After 28 years Dunolly Neighbourhood Centre coordinator Sharon Hiley has handed in her keys. Last Saturday a large gathering braved the cold for an afternoon tea in her honour at the Neighbourhood Centre, and a chance to wish her well in retirement.

When the NHC was formed thirty years ago there was no funding for a coordinator. The committee fumbled along trying to juggle their daily lives with organising activities for the NHC. Finally funding for a coordinator became available and Sharon was employed for five hours a week. On her first day she asked then secretary Joan James what she should do. Joan replied that nobody knew and Sharon just had to figure it out for herself. Somehow, through all that confusion, Sharon did figure it out for the next twentyeight years. One of her talents was to create a warm and welcoming space for NHC users, another was to think quickly on her feet when unexpected snags cropped up at the last minute. Many programs were run at the NHC during those years, archery, assertiveness training, computer literacy, dancing, fashion parades, woodwork and youth activities to name just a few. Mostly they came about in a collaborative way with Sharon having to finalise all details. One which proved difficult to finalise was the cooking for one program. Finding funding, then a cook and then navigate COVID restrictions were real hurdles. However Sharon's persistence paid off and the program is currently being thoroughly enjoyed by the participants. The acapala singing group was totally Sharon's idea and has been very successful for some years, but has become another casualty of COVID. Over the years Sharon has taken on some very difficult projects and made them work such as the gala concert in the Town Hall. After all that work everyone connected with the NHC wishes Sharon well in the future.

We are also delighted to welcome Kath Ryan, and hope that she settles into her new role as coordinator and gets to enjoy it as much as Sharon obviously did.

Council endorses draft volunteer action plan

A draft plan to recruit, engage and celebrate volunteers in the shire has been endorsed by council, who will work alongside the Maryborough Volunteer Resource Centre (MVRC) in supporting the community's volunteers.

Central Goldfields Shire councillors endorsed the draft 2021 Central Goldfields Volunteer Strategy and Action Plan at last week's ordinary council meeting and moved to make the plan available for public comment for four weeks. According to the report tabled to council, the strategy and plan aims to support and enhance volunteerism in the community, and provide direction for how council works with the newly formed MVRC.

The draft strategy highlights four focus areas for council, including promotion, recruitment, support and retention, engagement, celebration and recognition of volunteers in the community while the three-year plan outlines how these areas will be addressed.

Creating an online register for volunteers, groups and community organisations has been flagged as a priority, as well as improved coordination of volunteering events and activities and formalised recognition, celebration and support for volunteers.

In moving the motion to endorse the draft, Councillor Grace La Vella said the shire already has a high number of volunteers, which she believes deserve more recognition.

"In the 2016 census it was stated there were 12,995 people in Central Goldfields and of these, 22 percent volunteered with an organisation," she said.

"This was above the state and national average recorded for the same period and equates to just short of 2900 volunteers in our shire.

"I believe our volunteers in Central Goldfields deserve far more acknowledgement and recognition.

"I also believe it is vital for volunteers to feel supported and valued as they so truly deserve."

The draft plan outlines a number of actions both council and the MVRC will undertake, including developing a campaign to promote volunteering opportunities and profiles in the community, develop a policy to recognise council volunteer policy milestones, equip volunteers with resources and training and hold open days to promote volunteering.

The MVRC gave its first official presentation to the community members and councillors earlier this week, following the strategy and plan's endorsement.

The group's Tony Macer said the MVRC is pleased to see a renewed focus on volunteers through the council endorsement and that it was good to present to the community.

"The meeting was our first official presentation to the community but because of COVID, we couldn't have lots of people attending," he said.

"Basically we presented to the community and councillors about who we are, where we came from, what the journey has been and where we're headed. Our next step is establishing a more permanent physical space so we have a presence in the community and that's looking to be either at the Maryborough Resource Centre or railway station. We're really happy with the framework that's being introduced around supporting volunteerism; it's an area that's been really impacted by COVID and it's positive to see the MVRC and council working together to address this. The presentation was also a chance for us to thank our partners for all their support."

