#### Register your burn-offs

It is very important that people wishing to have a burn-off on their property follow the correct procedure.



- If you are in Dunolly you must have a permit. Check with the Shire if you are unsure.
- If it is a Total Fire Ban day NO fires. Check on a CFA "Can I or Can't I" brochure.
- If in the Fire Ban Period you MUST have a permit.
- At other times before lighting a fire it is extremely important that you register your burn with the CFA Phone 1800 668 511.

This registration allows the burn-off line to notify the relevant Fire Brigade that the burn has been registered, in case someone does ring 000 about your fire. It also helps if your burn does get away — the Fire Brigade will know exactly where to go. Please be very careful and follow all the rules for fires.

- Have on site at least 10 litres of water; keep an area around the fire clear of litter.
- Have people to help, especially if it is a big burn-off.
- Have your phone with you.
- Never leave the fire unattended.
- Make sure it is out and safe before you leave.

The Dunolly Fire Brigade wishes to remind everyone that if you have a fire and the Brigade is called, can the trucks access your property safely.

The trucks are big — are your gateways wide enough? Are there overhanging branches and limbs that prevents access? Please think about these issues. Unfortunately fires do happen and when they do occur, it is too late to widen the entrance or prune trees and shrubs.

## Dunolly District Hospital Auxiliary President's Report 2020 5th October 2020

I am pleased to present a brief report on behalf of the Dunolly District Hospital Auxiliary to review our activities over the last 12 months and to indicate our priorities for future work.

There was nothing usual about this year to report: the impacts of the COVID-19 affected our small committee and its activities, just as it has done through all communities. Of greatest concern has been to ensure the wellbeing of residents in the Dunolly Residential Aged Care home and staff have worked hard all year to help residents maintain a good quality of life. Restricted access has meant families and volunteers could not visit for several months; however, more workable arrangements have been introduced, thanks to the innovative practice of staff. For instance, a gazebo on the boundary of the garden has enabled residents and families to interact safely. Our Auxiliary members (and a couple of children) wrote to every resident, at Donna's suggestion, and I have maintained regular phone contact with Donna to see in what ways the Auxiliary may be able to help. Restrictions even meant the 150th Rheola Carnival was cancelled and our usual presents for Easter and Mother's Day were not permitted. Let's hope this will ease for Christmas. Unfortunately, the Auxiliary has not been able to raise funds during the year, but the raffle books will be out again when this is considered OK. We had set ourselves the task of raising \$1500 for the year, which is now, sadly, impossible.

Our revived Red Cross Garden is flourishing and ready to welcome strollers on fine days; however, Terry's commitment to employing a gardener for two days a week has not materialised, and this was brought to his attention on his departure. As we have not had the support of Community Corrections teams this year because of COVD-19, and as Troy is very busy with maintenance work, gardening in the Red Cross Garden has depended on volunteer goodwill, largely Marion and myself. This is not a sustainable situation and will be brought to the attention of the new CEO.

Our Scholarship recipient for 2020 was Billie Goodwin, who was thrilled to have some assistance to meet the costs of her nursing diploma course. She will complete the course this year and is seriously considering applying to study for a nursing degree. Billie loves all opportunities to care for residents on the Dunolly Campus. Our second annual educational award is the Encouragement Award (now called the Shining Star Award) for a student at the Dunolly Primary School. Several Auxiliary members attended the School's final assembly and presented the award to Lachie Condie.

COVID-19 has not diminished our commitment to our housing initiative, now called the Dunolly Housing Project. Having such strong foundations in the Feasibility Report and extensive community, health service, Council and political support, the Working Group continued to keep in touch to map out our strategies. Receiving the endorsement of our project from Community Housing Limited and their expression of interest in taking it on if/ when post-COVID-19 funding for innovative housing becomes available, was a great step forward.

We put several months to good use by commissioning Philip Ashton to make a short film to promote the Project. People from the district spoke from the heart about their needs for safe and secure independent housing and their fears of housing insecurity. Philip did a wonderful job: in less than five minutes, the essence of our Project is made clear. Philip donated his time and expertise with great generosity and community spirit; Dunolly is so fortunate to have access to Philip's professional talents and experience. Circulating the film to relevant Ministers and politicians has brought an encouraging response and the media coverage just reminds the community and politicians about the importance of this Project. A letter received 30th September from the Department of Health and Human Services commits the Department to "liaise with the Hospital Auxiliary and Community Housing Limited when future funding programs are open". I take that as a positive sign.

I wish to thank my Auxiliary colleagues for being such a wonderful warm-hearted and committed bunch and we have enjoyed welcoming another member, Carol Dodson. Our current membership is Carol, Rosemary Mecredy, Joyce Vater, Barbara Coupland, Faye Nicholson (Treasurer), Kath Ryan, Marion Da Costa (Secretary) and myself as President. We sadly farewelled Trina Kay as she and Gary moved to Bendigo. Trina was Treasurer and chief cake stall cook for many years. Rosemary also retired as Secretary after a wonderful innings, but her little brown suitcase lives on in The Dunolly Hospital Archives. Changes are now required for Executive positions as I am moving from Dunolly at the end of the year. I will, however, remain committed to seeing the Dunolly Housing Project through to what we hope will be an exciting transformation in housing for older people in our community in the capable and experienced hands of Community Housing Limited.

