Our experience shows us the creative community in Dunolly and surrounds plays an important role in bringing people to the town and provides an excellent vehicle for engaging visitors in conversations relating to the town's history and its beautifully maintained historic buildings.

#### Stories from Cynthia

While chatting to a friend of my daughter, who has made a study of 'bush tucker', she mentioned that there is a nice little edible plant growing in our immediate area which could easily be mistaken for a weed. It has a yellow flower and is known as the Yam Daisy or Murnong (*Microseris Lancolata*) and looks very much like a dandelion but on closer inspection you will note the differences. So I decided to look it up and find out more about this little plant using *Wikipedia*.

Apparently the Yam Daisy was a staple food for the Wurundjeri people in our area and other surrounding parts of Victoria. In New South Wales and Canberra it was a common and prolific plant, however the sheep introduced in the 1840s by the colonists trampled the earth, obliterating the Yam Daisy in many parts of its habitat where it was unable to re-establish itself. The tuberous roots of the plant can be eaten raw or baked and can be added to salads or served warm with butter, or just added to vegetables.

Since I read that the Yam Daisy is harvested in Autumn I plan to pay closer attention when out and about and see if I can discover this rare plant. They can be grown in your veggie patch or in a pot. Wouldn't it be nice to grow an Australian native vegetable that was once a staple for 50,000 years. It could become a regular in our cuisine. So everyone, start looking.

#### MyGov impersonation scam doing the rounds

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) and Services Australia are warning the community about a new email impersonation scam that is doing the rounds.

The fake emails claim to be from "myGov" and include screen shots of the myGovID app.

The email asks people to click a link to verify their identity using a "secure form" which takes them to a fake myGov page requesting personal identifying information and banking details.

According to a statement from the ATO, myGovID is an app that can be used to prove who you are when accessing government online services. ATO systems, myGov, and myGovID have not been compromised.

ATO assistant commissioner Ben Foster said this new phishing scam contains classic warning signs that it is not legitimate, for example, asking people to click a link to confirm their details and spelling errors.

"The ATO and myGov does send emails and SMS messages, however will never send you an email or SMS with a hyperlink directing you to a login page for our online services," Mr Foster said.

"In the lead up to tax time, we expect to see more of these malicious attempts to harvest identity details. So we encourage everyone to be on alert and take the time to remind family and friends to be on the lookout and stay safe online.

Mr Foster confirmed that this scam was all about collecting personal information from victims rather than gaining access to live information via myGov or myGovID.

Services Australia general manager Hank Jongen said scams were becoming more sophisticated, and people should be wary of emails asking for identity documents or personal identifying information.

"If you've opened an email that looks suspicious, don't click any links, open any attachments or reply to it," he

"If you've received the suspicious email and provided your myGov sign in information you should take immediate action.

"Change your myGov password and if you've provided your banking details, contact your bank.

"If you're still concerned and require extra support you can call Services Australia's Scams and Identity Theft Helpdesk on 1800 941 126.

"Staff will be able to give you advice on what to do if you've been scammed, and connect you with identity recovery services."

Mr Jongen said the Helpdesk is open Monday to Friday, 8am to 5pm AEST.

If you receive an SMS or email that looks like it's from myGov, but it contains a link or appears suspicious, you can report it to ScamWatch.

Lists of the latest ATO and Services Australia scam alerts and more information about how to identify and report impersonation scams are available at

ato.gov.au/scams and servicesaustralia.gov.au/scams.

Tips to protect yourself from scammers:

- · Be cautious when clicking on hyperlinks embedded in SMS and emails — do not click on links or attachments in emails from unknown sources.
- When logging in with myGovID, ensure that the URL displayed in our browser includes https://www.myGovID.gov.au or https:// myGovID.gov.au.
- Keep your personal information and passwords secure — don't share your password with others and change your passwords regularly.

- Install anti-virus software on all devices and set the software to automatically check for updates on a daily
- Make data security an everyday priority, practise good cyber hygiene and constantly review your security habits.
- Store personal information in a secure place make electronic documents containing personal information are secure and avoid carrying your birth certificate or passport in a wallet or handbag unless you need them.
- When downloading the myGovID app make sure it's from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store.

#### Slow-cooker beef brisket bourguignon

Pop this beef brisket in the slow cooker in the morning and come home to the delicious aroma of bourguignon filling the house. This is easy cooking at its best!

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1.5kg Beef Brisket
- 12 eschalots, peeled

200g streaky bacon, halved lengthways, chopped

- 3 garlic cloves, crushed
- 6 sprigs fresh thyme, plus extra to serve
- 1 dried bay leaf
- 1 cup red wine
- 1/2 cup Massel beef style liquid stock
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste
- 2 carrots, thickly sliced
- 200g swiss brown mushrooms, halved
- 200g button mushrooms

300g green beans, steamed, to serve

Mashed potato, to serve

#### **EQUIPMENT**

5.5-litre slow cooker

#### METHOD

Step 1 Heat half the oil in a flameproof slow cooker bowl or frypan over medium-high heat. Cook beef for five minutes each side or until browned. Transfer to a plate.

