Deluge in Tarnagulla and Surrounds

Taking many people by surprise, on Wednesday last week a huge downpour of rain was experienced, with substantial localised flooding in many surrounding towns. Stormwater drains were unable to cope with the influx of water, dams overflowed and low-lying areas became impassable, as up to 75mm fell over a very short period. Numerous drivers were stranded as floodwaters rose, with many properties sustaining damage, both to buildings and fencing.

As is usually the case with these events, the water subsided fairly promptly, leaving residents and others to mop up and survey the aftermath. Photos and individual stories abounded on Facebook, as people shared their own experiences. These particular photos were taken in the Tarnagulla area, however the impact of the flooding extended much further afield, including to Wedderburn, St. Arnaud, Inglewood and many other localities.

Armistice Day, 11th November, 2021

This year will be 103 years since the truce was signed for the end of the Great War, after over four years of fighting.

The Armistice was drawn up and the signing took place in a railway carriage at a siding in the forest of Compiégne in Northern France. The Allies were represented by Admiral Wemyss and Marshall Foch and the Germans by a delegation led by Erzberger. I will name a few of the terms:

- · Accept total defeat.
- All troops to be evacuated from Belgium, France, Luxembourg and Alsace Lorraine, moving them 23 miles (40 kilometres) east of the Rhine River.
- To surrender all its artillery aircraft, 5000 locomotives, 150,000 railway trucks and 5000 motorised trucks.
- The naval fleet to be interned and disarmed, with 114 submarines to be escorted into Harwich Harbour in England.

The next thing was to get the soldiers home: 95,000 from France and 60,000 from England; and also 12,000 war brides. Eventually they would all be moved, with 200 voyages by about 150 ships; some men not leaving until 1920. Australian soldiers 416,000 enlisted, 68,000 died. Now the thoughts of the people turned to listing the

Now the thoughts of the people turned to listing the names of the men and women who had served their country. So committees were formed then money raised and today we see memorials in nearly every town displaying these names.

Our ANZAC Day and Armistice Day; are the centre point for those remembrance services.

Currently the DDI is working on two major projects:

The first one is to get Dunolly "RV Friendly" status through the CMCA. This project is well on the way to becoming a reality with the Dunolly dump point completion imminent.

The second project is to get the Dunolly Gold Rush Festival up and running again, promoting tourism. First appearing in 1971, it ran for many years before petering out. Due to COVID, the reality of running the festival this year became too much of a challenge, so sights are set on 2022 instead.

However, the DDI came up with an alternative and are now busy planning "Dunolly Unlocked" an event which will allow residents to reconnect by facilitating them to get out of their homes after lockdown. The afternoon will provide a stimulus through council's community grants funding to local food businesses to provide catering and local musicians to provide entertainment.

High teas have now become the flavour of the month. Years ago high tea was a feature of Melbourne's famous Windsor Hotel. On special occasions you might invite a friend or relative to join you at the Windsor for what was then considered a luxury. A glass of champagne would come first, and then a selection of hot savouries served on a silver dish, then the tiny sandwiches and finally the exotic cakes on the silver three-tier stand.

You could choose from many and varied teas in beautiful china pots and bone china fancy cups. Nowadays high teas are popping up all over the place but I have never yet sampled one as elegant as the Windsor.

F. Scott Fitzgerald is one of my favourite authors and I loved reading about the giddy days in the 20s, the Jazz Age, with the Charleston and the flappers and the tea dances. They were always set in places named the Palm Court or similar, abounding with potted palms and tinkly chandeliers, ladies wearing fancy headgear and feather boas and beaded, fringed dresses.

Many years ago I went to a tea dance and was amazed they still had them. It was during the time I was living in London and I was visiting my grandmamma and aunts in Brighton. My aunt Frances invited me to accompany her to a tea dance on the Brighton pier in the late afternoon. It wasn't quite like Scott Fitzgerald's venues but shaped up quite well to my idea of them. There were some big pot plants and old fashioned furniture. A light orchestra was playing and people were dancing; but much older

people than the flappers. The food was not quite up to Windsor standard but did include the good old fashioned English currant buns. An elderly gentleman came over and asked my aunt for a dance but she declined so I hopped up and obliged. We had a waltz, very romantic, and he was old enough to be my grandfather, but I enjoyed it and now I could return home and say I had danced in the afternoon at a tea dance.

By a total coincidence, after I had reminisced about tea dances, my daughter Mel who joins me for lunch most Sundays, arrived with a high tea, all prepared and presented in the traditional way, down to the frilly doilies and dainty napkins. That was certainly a surprise.

New equipment for Central Goldfield Shire's emergency services

The Andrews Labor Government has invested nearly \$200,000 in local emergency services groups in the Central Goldfields Shire.

Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced the Dunolly CFA Brigade would receive funding to deliver a new ultra-light tanker and the Maryborough SES Unit will receive funding for a new Toyota Hilux dual cab four-wheel drive.

