Instead of a doctor, my night visitor was a paramedic and my embarrassing predicament was that I had fallen out of bed and was unable to get up due to my two replaced knees. It was more of a slide than a fall as Maddie had woken me to let her out and I swung my legs over my slippery, satin doona and down I went like a slippery slide.

After trying and failing, trying again holding on to the knobs on the chest of drawers, I finally gave up. The wonders of modern science. Thankyou so much, Shaun and Kelly. I have given Maddie strict instructions to go out before bedtime and I plan to stay on my feet from now on. Of course everybody said they would have come to help me when telling my story to others.

Most of you are probably aware I am a farmer together with my husband out at Timor West. We have commenced our harvest and I thought I would write about that in some detail, as some of you may not actually know what that means, apart from the obvious of removing a crop from its paddock.

You have probably noticed an increase of heavy vehicles on the roads recently consisting of mainly trucks carting grain to the Dunolly Silo, but also the odd header (which is the big machine the size of a Tiny House) or field bin (a mini silo on wheels). Traffic on the road is only a small part of harvest, which is a complex operation with lots of people doing lots of different things all at the same time, to make the process work.

My husband drives the header. It cuts the crop and threshes the grain out. This grain is then stored in the 'box' on top of the header. The chaff is chopped up and comes out the back of the header in a cloud of dust and all sorts of bits and pieces, you certainly do NOT want to stand near there, especially if its oats!!! Once the 'box' is full I, as chaser bin driver, drive slowly and precisely alongside the header and have the grain transferred from the header into my chaser bin. It is a hairy part of the process, as I need to drive super straight and at exactly the same speed as the header. If I'm too close the chaser bin can hit the 'front' which is the big comb that cuts and scoops up the crop. If I'm too far away, the 'auger' the big tube that moves the grain via a metal spiral, won't reach. Not all farmers use a chaser bin. Some just use field bins placed around the paddock and the header drives over to them each time to unload. However, using a chaser bin means that the header never stops as you're unloading 'on the fly'. It is much more efficient and means that the job gets done quicker.

Once my chaser bin is full, I drive it to our truck and unload into that. Once the truck is full, our driver Dave takes it to the Dunolly Silo. Once there, it is tested for a heap of stuff such as moisture, impurities (bits of chaff, other seed etc) and in the case of canola, the oil. If the oil is above a certain percentage, we get a bonus paid on top of the going rate. There are a few different ways we can sell our grain; we can take out a pre harvest contract for an agreed price, we can sell on the day of delivery, or we can warehouse it in those big blue bunkers and sell it at a later date. We usually do a bit of all three.

The two biggest challenges of harvest are the weather

and breakdowns. You can't harvest when it is raining as wet crops won't thresh. If there is a lot of rain the grain can sprout and then it gets downgraded, and you won't get nearly as much money for it. The grain can also get 'stained' which are tiny spots of mould on it. If a breakdown occurs, you need to wait for parts to turn up so you can fix the machine and get going again. So when the weather is good farmers will go for as long as possible and sometimes we won't get home till 11.00pm at night. Harvest usually lasts between 4-6 weeks so by the end tempers can get a bit frayed, especially when you work with your husband! And of course, my councillor obligations don't stop either, nor would I want them to. I bring my laptop and mobile phone with me so I can attend meetings via video conferencing and tend to emails and calls. My tractor cab literally becomes my office and in fact this column was written from the cab. But aside from all this, it is one of my favourite seasons. The three of us work as a team, turning up day after day for weeks, to get the job done in the end.

In the first week of December we sent three letters to the council, addressing issues regarding the Disability Action Plan 2021, the shire scooter study and concerns re local road issues.

Within three days we had responses on every issue and all with polite informed replies. This is a fantastic outcome. We are delighted to see this, and hope this form of communication will continue.

We still have three issues sitting with the FOI Commissioner (CEO's KPIs, Carisbrook levee grant application and the Asset Register viewing needs to be finalised). One is with the Ombudsman regarding plans claiming to be used in formulation of key policies at present, and further action on this issue will depend on the outcome of discussions with the Ombudsman.

CGR&RAI believe our well worn track to the Ombudsman and FOI Commissioner is not necessary, and it is a total waste of ratepayers' money and resources. We hope this path will stop and transparency and openness will be used, and the path to restoring belief and trust in the system and council can commence. Of late at several local events we have attended we have been asked what the aim of Ratepayers is and who is our target? There is one simple reply to that.

"Our aim is to work with council and the community to restore belief in the system, and to have our council and councillors working within their own policies. A well managed transparent council will receive the respect of the community. This is not about social positioning or personal targets. This is about our community working together and setting standards for our shire's future, our children and their children's future. Community, trust and respect.

However when deflection, not adhering to transparency and or adhering to policy by council or councillors, instead of throwing our hands in the air and believing it's not worth the effort, CGR&RAI pursue each issue in order to rectify the concern in question, with the hope the issue we have just elevated will be the last.

Our organisation was formed on July 4th 2018 after a group of locals met and were concerned with the direction our of Administrators. Our aim is to have the shire functioning in a manner where the community can feel confident that they can approach the council and councillors and believe their concerns will be answered directly and satisfactorily. We strive for that day.

