On 7th December 2021 we held our AGM via Zoom.

At this meeting a 14 page Transparency and Accountability report was presented which was a summary of 17 of the many issues we have had (ongoing and closed) with the Central Goldfields Shire. This document highlights more than 50 issues where we felt the council's action, or lack of action, affected the community. This report was sent to all financial members and is available to non-members on request. Please email us on cgoldratepayers@mail.com and a copy will be forwarded to you.

The annual election was also held and all positions were vacated. There were two nominations submitted asking all of the previous committee be kept on. As we would like to see more participation in the committee, there were no other nominations so the serving committee was thanked and the election took place as per Model Rules.

The outcome was:

 Vice President: John Tully
 Secretary: Judi McKail
 Treasurer: Michael Chainey
 and Committee members Sue Tully and John Wright.

Last week CGR&RAI mentioned about council replying to concerns regarding a dangerous road. Council responded in quick time on all three enquiries. They followed through on the stated temporary repairs to the road and the works were done.

We do not expect council to action every issue raised with them, but we do expect them to respond, and at least give an acceptable reply in a timely manner. Of the three issues mentioned, one was completed, the other two were explained very well. This is the professionalism we would expect from our council to every resident. We would like to thank two council staff who corresponded and acted in this case. A very positive and appreciated effort.

Of late our councillors have been broadcasting many issues — three in particular:

1. What a fantastic group of elected councillors we have — a perfect mix.
2. How fantastic the Deliberative Engagement is.
3. How well the council and councillors engage with the community and their transparency.

On 26th October 2021 at the council's meeting, items 8.5 Community Vision, Council Plan, and item 8.7 Long term Financial Plan was passed by council. On reading these plans it was noticed there was a key plan stated to being used in the formulation of all these above-mentioned plans. CGR&RAI contacted the council questioning the existence of that plan. We were informed that a plan of that name was not in use with the title stated in those plans. We then contacted Cr Meddows-Taylor for the same plan. He deflected and refused to acknowledge this plan. Transparency. Really? Deliberative Engagement was used to assist in the development of these plans as well.

So it now comes to how can the Deliberative Engagement assist in the development if a plan was stated to be used and it appears not to exist? This issue was submitted to the Ombudsman and the Ombudsman has stated they will be investigating this issue.

Deliberative Engagement — much as it is a fantastic tool and participated by very keen community minded members, if they are not given all the information then their role is only partial.

Is Deliberative Engagement used to hear representatives of the community, or an excuse for council to state we used community consultation. Which brings us to why did all the councillors vote to accept those three policies knowing the plan in question did not exist, or did they notice at all? What are the councillors being told?

With Christmas upon us CGR&RAI would like to thank everyone for their support over the past years and we would like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and an extremely prosperous New Year.

Our next meeting will be a casual outdoor gathering in Maryborough on 1st February 2022 at this stage. Thank you and stay safe.



Due to the impacts of COVID-19, the deadlines for you to provide your first certificate of barrier compliance to us have been extended.

For pools and spas built:

- on or before 30th June 1994 (deadline – 1st June 2022)
- between 1st July 1994 – 30th April 2010 (deadline – 1 June 2023)
- between 1st May 2010 – 31st October 2020 (deadline – 1st June 2024).

Grassfires move so quickly, it's **impossible** to outrun them.

This summer, significant pasture growth in paddocks and roadsides means that fast-moving grassfires will be a serious risk across Victoria. Rural grassfires can be just as dangerous as bushfires, and can actually spread even faster, travelling at speeds of up to 25km/h. If you live close to open paddocks or grasslands, you could be at risk and need to be prepared. On high-risk Fire Danger Rated days, the safest option is to leave early.

Better facilities for Bealiba Primary School

Students in Bealiba will have better school environments to learn and succeed in, with the Andrews Labor Government funding key maintenance projects at schools right across the state.

Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced Bealiba Primary School is among 94 schools sharing in \$7.26 million of Planned Maintenance Program funding for vital improvements to classrooms and school grounds.

Bealiba Primary School has been allocated a total of \$105,000. This includes:

- \$65,000 for high priority maintenance works on the school's *Shelter in Place* building. These works will be delivered by the Victorian School Building Authority on behalf of the school.
- \$5,000 to address high priority maintenance tasks identified in the school's Rolling Facilities Evaluation, including external surface revarnishing, fascia repainting and seating replacement.
- \$35,000 for high priority maintenance tasks identified in the school's Specialist Assessment to address the school's roof issues.