Central Goldfields Shire mayor Chris Meddows-Taylor said the importance of volunteers in the community can't be understated.

"We're a relatively small community and we make things happen through our partnerships, and the most important partnership we have is with our volunteers," he said. Thanks to the work of the MVRC, and now our draft strategy and plan, we will be looking at the whole aspect of volunteering in the community — we need to look at how we let people know what's available because currently we don't do a good job of marketing volunteering positions or celebrating the success and achievements of our volunteers. We need to have a refreshed and renewed strategy of engaging people, particularly young people."

At a Special Council Meeting last week, we appointed 20 members to the new Community Advisory Group.

The Community Advisory Group will meet on a regular basis and have important input on three of Council's Shaping Central Goldfields strategic documents, (the Community Vision, four-year Council Plan and long-term Financial Plan) which will help shape our Shire and keep us moving forward for the next 10 years.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to submit an Expression of Interest and congratulations to the successful applicants. I, along with my fellow Councillors, am looking forward to working closely with you all.

Another group I'm currently involved in is the Central Goldfields Climate Action Collaboration. Again, council is seeking individuals in the community to be a part of a dynamic group to produce a co-ordinated response to a complex problem. Our climate response will be developed using a best practice model for change involving three groups:

The Core Team, of which I'm a member, has hit the ground running and already begun foundational planning and will continue to drive the project throughout its duration. The Design Team will come together for five three hour workshops from August to December 2021. Over the design process, this group will reach out to Critical Friends to gather further insights, concerns and ideas from the broader community about climate change. Permanent firearm amnesty launched

The Federal Government has launched a permanent national firearms amnesty, with residents urged to hand in any wanted, unregistered or illegal firearms.

An Australian first, the national amnesty means that from last Thursday, residents can anonymously surrender any illegal or unregistered firearms, parts or ammunition in their possession without fear of prosecution.

In Victoria, anyone in possession of firearms or firearm related items is advised to surrender these to the nearest licensed firearm dealers, who will arrange for their destruction, or contact their local police station to organise for surrender. Maryborough Police Sergeant Frank Docherty said the amnesty aims to reduce the number of firearms falling into the wrong hands.

"The point is that we want people to hand in their unwanted firearms, especially any illegal ones, and this gives people the opportunity to do the right thing without any consequences," he said.

"We don't want these illegal firearms ending up in the wrong hands; for example, someone who may not use the firearms for a legal purpose."

The permanent national amnesty follows the success of a three-month amnesty in 2017, which saw more than 57,000 firearms handed in across the country. Sgt Docherty said while firearms aren't a key issue locally, surrendering any that are unwanted will result in a safer community.

"It's not really a major issue in the area, but it's still an issue and we'd just like to reduce the number of illegal or unregistered firearms locally which ultimately means less crime and a safer community," he said.

"Generally, the Maryborough community is pretty good with this sort of thing and we appreciate the community's continuing support.

"We do strongly advise members of the public to surrender them to an authorised dealer and they will organise for their destruction, but if that's impractical, you must call this station and organise the surrender with us — you can't just walk into our foyer with a firearm.

"It probably gives members of the public a bit more comfort that we (police) are not involved in the surrender of firearms — if we're not involved, we can't prosecute them in any way."

To support the commencement of the amnesty, Crime Stoppers has launched a national campaign — "No more unregistered firearms; that's our aim. Hand them in".

Over the coming months, Crime Stoppers will also hold some 65 grassroots community events across the country to encourage people to hand in unwanted or unregistered firearms.

"There are more than 26 million Australians who place the highest value on living in a safe community, and thousands of law-abiding people with registered firearms that they use for their work or hobby," chair of Crime Stoppers Australia Diana Forrester said.

"Sadly it is the minority who use firearms to threaten and injure others, and it is important to limit the opportunity for these criminals to access and use firearms.

"All of us have seen the harm that is caused by the unlawful use of a firearm and the impact on community confidence that often follows, which is why we all have a part to play in making our community safer — that's our aim."



