# **Sticky Date pudding**



## Ingredients:

Vegetable oil, for greasing
270g pitted, dried dates, finely chopped
310m boiling water
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
2 eggs
100g (packed) brown sugar
225g self-raising flour
1 tbs vegetable oil
1 tsp vanilla essence
caramel sauce
3 tsp cornflour
1 x 375m 1 can light evaporated milk 130g
(firmly packed) brown sugar

#### Method:

- 1 Preheat oven to 180°C. Brush a deep round 20cm cake pan with oil to lightly grease. Line base with non-stick baking paper.
- 2 Combine dates, boiling water and bicarbonate of soda in a heatproof bowl and set aside for 20 minutes.
- 3 Use electric beaters to whisk the eggs in a medium mixing bowl until pale and frothy. Gradually whisk in the sugar. Whisk for a further two minutes or until pale and thick. Sift the flour over the egg mixture. Add the oil, vanilla essence and date mixture and use a spatula to fold together until combined.
- 4 Pour the mixture into the prepared cake pan and bake in preheated oven for 50 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre of the pudding comes out clean.
- 5 Meanwhile, to make the caramel sauce, blend the cornflour with 1½ tbs of the evaporated milk in a small saucepan. Stir in the remaining milk and the sugar. Stir over medium-high heat until the sauce boils and thickens. Continue stirring over heat for a further three minutes. (See microwave tip.) Strain into a jug and place a piece of plastic wrap directly over the surface of the sauce to prevent a skin forming.
- 6 Remove the pudding from the oven and stand in the pan for 10 minutes. Turn onto a serving plate. Cut into wedges and serve with the hot caramel sauce.

**Microwave tip**: Blend the cornflour with ½ tbs of the milk in a one litre (four-cup) heatproof, microwave-safe jug. Stir in remaining milk and sugar. Cook, uncovered, stirring every minute, on Medium-High/650watts/70% for three to five minutes.

# Andrews Government cuts access to local forests

The Andrews Labor Government has created two new National Parks in Ripon. A 15,000-hectare Pyrenees National Park will be created northwest of Avoca. A 5282 -hectare Mount Buangor National Park will double the size of the existing State Park north of Buangor.

Regional Parks will also be expanded, as will Conservation Zones.

Louise Staley, Member for Ripon, said, "The people of Ripon have demonstrated over and over again that they are totally against this move that will lock many out of these areas".

Victoria has a beautiful natural environment that should be preserved and protected. There should be more opportunities – not less – for Victorians to get into our great outdoors and enjoy activities like bushwalking, camping, fishing, prospecting, and horse riding.

Opportunities should remain for locals to collect firewood, hunt deer for food, and keep their timber industry jobs.

Ms Louise Staley said, "Many communities in Ripon such as Maryborough, Dunolly and Creswick fill their motel rooms, caravan parks, and restaurants with prospectors and horse riders. This decision will end all that, creating great economic harm at a time when lockdown restrictions have already put these small businesses on their knees".

Labor's response to the Victorian Environmental Assessment Council (VEAC) will result in the people who know and care for these areas being locked out of the National Park. The more people get out and experience all our natural bush offers, the more passionate people will be about preserving these special and unique places. Furthermore, Labor has let Victoria's existing national and state parks become overrun with pests and invasive weeds. Labor has done nothing to control populations of damaging feral dogs, pigs and deer and is.

Ms Staley, said, "The Andrews Labor Government should be resourcing and fixing its current parks, addressing the weed and feral animal problem in them, rather than simply putting up a new sign on the front gate."

Given Labor slashed the total budget for the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) in the 2021/22 State Budget by a whopping \$601 million, and existing parks are underfunded and poorly managed today, Labor must come clean on how they will fund 65,000 additional hectares of national parks.

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# Supporting students with disability in the Central Goldfields Shire

More students with a disability in the Central Goldfields Shire will receive the support they need to learn, contribute and participate in their schools and classrooms, thanks to the Andrews Labor Government. Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced that Bealiba, Carisbrook, Dunolly, Talbot and Timor primary schools as well as the Maryborough Education Centre, along with all government schools across the Barwon, Loddon Campaspe and Bayside Peninsula areas, and the five supported inclusion schools across Victoria, will receive further funding support to make their school more inclusive for all students, as part of the Disability Inclusion package.

These schools are in Year one of the five-year Disability Inclusion roll-out and will all receive a base level of funding from Term three this year, with additional funding provided depending on the individual school's characteristics.

This new funding support is ongoing and is in addition to support already provided through the current Program for Students with Disabilities.

Schools will use this funding to implement whole-school practices that support the inclusive education of students with diverse learning needs such as autism and learning difficulties. This may include undertaking professional development for staff, employing new disability and inclusion staff, and purchasing programs, interventions or specific equipment and technology – depending on the needs of their students and the school.

For example, a school may choose to use this funding to employ a new inclusive practices leader to work in classrooms with teachers or an occupational therapist to develop sensory profiles.

Other schools may choose to use the funding to invest in the services of external professionals or coaches who can provide advice and training on equipment and technology to support learning for students with diverse learning needs and implement consistent inclusive supports throughout the school.

Disability Inclusion will be rolled out progressively over the next five years, reaching all Victorian government schools by 2025.

The Victorian Budget 2020/21 invested an unprecedented almost \$1.6 billion to make sure Victorian students with disability are supported at school through the Disability Inclusion package.