The Planned Maintenance Program works address priority maintenance issues identified by the Labor Government's ongoing evaluation of all school facilities – with work including fixing roofs and windows, repainting walls, resurfacing floors and replacing windows, pathways and stairs.

Almost \$1 million of the funding will go towards maintenance to Shelter-in-Place buildings at 10 schools, which provide temporary accommodation to staff and students during a bushfire until emergency services

arrive, or as a shelter of last resort.

The announcement brings the amount of Planned Maintenance funding the Labor Government has provided to schools in the 2021 school year to more than \$47 million. This fund makes sure all existing buildings at Victoria's 1,500 government schools are safe, modern and properly maintained to ensure students and staff are comfortable and safe at school.

In the past seven years, the Labor Government has invested more than \$10.9 billion in building new schools and more than 1,700 school upgrades, creating more than 13,500 jobs in construction and associated industries.

With 62 schools opening between 2019 and 2024, the Government is well ahead in its work to open 100 new schools by 2026, ensuring every Victorian child has access to a great local school.

Shallow creeks, gurgle, chatter and froth on their way. Deep waters flow quietly and steadily. Colin Sullivan's historic research was deep waters.

How we will miss the lights he shone into our past. Long remembered and treasured was his remarkable research and presentations for many special Bealiba historic celebrations.

The history for the 150th anniversary celebration of the Primary School, was really challenging. So many original documents had been destroyed or lost. Yet Colin managed to piece together a rich and most interesting history. He presented this body of work in an accessible manner for any of the visitors who had come to Bealiba for that special weekend.

Colin was able to hold in his memory different geographical areas alongside a wide range of periods of time, and then piece them together. Many Bealiba organisations were the recipients of this clever transposing of place and time.

Colin would pass on an article about our Historic Station which he discovered whilst searching for an entirely different matter. The CWA, churches, the school and particularly the Cemetery Trust, all received information from him after he had trawled through newspaper archives, data bases and all the other "tools" used by knowledgeable investigators.

Bealiba Historical Society enjoyed one of its proudest moments thanks to Colin's excellent work. BHS has received a "letter" from Britain regarding family tree information. In due course, a family travelled halfway around the world arriving in tiny Bealiba. Colin arrived at the BHS meeting with a box full of their history. He had newspaper articles, christening records, service records, school records and could you believe it ... a cousin (by marriage) – in person!

This Progress Association was able to use Colin's services from the time he first arrived in Bealiba. His home was directly opposite to the Community Hall. So he became the hall key keeper, often helping with set-up and clean-up duties, when the frequently used hall held occasions and activities both large and small.

ANZAC displays, "back to" celebrations, photographic competitions, Colin was there to help.

He was an office bearer for many years, supporting town clean-up Australia days, reservoir and cemetery activities. Friends of Bealiba was a special activity inspired by Nola McClelland. Colin undertook trips to Bendigo with Nola to secure funding and information for the project. The results are there for all to see in the Main Road. Where there had been a dirty weed-ridden drain, there is now a stretch of parkland surrounded by native trees.

Colin left this world too young, and he will be sadly missed.

He expanded the fields of history for the whole district through his creativity in research. He reliably undertook responsibilities for Bealiba village management. He worked in the pub and could befriend all comers. A quiet, gracious and lovely man now lies at rest in Bealiba Cemetery.

Dunolly chosen to trial an outdoor promotional program

The businesses selected to participate will be provided with a marketing package including signage and display elements which reflect the business, e.g. a pedlars cart filled with baked goods, a planter box with signage, or a vintage wheelbarrow full of antiques.

The program begins on Saturday 18th December and will continue through to the end of January with an option to extend.

If successful, the elements of this pilot will be rolled out as part of a broader marketing and advertising campaign across the Central Goldfields Shire and benefit all businesses in the region, encouraging visitation, tourism and shopping local.

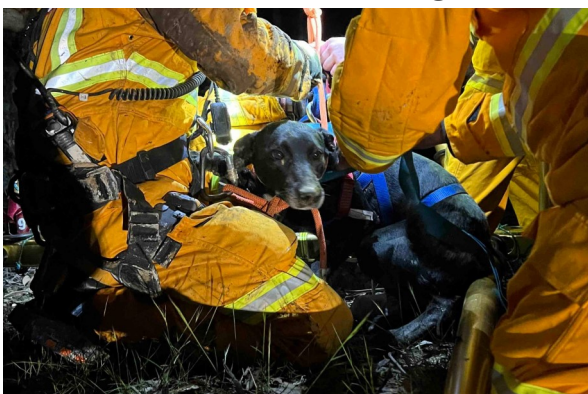

When it rains, it paws for CFA Oscar1 Brigade



A specialist CFA brigade has been called out to two incidents within a week, both involving the rescue of a dog from a mine shaft.

