Notes from Loddon Shire

Mayor elected

Congratulations to Cr Neil Beattie on being elected as Loddon Shire Council Mayor for the coming year.

This is the third time Cr Beattie has been elected Mayor. Cr Beattie was previously Mayor in 2015 and 2016.

Councillors were also officially sworn in at the Special Council Meeting, taking the Affirmation of Office and making a written declaration that they will abide by the Councillor Code of Conduct.

Fire danger period for Loddon Shire

The 2020/21 Fire Danger Period (FDP) for Loddon Shire is now in effect.

The FDP, which is declared by the Country Fire Authority (CFA), started at 1am this morning (Monday 23rd November). The FDP will run through the warmer months, ending on 1st May 2021.

During the FDP fires cannot be lit in the open air without a written permit from the CFA or a Municipal Fire Prevention Officer.

Customer service office reopens

Until otherwise advised, cash payments will not be accepted by Council's customer service staff. If you wish to make a payment by cash, please go to your local Australia Post Office.

Meetings with non-reception Council staff will be by appointment only. To arrange an appointment, please call Reception on 5494 1200.

As many Council staff are still working from home (as per the direction from the Victorian Chief Health Officer) most appointments will be conducted via video conferencing. Please let reception staff know if you need help with video conferencing when making your appointment.

In some cases, a meeting room and Council computer may be used for video conferencing. For people familiar with video conferencing, you can use your smart phone, tablet or home computer.

Swimming pools now open

Council's five public swimming pools are now open for the 2020/21 season.

Swimming pools are located at Boort, Inglewood, Mitiamo, Pyramid Hill and Wedderburn.

To make our pools safe and to operate within current COVID-19 guidelines, restrictions are in place at all pools. This includes using the QR code access system or providing staff with contact details upon entry to pools, wearing of masks when outside of the pool and maintaining social distancing.

Hand sanitiser will be available at the entrance/kiosk for use by attendees when entering pools and any time as needed.

During busy periods, attendees will be asked to stay no longer than two hours at the swimming pool. There will also be a maximum number of people allowed in a pool at any one time.





Go Goldfields formally launched the "Every Child, "Every Chance" initiative today. The initiative recognises the early years as a critical time to combat inequality to ensure all our kids get the footing they need.

Beginning in pregnancy, the early years of every child's life entails the rapid development of emotional, communication, thinking, social skills to equip children with tools for life. However, too many of our children are beginning school with vulnerabilities in these important areas.

Research conducted on Central Goldfields Shire by the Murdoch Children's Research Institute found that while we receive our fair share of programs and services directed to the early years, more can be done to ensure they are shaped to our local context and meet the specific needs of our families.

The "Every Child, Every Chance" initiative brings together community, business, government, and not-for-profit partners to ensure every child in Central Goldfields Shire has every chance to grow up safe, healthy, and confident. This means working together on identified priority areas.

- Supported and healthy pregnancies.
- Confident and Connected new parents.
- Safe and Secure Children.
- · Valued early years education and care.
- Great start to school.

The initiative is supported by a community engagement program to begin in 2021. This will ensure we have the voices of children, parents, carers, community volunteers to inform service providers, educators, and health professionals, and governments as we come together around these important milestones.

Three short polls are now live on our website and encourage community members to express interest in the priority areas. We are also seeking volunteers from the broader community who have time or skills to assist in the initiative.

The approach also complements recent State Government announcements of significant investment in children's education including School Readiness Funding and additional funding for Central Goldfields Shire early learning centres to address disadvantage and access, as well as free three-and-four year-old kinder for 2021 onwards

Healthy Heart of Victoria launches Adventure Bingo to get reisdents active across the region

Residents are encouraged to get physically active across the Loddon Campaspe region while having some fun at the same time by taking part in Adventure Bingo - a new initiative from the Healthy Heart of Victoria.

Adventure Bingo invites residents to collect or download an Adventure Bingo booklet and participate in one of six walks in each of the participating local government areas. Through the initiative participants spot points of interest listed in the booklet during their walk and once they've spotted three items in a vertical, horizontal or diagonal line, they've got Bingo.

As part of the initiative, a series of weekly prize draws will be conducted from Monday November 23 to Sunday December 13, where residents who submit a photo of their completed Bingo card to hhv@bendigo.vic.gov.au will go into the draw to win sporting equipment. Participants can send a photo of themselves at one of the sites on their Bingo card via Facebook message to Healthy Heart of Victoria to enter a special photo prize draw.

Healthy Heart of Victoria Coordinator, Alicia O'Brien said Adventure Bingo encourages physical activity in our local region in a fun and simple way, especially for children and families.

"It also provides a free opportunity to explore walks in our region in a COVID-safe way as the walks are outdoors, self-guided and can be done individually or in very small groups," Ms O'Brien said.

Recent data released by AusPlay has shown that children's physical activity levels were heavily impacted by COVID-19. The data highlighted that less than one in five Australian children were active in organised activities outside of school during COVID-19 lockdown.