As the elected President since July 4th 2018, I would like to thank the committee who, without them, I am sure I would have been locked up by now.

I believe some of the community do not understand what a correctly run organisation looks like and the President is really a figurehead.

In a well run democratic organisation all decisions are made by committee and members. I genuinely would like to thank every elected committee member who have been the back bone of CGR&RAI, and also the members who without their support we would not be in this position and those community members who have contacted us over the time.

The stationery, hall hire, phone and internet accounts and registration all need to be met. Membership assists that. We are self funded and do not receive grants or council support. Not to mention the hours and hours of research and brain storming done to make sure every report we



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Dunolly hobby farm gets council approval

Central Goldfields Shire councillors have voted to approve a planning permit for a hobby farm in Dunolly, despite an officer's report which recommended it be refused.

Councillors moved to grant the permit at last week's ordinary council meeting, citing the decision as one of the more difficult ones the elected representatives had encountered since being sworn in 12 months ago.

The decision relates to planning application 079/21 and concerns a property in Broadway, Dunolly which currently has one ram, six ewes, goats, alpacas, a miniature pony, hens, roosters, cats and caged birds.

According to the report tabled to council, the animals are kept as pets for companionship and are well cared for, with a number of previous visits by council officers raising no welfare concerns.

The report states however that the landholder made the permit application after council received a number of complaints including that animals were escaping the site and regarding odour from a pig that had previously been kept at the property.

The application had been referred to Goulburn Murray Water, who had no objection with the application being granted however required the landholder to ensure animal waste was not disposed of directly into waterways.

Two objections to the application were received from surrounding landowners, raising issues around animals being kept in a residential zone, damage to fences, stock on roads, odour, animals attracting flies, devaluation of neighbouring properties and concerns around the future use of the site if the permit was approved.

The officer's report recommended that given the application was inconsistent with the residential zoning of the land and would negatively impact surrounding residential properties, councillors move to refuse the permit.

During last week's meeting however, councillor Liesbeth Long presented an alternate motion where councillors granted the permit, with a number of conditions attached. These included a limit to the maximum number of animals kept on the property, with no more than five ewes and one ram on site for a maximum of three years, two alpacas and one miniature pony no larger than seven hands and 10 poultry animals, with all animal feed to be stored in vermin-proof containers and additional fencing to be installed, among others.

Cr Long said the issue had weighed on her mind and she understood the importance of animals as companions, however said council's regulations must be followed to avoid "anarchy".

"As a primary producer, I know how much joy and companionship farm animals can bring to an individual, improving their wellbeing and mental health.

"However, I also know farm animals are not the same as domestic animals — namely dogs and cats, they require different management, care and containment.

"Council rules and regulations are a very important part of council, they exist to allow everyone to live in a safe and harmonious environment and without them, the shire would soon turn to a place of anarchy.

"In this alternate motion, it is possible for the applicant to keep their animals as pets by reducing the number of animals on the property through rehoming or natural mortality."

Cr Long's alternate motion was seconded by Cr Geoff Lovett, who said councillors had a meeting with the applicant some time ago about the issue which he said left him concerned about the situation.

"I have to say I was left quite distressed and uncertain how I would vote on this issue and I know from a series of emails that were sent (after that meeting), my fellow councillors felt exactly the same," he said.

"My dilemma at the end of the day was that we have a series of council by-laws and there are government instrumentalities who have laws that strictly control things like animal faecal matter into water ways.

"To be perfectly honest and let's say it, we have a farm in a residential area and to me that is the crux of the matter."

Cr Lovett said council had to follow its own rules and regulations and while it would have made sense to accept the officer's recommenda-tion and refuse the permit, Cr Longs motion was fair and reasonable for everyone involved.

"Although there is some personal sympathy for the applicant involved in this, we do have a set of rules we must abide by, they are our rules and if we choose to ignore them for whatever reason, what message does it send to the rest of the community?" he said.

Cr Grace La Vella echoed the sentiments of both Cr Long and Cr Lovett, citing the planning permit decision as an "extremely difficult" decision to make.

"This motion is one of the many extremely difficult decisions councillors need to consider and decide on in their term," she said. In this case we are torn between the sentiment and legislation of local laws, this motion sits under many legislations we must adhere to.

"I believe the alternative motion is an acceptable compromise."

All councillors voted in favour of the alternate motion with the exception of Cr Gerard Murphy, who argued the three year limit on the ewes and ram was too long and should be reduced to one.

I found the recipe for invisible ink to be interesting, with the use of common oil of vitriol in water.


She suggests to write with it using a clean pen, when dry it will be invisible, but on holding it to the fire it turns an indelible black.


Agnes' recipe for fruit salts, by the combination of ingredients, might have been a successful indigestion remedy, with the combination of Epsom salts, magnesia, cream of tartar, bicarbonate of soda, tartaric acid and sugar, however the resulting effects might have been worse than the

original complaint. There are so many seemingly drastic 'cures' in this book that it makes one wonder if the person receiving treatment actually survived; the partly-obscured toothache remedy being the most obvious, with its use of oxide of arsenic, another ingredient (obscured) and sulphate of morphia mixed with a little creosote.

I will leave that one to your imagination and continue to seek out more of these gems for future instalments.


