Lovel family of Bealiba

I read with great interest your article "Stories from the Museum — A Life in a Scrap Book – Part 1" in Volume 36 Issue 4. I have something that might add to the concept of the Scrap Book and the mention of Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee.

As background my great great grandparents, William Lovel, partner Mary Ann Mayes and two year old son, William arrived in Dunolly in about 1857. That is where their second son Stephen's birth was registered in 1857.

They had left Ballarat in about 1855, shorty after the Eureka Stockade that occurred in December 1854.

William Lovel was really William Laws an escaped Van Diemen's Land Convict.

I surmise that one of the reasons they departed Ballarat was the arrival of the troopers at the time of the Eureka Stockade in 1854. A good time to make oneself scarce if on the run from the authorities

They settled in Bealiba in 1857 and had what was the norm for the times, a large family, numbering 10 children. The last child was Henry George Lovel, born at Bealiba in 1876. Henry George moved to New Zealand in 1901 to go shearing. He settled there, married and started the Lovel dynasty in that country. As I was researching the Bealiba Lovels I was keen to make contact with the New Zealand Lovels. I visited them about 10 years ago and was fascinated to find out how much Henry George had instilled in his family the love for his old home town, Bealiba.

Henry George kept a Scrap Book and I was able to obtain a copy. A fascinating tale of one man's life. Everything from family details, from washing day beside Cochranes Creek, to working in Cue in Western Australia in the early 1900's and some information on his father William Lovel (Laws) sufficient to allow me with assistance to trace his father back to Norwich in the UK.

There was a reference to Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887 on the Bealiba Cricket Ground. It was through the eyes of an 11-year-old boy. It went as follows:

"Queen Vic Golden Jubilee 1887 a bullock on the cricket ground & barrels (sic) of beer, every old boozer there drinking beer & eating half raw meat. I remember it well." The actual writing is shown below:

Roadside slashing update

The crews are making good progress with slashing around Dunolly and surrounds now complete.

Our crews are working six days a week with the next areas of focus being — Bet Bet, Bromley, Timor/ Bowenvale and Majorca.

Please note, should there be any fire ban days scheduled our slashers will not operate.

Dunolly footpath update

Works to construct two new footpaths in Dunolly are continuing and are expected to be complete by the end of next week.

A new 300 meter stretch of footpath is being constructed along Bull Street, between Market Street and Havelock Street — and will provide a connection to the entrance of the Dunolly Hospital.

The second project involves the construction of a new 100 meter stretch of footpath along Market Street, from Bull Street to the Dunolly Swimming Pool.

Both projects are funded as part of the 2021-2022 Council Budget.

New shade sails at Dunolly

Thanks to Anne Webster MP and the Federal Government's Roads and Infrastructure Program two new shade sails are being installed at the Dunolly Swimming Pool just in time for the summer outdoor pool season.

Additional projects soon to be delivered as part of this funding include:

- Fence around Gordon Gardens playground.
- New wayfinding signage.

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Storiës from Cynthia

Life wouldn't be the same if there was no drama to liven things up. This time the dramatic occasion was the birth of my granddaughter's baby last week. Unfortunately she had contracted COVID three weeks ago, as did her four year-old-son, and a week later her partner tested positive. She had declined the vaccine, worried about the baby, so she was given an infusion containing the same antibodies as the vaccine.

Last Saturday night I spoke to her when the pains started and she was very tearful as she would have to go to hospital alone because although she was just out of isolation her partner still had a few days to go. With contractions 15 minutes apart, the midwife told her by phone to hang on longer but suddenly she knew she was ready. They were fortunate to receive last minute

permission for her partner to drive her to the hospital, but halfway there the baby couldn't wait so they had to stop on the side of the road. Daddy, now having to put aside his fear and trepidation, was able to follow the midwife's instructions with my granddaughter begging him to get the baby out, and out she came, cord wrapped round her neck but quickly removed, and then the ambulance arrived. Leilana was a beautiful seven pound baby girl with everything intact.

