held from 1st November to 7th November each year. Its philosophy is simple, to encourage people to help someone either with a random act of kindness or a planned activity.

Their motto – life is a team event.

National Others Week was launched in Canberra in 2012 by the Shadow Minister for Families, Housing and Human Services, Mr Andrews, in Parliament House, Canberra.

National Others Week has been organised to encourage Australians to focus on other people instead of themselves for seven days. Mr Andrews said NOW would develop a greater awareness of, and appreciation for, the people around us in our community.

It is an aim to encourage people everywhere to look beyond their own four walls, and just be there for someone else – to be a mate to them.

"Psychologists tell us that helping others actually builds our own self-esteem and sense of well-being — in other words, when we choose to bless others, we also benefit ourselves."

We can get so caught up in our lives, we forget about the incredible power of focusing on others. There is no such thing as a small act of kindness — every act, no matter how seemingly insignificant, has a ripple effect that spreads out forever in all directions.

"The essence of NOW is for all of us to carry out acts of kindness, spread good cheer, value people and show by example the goodness of mankind.

"We live in a very individualistic and self-centred society — we see violence, greed and selfishness portrayed only too vividly every day in the media.

"This is a chance, for one week at least, to exchange violence, greed and selfishness for kindness, generosity and compassion because we are mates helping mates, and at the end of the day, life really is a team sport," Pastor Wootton said.

This year National Others Week will start Sunday 1st November and finish Saturday 7th November. People participate by doing small random acts of kindness such as shouting someone a coffee, picking up litter, cleaning out your cupboard to give away your old clothes, babysit for a single parent etc.

This year we have seen a lot of distress and disaster so having an opportunity to bring light and kindness in the simplest ways could have a huge impact.

So, I know it's been a bit of a heavy topic this week but let's look at it as a chance to look up and see others and just ask them if they would like a hand.

Central Goldfields clubs receive further grants to survive and thrive

Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced three \$1000 grants have so far been approved in the Central Goldfields Shire under the second round of the Government's Community Sport Sector COVID-19 Short-term Survival Package.

The latest successful organisations are the Maryborough Butterfly Guides, Maryborough Caterpillar Guides and Maryborough District Cricket Association.

These are the second round of grants from the Andrews Labor Government's \$40 million community sport survival package, making it that little bit easier for clubs to support players and volunteers during this time. These clubs join the 27 local clubs that were successful in the first round of grants.

Victorians have been hit hard by the necessary restrictions, and sport and active recreation clubs and associations are no exception.

With more than three million Victorians involved in community sport and recreation, we know that getting back on the field or court is important to Victorians – that's why we are getting behind 12,000 clubs and associations across the state.

The Community Sport Sector COVID-19 Short-term Survival Package has two streams: grants for state sporting associations, regional sports assemblies and academies and other state sport and recreational bodies; and grants of up to \$2000 for associations and leagues and up to \$1000 for individual clubs.

The Government also recently announced further changes to its roadmap to COVID normal. This directive signals the steps in the return of community sport in Victoria. 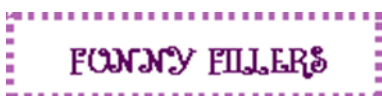

joining with us for church. The vision part of the communication added to the speech is particularly helpful. When I checked with my GP to see whether my hearing or my dementia was causing auditory problems, he said it is the latter. Although the phone alone is still a comforting communication. However, if you are not prepared for the topic of the phone conversation and you don't have the vocabulary needed at the forefront of your diminishing mind, telephoning can be quite disheartening. You wonder if you have missed more than you have gained. Facebook, emails, on-line shopping can all be done at your own pace, and you can repeat as frequently as you need to comprehend something in its entirety.

