Exciting new plans for Deledio Park

They are examining and discussing the exciting new plans for the pavilion to be built at Deledio Park, Dunolly last week in Maryborough.

The plans have been finalized after an extensive process of consultation with the local community, coordinated by the Central Goldfield Shire Council.

The plans are very different from those readers may have seen previously.

We have moved away from a model

based on sports alone, and we have arrived at plans which will be suitable for a wide variety of community uses, including sport.

We have now moved on to the next phase of the project, which involves publicity, fundraising and political lobbying.

To this end, we are asking all community members to talk to all party candidates in the lead up to both Federal and State elections, both due sometime in 2022.

Let them know that we think our present facilities are not up to scratch, and we feel we deserve a building of the type which many surrounding towns have.

Dr Webster, Louise Staley (Member

for Ripon), Jaala Pulford (State Upper House Member for our region) and Councillor Long are all on board in agreeing this is a worthwhile project, and one which will be of great value to Dunolly and surrounding districts.

Events are back on the agenda in the Central Goldfields

There is a sense of optimism across the Central Goldfields community with a jam-packed summer of events to look forward to.

Whilst our biggest annual event, the Energy Breakthrough, won't be held this weekend due to the pandemic, work continues behind the scenes in readiness for its 30 plus years anniversary event in November, 2022.

Ongoing site upgrades and improvements to the Princes Park precinct are under way, with site-wide event Wi-Fi planned to be installed and available early next year. This is in addition to an increase in drinking water access, additional permanent lighting and electricity points, the installation of CCTV and a state-of-the-art PA system — funded through the Victorian Government's Crisis Committee of Cabinet Infrastructure Stimulus Fund.

These additions will encourage locals and visitors to use the area all year around, attracting further economic investment to the region and will be completed in time to welcome 20,000 plus visitors back to Maryborough next November. Meanwhile a sense of normality is returning for local community organisations and businesses as a growing number of events are planned for the 2021-22 summer season.

Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Cr Chris Meddows-Taylor said it was wonderful to see events back on the agenda. "Whilst it's disappointing the Energy Breakthrough won't be held this year, our community can be rest assured there is so much happening behind the scenes to ensure next year's 30th anniversary event is the biggest one yet.

"The last 18 months or so have been incredibly difficult for so many in our community, in many different ways. One thing people have really missed is social connection— and the way events form a large part of our lives — we look forward to them and they provide an opportunity for friends and family to get together and have some fun.

"For our business community this is an opportunity for them to look to the future and work towards economic recovery. Similarly for our community organisations — events form such a huge part of what they do — bringing people and communities together for social connection. "I encourage our community to come together and support these events — get your friends and family together — have some fun and support our wonderful community groups and businesses at the same time."



is always а opportunity to welcome one Members our Parliament to our Shire to share our progress and discuss priorities. Last week we welcomed Dr Anne Webster MP the Member for Mallee and together with Cr Liesbeth Long and our CEO and General Manager, infrastructure, Assets and Planning we spent some time around the Shire including a visit to Dunolly to showcase some work

funded by the Commonwealth Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program which includes work at the Town Hall, Gordon Gardens and the shade sail being installed over the swimming pool. A big thank you to Dr Webster for her support for this.

In addition Council is funding a new, 300 metre stretch of footpath which is being constructed along Bull Street, between Market Street and Havelock Street providing a connection to the entrance of the Dunolly Hospital. In addition Council is constructing a new 100 meter stretch of footpath along Market Street, from Bull Street to the Swimming Pool. Shade sails and footpaths are increasingly important in the provision of community

infrastructure. We now recognise the safety that shade provides and there is a greater focus to ensure our key recreation facilities have shade provision.

Earlier this year Council adopted its Positive Ageing Strategy which emphasised the importance of safe and accessible community infrastructure for our ageing population in particular, the provision of quality footpaths. It was so good to see these things which are both wanted and needed, happening in Dunolly.