Step 2 Reduce heat to medium. Add remaining oil to bowl. Add eschalot and bacon. Cook, stirring, for five minutes or until eschalot softens. Add garlic and thyme. Cook for one minute. Transfer bowl to slow cooker. Add brisket, bay leaf, wine, stock and tomato paste. Top with carrot and mushroom. Cover with lid, Cook on low for six hours or until beef is very tender.

Step 3 Remove and discard bay leaf. Using two forks shred meat coarsely. Season with salt and pepper. Serve with green beans and mashed potato.

#### **RECIPE NOTES**

To make this in the pressure cooker, follow steps 1 and 2 in pressure cooker. Seal cooker. Cook, manufacturer's directions, for one hour 40 minutes. Continue from step 3.

#### **Beautiful blooms**

Laanecoorie was the place to be last Saturday afternoon, especially if you admire chrysanthemums. There was much to admire. Table loads of single blooms in vases were set out in the Laanecoorie Hall. There were very large spider chrysanthemums (though grower Graeme assured me he won Best In Show at the Chrysanthemum Society of Victoria's Melbourne exhibition last week with an even bigger one he had grown), others with petals artfully hanging down which reminded me of hats women used to wear in the 1950s and 60s, and anemones with lovely domes; there were also perfectly round little balls to name just a few, as well as my personal favourite the fire wheel. It was red and white with pinched petals towards the centre. Very beautiful.

Graeme Cain won all the certificates on offer at the show because all the other usual growers had difficulties ranging from health problems to soil troubles. In fact nearly all the blooms on display were grown by this Laanecoorie local. When asked he said his garden patch was not very big. All the chrysanthemums were grown under shade cloth until the first bud begins to colour then they need to be protected from rain at critical times. Half his plants are grown in the ground, the other half in pots. It takes a lot of trimming to keep the number of blooms per plant low so blooms can reach their maximum size. He also explained some of the tricks to successfully showing your loved blooms.

As visitors entered the hall door one of the women behind the table was enjoying a mouth watering Devonshire tea. It proved to be great advertising as many people sat down to their own Devonshire tea after inspecting the blooms. Gardening was the main topic of the conversations which buzzed through the room. Thanks Heather and Brenda for your company and exchange of ideas and information.

The chrysanthemum show was run by the Bendigo Chrysanthemum Society. In past years they have hired space at the Bendigo Show grounds and that has been very expensive. This year, because of COVID 19, things have been uncertain for everything. Graeme Cain suggested that the Laanecoorie Hall would be available to them and so the society agreed to give it a go for 2021. If it has been deemed a success then it might happen again in 2022. The society has had a lot of support from the local community, particularly the Laanecoorie Hall Committee and the local CFA. Bendigo Chrysanthemum Society member Julia said the advertising was easier and the support from the local community has been greatly appreciated.

It would be excellent if the Bendigo Society decided to put on a full show in 2022. This would include such things as floral art and vegetables. Hopefully it could all happen again at Laanecoorie in 2022.

# Home owners urged to service wood heaters as tempatures drop

As the temperature drops and the autumn leaves fall, Victorians are warned to have their wood heater serviced to avoid a potential fire hazard.

It is important to have a wood heater serviced regularly to reduce the risk of unintentional fire.

Wood heaters and flues should be serviced each year by a registered or licensed mechanical services plumber to ensure it operates efficiently and does not put lives at risk.

The VBA's state building surveyor Andrew Cialini said consumers need to play it safe when keeping their homes warm.

"Wood heaters that have not been cleaned and maintained properly present the added risk of flue/ chimney fires with the possibility of combustible materials such as built up creosote (wood tar), twigs and other debris catching fire," he said.

"Outside the house, it is also important to keep combustible materials, such as overhanging tree branches, well clear of flues."

Mr Cialini said regular servicing of a wood heater and its flue system address key risk factors.

"It removes creosote, or wood tar, that has accumulated in the heater or flue. This substance is highly combustible, it can build up quickly and block the flue, leading to inefficient heater operation and cause fire," he said.

"A check of the flue system will also help ensure it is free of defects and flammable materials such as grass, small twigs and other debris that may be the result of birds nesting in the flue or surrounding chimney cavity."

#### Tips for operating your wood heater:

- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for lighting, fuelling and operating the wood heater, use paper or kindling wood to get the fire started
- Only use dry, seasoned wood
- Arrange the wood so plenty of air can circulate around all sides
- Always leave the air control open for at least 20 minutes after starting or refuelling the fire
- Do not overfill the heater or try to burn logs that are too large.

#### Wedderburn Open Gallery Mural Project launch

It was an honour last Thursday to launch the Wedderburn Open Gallery Mural Project "Birds Eye View", at the Uniting Church grounds.

On behalf of Council, I would like to congratulate the working group, the artists Andrew Bourke, Jimmy Dvate, Bryan Itch and the community of Wedderburn on this fantastic project.