The record investment will transform support for students with disability in Victorian government schools — doubling the number of students receiving extra support in the classroom to 55,000 — and is expected to create up to 1730 jobs across the state by 2025.

Disability Inclusion will transform funding and support for students with a disability in Victorian government schools, to ensure every student at every ability can thrive at school and in life as we continue to build the Education State.

"This funding will enable schools in the Central Goldfields Shire to support more students with disability, so that they can get the great education they deserve," Ms Pulford said.

This has been a week of several issues which have come to light or reappeared, and need to be discussed and a united decision found.

One which has raised quite a bit of interest is the councils four bin system. Our council is looking at using purple bags (similar to those available for purchase in supermarkets for shopping) instead of taking the state government up on the offer to provide purple lidded (glass recycle) bins.

This has several concerns. After researching other shires and how they do it, the two issues which spring to mind are firstly the purple bins.

Option one — use purple bags, educate the community to drop their glass off to central locations.

Option two — distribute the purple lidded bins and charge the community for monthly (possibly) pick up. Some shires charge more than \$500 annually for glass pick up.

The second issue is green lidded bins (green and food waste) and council's composting facility. Just two weeks back one councillor stated that the green bin is optional "at this stage". This comment raised a few eyebrows.

On 16th June 2021 the Goldfields Sustainability Group organised a tour of the shire composting facility. This was a very informative tour and thank you to the Goldfields Sustainability Group for organising this, and also to our shire for allowing it and the guest speaker for participating.

This was an extremely interesting tour, one which raised many questions. We wrote to the shire asking for information and a reply was received immediately. Thank you to the shire for that. We then asked follow-up questions which have not been answered as yet. So we will make an assessment as best we can with the information we have.

This Carisbrook composting facility is an impressive setup and well done to the shire for that. From previous communication with the shire and on information from the tour, this facility is not paying its own way, and with the information received from the shire earlier it is anticipated it possibly never will.

So council's plans on expansion and increased development of this facility and possibly making green bins compulsory raises several questions.

One question! "is the composting method more cost efficient for the community than sending it away"?

It was mentioned if the facility was to increase, EPA compliance issues and possibly a new location may be required. Hopefully with more discussion a suitable answer can be found. The complete waste and recycle issue can be brought under control. It does not need increased services, or more money thrown at it.

The answer is education and each and every one of us doing that little bit more. Buy smarter, reuse more, and throwing it out will only cost us all more in the long run.

So we all smarten up, take more care and think wiser. Reuse and recycle more.

Due to the present situation and uncertainty around COVID and the winter months ahead, our ratepayers meetings for the first Tuesday of the month will not be held until 7th September 2021. This issue has been raised by several of our members and we have decided to adopt it.



## MAYORAL COLUMN

## Key finance documents adopted

At its Ordinary Meeting last week, Council adopted the 2021/22 Budget, 2021/22 Schedule of Fees and Charges, and Revenue and Rating Plan 2021-2025.

The Budget allocates a capital expenditure program of \$6.92 million, which includes \$3.07 million towards roads, \$350,000 for urban and road drainage, and \$240,000 for footpaths. The total figure also includes \$1.33 million for leisure and community facilities.

There is also a \$300,000 allocation for works associated with the Building Asset Management Plan and full funding of Council's ongoing commitment to community planning of \$750,000.

As outlined in the Schedule of Fees and Charges document, fees and charges will increase by 1.5 per cent – the same as the rate increase in the 2021/22 Budget.

The Revenue and Rating Plan, which is the revenueraising framework for Council, is required to be prepared under the Local Government Act 2020 to cover a minimum period of four years following each Council election.





# **Dunolly Bowling Club History Part 6**

**1980** — Was the year maintenance work was carried out around the club. The remaining bank was replaced around the green, the water tank was removed, a new coring machine was purchased, the mower was overhauled, plus the extensions had began. A vote for a liquor license was taken.

**1981** —The hedges were removed between the entrance and the clubhouse and the area was re-fenced. In the past the club had not paid rates, this was to change in 1982. The club also requested a grant for work on another green. Mrs C. Freemantle donated a Life Members Board.

**1982** — The proceeds from the Bingo afternoons totalling \$261.30, supported the local Miss Australia Charity Quest candidate Miss Marion Woodward.

**1983** — J.D. Sellers tendered for the lighting at a cost of \$2000 which was accepted. 1st November 1983 the lights were switched on.

**1984** — The club needed work on the drainage and applied to the council for a grant of \$2200. A new shed was concreted in, ceiling fans installed in the clubhouse, shrubbery removed around the club house, trees planted, spouting replaced. The last time the club house was painted was in 1972, repainting was completed by volunteers.

**1985** — Construction on the B Green began, Mr A Freemantle wrote "When we have had to renew our greens and the extension of our B Green, members with trucks and earthmoving equipment have saved the club a large sum of money"

**1986** — Discussion regarding the amalgamation of Maryborough and Castlemaine associations was voted against at the General Meeting on 30th July 1986. At the Meeting in August 1986 a note was made in the minutes that the club house would need to be extended again in 10 years. The new green was opened on the 20th September 1986.

**1987** — A second-hand Scott Bonner was purchased for \$1000, a grooming wheel was added to improve the green, a new five foot plain roller was purchased for \$2428.

**1988** —**1989** I am sure work was done however I could not find any records of this, should I come across any information I will definitely post it in future editions.

Due to the necessary purchases during the years 1987, 1988 and 1989 the club was struggling a little bit with finances they requested and were granted a reduction in the rates.