Loddon Shire Mayoral Column

Last week the Victorian Government announced the lifting of almost all remaining restrictions statewide for fully vaccinated people. There are now no limits in the home and no caps or density limits for cafés and restaurants. We are pleased to be able to welcome tourists and visitors to our businesses and natural attractions in the Loddon Valley.

Masks are required for workers and customers at indoor retail, for visitors and select workers in hospitals or care facilities, for people using public transport, taxi/rideshare and planes, and for workers serving the public at hospitality venues.

Masks are also required for primary school staff and visitors and for students in Years 3 to 6.

The Victorian Government also announced changes around isolation requirements. The vast majority of people who come into contact with a confirmed positive case outside their home will no longer have to selfquarantine. These contacts will be required to get a standard (PCR) test and isolate until they get a negative

This means exposure in places like offices, restaurants or nightclubs won't automatically result in quarantine for the patrons or staff, who previously would have been designated Primary Close Contacts at Tier 1 exposure

The Department of Health will continue to manage emerging outbreaks of concern and "spreader events" and can impose a quarantine period on contacts on a case-by-case basis, depending on evidence.

Exposure sites will no longer be published. Instead, the Department will use the new alert function in the Service

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Victoria app to notify patrons of higher-risk venues where positive cases have been present - such as restaurants, gyms and nightclubs – and advise them to get tested.

The Victorian Government has developed a COVID Checklist, which provides information on what to do if you test positive to COVID-19. You can view the information at www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/checklist

Fire Danger Period for Loddon now in effect The Fire Danger Period for Loddon Shire began at 1am on 22nd November.

This means that fires cannot be lit in the open air without a written permit from the CFA or Municipal Fire Prevention Officer.

Fire Danger Periods are based on local conditions and take into account fuel moisture, fuel loads, grassland curing, weather and rainfall.

Lighting a fire in the open without a permit is an offence and can bring a penalty of more than \$19,000 and/or 12 months imprisonment.

Barbeques and fires for cooking and warmth do not require a permit, but must be lit in properly constructed fireplaces.

The use of an incinerator, chainsaw, lawn mower, welding/grinding equipment and vehicles which come in contact with vegetation and machinery with an internal combustion or heat engine are permitted provided conditions are followed.



COVID-19 testing to return to Florence Lane

Maryborough District Health Service (MDHS) advises the pop-up COVID-19 testing clinic at Lake Victoria in Maryborough closed on Friday 19th November.

Testing will resume by appointment only at the Florence Lane drive-through clinic. Enter and exit via Nightingale Street.

The clinic will operate six days a week until further notice. The opening hours are from 10am to 3.30pm Monday to Friday, and from 10am to 2pm on Saturday.

"We opened the pop-up clinic at Victoria Lake in the short-term to help meet the increase in demand for COVID-19 testing," said Kristen Venn, Community Nursing Team Leader, Maryborough District Health Service.

"It was great to see everyone come out in force to get tested while we had a number of active cases of coronavirus in our community," she said.

"Maryborough District Health Service has tested around 1400 people at the pop-up clinic since it opened at the end of October. It's good to see the service move back to Florence Lane now there is less demand.

"We would like to thank community members for their patience and cooperation over the past few weeks, and acknowledge the effort of all staff who put their hand up to provide a vital service around the clock to keep our community safe," she said.

"We also appreciate the strong support from our partner Central Goldfields Shire Council who worked with us to identify and set up the pop-up site, and provided traffic management to keep everything running smoothly."

MDHS has introduced a two-step process to streamline bookings and help save time at the testing site.

1) Complete the COVID-19 Testing Registration Form by following the links via:

www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/where-get-tested-covid-19 or the MDHS website.

2) Phone MDHS on 5461 0300 between 8.30am and 5.00pm to make your appointment at the drive-through

You must be in a vehicle to be tested. Please let the team know if you need any special assistance at the time of booking.