Bendigo-based Oscar1 Brigade helped rescue Bruno the Bull-Arab on Sunday 5th December after he'd fallen down a mine shaft at Castlemaine Diggings National Park.

Captain Daniel McMahon said it was quite unusual and surprising to receive another call less than six days later, this time to rescue Terry the Kelpie-cross from a mine shaft at Woodend.

"The owner said they were camping and the dog just went for a

run, but as it was night and you can't see these mine shafts at the best of times, he just fell down the hole," said Captain McMahon.

"The Woodend team did a great job in securing the scene because one of the biggest risks at a job like this is the owners trying to communicate with their loved animal and ending up falling into the shaft as well.

"It was a 15-metre shaft but we thought it may have been a false floor, meaning there could have been another 10 or 20 metres below if the floor had collapsed.

"Terry was in surprisingly good nick though with no injuries, so we hooked him up to the ropes and Woodend brigade helped pull him up.

"The owner was ecstatic when they were reunited."

Captain McMahon said it was great to have a good result from both incidents in Castlemaine Diggings National Park and Woodend.

"We hadn't been called out to a rescue in quite a while, so to have two similar jobs in a week was quite surprising.

"Rescuing a dog in a mineshaft is a serious job, but for us it also doubles as a real-world experience in case we are called to a community member in the same unfortunate situation.

"In both scenarios it's a multi-agency effort, there's crowd control required and there's a very concerned person pushing us to rescue their loved one."

Santa supports My Health Record

Santa has joined the Australian Digital Health Agency this year to urge Australians to give themselves the gift of better health care by using their My Health Record.

"I've been using mine for years now and encourage the elves to do the same," Santa said.

"Like making a list and getting it right, having your health information in one place means you don't forget the important things."

"I travel a lot at this time of year and if I do get sick, I don't need to tell my health story over and over again," Santa said. "It's all in my digital record including my vaccination status. Besides, there simply isn't enough room in the sleigh for more paper. With digital records, I don't need to carry around physical documents."

Agency Chief Clinical Adviser Dr Steve Hambleton said "Santa knows the last thing we want is for him to suffer an adverse reaction because any new medication interacts with what he is already taking."

"If you're taking medications that help you have better health, it's important all your healthcare providers know the name and dose of those medications. This is particularly important if you're admitted to emergency or unable to remember details. Plus, Santa's regular GP can be updated online, for when he returns home. Surface mail takes too long, especially at this time of year."

Santa suggested that for anyone not connected with their digital record, the Christmas holiday break could be a great time to get connected.

"Most Australians already have a record but they aren't always taking full advantage of it," he said. "While many Australians have 'gone digital' to adapt to COVID-19 check-in requirements, not all have yet recognised the full benefits of their own digital health record – which generally contains a health summary and COVID-19 pathology results as well as the digital immunisation certificate. If the record doesn't have all a person's health records, a quick chat with their regular doctor can sort that out."

Santa said better health was the perfect Christmas gift, so Australians should talk to their friends and family over the holidays, to make sure their loved ones are also using their digital records so that their health information is available as and when they need it.

"Follow up your health checks, don't put your health on hold," Santa said. "Good health is like the gift you unwrap throughout your life."

Chronological age is considered irrelevant to many of us because we are the ones who believe that the way you feel and behave determines how old you are. I never feel old so therefore I am not old, despite my 80th birthday looming on the horizon. I liken myself to the Queen who was nominated as the oldest working body in the UK. She declined the title and her response was that she didn't qualify because a person is only as old as they feel. Obviously the Queen at 95 doesn't feel old.

A friend of mine recently lost his mother. She was 106 when she died and right up until the end she could read, crochet and knit, watch TV, and she remembered all the authors she had read, knew the names of everyone and needed almost no medication. Another person I knew sadly lost her 25-year-old son in a car accident when she was in her 60s. Overnight she turned into an old lady because her grief robbed her of all the pleasures in life. She started to shuffle along, bent over, decided she couldn't walk the distance to the shops, lost her ability to cook for herself and generally lost the will to live.

Long ago I modelled myself on my Aunt Frances staying with her in England when I was in my early 20s. We were in Brighton and my aunt decided to go with me for a swim at the sea baths. To my shame I was a bit embarrassed accompanying her in her moth eaten old bathers but arriving at the baths I saw lots of older people in old fashioned togs splashing about. I was ashamed of myself.