These are two of 303 grants sharing in more than \$14.3 million in funding under the government's 2020-21 Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP).

Under the program, the Government matches every \$1 paid by volunteer groups with a \$2 co-contribution up to \$150,000 per project.

The annual grants program gives volunteer emergency service groups the opportunity to apply for grants of up to \$150,000 to purchase equipment including vehicles, trucks, tankers, watercraft and trailers, and for minor improvements including refurbishments and amenities, such as kitchens and change rooms.

Other operational equipment which can be funded includes chainsaws, generators, quick fill pumps and inflatable rescue boats and engines.

"It's going to be another busy summer season for our emergency service volunteers. That's why we're helping to give them the equipment they need to continue doing what they do best – keeping Victorians safe.

"These grants have been going strong since they were first set up 20 years ago – communities will continue to proudly contribute to local fundraising efforts, but we want to help reduce that task and demonstrate that we'll always support our selfless volunteers."

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Fire Prevention

On Monday 8th November 2021, the Loddon Shire Council Municipal Fire Prevention Officer (MFPO) started inspections across Loddon Shire.

The MFPO inspects properties throughout the Loddon Shire, to identify whether landowners are maintaining appropriate levels of vegetation and reducing fuel loads, particularly in high-risk areas. Landowners who have excess vegetation, that is, large amounts of branches piled up or long grass or debris, will be issued a fire prevention notice.

A fire prevention notice is a reminder for the property owner to reduce the fire risk at their place. Landowners typically have 14 days to comply with the notice or make contact with Council to discuss the issue. If the hazard is not removed within the required timeframe, Council will organise for a contractor to enter the premises and remove the fire hazard.

If Council has to arrange a contractor to remove fire hazards, it will be completed at the landowner's cost, plus a \$110 administrative cost. Under Section 41E of the Country Fire Authority Act 1958, a \$1817 infringement notice may also be issued to the landowner for a failure to comply with a fire prevention notice.

Please bear in mind the OVIC or Ombudsman would not take on any complaint if there was no merit. We would suggest there is a common denominator.

We are committed to work with the shire to help overcome these unnecessary, expensive and time consuming enquiries. The 53 percent satisfaction survey result certainly highlighted a real concern.

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In the vegie patch



All frost tender plants or seeds can go in the soil now. November is the time to plant out all the varieties of the pumpkin family. Identical conditions are required for all these plants. They are heavy feeders so dig in at least half a bag of sheep or well-rotted manure into each of several, metre-wide circular seed beds, about three metres apart. The extra bulk creates low, fertile and perfectly-drained mounds. Push the seeds into the surface down to the first knuckle and cover. To be safe, sow several seeds in three groups spaced well apart in each mound. As they germinate, pinch out the weakest seedlings to leave just three strong plants to grow on. Tomato, capsicum, eggplant and chilli seedlings can be planted out now but be prepared to cover them if there are late frosts.

Another easily grown tasty vegetable is the silverbeet or chard. Rainbow chard is definitely the most attractive variety; stems have a range of colours, like orange, yellow and some gold colours. It adds some colour in the garden, and is more tasty than silver beet.

Parsnips sown now will be a good winter veggie and will have a better flavour after being hit by frosts. Beetroot will do well when sown now; it will grow well in most soils, and keep in the soil for a long period of time. If sown too early in the season, they are likely to bolt to seed, when the good growing weather sets in.

Sow dwarf beans from now until the end of February. To have a supply of beans over the summer months, a small sowing each month will give a regular picking supply. Beans like lime and some fertiliser added to the soil before sowing seeds. Seeds which contact with fertiliser or lime are likely to burn and not germinate. Butter beans are best left until later in the season as they will form small curly pod if planted early.

To have a successful crop of sweet corn, the soil should be well fertilised at planting time, and during their growing period. Fowl manure is particularly valuable for this plant; if not available, blood and bone will give good results.

Stories from the Museum

A life in a scrapbook - Part 2

A further delve into this wonderful scrapbook (Part 1 in Vol 36 Issue 41, 27 Oct. 2021), reveals more diverse reflections, recipes, remedies and seemingly random facts. The cut-outs from old newspapers and magazines are only partly visible in the main part, due to many having been used as clothing patterns; the content of some, such as the "Articles for Women" would have made for interesting reading.

One of my favourite sections, although sad, is her account of a railway accident, as follows:

"The Prahran Railway Collision. One of the most shocking disasters that has ever occurred on the Victorian Railways took place in a deep cutting nearly midway between the Prahran and Windsor stations, on the Brighton line, shortly before 6 o'clock on Wednesday evening, 11th May 1887 when the 5.40pm express overran the 5.30 ordinary passenger train, and a collision ensued which was attended with most direful and calamitous consequences. Five persons were killed amongst whom were the driver Frederick Maskell and Jas McNab the fireman of the Express and upwards of 150 other persons were injured. The Express train dashed through the ordinary train as it was standing on the line, the scene was one of painful confusion and distress (sic).