The Wedderburn Open Air Gallery project originated from local artist Ross Currie, who approached Wedderburn Tourism regarding developing murals around the town. Following initial feedback, the project's working group identified the Wedderburn Streetscape Improvement Project vicinity as the initial location for the murals

Wedderburn Community House, in conjunction with the working group, sourced funding from Creative Victoria to establish five murals – forming the open-air gallery and providing a point of difference for visitors to explore the town. The theme is "Birds Eye View", due to Wedderburn being identified as a mecca for birdlife.

Wedderburn's Uniting Church features the project's sixth mural. The mural was funded by the local community and Council's Community Grants scheme.

The event last week also saw the launch of the Storytown "Birds Eye View" podcast, which is designed to provide an entertaining experience for both travelling tourists and locals alike.

The podcast tells the story of the Mistletoe Bird mural on the Wedderburn Newsagency wall. It also features local conservationist and amateur ornithologist Jeroen van Veen and artist Andrew Bourke telling the story of Jimmy Dvate who painted the mural.

Visitors and locals can listen to the podcast via social media or the Visit Loddon Valley website.

CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOC. INC.

We held our May public CGR&RAI meeting at the Maryborough hub. It was attended by 11 participants including Councillors Long and Sproull.

At this meeting the Airport, Carisbrook levee, Budget, Men's Shed, Assembly of Councillors, Industrial direction, our growing list of FOIs, the Dunolly Mosaics and a few general items were discussed. Councillors Long and Sproull offered an interesting insight into the activities and duties they have partaken in since being sworn in as a councillors. I thank them both for that.

CGR&RAI followed with an assessment of the six months of the elected councillors, the direction and actions are reasonably good, but there are still huge concerns about transparency, accountability and public consultation. Those three councillors promised, and we still would like to see a much better display of those values.

In the council's April monthly meeting, the council endorsed their proposed 2021/2022 budget. The budget includes a rate increase of 1.5% (the maximum autoincrease allowed by the State Government). Using the council's budget figures, the CGR&RAI proposed a rate decrease which we believe is manageable. No expenses would be impacted by a rate reduction, and the Council would still provide all services to the community and undertake all works listed in the budget. One of the elected councillors ran on a platform of addressing the rates and in particular the discrepancy between CIV valuation Improvement Value) increases between residential, rural and business properties. CGR&RAI would like to hear their update on that. The council is holding four community information sessions to explain the budget to the community (the dates and times of the session are listed on the council's website). CGR&RAI encourages the community to attend a session.

We also invite the council to present to the community budget modelling at these sessions; modelling for a zero rate increase and modelling for a rate reduction. The community should be aware of the budget options available and the impact on council's budget as they pertain to their rates. Are these sessions for hearing what the community want, or for the council to inform us of what we are getting? Community consultation or Information session? Regarding the budget — we believe funding allocation toward building assets and property assets seem to have fallen short.

The Airport is being very topical and described as a valuable asset to the community, with the council spending six months already just on lease agreements. We believe only a few of the leases have been settled at this stage . With the actual airport (other than erosion issues and the fences) the maintenance of that asset is paramount if we are to attract more investment and that area should be in pristine condition. Possibly an allocation or commitment to have maintenance works which is so badly needed. As for the town halls we acknowledge the efforts made on some of the town halls in the Shire. But the Maryborough Town Hall which is a very used asset should be open, and the Carisbrook Town Hall is also sadly in need of much repair work. Has any commitment been made to have the Maryborough Town Hall re opened?

The interest in industry development and growth also seems to be amiss in this. For four years we have heard about industry and growth, yet still would love to see some form of action toward this.

Our next CGR&RAI meeting will be in Carisbrook June 1st

#### Changed Forever: Legacies of Conflict exhibition

A new exhibition from the Shrine of Remembrance, Changed Forever: Legacies of Conflict, interweaves stories of migrants from war-torn countries and recent veterans

of overseas service, reflecting the range and depth of experiences of conflict.

Changed Forever: Legacies of Conflict will be officially opened by Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Cr Chris Meddows-Taylor at 2pm on Saturday 15th May.

At 1pm all are welcome to attend a free guided tour through the exhibition with an exhibition storyteller and a co-curator from the Shrine of Remembrance.

They explore reconciliation between the men and women of the Australian Defence Force and the civilian community, and between veterans and their sometimes-estranged families and friends.

For migrants, reconciliation between a past they can never retrieve, and the challenges and rewards of their new community.

Through paintings, sculpture, music, multimedia, poetry and photographs, these personal stories illustrate the effect of global and civil conflict on our society today.

Mayor Cr Chris Meddows-Taylor said this poignant exhibition will be a coup for the local community.

"We are incredibly luckily to be partnering with the Shrine of Remembrance to bring Changed Forever: Legacies of Conflict to the Central Goldfields Shire. This exhibition will no doubt be popular with locals and visitors alike and I am very excited to be launching this moving exhibition."