Regular meals are becoming taste sensations at our place these days. Just when getting something/anything onto the table that was vaguely appetizing, was a task too hard, Coles Supermarkets came to the rescue. (Woolies do the same thing, but our bankcard is connected to Coles). #colesmag: beautiful full color and almost life size, photos of the meal you can prepare. A symbol to show how many the dish will feed and another symbol to show preparation time (no English language required). Each meal is on a separate page. Each page has a 'what you need' inset with colour photographs of the items and their names. You can take the page to an assistant at Coles and they will take you to the item. Never purchased or heard of Caramelised onion jam, but we have some in the cupboard now. That service is a special feature because brightly lit, cluttered supermarkets cause overwhelming confusion when you have dementia. Some supermarkets offer a low light quiet time for shoppers who cannot cope with the normal 'rowdy' supermarket scene.

Nine degrees difference between the temperatures of the previous two days. Come on "Nature"! Just when getting the correct order of garments was becoming simplified, it is back again to 12 items of clothing. Ah summer: a shift, knickers and a pair of thongs. No disorder there!

Election votes counting week

It's another several days before the confirmed elected Candidates are formally declared. All Candidates we thank you for your interest and putting yourself forward for election to be our community representatives. Those not successful we look forward to seeing you stay on board and assist the forward direction of our community. It doesn't stop with the Councillors, it starts with us. A snap shot of possibly where we went wrong.

This is our time to shine.

In 1995 commissioners were placed in and shires were amalgamated. On the completion of the commissioners' term a review was carried out by the State Government. That report is below:

The report was tabled in 2001 and that is where it stayed. Never followed up.

In 2017 Administrators were appointed due to the Inspectorate's report. <https://apo.org.au/node/104341>

On analysis of these two reports on key persons which were common in both reports, it appears the findings in the 1998 report were extremely similar in the 2017 report. It appears the concerns were not looked into (recommendations not followed up) in the 1998 report by the State Government, the newly elected councillors or questioned by the community.

So that same behaviour from 1998 report was permitted to continue, which became the central issue in the 2017 findings.

Where do we fit in?

Is it the fault of the Government? Yes.

Is it the fault of the Councillors? Yes

Is it the fault of the Community? Yes.

It is up to us as the ratepayers and residents to keep an eye on our council and Government and keep them informed of our concerns, and reward them also for their good decisions. If you don't understand ask our elected representatives or council representatives. This is where it all starts.

We have just had two and a half years of Administration. This has given us an extremely good insight as to what we can expect if we don't all work together, and make this election the one to set us in the direction where it won't happen again. Some may state "processes are in place to ensure this won't happen again." We don't need processes, we need participation and transparency. The way to get that is to ask, participate and assist our council and councillors.

One example of this is the recent Broiler Farm concern from Carisbrook / Moolort.

A Broiler Farm code was passed in 2018. More participation by we the community may have changed this very code. Questions: Did we know? Would the Administrators have listened? Would our shire have listened? Were our leaders aware of the Broiler issue of the past? The list goes on.

The question we have is — do we make sure this doesn't occur again? We ask everyone of the community to address all your concerns with the shire, councillors or if there are uncertainties regarding this approach contact us, CGR&RAI and we will do it for you.

This is our community, it's our responsibility and be part of our new direction, and do it with pride It's our time to HINE