When I went to order some flowers at Bent Stems I discovered mother and baby were already home

because they had been kept in for only six hours. The wonders of modern science. We used to languish in hospital for a whole week and I loved every minute of it, especially after the birth of my third child. Leilani's brother adores his new sister and wants to kiss and cuddle her all the time. I remember a lot of jealousy from my two-year-old son when his baby sister arrived, so am very glad to see this bonding. Many years ago I delivered my neighbour's baby on the way to the hospital and the situation was almost identical down to the cord round the baby's neck, but there were no mobile phones then so I had to act on pure instinct. She now has her own daughters and lives in Queensland Her name is Sakkara and she calls me her godmother.

Energy efficiency program saves hundreds for households and small business

In a year where stay-at-home restrictions led to bigger power bills for many Victorians, almost 200,000 homes will save an average of \$229 per year thanks to energy efficiency upgrades. A new report released by the Essential Services Commission shows the Victorian Energy Upgrades program delivered energy efficiency upgrades across 189,536 homes and almost 15,000 businesses during 2020.

Commission chairperson Kate said despite coronavirus restrictions curtailing activity for almost half the year, the program continues to deliver.

"With average annual savings of \$229 for households and \$3114 for businesses, this program is delivering in tangible ways for all Victorians,' she said. In 2020, the program:

- Delivered an expected 5.5 million megawatt hours of electricity savings and 591,000 gigajoules of gas savings.
- Over the upgrade lifetime registered six million certificates to offset emissions generated by sales by Victorian retailers.
- Provided employment to 220 accredited businesses.

Chairperson Symons said the integrity of the program was maintained during 2020 with 42 investigations being conducted during periods affected by coronavirus restrictions.

"This included the largest regional investigation ever conducted under the program resulting in enforcement action against two companies," she said.

In another matter, the commission issued a formal warning to an accredited provider after evidence suggested they unknowingly submitted falsified certificate claims to the value of \$620,000.*

Conditions were also imposed on the company to conduct independent audits to ensure any certificates created comply with the program's legislation.

This case was also referred to police for investigation of possible fraud involving alleged manipulation of invoices. (based on certificate prices at the time.) For further information call: 0492 805 003.

New pop-up COVID-19 testing clinic opens in Maryborough

Maryborough District Health Service (MDHS) is working with Central Goldfields Shire Council to open a new popup COVID-19 testing clinic in Maryborough to deal with the extra demand for testing over the coming weeks.

The MDHS drive-through COVID-19 testing clinic will open at Lake Victoria on Friday 29th October. It will operate from 9am to 5pm, seven days a week. No appointment is needed.

Maryborough District Health Service Chief Executive Officer Nickola Allan said the time is right to open the new clinic to make it easier for the community to get tested.

"Thanks to a great effort and everyone working together we have been fortunate to minimise the impact of the COVID-19 in our local community so far," said Mrs Allan.

"However, we are monitoring a small number of active cases in the community at a time when restrictions across the state will ease this weekend, and the situation could change quickly.

"That is why we are asking our community to continue to do all the right things to reduce the risk of spread of COVID-19.

"We know one of the biggest risks of transmission is when family and friends get together, and the reality is there will be lots of gatherings this weekend.

"Meet up outdoors where you can, keep your physical distance, wear your masks indoors or in crowded areas and stay on top of any exposure sites.

"If you do go out, make sure you check-in at the venue and get tested at the first sign of COVID-19 symptoms."

Mrs Allan said getting a COVID-19 test is quick and easy, and you no longer need to make an appointment at the local pop-up clinic.

"Simply drive up and get tested, then go straight home and isolate until you receive your result.

"Don't stop to get petrol or to pick up groceries at the supermarket. Call on your support network for supplies. Assistance is also available if you need it.

"Our community has been doing a great job of looking out for each other and we are well prepared to adjust to living with COVID-19 as part of the new norm.

"About 80 per cent of our community is fully vaccinated, which is a great start. We need everyone to jump on board to help protect our children and others that can't be vaccinated.

"We are also working closely with the Grampians Public Health Unit, Central Goldfields Shire Council and other key agencies to support the response effort," said Mrs Allan.

Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Cr Chris Meddows-Taylor congratulated MDHS for their efforts in getting the new clinic open so quickly.

We're pleased we've been able to support the response effort and thank both our Council staff and the MDHS team for getting the pop-up clinic up and running so that our community can continue to get tested should they have symptoms," said Mayor Meddows-Taylor.

"Our community have done such a wonderful job so far – our vaccination rates are high and our cases remain low but, with restrictions easing again this weekend, it's more important than ever for us all to continue to play our part. "Please continue to look out for one another, be kind, and together we will get through this."

The number of active cases in the Central Goldfields Shire is six and three in the Pyrenees Shire. There are currently no Tier 1 exposure sites at 28th October 2021. To stay up-to-date on local testing and vaccination clinics visit mdhs.vic.gov.au/covid. 

- Drive slowly as you enter and exit the park.
- Look out for other traffic, pedestrians and clinical staff.
- Turn your engine off while waiting in a queue.
- Wait until you receive notification and drive into the testing area/marquee.
 - Turn your engine off and place the car in park.
 - Leave your face mask on until you are instructed to remove it for the test.
 - Return home immediately after your test.
 - Stay at home and isolate until you receive your results.



The amount of grants which our shire has received have been most welcome from state and the federal governments. We appreciate any assistance to get advancement for our wonderful shire. We are lucky to live in very marginal seats in both Federal and State electorates.

With the latest ICAC enquiry involving Gladys Berejiklian and IBAC's enquiries into the Victorian Labor Branch stacking, this has highlighted that our political parties now direct funds not to areas not necessarily most needed, but to areas which they (the parties) will most benefit from.

Possibly you may have noticed since the introduction of the Local Govt Act 2020 our council has been using that act as excuses to not provide information, or reply to issues.

Now we see local shires are being given directives by state government to do surveys, do reports and set regulations in local shires.

There is still the interpretation of those orders from the state government which our local council and councillors have to agree on and then implement.

Last year the result of the federal government Our Community 2030 survey was completed and handed down. Then the state government required all shires to produce a Community vision, Community plan and financial plan. The Vision and Community plans were done mainly using deliberative engagement, along with a few other options.

We would like to thank the Community Advisory Group (CAG), all who participated and those who ran the workshops. Under the present conditions we understand challenges were met and overcome.

At the 26th October 2021 council meeting

Council/Council-Meetings Item 8.5 Adoption of the Community Vision 2031 and Council plans 2021-2025 It began with Cr La Vella glowingly stating that this is "A perfect example of democracy at work".

perfect example of democracy at work". The report on page 73 stated that the CAG comprised of twenty members with eighteen members accepting the invitation. They failed to mention the other two members were refused by Council or councillors. This is the first example of our council's interpretation and rolling out of the state government act. Asking for 20, but council deciding 18 would suffice.

The five meetings along with other community and local group meetings were completed by early Oct 2021. Well done to Lisa and Kylie for achieving that goal.

Item 8.5 is on pages 72 to 82 of the October 2021 meeting agenda.

Throughout that report are many comments which were submitted by the CAG members and possibly others? For example: "Why is the Heritage Bid given such prominence – we need to understand more about what it is and the implications for community". "The only downside was the tight time frames". "Lisa and Kylie were fabulous – best thing I've seen in a long while". "I'm not sure the council noticed the work of the CAG". "One of my concerns was that there was a disconnect between council and CAG, particularly for the long-term Financial Plan". "We need to try harder to pick up the groups that weren't present" and "The CAG worked well, the facilitators did an excellent job and the CAG was largely ignored by Council".

Is this what you would call a perfect example of democracy and being respected for their efforts? As a community we need to feel our input is valued. Respect for your effort paves the way for more wanting to be part of the next study. Does this report feed the communities willingness to participate or give the opposite effect?

Do you feel with comments like above the CAG feel their efforts were respected, listened to and worthy? Safer rail crossings

Member for Ripon and Shadow Minister for Transport Infrastructure Louise Staley, today announced that a Victorian Liberal Nationals Government, would deliver much-needed safety upgrades to the Bet Bet rail crossing between Maryborough and Dunolly.