On the way home we walked through a children's playpark and my aunt told me that the only thing that stopped her having a swing or going on the slide was that she would probably get laughed at because of her age, but that didn't deter her from wanting to have a swing. That really surprised me and has become my mantra.

Her mother, my Grandmamma, was always full of life and when she died at age 99 she thwarted the *London Times* which had prepared an article for her 100th birthday, but she died a week before.

I plan to invite you all to my 100th.

That's a wrap for the community vaccination program

With community vaccination rates above Victoria's double dose target, Maryborough District Health Service will soon close the Community Vaccination Hub on Friday 17th December.

Now is your final chance to make an appointment at the hub if you haven't received the COVID-19 vaccine or if your booster is due.

If it's less than six months since your last dose, boosters will be available from GPs clinics and pharmacies moving forward.

According to Wendy Giddings, Director of Clinical and Quality Services at MDHS, the COVID-19 vaccination program has been a good example of everyone working together to protect the community from COVID-19.

"The Communication Vaccination Hub was set up by MDHS in March, in partnership with Central Goldfields Shire Council and local GPs, to roll out the local COVID-19 vaccination program smoothly," said Ms Giddings.

"Since then we've seen people of all ages roll up their sleeves to receive the vaccine as they became eligible, including a keen response from young people aged 12 years and over.

"We would like to thank everyone who helped our community in the Central Goldfields and Pyrenees Shires exceed a 95% double dose vaccination rate by the end of November.

"We've seen amazing teamwork from staff from areas such as nursing, infection control, pharmacy, administration and customer experience to keep the clinic running smoothly and with the greatest care, while managing the demand with available vaccine supply," she said.

A number of nurses put their hand up to return to the workforce to help manage the demand, while the Community Services Team conducted outreach clinics in smaller towns for vulnerable clients.

"Over the past week, members of the MDHS vaccination team have jumped on board a bus to give booster shots to clients in our residential care facilities in Avoca and Dunolly, as well as Wattle Rise,," said Ms Giddings.

"It's nice for us to end the vaccination program back where we started, in looking after the safety of our older more vulnerable community members," she said.

Ms Giddings urged anyone who can get vaccinated to make an appointment to help protect those with a medical exemption and younger community members.

To book your place before the hub closes, call 5461 0300 between 8.30am and 5pm weekdays.

Health services are still awaiting more information on the rollout of the vaccination program for children aged 5 to 11 years. The program is expected to start from January 2022 pending advice from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation.

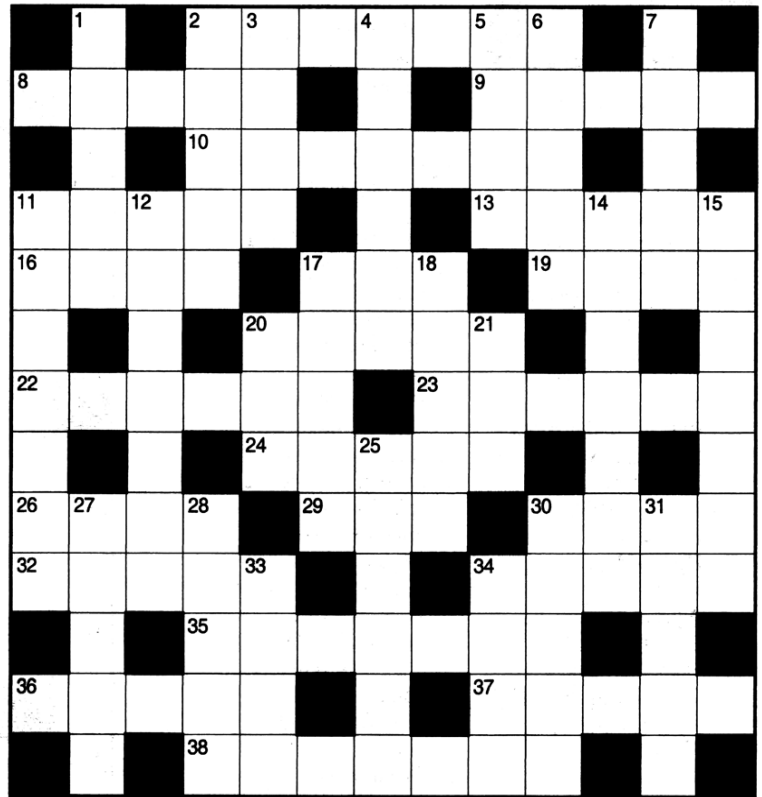