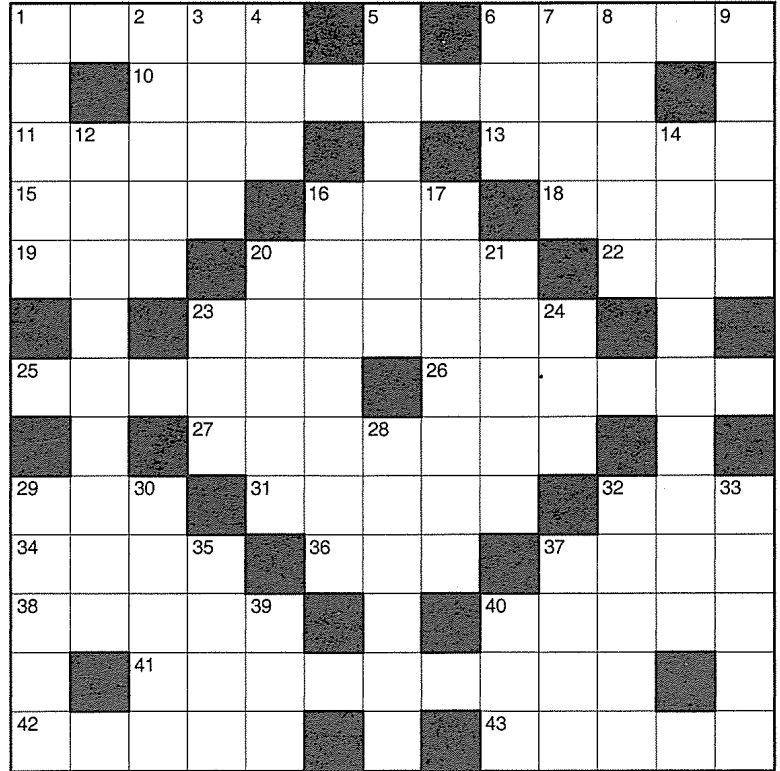

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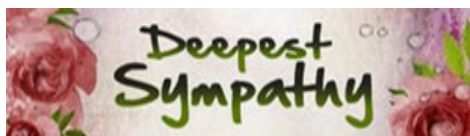

Alice Street, Dunolly

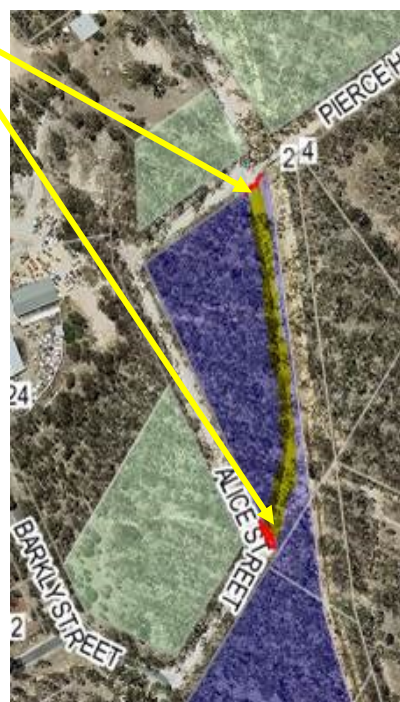
Some residents may have noticed that Alice Street in Dunolly currently has 'Private Road' signs in place.

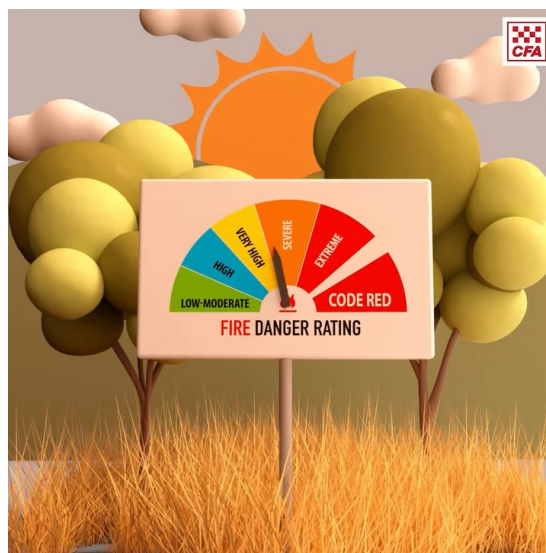
Leaving early is the safest option to protect yourself and your family. Leaving early means leaving the area before a fire starts — not when you can see flames or smell smoke.

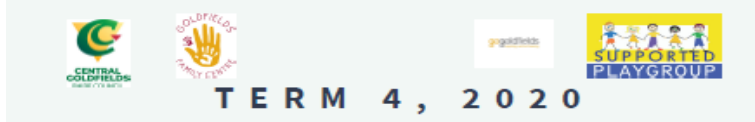