It's a mark of the solidity of our Auxiliary that we have stuck together during a very challenging year.

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#### **Recycle Week**

This week is Remembrance Day. We need to honour our fallen war heroes and those who came home. There are so many ways to do this, I'm sure I don't need to tell you.

One way to pay your respects to these wonderful men and women, is by having respect and care for our environment. Let's look after the world they left us. They fought for our freedom; let's use that freedom by looking at what we use in our houses and what is left as rubbish or recycling materials. That being said, this week it is Recycling Week, 9th — 15th November.

Possibly you have never wondered what happens to your recycling materials once they are loaded onto the trucks. Our recycling products in this area are trucked to Carisbrook and sorted for delivery to other depots. They are then sorted for delivery to other facilities to be recycled, and sorted for repurposing.

I was fascinated to learn the Central Goldfields Shire does not run our local transfer stations: they are run by a company called Veolia, which it seems is a worldwide business. I looked up their mission statement and part of it states:

"As natural resources become scarcer, and we face growing challenges of urbanisation, consumerism and climate change, we need innovative models that support growth and sustainability. Today, water, waste and energy can all be recovered. Our solutions transform what is discarded by some into valuable resources for others." I'm sure this is a very noble sentiment from a huge conglomerate.

A visit to our local transfer station in Dunolly was interesting. It was surprisingly neat and clean, very well organised, much different to the tips of my childhood remembrance. An extremely helpful man explained the workings of the transfer station, things I hadn't been aware of before. It is here I learned of the journey our recycling takes.

Our cardboard is taken to Echuca where it is compressed for further use by the recycling industry. Our paper and glass are taken to Bendigo where they are sorted and prepared for further use. This gets me to the circular economy. What's that you say?

Today's dominating economic model is linear: We take virgin natural resources and make products from them which we then discard once we're done using them — often after a relatively short time. Sometimes the short lifespan is due to planned obsolescence where products break easily and are difficult to repair and upgrade.

Our current, linear way of producing and consuming products is ruining fragile ecosystems, causing the loss of valuable natural resources. The circular economy brings more sustainable solutions where products are in use longer and materials are reused to manufacture new products.

The linear model leads to a number of problems.

Virgin materials are extracted at a faster rate than they can be replenished. Once discarded, products are treated as waste and are often incinerated or placed in landfill, leading to the loss of valuable and scarce natural resources.

Unsafe ways of handling waste also lead to hazardous substances leaching into soil, water and air. Both the manufacturing and transportation of products lead to pollution and extensive energy use that can be avoided in the circular economy.


Reserves of some natural resources are already running low and the problem will increase as the world population grows and economic prosperity reaches more people. Resources are re-used in the circular economy.

The goal is to extend product lifetime and recirculate all materials without producing any waste. Product reuse is more resource efficient than recycling, since most materials lose value every time they are recycled. Therefore, extending product lifetime is the best way of lowering its environmental impact. In a circular economy, products are built to last.

They are durable and can be upgraded and repaired. Parts can be replaced — for example batteries, since functioning products often are discarded just because of worn out batteries. Once products have reached the end of their usable life they turn into valuable resources, used to manufacture new products. The need for extracting virgin materials is therefore minimized in the circular economy. Product and material life are considered already in the design phase — components are made easy to separate and contain no hazardous substances which makes them unsuitable to recycle and use in new products. Okay, so that was a quick tour of how things work.

Maybe we need to look back to how our forebears used commodities such as cleaning products and rethink our consumption by making our own, thus reversing some of the plastic use in our households. That's just one example; I'll leave it to you to think of others.

From this stage on, we encourage each and every resident to begin interaction with the Shire on every issue they have and find an answer, not complain to your friends and not pursue an answer from the Shire.

The Central Goldfields Ratepayers and Residents Association Inc advocate for our members and non-members. We are happy to advise, direct or listen to any ratepayers or residents, new or old, from any corner of our wonderful Shire. We are also happy to assist those outside our Shire if asked. So to set the ledger straight we represent our members and offer assistance to the community on request.

Many a time over the years the local comment has been "It's no good talking to the council/councillors — they won't listen or do any good." That may have been deemed the case, but it is not going to be the case now. Ask, seek and you will get the answers.

In the last month alone we have had two local residents who have had issues going back several years. With advice and direction, both these local residents have obtained answers to issues they have not been getting over the past years. It will not always be a result you are seeking, but understanding the complete situation will go a long way to some sort of agreement. By understanding and using the correct processes an answer is in reach.