To stay up-to-date on information about the local testing and vaccination clinic visit mdhs.vic.gov.au/covid. Keep an eye on the MDHS Facebook page as services may be scaled up or down at the last minute based on demand.

"It is important that we all continue to get tested at the first sign of symptoms, which may include fever, chills or sweats, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, runny nose and loss or change in sense of smell or taste," said Ms Venn. For more information about COVID-19 visit:

Tips for drive-through COVID-19 testing

- · Drive slowly as you enter and exit.
- Look out for pedestrians, clinical staff or other traffic, including ambulances.
- Park in a bay and remain in your car.
- Be careful not to obstruct entrances at the ambulance station.
- Wait until you receive notification from a staff member.
- Drive to the testing area / marquee.
- Turn your engine off and place the car in park.
- Leave your face mask on until you are instructed to remove it for the test.
- Return home immediately after your test.
- Stay at home and isolate until you receive your results

Christmases past

Now that Christmas is fast approaching it set me to thinking about all my Christmases in the past. Way back when my children were small our Christmas days were never predictable. My red-bearded jazz musician/potter husband could never be relied on to fit the pattern. One year, when 10 o'clock pub closing had just arrived to replace the so called six o'clock swill, he decided to have a beer or two at the local pub on Christmas Eve. When the kids were in bed I started to do Santa's job and there was a doll's pram to assemble among the presents.

I struggled for hours, not being the technical type, and finally rang a musician friend of my husband to help. He was most willing but most critical of the absent father. When that father did arrive home he was furious that a mate had taken over his role; however by then he was hardly in a fit state to assemble anything.

Another Christmas around that time, I was just setting the Christmas table when I heard the back gate open and in came three mates of my husband's whom he had apparently invited to Christmas dinner when at the pub the previous evening. He had no recollection of doing so and they were politely sent away before setting foot inside. A couple of years later, after my husband had left, he arranged to join us for Christmas dinner and said not to worry about a turkey as he was bringing a big duck. We start the report off with a well done to the shire for their quick work in attempting to rectify the flooding issue at the airport.

floodways — well done to those involved. So pleased to see the community getting behind the very important step of Carisbrook's security. The security and safety for our own town come down to each and every one of us. If left to the council we would possibly still be waiting.

Over ten years now and still waiting for the levee to be finished. We encourage all to get involved and have this long awaited project completed.

CGR&RAI asked the CEO back in February about costings and maintenance of the airport. The CEO's reply was that you will find that in the Annual Report later this year.

We also have on several occasions in the past week asked one of the elected councillors the same thing. That request has fallen on deaf ears. There has been the



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2020-21 Financial and Council's performance statement presented, yet still no appearance of the 2020-21 Annual Report. The performance statement was nothing short of ordinary. Just backing our call that the 53 percent satisfaction survey result was complimentary. Once again we cannot stress enough most of the decisions made by our elected councillors and council are self interpreted with little or no involvement with ratepayers or the community. Our direction heading out of COVID is becoming quite confusing with many members of the community not understanding the mixed messages put out by groups from all sides. CGR&RAI asks that the community understand there are many ways of looking at this situation, and that we all use understanding, respect and through these next few months as an understanding community. Not everyone will interpret the same information the same way.

So please don't judge, but understand and assist. Working together will be enough. Our AGM will be a zoom meeting Monday 7th December at 7 pm online. Please contact us for the link.

Boosting kids' emotional resilience

As another bushfire and storm season approaches, Victorian families are being encouraged to add emotional resilience to their preparation checklist to help children and young people cope with any anxiety or worries they may be experiencing.

Co-author of the Fear-Less Triple P program and Associate Professor at The University of Queensland's School of Psychology, Vanessa Cobham, said that children and young people represent a particularly vulnerable group following natural disasters such as the 2019-2020 "Black Summer" bushfires.