Ms Staley met with local Rail Revival Alliance member Scott Ramsay to inspect the crossing and discuss the safety upgrades.

The rail crossing has poor visibility and a lack of warnings, meaning an accident waiting to happen.

Ms Staley said she knew the rail crossing well, having driven through it many times. She argued that the rail crossing needs immediate remediation to make it safe.

"There is no warning about the crossing's location, and there is poor visibility because of the bend in the road. Unsuspecting tourists, country residents and transport workers who don't regularly use the crossing would have a minimal idea that it is there until they are right on top of it. I have heard stories from local train drivers who have told me shocking stories of near misses. Trains weighing up to 4000 tonnes are needed using the rail crossing, trains that size a substantial amount of time to slow down.

"Today, I am here to promise the community that an elected Liberal Nationals Government will deliver the much-needed safety upgrades to this crossing,"

"As part of our safety upgrade, we will deliver boom gates, install advanced warning flashing lights in both directions and rumble strips."

Ms Staley said the Bet Bet crossing is just one of many regional rail crossings that the Andrews Labor Government has ignored.

"The Minister for Transport Infrastructure Jacinta Allan is so busy spending hundreds of billions on her Melbourne Level Crossing Removal Project and Suburban Rail Loop Project that she has completely ignored rural rail crossings.

"We know that Labor will never prioritise regional rail and regional communities."

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Coffee and conversations

I sat down with Kath Ryan, coordinator of the Dunolly and District Neighbourhood House, and we chatted about her new role and the challenges the pandemic has brought.

Kath has lived in the area for eight years with her family. They lived in various places around Australia and New Zealand. They liked the idea of settling in a small town because of the community atmosphere and the great school.

Kath worked as an integration aide for four years and was ready for a different challenge, applying for the Dunolly and District Neighbourhood House role earlier this year. I asked Kath what she loved about the role.

"It's so varied. One day is never the same as the previous one, and there are so many opportunities to upskill," she replied.

Learning a new role is very challenging at any time, but the pandemic has made it worse. Normally the role of coordinator would be a face-to-face one, where one might build a rhythm of seeing people, organising classes, and helping instructors; but when faced with repeated lockdowns, the challenges are increased.

"It's a stop, start, staggered approach, which interrupts connections between myself and others," Kath said, "I do love the face-to-face contact and the fact that people have varied needs though."

On a day-to-day basis Kath is helping people get hold of that elusive vaccination certificate, referring people to other professional organisations, as well as helping to organise and promote classes at the centre and the Dunolly Arts Hub.

I asked Kath what she did to unwind.

Taking her dog Rosie for a six km walk, and when restrictions allow more travelling and camping, and of course, visiting family in Melbourne are top of her agenda.

"We used to love going for a nice night out and hopefully we can do that again soon. Until that happens, it's Netflix and Stan and enjoying spending time at home."

I asked Kath what was in store in the future for the Neighbourhood Centre.

While the woodwork and mosaics are continuing, there are many other plans on the board.

Kath explained however, after such a prolonged and difficult time of travel restrictions and lockdowns, many people are reluctant to step forward and leave home.

Add to that the fact that everything has been so stopstart it is difficult to encourage people to come out because they are still worried about the health implications of virus.

As well, people are hesitant to start something new when there is a possibility of it stopping abruptly, and the associated disappointment which occurs.

Nonetheless, there are many new ideas and courses waiting in the wings. While we are all waiting to return to a Covid-normal, Kath is working on ensuring the centre is compliant, sitting in meetings and working on various demands that are all new.

Moving forward, the Centre will be looking to build its volunteers. Anyone with relevant skills who has the time will be called on to help out later in the year.

What is Kath's vision for the Centre?

Kath wants the community to know that the Neighbourhood Centre is just that. A space for everyone to explore and share ideas. She'll be manning a market stall most months to give people the opportunity to tell her what they want to see and happen. So far, she has received some interesting and diverse project proposals.

"We are very open to new ideas," Kath explained, "If people would like to conduct classes and give something a go, we want to hear about it.