It is fantastic to see so much consultation happening between our shire and the community. Of late we have had the Community Vision for the Future and Shaping Central Goldfields Advisory Committee. Now the Carisbrook Conversation, Maryborough Community Dinner, combined with the 2021 Satisfaction Survey, Council's annual report, the previous 2030 community review, and the several months campaigning of each candidate prior to the election. Four councillors have previous experience, including three councillors from our previous elected council. I'd say we should have the recipe for an extremely smooth, confident successful journey out of our past. Moving forward with confidence. It possibly all comes down to not what information you have, but what you do with that information you have. We have kept no secret of our applications through Freedom of Information requests.

At present we have seven active FOIs and three of those with the FOI Commissioner. When submitting an FOI the council should take your request, discuss the actual information you are seeking, then work with you to submit an accurate question which the council should either provide the information or provide a legitimate reason why they can not. With our three requests sitting with the Commissioner, our council has added a third dimension to the FOI request criteria — provide a question which they can deflect or procrastinate with.

For example, we have requested a copy of the original Council Planning Permit for a specific project dated 2011. CGR&RAI has supplied the EPA recommendation for that 2011 application. Council have sent us, on three occasions the 2014 amendment and call that the original. It is not only resource intensive but also expensive to provide information on a request for FOI.

All our FOIs are still active concerns which were started well before Administration, so one would think we have better than a good chance at obtaining the true situation with several councillors who actually were part of that decision making process.

That is if the powers that be wish that information to be released. This takes us back to the opening discussion on this weekly report — what is needed for our community? Or should it be how much do our councillors or council want our community to know? Have we really moved forward? We ask the question is this what is needed for a community moving forward?

The councillors suddenly have put back on the agenda terms like "Trust, Transparency, Confidence from the community and working with the community." We will see the gathering of the information, but what will be done after that? It is now up to us the community to make sure that "this time" they actually provide what they are claiming and collate correctly the information they are seeking.

We have the make up for a very successful united community driven by a focused professional council team. Will the pieces fall into place? It won't happen if we don't all strive and work for it. Wayne McKail President

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Proposed Changes to Timber Release Plan

Stakeholder and community feedback period: 2 July – 30 July 2021

VicForests is seeking stakeholder and community comment on proposed changes to its Timber Release Plan (TRP).

The TRP identifies potential operational areas for the coming years and is updated regularly as part of VicForests' ordinary planning process.

The proposed changes will add new operational areas (called coupes) for harvesting and access, amend areas already on the plan and remove coupes that have been successfully regenerated or are no longer required.

Community feedback is sought on matters that should be considered by VicForests in deciding whether to include specific areas in the plan or as part of more detailed planning undertaken prior to commencement of activities in the proposed new areas.

All VicForests' timber harvesting and regeneration operations are conducted in line with Victoria's strict environmental regulations and the State's Forest Management Zoning scheme and are subject to oversight by an independent regulator.

A schedule of proposed timber harvesting areas, maps indicating approximate locations and a feedback form for public comment are available at www.vicforests.com.au/proposed-timber-release-plan-july-2021.

Vaccination Clinic on the move to Community Hub

Maryborough District Health Service's COVID vaccination clinic is on the move, ready to be up and running from the Central Goldfields Community Hub from next week. Originally set up at the Maryborough Hospital's Wellness Centre, from Monday locals will be able to receive their vaccinations from the hub located on Burns Street near the council offices and railway station. The clinic is shifting to allow the Orange Door network, which provides family violence support, to set up in the Wellness Centre as it's due to provide services from September. MDHS acting CEO David Edwards said the move will ensure locals have easy access to the vaccine.

"MDHS is excited to be able to partner with Central Goldfields Shire in providing vaccination services to the Maryborough community," he said. "The new location at the Community Hub ensures the community continues to have easy access to this critical vaccination service that is helping keep us all safe."

The clinic has already administered more than 5000 doses to community members. The hospital is currently offering both Pfizer and AstraZeneca vaccinations for those aged over 40 who are eligible.