"As a result of the significant disruption to families' lives, the fallout from natural disasters can take a huge toll on children and parents' mental health, with research showing that approximately five to 15 per cent of Australian children experience significant mental health symptoms following disaster exposure," Dr Cobham said. "Parents and children alike may have experienced or continue to experience a range of emotions after recent disasters, including grief, anger, fear, sadness, and anxiety – this is normal," she said.

"Thankfully, there is now a greater understanding of the impacts that natural disasters have on children and young people and there is a lot of work being done to help disaster affected communities move towards a journey of positive recovery.

"Parents can draw on their recovery experience and use the skills they already have in their parenting toolbox to help build their children's emotional resilience before disasters occur," Dr Cobham said.

"Just like you would prepare your house ahead of bushfire season, being emotionally prepared is also important for both parents and children so they can cope with whatever life throws at them in the future.

"As families prepare their emergency checklist this coming bushfire and storm season, parents may also like to add an 'emotional resilience preparation plan' like the one we've prepared below:

Emotional Resilience Preparation Plan

- Be a role model show ways to deal with strong
- emotions to encourage a sense of being calm and prepared.
- Be prepared talking about the possibilities of what might happen and how to prepare is a good way to help kids keep calm and encourage realistic thinking rather than "imagining the worst". This may include involving kids in some simple tasks as part of the planning and preparation.
- Show you're listening kids may experience worry in the lead-up to the bushfire and storm season so listening to their concerns and helping them to accept their feelings is key to strengthening their emotional resilience. Encourage them to acknowledge their feelings and let them pass.
- Emotional support team make a list of family members, friends, and emergency help lines you and your children can call if they are feeling overwhelmed or anxious such as Kids Helpline (1800 551 800), Lifeline Bushfire Recovery (1343 57) or the local Bushfire Recovery Hub.
- Parenting toolbox look at the strategies already in your parenting toolbox to help guide you through this period, including a list of programs or organisations where you can access parenting support how and when you want.

Triple P International Country Director, Carol Markie-Dadds, said that thanks to generous state government funding, Victorian parents and carers can access free, online parenting support 24/7 or attend face to face seminars on Raising Resilient Children and After the Disaster. The available online programs are Fear-Less Triple P Online, Triple P Online, and Teen Triple P Online, plus a guide to parenting during COVID-19, at www.triplep-parenting.net.au.



Emergency services share in Government funding



Dunolly CFA Third Lieutenant Cheryl Renfrew and Captain Ken Duell are excited to have received more funding to add another much needed vehicle to their fleet after securing their new Forward Command Vehicle late last year.

Two local emergency services are set to share in \$200,000 of government funding to help them purchase new vehicles, which will allow them to respond quickly and efficiently to all crises their communities may face. The Dunolly CFA received part of the funding to secure a new ultra-light tanker while the Maryborough SES are now set to purchase a Toyota Hilux dual cab four wheel drive.

The funding comes from the State Government's 2020-21 Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program which sees the government match every \$1 paid by volunteer groups with a \$2 co-contribution up to \$150,000 per project.

Dunolly's new tanker is a smaller four wheel drive style vehicle and fire

brigade Captain Ken Duell said the brigade is contributing \$22,500, which will be topped up by the grant, bringing it to a total of \$147,500.

"Each year we've been fundraising and the public has been donating to us regularly and this is now the outcome which is great, my thanks goes to the people of Dunolly and surrounds for keeping us going," he said.

"The vehicle is expensive but it has state-of-the-art equipment on it. It will be replacing an older unit we have which has become a bit too old.

"We use it to go out on strike teams for the rougher terrains which are hard or impossible to access for the bigger tankers." The brigade also received \$80,000 to purchase a new Forward Command Vehicle in September 2020 and Mr Duell said the brigade's vehicles are now all up to date.

."We try to keep our vehicles as up-todate as possible. We've done well recently with the new command vehicle as well," he said.

"All our vehicles now are right up to date which is great."

Mr Duell said the new tanker likely won't be at the station until the new year.