The process is simply this: Contact the council officer involved. If not satisfied, contact his/her immediate superior. If still not satisfied, contact the CEO; if still not satisfied, contact the Mayor, then write a letter of complaint to the Ombudsman. Always follow up with a formal letter of complaint to the CEO. Ask the officer before you proceed to the next stage, where they would suggest you take your concerns to next. Keep all correspondence — that paper trail is crucial.

We have used this process successfully on many occasions. It was unfortunate that it came to this.

At present we have one VCAT, two FOIs and an Ombudsman's investigation open, which all should not be necessary, however, to break down that present barrier these steps must be taken.

We work towards a time when we can go to the Shire, ask a question and be given all the information and assistance asked and where both parties feel satisfied.

It's the local and state laws which govern the behaviour of the Shire and CEO. Our councillors on many occasions are given the blame for non-action, where by law they cannot intervene or are not involved.

All our elected councillors advocated transparency and accountability. It is up to us to give them the opportunity to achieve that. We are confident our councillors will achieve this.

On the other hand our CEO and council staff are governed by not only local law but state acts and laws as well. The elected Mayor can discuss issues with the CEO but has no jurisdiction over the Shire staff.

By using the process mentioned earlier we can open the information flood gates and make dealing with our Shire a more pleasant and transparent experience.

Communication is the answer and we must begin the open information by asking those questions and persisting. We have rights too and we will be heard!

There are two parts to CASI. Residents can call the Coronavirus Hotline on 1800 675 398 to receive emotional support if they are feeling lonely or disconnected. CASI is an Australian Red Cross initiative and callers will be connected with Australian Red Cross volunteers who are trained in psychological first aid and can provide emotional support.

Community members can also be linked to the Central Goldfields Community Connector who can help with connections with local organisations, local networks and opportunities that provide ongoing emotional, practical or social support. Direct calls can be made to the Central Goldfields Shire on 5461 0610.

From November 2020 we will be conducting Town Hall Community Connector sessions. Community Connectors will be available in-person at different locations throughout the Shire. Dates, times and locations are available:

## Helping Central Goldfields Shire kids get the most out of kinder

Every Victorian child attending a funded kindergarten program in Central Goldfields Shire will get the most out of their learning and development with the final stage of the \$160 million Australian-first School Readiness Funding rolling out.

Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, has announced five early childhood services offering funded kinder in 2021 in Central Goldfields Shire will share in more than \$170,000 of early childhood School Readiness Funding. This includes the A G Leech Kindergarten, T L Stone Memorial Kindergarten, Dunolly Kindergarten, Paisley Park Early Learning Centre Maryborough and Goldfields Children's Centre.

The total funding allocated to each service is dependent on the number of children enrolled who face educational disadvantage. This is the first time the funding will be made available to all funded kindergartens in Victoria, with the program now a permanent feature of Victoria's early childhood education system.

About 1700 kindergartens in 47 local government areas will automatically receive this funding for the first time in 2021. Services delivering funded kindergarten programs for three-year-old children in 2021 will also receive this funding. Services that are receiving School Readiness Funding for the first time are located across Victoria, from the Alpine Shire, Greater Geelong, Port Phillip to Yarra Ranges in 2021.

Australian research shows that one in five Victorian children start school developmentally vulnerable and once behind, they tend to stay behind. This needs-based funding aims to reduce the impact of educational disadvantage on children's learning and development and improve outcomes in communication, wellbeing, and access and participation.

School readiness funding will allow Victorian kindergarten providers to tap into the expertise of speech and occupational therapists, language and literacy professionals and child psychologists, who can then boost the capability of both parents and teachers.

Victoria's success as the Education State starts in the early years — so that's why the Victorian Government has also invested \$5 billion over a decade to deliver 15 hours of three-year-old kindergarten to all children.

"This needs-based funding will improve outcomes in communication, social and emotional wellbeing, access and participation for children in Central Goldfields Shire," Ms Pulford said.

Sea salt dark chocolate almond cluster fat bombs

#### Ingredients

1 1/4 cup raw almonds 3/4 cup cocoa butter 5 tablespoon unsweetened cocoa powder



5 tablespoon heavy whipping cream 1/4 cup Lakanto Monkfruit Classic Sweetener Coarse sea salt


Method

Preheat oven to 250 degrees celsius and line baking sheet with parchment paper. Bake almonds until toasted, about 10 minutes. Line a separate baking sheet with parchment paper. In a small glass bowl, combine cocoa butter, cocoa powder, heavy whipping cream, and sweetener. Using double boiler method on stovetop over low heat, melt ingredients together until chocolate is smooth. Whisk mixture frequently to avoid burning.

Remove melted chocolate from heat and stir in toasted almonds. Spoon chocolate and almond mixture onto prepared baking sheet into desired cluster size. Top clusters with sea salt. (A second baking sheet may be necessary, depending on the size of the baking sheet.)

Transfer baking sheet to refrigerator and chill until hardened, about 25-30 minutes. Alternatively, transfer baking sheet to freezer and chill until hardened, about 10-15 minutes.

Once chocolate has hardened, gently pull parchment paper away from clusters, serve, and enjoy!