Although the Federal Government this week announced anyone aged over 18 can now receive the AstraZeneca jab if they so choose; MDHS will only provide vaccinations, including Pfizer to those aged over 40 who are eligible. Those under 40 seeking the AstraZeneca vaccine can request the shot from their GP. The Community Hub is located at 48 Burns Street, Maryborough (opposite the railway station, behind the shire offices). The vaccination clinic will be open Monday to Friday and appointments must be made by contacting MDHS on 5461 0300. For more information visit: https://mdhs.vic.gov.au/covid-clinic/. In The Vegie Patch



This month can be very cold, and plants are like us, they like sunshine. July is not a big sowing or planting month. With little or no growth over the winter, seeds and most plants are better left until near the end of August.

If space is available now, it is best to sow a crop of oats. This crop will germinate and grow in a very short time; when about 15 cm high, turn it over into the soil. Green manure makes a good Spring fertiliser. This mass of rich organic matter will break down rapidly, and makes good plant food for Summer crops. It helps to keep the soil from water logging and also keeps the soil active.

Sow seeds of parsnip, radish, silverbeet, beetroot and brown mignonette lettuce. Brown mignonette lettuce will grow better during the winter than the green ones. All varieties of peas can be sown this month. Peas like deep soil and plenty of lime. Blood and bone is also a good help for growth.

Broad beans can still be sown and when they are at their growing stage, a good dressing of potash, run along between the rows will make the plants stronger. But if f they get too tall later on cut the tops off, they will then make more shoots and have more bearing heads. Long keeping onion plants are best left until near the end of July.

Plant new bare rooted asparagus in well enriched garden beds, they are heavy feeders and will live for along time. Winter is the best time to top dress existing plants with rotted manure and compost. Cut off all growth at ground level first. Plant new strawberry runners or dig up and divide old strawberries plants now to give them a good start before spring.





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


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Netball

Dunolly Bowling Club History Part 7

1990: As extensions to the clubhouse were required discussions were being held. A rough estimate of \$40,000 to \$50,000 dollars was suggested. The club approached the council about obtaining a loan. They were granted \$20,000 at 15.5% over a period of 10 years. The successful tenders were G.A and D.E Hutchins. Mr and Mrs M Raselli offered a loan of \$3000 to cover the cost of the front window at 12% over three years. The ladies were asked to contribute to the cost of the floor coverings. The club once again approached the council for a reduction of the rates.

1991: Discussion regarding the connection of the sewage lines came up, once again the club approached the council for a reduction of the rates.

1992: Dunolly's Division 2 was successful in winning a premiership.

1993: Questions were raised regarding security lights. Once installed our local police officer reported he was extremely pleased with the lighting. The club expressed interest to the council to pay a reduced loan amount, however the council refused. The bingo club raised \$28 per week, however expenses were \$25 per week. As only \$3 profit was made, this was the end of the bingo sessions.

1994: March of this year a great storm hit Dunolly, damaging the bowling shelters.

1995: Dunolly Bowling Club celebrated its 50th Year. RVBA Councillor Mr Gerry Hoy presented a plaque to the club, which was received by presidents Mr Geoff

Davis and Mrs Norma Peters. Mr Alf Freemantle, Mrs Doris Proctor, Ethel Hurford and Isla Flett were honoured with life membership.

1996: Work to the clubhouse had slowed down, however the greenkeepers were continually working on improving the greens.

1997: The club approached the council to concrete between the kerb and front gate to the clubhouse

1998: The ladies raised the issue of obtaining a stretcher for the club plus having CPR training. Discussions were held regarding a new green and watering system. The club by investing money was in a fairly good financial position and it was able to install a sprinkler system. With the use of a new grooming wheel the old and the new grass would be very classy. Discussions were held regarding proposed Inter-Association between Ballarat and Geelong. It was decided this would be of detriment to the survival of smaller associations such as the Midlands Association. Some club members were tasked with sitting for the Responsible Serving of Alcohol certificate.

1999: The cost of the new green was to be met by debenture, grant or loan, The Goldfields Shire Council granted the club \$12,000 and the new green was installed. The greenkeepers at that time were Bux, Joe, Ron and Keith. However the green was not up to scratch by start of the season commencing 2000. An expert was called in to inspect and advise on the best way to improve the green. Ladies 50th Anniversary was on 16/10/1999.