"Even before the pandemic, there were concerns that children were not moving enough, and with students learning from home for much of 2020, with no access to a playground at lunchtime or organised sport after school or on the weekends, the research has shown that levels of inactivity have increased during this time.

"The Active Living Census told us that walking is the most popular physical activity across the Loddon Campaspe region and so through Adventure Bingo we hope residents are encouraged to have a bit of fun when out on

Watch out for online shopping scams this holiday season

Losses to online shopping scams have increased 42 per cent this year, and Scamwatch is warning Australians to be careful when buying gifts this holiday season.

Scamwatch has received more than 12,000 reports of online shopping scams so far this year, with almost \$7 million in reported losses.

"More people have been shopping online this year due to COVID-19 restrictions and scammers are now targeting people doing their Christmas shopping, including in the Black Friday and Cyber Monday sales," ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard said.

"Scammers create fake websites that look like genuine online stores, offering products at very low prices and victims will either receive a fake item or nothing at all.

"They also post fake ads on classified websites, often claiming they are travelling and someone else will deliver the goods, but the item never arrives and the victim can no longer contact the seller."

Losses on classified websites, such as Facebook Marketplace and Gumtree, have increased by 60 per cent this year, to \$4.5 million.

Reports of online shopping scams involving consumer goods, such as shoes, phones, computers and toys, continue to be high. But the most common thing people were trying to buy when they were scammed was puppies and

People aged 24 and under reported the highest number of scams involving phones and computers.

"Watch out for popular products being sold at prices much lower than on other websites and sellers requesting payment through direct bank transfer or cryptocurrency," Ms Rickard said.

"Take the time to consider who you are dealing with and don't be pressured by special offers.

"Do your research by checking independent reviews of online stores or the seller's history on classified websites."

Another scam to be aware of if you have made recent purchases online is fake parcel delivery notifications via text message or email.

"Australia Post will never ask you to click a link to enter your personal details, nor will they ask for credit card details or a fee to deliver your packages," Ms Rickard said.

"If you have been the victim of a scam, contact your bank as soon as possible and contact the platform on which you were scammed to inform them of the circumstances."

Most financial institutions offer a charge back service for credit cards and will dispute a credit transaction with the merchant if they still exist.





Caper White butterfly cloud hovers over the capers

Who would see a cloud of beautiful mottled white butterflies and be filled with dread and loathing? Incredible as it sounds, caper growers experience this each growing season. This year those feelings have been aroused months earlier than normal.

The Caper White butterfly has headed south and arrived in our local district. We know that these beautiful fluttering creatures have arrived at Rosie's place (Rosie's Ramble Vol 35 Issue 44) last week. They have never been seen in such numbers in Bealiba as folk have seen them this year.

Caper White butterflies, *Belenois java*, are native to Australia. They migrate in large numbers every year through Queensland, NSW and occasionally in Victoria, depending on the weather and drought conditions.

In his book "Djadja Wurrung Language of Central Victoria" John Tully recorded the indigenous name for butterflies as "ballam ballam", which may have included these Caper Whites.

The butterflies drink nectar from both native and introduced flowers, such as buddlejas or lavender. Their larvae, or caterpillars, have adapted from eating the leaves of native caper plants, such as the Native Orange, *Capparis mitchellii*, to also eating the European caper plants, *Capparis spinosa*, whose berries are widely known as pickled capers.

Capers are a delightful culinary delicacy. Capers are the buds of the caper bush and if left to blossom grow into a beautiful flower.

This flower is pink and white similar in shape and size to a passion fruit flower. In Hungary they are known as a passion flower.

The flower has a very prominent stamen and if allowed to mature, a caper berry is formed. Both the caper bud and the caper berry have a firm place in the highest of culinary arts. The buds, when picked are about the size of a small pea. Both buds and berries are hand-picked. This picking is done early in the morning as the tips of the plant, where the tiny buds are forming, are very delicate. The buds snap off if picked when it is cool.

Caper bushes are native to Turkey, growing wild around the Mediterranean area. Australia has at least 18 varieties of native caper trees. The native caper plants are less prevalent in Victoria, although there is a large native caper tree in the Royal Botanic Gardens, and also at the Zoo, in Melbourne. Tough rock plants, they are notoriously difficult to propagate. Coopers' Capers has 400 caper bushes in the paddock in Mount Road Bealiba. They are growing in open ended pots for picking height convenience. Bushes are fitted to an irrigation system, with a dripper for each plant, to simplify watering.

Organic farming insists that no chemicals are used to combat the caper butterfly invasion. With this influx of butterflies, we must remove caterpillars during our daily caper picking. Left unattended, these creatures could destroy the entire bush. Butterfly eggs are collected annually for the Butterfly House at Melbourne Zoo.

So, the sight of a cloud of beautiful butterflies in Bealiba is not what we farmers like to see, but is a spectacular sight for butterfly admirers.


Rhonda Collins — artist, mixed media specialist



Welcome to our newly-sworn-in Councillors and Mayor Cr Chris Meddows-Taylor. There is much to be done, bearing in mind we are aware Rome was not built in a day.

Thank you for putting yourself forward to assist the community, and we look forward to seeing our Shire's economic industrial, and community development improve. This has been a time of unprecedented property growth with our shire obtaining increases in land and building values not seen for decades, our 2019/20 Annual Report which was written by the Central Goldfields Shire, presented then passed by the now ex-Administrators on Monday 16th Nov 2020 at a special council meeting. In a time of a huge property boom, we ask why were our Building assets depreciated \$56 million. Yes you read correctly, our building assets were depreciated by 64% from \$88 million down \$56 million to \$32 million, and our infrastructure was also depreciated by 30% (\$93 million) which gave us a very creditable asset over Liability percentage of 160.79%.

One question we ask is "Why did we have to (in a time of a huge land and property boom) have to depreciate our assets and infrastructure \$152M million" It doesn't sound much if you say it quickly.

We also noticed in the Shire's performance section of the Annual Report, the planning figures which have been skyrocketing have also been omitted or recategorised, planning performance from 2016 "Staff producing a planning approval" costs went from \$1500 to \$2800 to 2020 now listed as "Cost of statutory planning service" \$3400.

Time for approval went from 54 days to moreover 90 days and number of approvals done within prescribed time went from 57% to 32 %.

CGR&RAI wrote to the Shire asking for an explanation to these and a few other questions on Tuesday 17th November 2020. We have not even received an acknowledgement of receipt of our email, let alone a reply which is totally against the shire's own service charter. We ask the newly elected councillors to please look into the Central Goldfields Shire Annual Report 2020, and update the Shires intention to adhere to their own policies and belief in the financial and managerial direction of our great Shire, hopefully with the outcome of giving the community confidence into our shire direction under its present management.

We can't see a \$152M write down in the present economic spike as a positive and look forward to understanding the

On a different note, the Fire Preparedness notice which was distributed throughout the shire to property owners has also raised a few concerns. We would like to stress that the notices sent out are not infringement notices nor work orders, just a notice to the property owners to make them aware of property regulations and the pending fire season. These notices were worded of the nature which caused considerable grief and concern through out the community. That was not the intention. However the shining light out of this exercise has inspired the Shire into a quick smart "Mow your own back yard mentality before asking others to do same". Refreshing, We ask any resident, if there are any areas of concern regarding fire concerns please notify the Council. Please also bear in mind that there are Vic Roads and Local Council Roads, DELWP, Victoria and National

parks areas as well, so possibly begin with a question first. Many concerns have been raised regarding the time, costing and mailing of the aforementioned fire preparedness notices but there is no doubting its effectiveness. Maybe both sides should be weighed up.

We are having our AGM on Tuesday December 1st 2020 (COVID permitting) and are anticipating the possibility of having it inside the Maryborough Hub at 7pm. Should COVID restrictions or Council approval not permit this, plan "B" is to having the AGM at the Auditorium (weather permitting) outside the Hub, COVID conditions and distancing compliant. We would appreciate RSVPs if possible to give us an idea of numbers, and financial members can nominate committee members. With our increasing membership and Facebook interest the future of our association is looking very strong.

Thank you all and our way forward is "working together".

Victoria experienced below average rainfall for most of the state during winter, but above average rainfall occurred in East Gippsland.

While areas in the far south-west received rainfall well above average earlier this spring, pockets of Victoria received below-average rainfall.

For the remainder of the year and into the start of summer, we can expect above-average rainfall across Victoria due to the influence of *La Niña*, particularly across the northern parts and mountain regions.

Considering the outlook and current conditions, the fire season has the potential to be a grassfire-dominated season, with shorter-duration fires in grass and dry forests during hotter and windier days.

Victorians can find out "Can I or Can't I?" information at cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can or by calling VicEmergency Hotline on 1800 226 226. All burn-offs should be registered with the VicFire Burn-off notification line on 1800 668 511.

Fire Danger Period information:

- Lighting a fire in the open without a permit is an offence and can bring a penalty of more than \$19,000 and/or 12 months imprisonment. Barbeques and fires for cooking and warmth do not require a permit, but must be lit in properly constructed fireplaces (to view complete conditions visit cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can
- The public is referred to the CFA "Can I Can't I" document for a full list of activities that can be safely undertaken during the FDP. This includes the permit and general conditions that apply in each circumstance.
- Farmers can find legal guidelines and practical advice at cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare/farms this information is important especially for new farmers, bush block owners or hobby farmers.
- A Total Fire Ban declaration means no fires can be lit for the declared district for that day unless there is a specific exemption or special permit issued. This applies irrespective of the Fire Restriction status for a given municipality. Further details at cfa.vic.gov.au/warningsrestrictions/can/


